The resolution endorsing the President's course in the Louisiana troubles passed the U. S. Senate by a vote of 33 to 24.

HEAVY WRITING.—Our Democratic cotemporary, the Herald, is addicted to a heavy style of writing indicative of the massive brain of the editor. In speaking of the contemplated impeachment of Attorney General Williams by the next Democratic House of Congress, the Herald says: "That before such a prosecution as will be waged against him by Randall, Cox, Clymer, Kerr and other opposition leaders and lawyers, his rotten and lathsome record must crumble like a lump of sand under an iron roller."

Is just this iron roller a metaphor that captures the Southern mind. Who can blame us if we surrender in the face of such crushing arguments?

A Few Points about Connecticut to Keep in Mind.

The election to be held in Connecticut on the 5th of April, next Monday week, is for Governor, State officers, and members of Congress. Last year Ingersoll, Democrat, had a plurality over Harrison, Republican, of 6,782, and the year preceding that the Democratic plurality was 6,086.

To show any evidences of "the tidal wave," the Democratic ticket must carry Connecticut by an increased majority, while if they lose the State, or the "tide" recedes and leaves them on the ragged edge of a minority, the case would be a hopeless one, for the "tidal wave" part.

Frontier Protection Fallen Through.

The State troops, organized with such a flourish at the beginning of Coke's reign, are to be withdrawn soon and disbanded. The Legislature gets the credit of doing it, because they failed to make the requisite appropriation to keep these troops in the field.

During the winter there was little use for these troops on the frontier, and Coke has used them as a kind of state police force to regulate some of his unruly partisans in Dewitt county and elsewhere.

Coke's Waco organ, "the Examiner," tells the frontier people that "they must now rely upon the protection of the United States forces, not always very alert or effective, in this kind of service, because of the red tape nature of their system of leading warfare."

This is refreshing news to the suffering frontier. This going away with the rangers was simply a retrograde movement of the Democratic party, which had pledged itself in favor of frontier protection. This frontier plank was merely to catch the frontier vote, and now it is not needed.

Our frontier people ought to begin to do without the Democratic party which in the State Legislature, still to vote appropriations for frontier protection, and in Congress pursue the same course towards the U. S. Army. If the democracy was in power at Washington our frontier, would not even have the consolation of the "Waco Examiner."

Louisiana. Governor Kellogg has issued a call for an extra session of the Louisiana Legislature to convene on the 14th of April next. The proclamation of the Governor limits the subjects for the consideration of the Legislature to adjusting the political differences; the revenues of the State, how to collect and disburse; amending the funding bill so as to prevent fraud; the condition of New Orleans; the relief of the commerce of New Orleans; and to incorporate a board of trade.

Peace seems to have been restored to Louisiana under the wise management of a Republican Congress; the very air seems redolent with good feeling. McJannet disappears from view; and the White League frantically throw up their hats and hurrah for Kellogg. The vapid press of New Orleans contains words of approval and praise; and from all appearances, a political millennium has been inaugurated in the pelican State. This will all do very well until the next general election, when we may expect a repetition of political troubles in Louisiana, as both parties are thoroughly corrupt.

The Black Hills. Gen. Custar did not mean to stir up the depths of mankind by writing his glittering descriptions of the gold fields he discovered in the Black Hills, sometimes called "Custar's Paradise," but the sequel is likely to prove the most exciting gold-hunt known since the days of 1849, when California was all the rage.

This new El Dorado is situated in Dakota Territory, and is embraced in an Indian reservation, covered by a treaty, the stipulations of which oblige the United States government to keep out all intruders. The distance from Fort Laramie is 180 miles; from Bismarck on the Union Pacific railroad 201 miles, and from Sioux City and Cheyenne City about the same distance.

Last October a party of twelve men under the leadership of John Gordon left Sioux City and spent the winter in the hills. Gordon and another man of the party returned to Sioux City the 1st of this month and reported splendid success in mining, notwithstanding the severity of the winter. The reports brought by Gordon and his companion were taken up by the press and now thousands of adventurers are on their way to the Black Hill determined to seek their fortunes notwithstanding the Indian treaties and the efforts of the Government to protect the Reservation from invasion. So great is the excitement, and so tremendous the rush that the matter is assuming a very serious aspect. A recent telegram reads:

OMAHA, March 25.—Gen. Ord has advised that miners are leaving several points for the Black Hill country. Ord orders the parties to be brought in, the leaders confined, and their outfits to be destroyed. Fifty Indians scouts to expel or capture the intruders.

This will not stop the flood, and the Government will be compelled to make an arrangement for the Indians elsewhere. The policy of removing immense regions of country to remain the idle hunting ground of a pack of savages is entirely out of keeping with good statesmanship or civilization. The Indian should be allowed the first right as a prescriber, and only entitled to as much land as he can cultivate and use for farming purposes; he should be treated as a citizen and not as an alien—and he must bend or break to the usage of civilized men. Let him become a gold hunter and his poverty would soon be at an end.

The Black Hills country is described as one of wild romantic beauty; well timbered and watered. Texans seldom contract the gold fever and we advise them to wait awhile before they go to "Custar's Paradise."

Secretary Delano reports to the President on the present situation of affairs in the Black Hills country. The expeditions forming and those already in the territory reserved to the Indians, he says, are in violation of our treaty with the Sioux, and will be prevented from entering the reservation or expelled therefrom, as the case may be, by force of the United States. The Indians object to the intrusion. At the same time, the Secretary says, every possible effort will be made to extinguish the Indian title to the Black Hills country, and negotiation to that end are now progressing. The sooner they are brought

to a successful close the better. Civilization is bound to advance, and the adventurous pioneer of the West are hard men to hold back, especially when the tempting stories of the wealth of the Black Hills region lure them forward.
