John Mitchell, the Irish agitator, is dead. This will relieve the English Parliament.

The telegraphic dispatches are barren of interest.

The German Parliament has voted an appropriation of \$75,000 to pay expenses of representatives to our Centennial.

Judge Divine is reported to have made a speech at Galveston in favor of St. Patrick.

It is not very consistent for Democratic newspapers in Texas to keep up their denunciations of strangers as carpet-baggers and in the same issues invite immigration to settle up our waste places.

Only one month is allowed in which to make the returns of the vote on the Constitutional Convention, to issue the proclamation and to meet at Austin. It was evidently the intention to defeat the measure by not allowing sufficient time to execute the law.

The Pension business is a fraud. It can be proven that pensions have been secured for persons who fought against the cause of the Texas Republic. Not only have persons not entitled to pensions received them, but bonds have been issued twice over to the same party. Coke's reform government is a swindle from beginning to end. Pay your taxes!

Joe Davis has written a letter dated Feb. 24 to some one in Maryland explaining how his feelings were towards the north even during the war. This is taken to be a bid for the nomination of the Democratic party for the Presidency. As a native of Massachusetts, the ex-President of the Confederacy no doubt feels a natural yearning towards the sod of the old Bay State.

We stand shoulder to shoulder. Official contemporary, the Herald, in its issue of March 20th, comes nobly to the front as an advocate of division. Had the Herald ranged itself upon the side of those who for selfish or partisan motives are willing to sink the prosperity of West Texas in order that they may float their own selfish schemes, we should have regarded our labor as lost; as it is, we feel encouraged that every intelligent man in West Texas will favor division, regardless of political predilections.

The Proposed Constitutional Amendments consist, first in a change of the Judiciary system, making the Judges, Supreme and District, elective, and fixing the term of office at 7 years for Supreme Judges and four for District Judges.

Second, doing away with the interjection upon the Legislature passing any law, and allowing such laws to be enacted.

Third, to enable the Legislature to pass a law disqualifying certain citizens from serving on Juries.

Fourth, doing away with road and bridge tax.

Fifth, adding a new section to the "General provisions" limiting the State debt to \$500,000. The horse is gone, let us lock the stable door.

Sixth, abolishing the Public school provisions and introducing cash and establishing a color line.

We shall publish these amendments in connection with the original motions, and we feel certain that they will not meet the approval of those intelligent men in the State.

The school amendments will be certain to get us into trouble if there is any virtue left in the Congress of the U. S. The act admitting the State to representation is based upon a guarantee that the public school system should remain inviolate and be carried out.

The clergy, Judiciary and the army have all sided with the latter favor. It only shows what a battle the Civil War was, that it was whenever they undertake to meddle with the Constitution.

### Will it Carry?

The Constitutional Convention question is beginning to agitate the public mind. The Democracy monopolize this agitation, an Republicans regard it as the special pet of that party. From Coke down to the Democratic ward bumper, the cry has been a Constitutional Convention; they put it in their State platform, and every Democratic office-hunter pledged himself to bring about a Constitutional Convention; almost every Democratic newspaper has declared the present Constitution to be an enormity, forced upon them by Federal bayonets, only to be tolerated until it could be done away with by a convention called under Democratic auspices. This agitation permeates the rank and file of the Democratic party, and those who have sworn to the wind will reap the whirlwind.

### The Democratic office-holders

from Coke down, regard the Constitutional Convention as a bitter pill, as it will end their official terms, and they are quite sure that they will be left out in the new deal. Consequently, while there is an outward show on the part of these office-holders of favoring the Convention, they are secretly working to defeat it; party pledges and party platforms sink out of sight in view of a fat office; with this army of office-holders opposing the calling of a convention, will it carry? We place no confidence in the pledges of Coke and his fellow office holders;—we regard all this cry against the present constitution as the meanest kind of partisan hypocrisy; and we have failed to see one single good or valid reason advanced by a Democratic newspaper or politician, why the present constitution is not good enough, or in what particular it is faulty, but they have broadly asserted that they must have a new constitution, and they dare not take it openly now that the responsibility is upon them.

Will the office-holders be able to defeat the convention by their secret opposition? We think not. It is true that they form a powerful force in controlling the ballot box, but to every Democrat, now in office, who is opposed to the convention there are a hundred out of office who will favor it in hopes of securing a place; and we believe it will carry.

Rumor says that a political convention is to immediately take place in San Antonio, having in view the formation of a plan for governing the next political canvass in the West. It is said that parties propose to engage in this movement, who, if they do so, will soil their official raiment, and lose themselves that respect which friends have extended them. There are dignitaries, who, when they have accepted official positions, should themselves honor and uphold their dignity.—Statesman.

From the above we guess the Statesman has information of Coke's underhanded movements to defeat the Constitutional Convention. Either this or Judge Divine is coming home to help us out. Come on Judge; be not afraid of the taunts of a pampered press; it is no dishonor to maintain our rights.

The question of Division can no longer be blinked—it will have to be met—and division of the State, with Western Texas as a distinct autonomy, is a foregone conclusion. Nothing can prevent it; it may be retarded, but the people of Western Texas are too intelligent, too enterprising, to be trampled much longer by the shackles imposed by a foreign population—aye, not only foreign to them in feeling and in interest, but positively hostile to them in their every relation in life. We, of course, refer to the people beyond the Colorado.—San Antonio Herald.

What has the State of Texas ever done for education in our midst, the endowments for seminaries, colleges and universities have been all concentrated East of the Colorado river, even of the lands granted by Congress to the several States, Texas sold her portion, put in the pocket of her agent, and then after the amount had been wrested by commissions, etc., the balance she sunk in some village or town in Northern or Central Texas.—A Herald.

### Charity.

Not long ago, a young and poorly clad girl entered a barber's shop at Vienna, and told the proprietor that she must "buy hair." The barber examined her long, glossy, chestnut locks, and began to bemoan. He could give eight guineas and no more. Hair was plentiful this year; the price had fallen; there was less demand, and other phrases of this kind. The little maiden's eyes filled with tears, and she hesitated a moment while threading her fingers through her chestnut locks. She finally threw herself into a chair. "God's name," she gasped, "to be a beggar!" The barber, satisfied with his hair, was about to climb to his hair chair, when a gentleman who sat half closed looking on, told him to stop. "My child," he said, "why do you want to sell your beautiful hair?" "My mother had been nearly five months ill; I can't work enough to support us; everything has been sold or pawned, and there is not a penny in the house." "No, no, my child," said the stranger; "if that is the case, I will buy your hair, and will give you a hundred guineas for it." He gave the girl the note, the sight of which had dried her tears, and took up the barber's shears. Taking the locks in his hand, he took the longest hair, cut it off alone, and put it carefully in his pocket-book, thus paying one hundred guineas for a single hair. He took the poor girl's address, in case he should want to buy another at the same rate. This charitable man is designated as the chief of a great industrial enterprise within the city of Vienna.

### First Order under New Law for Retention of Legal Fenders.

Under the new law to provide for the redemption of specie payments, which directs the Secretary of the Treasury to retire eighty per cent. of the new national bank notes issued in legal tenders until the whole volume of legal tenders outstanding is reduced to three hundred millions, the Secretary will shortly direct the retirement of over one and a quarter millions in legal tenders, nearly sixteen hundred thousand dollars having been issued in national banks since the passage of the law. The legal tenders to be retired will be taken from the cash in the vaults of the Treasury, canceled and burned by the proper officers of the Treasury Department.

Don't, the famous horse artist, has lately brought his wonderful horse Dick from San Francisco to the East to prepare for the spring meetings, which commence about the first of May. The car in which Dick made the journey is described as being especially designed for the ease and comfort of race horses. Stalls padded with Brussels carpet, beds for the horses to lie in, wire screens for the windows to keep the sparks from the boiler to keep him warm, a contrivance to keep him cool, hot water for his feet, a bonnet with screened walls and ceiling, for his keeper, driver, longes, face curtains, mirrors, silver lamps and a side-board of fine wines for his guests and admirers. So much for a horse. Mean while the harness drivers receive two dollars a day for seventeen hours work, an allowed ten minutes for meals and five hours for sleep, and receive their discharge when their strength is gone, which with this sort of treatment is not likely to survive a few months service.

Kit Carson, the old frontiersman and Indian fighter, has a tribute paid to his memory by Mrs. Jessie Fremont. In her entertaining sketch of "Distinguished people she has known," she says: "He was certainly no savage, rude or ruffian. His domestic life was as regular and blameless as that of any domestic in New England. Even in his remotest haunts he was as sober and steady as clockwork. He once said, speaking of a man who had drunk himself into a stupor: 'If ever I get the chance I will do him an honest job.' A volume could scarcely give a more vivid idea of the old frontiersman than this phrase."
