NOON DISPATCHES.

WINDSOR—A man who left a few days ago. The Journal estimates the paper discounted for him at over \$200,000, but whether the figures are correct is uncertain. It was reported for the Ministry of the Methodist church, and served as chaplain in 1860 regiment, during the war. He was also chaplain in the navy, and has since officiated in several capacities. He was the publisher of Zion's Herald, Boston, and was a member of the Legislature for 1872, '73, '74 and '75. It is stated that before his disappearance, he made several efforts to negotiate a paper; the endorsements were depicted as forgeries, and he was threatened with exposure.

MURKIN OF EX-SENATOR OF ILL. New Orleans, Jan 26.—The particulars of the shooting of Democratic Senator Orestis of St. Louis, are as follows: Orestis, while making a visit to his relatives at Washington, was shot through the head by a negro named Benjamin, armed with a shotgun, shortly afterwards informed some colored woman that Orestis had been hurt. Benjamin was suspected, and a crowd went to his cabin. He ran out from under the cabin about 500 yards in advance of his pursuers; 900 yards was surrounded; the swamp in which he had refuged. Orestis died on Sunday.

GREAT RAILROAD MEETING. New York, Jan 26.—A meeting of the stockholders of the New Orleans, St. Louis & Chicago R. R. Company, was held here to day, Hon. Henry Day presiding. The board of directors authorized the issue of \$5,000,000 preferred stock, with which to cancel the income and equipment bonds of the Mississippi Central R. R. and to pay the floating debt of the Company, which to reach figures amounts to a million and a half. They were also authorized to issue \$3,000,000 bonds to better equip the road.

CHINA—THE JAPAN—THE MARGARY MURDER. San Francisco, Ca., Jan 26.—H. H. Howes, late Counsel at Hakodadi, died at Yokohama. Nearly 1000 houses were burned in Foo Chow, China. The murderer who has just returned from Yonowak, says that Mr. Margary was killed while at dinner. At a given signal, namely, clapping the hands, at the first clap they seized him, at the second they beheaded him. The plot to kill him is confirmed by the testimony of a French priest.

CANADA MUST SUBMIT TO ENGLAND. London, Jan 26.—The correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says for the Colonial Department, has determined to advise the Queen that the clause of the Dominion Parliament bill, creating the Supreme Court of Dominion, which debars an appeal to the Privy Council of England, must be repealed. The correspondent also says that an intimation to that effect has either been, or will be sent to the Canadian Government.

THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON THE PACIFIC RAILROAD was crowded to hear the argument.

THE COMMITTEE OF WHOLE ON MILITARY APPROPRIATIONS are in general debate.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Jan 26.—Several men went to the house of Whalley, one of the Northampton bank officers, and gagged him and his family, then obtained the key to the bank and made an unsuccessful raid on the same. They succeeded, however, in obtaining a split watch from Whalley and some other personal property.

The Cincinnati delegates to the National Republican Committee, called upon the President; the latter discussed the work of the committee at some length, and expressed regret that the Convention had not been called in May. He said that the Republicans always gained by an examination of their records in a long campaign, while the Democrats always lost.

The colored members of Congress are all in a state of great anxiety.

The continued fine weather has caused the winter wheat to grow finely, and everything forebodes a good yield next summer provided some disaster does not befall it between now and harvest.

CITY AND COUNTRY DOGS

Weddings are wonderfully scarce nowadays.

Beef at the market stalls is in a better condition now than we have ever before known it to be at this season.

We were pleased to meet our young friend, J. F. Harris, of Kingsbury, and Peyton G. Bowman, of Pleasanton, in the city.

A mother in one of our neighboring country precincts holds proudly up a 15 pound boy baby to the world's contemplation.

There will be a meeting at Ben Klodass's store, in the Post Oaks, next Sunday.

Wild cats are said to be plentiful on the Upper Colorado that the dogs of business generally get home without any bites on their foreheads.

Jack Harris was tried before Justice Klocke last evening for showing an intention of protecting himself from injury by Mr. Morris, on Tuesday evening, and was honorably acquitted by the jury.

Yesterday was much more quiet than Tuesday. The physicians seemed to have wasted all their money and worried themselves to such an extent that they were unable to continue their ministrations, quarrels and fistfights any longer.

We learn that the pistol found on the person of Mr. Morris, yesterday, was not loaded. It may therefore be presumed that he had no intention of injuring Mr. Harris, otherwise he would have been more careful in preparing himself.

Our neighboring farmers are occupied preparing the soil for the crops of the coming year. Judging from past experience, the mild weather we have had this winter will be followed by a late and cold spring.

We were pleased to see upon our streets yesterday the smiling face of Mr. Dan Franks, of Atascosa. We learn he is having a splendid two-story residence erected in that County, and Mr. M. G. O'Brien, of our city, is the contractor.

Our informant in regard to Capt. Frank Newton's having accepted the declined position of Antep Gagger, on the Democratic ticket, for County Commissioner, was mistaken. The Democratic Executive Committee offered the place to Mr. Newton, but he respectfully declined to accept it.

We are pleased to learn that the recent vesting of power, by the Presbyterian Church, was very satisfactory to all. Good prices were paid, and the demand was so great that most of the pews at present in the Church were hidden up. Mr. Parly, of the past work has the matter of erecting in his hands. We are informed that additional beams for this large and growing church have been ordered.

Some people begin to think that the present unusually warm weather at this season of the year is a sign of a great change of climate coming, or perhaps the millennium or something of the kind; while others argue that it is because of the friction produced by the heated railroad and political discussions in which nearly all our citizens have become entangled.

A board of officers, to consist of Colonel H. H. Clitz, 16th Infantry, Major J. H. Taylor, Assistant Adjutant General U. S. Army, and First Lieutenant J. D. Stevenson, 8th Cavalry, will assemble at the Quartermaster's corral, in this city, on Wednesday, the 26th instant, at 10 o'clock A. M., or as soon thereafter as practicable, to inspect all the cavalry horses there and select those well for cavalry service.

Our police should be supplied with uniforms—they would look much better and their presence would then carry with it greater influence in keeping the lawless element straight. The City Council took some action on this matter, recently, but as yet we have noticed no evidences of the result. Grey suits with metropolitan caps would improve their looks very much.

Some weeks ago an old gentleman by the name of Wallish, of a very prominent Alabama family, came to San Antonio, from his native State, for his health, being sorely afflicted with a disease of the lungs. In a short conversation with him soon after his arrival, we asked him what he thought of our city. He spoke very well of it, and sustained, fully, the good reports about our section which have been heralded over the country. "But," said he, "I have one great objection to San Antonio—you are without a railroad. When I left for this place, I had no idea that your means for transporting travelers were so poor and uncomfortable, or I should never have undertaken the journey. I am here now, though, and will have to stay, for I cannot re-undo the hardships which attended my coming to San Antonio—I would rather die here, immediately, than again ride over the road between here and Kingsbury." Since our conversation the old gentleman has passed away. He died at Mrs. Adams' boarding house the latter part of last week. His death was no doubt hurried on by the rough stage riding, as it is very prostrating and dangerous to persons afflicted with consumption. There are hundreds of sick people who would like to come to San Antonio for their health, but they are afraid of stage riding, for it is killing.
