AND IT WAS NIGHT
 Bible Thought: "Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." (John 8:12).
 In all fairness, much can be said to the credit of Judas. He was one of the Twelve. He must have known much of the wonderful life and matchless love of our Lord. However, the devil gained control of Judas by planting evil thoughts in his heart. 

Cisco JC To Offer Automotive Mechanics During Summer Months

Pre-registrations are now being accepted at Cisco Junior College for credit and non-credit Automotive Mechanics courses to be conducted during

the summer, according to Leland Willis, President of CJC. Minimum age limit for the non-credit course is 15 years old. The courses will be con-

ducted in the CJC Industrial Engine Technology shop located in one of the former Humble Pipeline Co. buildings in Cisco. Courses will be conducted four hours a day, Monday through Friday of each week. Both day and night classes will be organized if demanded, with a minimum of 12 required for each class. An average of 90 hours training each month will be given for either the day and/or night class. The course is approved for GI's.

High school students taking the instruction will not be eligible for credit, but those pursuing the course will receive certificates upon successful completion.

All hand tools and equipment are furnished, and tuition will be approximately \$40 per month.

Interested students who wish to continue the course next fall may do so, Mr. Willis emphasized, as the Industrial Engine course is one offered the year round by CJC as a program of the Technical-Vocational Division.

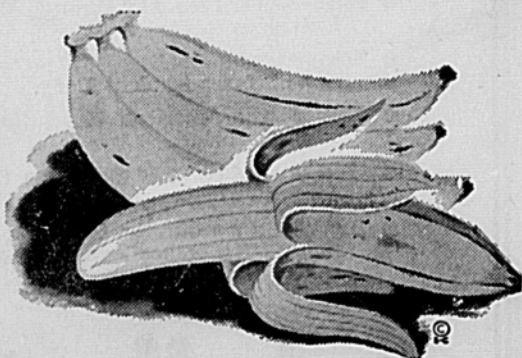
