Gen. Joseph E. Hawley has been renominated for Congress by the Republicans of the First District of Connecticut.

Mrs. BERMINGHAM, of Leavenworth, Kan., is the last to give birth to four children at one time—two boys and two girls.

The Governor of Iowa has appointed Miss E. C. Stebbins, of New Hampton, Chickasaw County, a notary public. She is the only woman holding that office in the State.

MR. F. T. PALGRAVE, whose "Golden Treasury" is the best anthology of English poems in small compass extant, is compiling "The Children's Treasury," including the best poems for young persons.

The London Academy says that the Scottish collection of ballads known as the "Glenriddell Manuscripts," which Professor Child, of Harvard College, searched for so long, has been found in Edinburgh.

The German Emperor has presented to the public library of Geneva, of Switzerland, a splendidly bound copy of the works of Frederick the Great, in 33 volumes. The edition is that published by the Prussian government, which is not on sale to the public.

It is stated that the Earl of Derby has accepted from Spain, as indemnity for the Virginia outrage on the British subjects, £500 sterling for each white and £300 for each black man murdered.

WHILE Mr. Bancroft, in one sense, concluded his history with the tenth volume, in order that in the event of his death his work might not go into literature unfinished one, he is now at work upon an eleventh volume, which at least he hopes to add to the previous series.

THE New York Commercial Advertiser calls attention to the fact that no one of the United States Senators known as Liberal Republicans will occupy seats in the next Senate. It might have added, says the Washington Republican, that not one of the weak-kneed Republicans in the present House will ever be re-elected.

AN EXTRA SESSION of Congress is probable, if it turns out that some of the important appropriation bills failed of passage last night. A Washington special to the St. Louis Democrat dated Feb. 27 says that the statement the President would not call an extra session if the river and harbor, deficiency, and sundry civil appropriations should fail, was an error. So far as the latter bill is concerned, should that fail, it is held by the cabinet that an extra session would be absolutely necessary. This bill, among a great number of minor matters, contains appropriations for all public printing and binding, engraving notes, bonds and currency, revenue service, light house system, expenses of all United States Courts, surveys of all public lands, District of Columbia, including all national benevolent institutions, all public buildings, and lighting and heating the same, arsenals and navy yards.

THE FORTY-THIRD CONGRESS concluded its existence last night. We have kept our readers pretty well posted as to its proceedings. We shall not get the important action on some very grave questions at the very close for a few days. The press dispatches, as they are received here, will only give us inklings of what has been done, and that in a partisan and garbled manner. We have to depend at last for all true information on the special dispatches of the St. Louis and Cincinnati papers. As fast as they are received the readers of the EXPRESS will get information as to all that was done at the close of the session, including the final action on the important measures under discussion. The session has been an earnest, excited, and stormy one, and the whole country has sympathized with its spirit.

MRS. MACMAHON, the wife of the President of France, is said to be a very sensible woman, for the reason that she is obstinately opposed to following the Parisian fashions that are periodically inaugurated for the rest of the world by the "loose women" of the French capital. The example of these strumpets, she says, is not more worthy of imitation in matters of dress than in morals. And she is right.

THE LONG AGONY of deserved punishment which the Republican party of Texas has suffered for electing J. W. Flanagan to the United States Senate, came to an end last night at "four twelve." Whether or not the victim of this long and well merited suffering will ever fully recover from its effects, remains to be seen. At any rate, the pain has ceased, except so far as its fearful recollection is concerned. If there ever was an old fraud par excellence in any party, it is J. W. Flanagan. Without the ordinary intellect, without honor, without loyalty to either personal or party friends, the laughing stock of the Senate, the butt of the press, the shame of the United States, the disgrace of Texas, and the indelible odium of the Republican party of Texas, he had a species of long enunning, and a long experience in tricky and corruption, which enabled him to fill his own capacious and greedy palms and pockets with money the possession of which is a discredit to the high position which "he most unworthily filled. But "the place that has known him will know him no more forever." Let us inspire fresh air, and begin life anew, now that this taint is removed from the political atmosphere.

THE Herald of this city publishes a letter from a correspondent in Austin which is terribly severe on Gov. Coke (so-called) and "little Guy Bryan," the Speaker of the House. The Herald pronounces Coke the most arrant "time-server" Texas has ever had for Governor. The correspondent makes it appear that Coke has done his utmost, with the help of his tools, the Attorney General and the Speaker of the House, to have international railroad compromise bill defeated, whatever shape it might assume, to avoid having to take any position himself with regard to it. He did not wish to sign the bill, nor did he wish to veto it. He sought to dodge the issue entirely, and to throw all the responsibility on others. Now he is compelled to "face the music." Lieut. Gov. Hubbard says that they made him "face the music," and now he wants Coke to be made to do the same thing.

The people of this country will learn after a while that the EXPRESS rarely makes a mistake in its estimates of public men. We have had but one opinion of Coke from the beginning. We think as much of him now as we did in 1874. If he signs the International railroad bill, or allows it to become a law, much as we shall be gratified at the fact, we shall think no better of Coke than we do now; if he vetoes the bill we shall think no worse of him than we do now. The man is hopelessly bad, and he cannot redeem himself. We have not opposed him and his administration from any partisan motives whatever. We do justice to all good and honorable public men, Democrats as well as Republicans; we condemn all bad and faithless public men, Republicans or Democrats; and we place Richard Coke and J. W. Flanagan in the same category.

NEWS SUMMARY. The President has signed the Civil Rights bill. Adjutant-General Lorenzo Thomas is dead. Congress has adopted a rule that gentlemen standing as witness before either House shall be free from arrest, coming, going, and during stay. The resolution not to interfere in Arkansas passed by a vote of 149 to 96. The bill equalizing bounties passed the Senate. The tax and tariff bill has passed the Senate. The post office appropriation bill restores the franking privilege temporarily so far as Congressional Record and other public documents, and permanently so far as seats are concerned. Gov. Kellogg has vetoed a bill to divide the State of Louisiana of about a million. Hotels in Virginia and Baltimore are closing on account of the Civil Rights bill. GARIBOLDI'S PLAN FOR IMPROVING THE TIBER. ROME, Feb. 23.—The Government surveyors have made a report, declaring Garibaldi's plan for the improvement of the Tiber practicable.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association be, and they are hereby, tendered to Miss Nettie Power Houston for her contribution of the beautiful and pathetic poem, which has been read this day on this occasion, and further, That our Secretary be, and he is hereby, requested to furnish Miss Nettie with a copy of the foregoing resolution, (which has been done.)

The following pre-ambles and resolutions were also presented by Jas. L. Truchear, T. V., and adopted:

Resolved, That the International railroad bill has passed both Houses of the Legislature, only needing the sanction of the Governor, it is Resolved, That the Texas Veterans Association of Bexar, respectfully urge and request the Governor to approve the same by signing the bill, and that our Secretary forward a copy of these resolutions with the names of the signers to the same, (which he has done, and the copy sent to the Hon. J. H. McLeary, our member in the House.)
