THE THIRTY-MILLION CALL

Its Probable Effect Upon the Gold Market and the Result of Its Success.

The Boston Post, eminent for the soundness of its commercial and financial views when directed of political prejudice, has the following just comments upon the policy of the late call for thirty million bonds for the sinking fund:

Speculation is rife in commercial and banking circles to discover the probable result. The registered bonds are nearly all held in this country, and if the call is made, the gold will be sent to the Treasury for their redemption, and the way into the hands and strong holding their coin reserves.

Of the \$30,000,000 coupon bonds called for, \$10,000,000 are held in this country, large amounts, owing to recent prices, having been imported since the opening of the year.

If this showing be verified by the facts fully one-half of the amount of bonds called will be paid for by domestic holders, and that amount of gold will be retained in the country, breaking down the combination of the stock market and the importation of foreign gold.

At Waso on the 27th of March, a Mr. G. J. Buck shot and fatally wounded, Dr. Caldwell. Buck was released on \$2,500 bond.

If the people of Brownville and Corpus Christi fail to get up a war with Mexico, it won't be because they don't try.

The Democratic motto "tidal wave," is now used to designate the Tilton-Beecher trial, it is called "the tidal wave of fifth."

A cattle man, James R. Scott, subscribed to the Corpus Christi railroad donation fund "one beef" per mile for fifty miles.

In Corpus Christi, on the 21st of March, a man named Tom Galiger was stabbed by a Mexican. Not fatally.

Capt. McNally is in Austin, his special State police appointed by Coke having been disbanded. McNally states that he fears the disturbances in DeWitt county are only temporarily allayed.

There is trouble in Austin because its mayor sold some city bonds for 73 cents to Foster and Ludlow who disposed of them at 85 cents. The bankers simply infused more value into the bonds.

The Houston Telegraph wants the Texas Democratic newspapers to stop making mouths at each other over the International railroad question. The Telegraph is one of the whipped.

In the face of Father Walker's denunciation of the free schools in N. Y., a communication from the representatives of the Catholic parochial schools asks the appointment of a committee of the Board of Education to meet with them for the purpose of considering the terms upon which those schools may be admitted to the benefits and subjected to the discipline, laws and general management of the common school system.

There are fifty thousand pupils in the Catholic schools, and the proposition comes in good season to add point to the rebuke administered to the bigoted assailant of the common school system.

COKE FINDS ANOTHER CARPET-BAGGER.—We find the following in the Austin Statesman:  
The Sulphur Springs Gazette condemns the appointment of Cheno with as judge because older citizens and good lawyers applied for the place. Fortunately, Governor Coke does not deem longevity, in or out of Texas, an element of history and character indispensable to fitness for office.

The Democratic party, with Coke at its head, has become essentially the nursery of Carpet-baggers. There was a time when the Republican party could claim the distinction of being the special friend of the Carpet-bagger, but that poor boast is gone.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.—USURY.—ENLIGHTENMENT.  
THE CONSTITUTION AS IT IS: Sec. 44. of Art. 12 reads: "All usury laws are abolished in this State, and the Legislature is forbidden from making laws limiting the parties to contract in the amount of interest they may agree upon for loans of money or other property; provided, this section is not intended to change the provisions of law fixing the rate of interest in contracts, when the rate of interest is not specified."

AMENDMENT AS PROPOSED. Sec. 6. That section forty-four of article twelve shall hereafter read as follows: The Legislature may by law regulate the rate of interest. We submit this comparison to every business man in the State, and to every citizen with common sense, enough to know that usury laws are fruitless and really an infringement upon the liberty of the people, and we feel sure the constitution as it is will be preferred.

Money is worth what it will bring—and there is just as much justice in regulating the rent of a man's house and premises as the rent of his money. Renting usury laws promote dishonesty and never attain the end aimed at.

The new Penitentiary.

Are we a community of Micawbers? Is a question that will soon be an interesting one for our literary clubs to debate, unless our people keep wide awake to their interests and secure the business advantages offered them.

Coke recently appointed one of our very worthy citizens, Maj. T. A. Dwyer as one of the Commissioners to select sites for two new penitentiaries; and one of these institutions is to be located west of the Colorado.

The location of a penitentiary at San Antonio would be worth, in the course of ten years, as much as the building of a railroad to our city. In fact, if we had such an institution here now it would secure a railroad in less than twelve months.

What are the advantages, asks a sleepy citizen, to be gained by having a penitentiary?

1st. A large sum of money will be expended for buildings and machinery, giving work to mechanics and business to merchants.

2nd. The support of such an institution requires an annual expenditure that is sufficient to support a good sized town.

3rd. It will furnish a market to farmers, and stockmen, for their cotton, wool, hides, skins, &c.

4th. It will build up the country about it.

5th. It will better instead of injuring our morals.

Auburn, New York, is the seat of wealth, refinement, and enterprise, all produced by the manufactures of the Penitentiary. Frankfort, Ky. is another instance of the effect produced. It is the pleasantest place in the South.

It would be worth half a million to San Antonio, and it is time our business men were looking after it.

The State of Michigan will hold an election on Monday next for Judges of the Supreme Court, Regents of the State University, Judges of Circuit Courts, Superintendents of schools and township officers. This election has peculiar interest; the Republicans had a very small majority in November last and it was attributed to "tidal wave" influence. We shall see if Michigan does not do as New Hampshire did.

Mr. John S. Kennedy has resigned the office of President of the International and Great Northern Railroad Company, and has gone to Europe for health. Mr. Sam Sloan, of New York city, has been elected President, vice Mr. Kennedy. Mr. Sloan is a prominent capitalist and railroad man, and is well known in business circles as the President of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company.

General Items.

The report of the Superintendent of Public Instruction of New York, for 1874, presents some most interesting facts in relation to the operations of the common schools of that State. The number of persons of legal school age in the State is 1,298,846. Of these 1,294,301 attended school some portion of the year. The aggregate attendance at the common schools was 1,044,361. The average daily attendance, 515,295. Nearly 20,000 teachers are employed in the schools, and their salaries amount to \$7,500,000. The State school fund amounts to \$2,841,834.

ALBANY UNIVERSITY, Mississippi, has been investigated by a legislative committee consisting of three colored Republicans and two white democrats, who find that the institution has been shamefully mismanaged. Extravagance is charged, stealing is intimated, and the committee say that the charges of profanity, drunkenness and lewdness preferred against several of the officers are found to be true.

Says the Washington correspondent of the Hartford Times: "Aristarchus Bay, the Minister from Turkey, is a handsome young man. He has a full black beard and brilliant eyes. These foreign gentlemen are very particular about their dress. They have different suits for different occasions. The Minister from Norway and Sweden is a large, vigorous-looking man. He is one of the most accomplished and elegant men in Washington."

Very quantities of property are being destroyed by the war in Cuba. In Trinidad twelve estates, producing over eight hundred thousand bushels of sugar, have been burned, and in Villa Clara and Cienfuegos more than forty thousand bushels of the same commodity have been lost by inroads of the patriots. To this destruction of property must be added that in Sigua Grande, consisting of twenty-seven large sugar estates, and also the sugar plantations at Sierra Mifana and Carabites, numbering over sixty vast structures, well filled with sugar waiting for transmission to Havana and other ports. These are some of the effects of a war waged by Spain to prevent Cuba from achieving its separate nationality and independence.
