Associated Press Dispatches. DOMESTIC. NOON DISPATCHES.

The Blaine-Fisher Case. VETERAN OF 1812 DEAD. Pittsburgh, Pa., May 31.—Robert Orr, a veteran of 1812 is dead; aged 91 years. He was a member of Congress during the Presidency of John Quincy Adams.

Washington, May 31.—In the Senate several resolutions were presented from South Carolina remonstrating against the ratification of the Hawaiian treaty so as to admit rice free of duty. They were referred to the Committee on Finance.

ABOUT BLAINE. Fisher has denied the Boston Herald's story about Blaine. Nothing important developed. He also testified regarding the value of the Atkins stock, without any knowledge of the Blaine bonds getting into the hands of the Pacific Railroad.

Mr. Mulligan, Fisher's book keeper, testified that Blaine, as agent, negotiated for Fort Smith bonds, and afterwards took them up. He complained to Mulligan of having lost money. Mulligan replied: "you could not have lost much as you get 50 cents on the dollar for seventy four thousand dollars." Atkins told Mulligan that Blaine's bonds were sold to the Union Pacific by Scott.

The transactions are complicated, and there is a great struggle on the part of Blaine's friends to prevent the investigation which the House is conducting. The House is investigating Blaine vs. Money from Louisiana.

FOREIGN. NOON DISPATCHES. The Turkish Situation More Serious. No compromise with the Insurgents. Russian Influence Paramount. England and France Mediating. All Europe Rejoices Over The Fallen Sultan.

1000 HOUSES BURNED. Quebec, May 31.—Probably a thousand houses are burned; the loss is at least one million dollars.

TURKISH SITUATION. London, May 31.—The Standard's special London correspondent says that the cessation of Murad to the Ottoman throne is considered as mainly due to Russian investigation of Serbia and Montenegro to immediate war.

ENGLAND YIELDS. Paris, May 31.—It is reported that Lord Derby has notified the Turkish ambassador that England is prepared to accept the programme set forth beforehand.

FORNIGN MISCELLANY. The Montenegrin Minister of War informs Baron Rooner that an offensive and defensive alliance has been concluded between Serbia and Roumania, and Montenegro, and it is estimated that this treaty will be in force in support of the movement in Northern Turkey. Altogether, the situation is regarded as drawing to a crisis. The Porte had informed them that no armistice would be granted on the Berlin proposition, and the insurgent leaders declared that they would fight until independence was achieved.

It is officially stated that Russia has seconded these movements by declaring that England's refusal to set with the Northern powers cannot but bring about disaster. Russia is pledged to a constitutional government. The French government urges the Turkish government to hasten a pacific solution.

The Duc de Cases has pointed out to the Turkish government that Murad is entirely free from embarrassing engagements, and that his succession would naturally induce a cessation of hostilities, and that an armistice is in no way inconsistent with the dignity of his government. The Porte is urged to take advantage of the opportunity, and immediately grant on the Berlin proposition, and the insurgent leaders declared that they would fight until independence was achieved.

The Russian telegraph agency states that the Sultan's deposition is regarded as an opportune occasion for a peaceful settlement, which is desired by all parties. Prince Milan has advised the Foreign Consul at Belgrade that he will issue a note declaring that Serbia has no choice other than to lead the insurrection or perish.

The rumor circulating that Count Andrassy is about to resign, and that Herr Travasson would succeed him.

DOMESTIC.

MIDNIGHT DISPATCHES. Two Men and 27 Horses Burned. Another Fire Burns Up Several Children. Presbyterian Re-Union Triumphant.

FATAL FIRE. Geneva, N. Y., May 31.—The Seneca House and Canal Streets of B. Knight, burned; with two men and 27 horses.

EPISCOPAL CONVENTION. Des Moines, Iowa, May 31.—At the Episcopal Convention a bishop is to be elected to-day. Dr. Beecher and Dr. Perry, of New York, are the most prominent candidates.

UNIONISM CONVENTION. Boston, May 31.—At the anniversary of the Unitarian Association to-day Henry P. Kidd was elected President. The secretary reports the receipts short of the expenditure, and the deficit a quarter of a million.

COIN SHIPMENT. New York, May 31.—Three hundred thousand dollars in coin was shipped to Europe to-day.

ANOTHER FATAL FIRE. Quebec, May 31.—The fire caused by children playing with matches was under control by midnight. Several dwellings within the walls were fired by sparks. Three or four children are missing, and supposed burned. Yesterday was the anniversary of the burning of the same building thirty years ago.

METHODIST ECUMENICAL COUNCIL. Baltimore, May 31.—Bishop Morrell presided. The Commission of two bishops, four ministers and three laymen to make suitable provisions for the Ecumenical Council, was appointed, and adjourned sine die.

STATE CONVENTION. New Orleans, May 31.—The Republican State Convention met at noon to-day. Judge Taylor Battle, of Lafayette Parish, was elected permanent chairman. Judge Battle is now Judge of the 19th Judicial District, having been elected to that office.

The following is a summary of the preamble and resolutions adopted. Preamble and resolutions, tendering the names of the Louisiana Republicans to the Republican National Convention, favoring the nomination of a candidate for President whose personal character will afford a guarantee of honest able, and economical administration of the government upon Republican principles, but leaves the delegates to elect a man untrammelled by other instructions. They want established a system of payment of specie into the treasury, and bring about a steady, speedy and permanent payment of specie into the treasury in all federal transactions; advise a just apportionment of federal appropriations for national works of internal improvements. Taking into consideration our more fortunate sister States during the period when the Democratic domination drained to the Southern States their just share of the common fund, such a measure of equalization would justify National aid to a Southern Pacific Railroad, its branches, to the protection by levees, and on the capital and labor employed in the culture of cotton, sugarcane, and rice, to the effective investigation of the Mississippi river and its principal tributaries, and its outlet. They favor the protection of certain National interests against the destructive competition of foreign products.

Resolved, That the assassination of many hundreds of prominent union men in the South on account of their political principles, the massacre of thousands of innocents colored citizens, the delegation of nearly all the Southern States to the control of the military element, whose treason brought about the war of the North, and the maintenance of the Southern States largely composed of ex-leaders of the Confederate Army, indicate grave National dangers which demand the enactment of a policy of equalization, and the adoption of such a policy as shall insure to every citizen of the United States, in fact as well as in name, the inalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, irrespective of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

Gov. Kellogg, Hon. S. R. Packard, P. B. S. Finckhock, and W. G. Brown, were elected delegates to Cincinnati.

RE-ELECTED SENATORS. Providence, May 31.—The Republican caucus nominated Henry B. Anthony U. S. Senator.

PRESBYTERIAN RE-UNION. New York, May 31.—In the Presbyterian Assembly the Moderator read a private letter from the Moderator of the Northern Assembly, which, after giving a history of the course of the Southern Assembly on the subject of fraternal relations, said: "The point of this whole history is to make it clear that our original action was adopted irrespective of your telegram to me, which, though unofficially announced to the Committee of the Whole, was not officially brought before the Assembly for action until the paper of the Committee on Bills and Ordinances had been accepted by a vote of 83 to 4. The six subsequently withdrew their dissent. (Applause.) The reply containing the letter was then sent you, and prayer was offered in thanksgiving to God for bringing us to a unanimous conclusion." (Applause.)

FOREIGN. MIDNIGHT DISPATCHES. All the London Journals argue favorably as to the consequences of the Turkish revolution. Berlin papers universally regard the change favorably, though the powers are inclined to maintain an observant attitude while they are understood to view Murad's accession to the throne with satisfaction and sympathy.

The Berlin State Gazette says that Mr. Bismarck "is a man of uncertain temper." How do you know, Mr. Gazette! Give us the "strong reasons" for this gratuitous assertion.

THE GARDEN OF THE WORLD.

The construction of the Suez Canal, and the improvements and progress of civilization, in connection therewith, have caused rains to fall on the Red Sea and its shores once a fortnight, where it hardly ever rained before, since the children of Israel passed through in their exodus from Egypt. The same meteorological wonder has been exhibited in Western Texas. Before the American settlements, rain was very rare, so rare that it was never thought of as an agricultural country, apart from irrigation. Now, however, the rains in Western Texas are about as reliable for the agriculturist as those of any other part of the State. Moreover, the rains increase in frequency and regularity in proportion as the country becomes more densely settled. Then, in all the rich and beautiful valleys and canyons of Western Texas we have the advantage of irrigation facilities also. When all this beautiful, fertile and beautiful country is settled up, its capacity for irrigation fully developed, trees planted everywhere, forests developed by the rains, beautiful homes erected, railroads constructed, and the vast prairie landscapes varied and beautified by farms and color, so striking in this bright climate, Western Texas will be the garden of the world. These who now get a foothold here are wise men.

We must say, with all any examination into the scandal evidence to the contrary, that we do not believe a word of the charges just made against Speaker Kerr of corruption in office; nor do we believe the fresh charges of corruption brought against Mr. Blaine.
