and throw the whole responsibility upon the Governor.

It is a mistake to say his resolution was a mere expression of opinion. It looked to immediate action. The amendment by the gentleman from Marion remitted the whole matter back to the Governor who had just asked the House for action. He was unwilling to continue a penal system, which was an outrage and a farce. The responsibility for its continuance was upon the House. Suppose, said he, you refer it to the Governor and he should do as Governors have done in other States—become a party that he is held responsible to account. He has done all that patriotism and common sense could require. He has asked action by this body. Then the responsibility rests with us. For himself, as a representative of his people he would ask no other man to act for him. We know this lease is a big nuisance and the Governor, willing or unwilling, wants it to stop. If he knew the Governor wanted to continue, he would in his heart spit upon and spurn him. To adopt the substitute was virtually to declare to the sense of the House that the lease should continue. He was tired of reading every morning's paper of the outrages being perpetrated by the 1300 convicts now scattered over the State.

Mr. McComb thought, if the resolution declaring for resumption, was passed and resumption had, the State would be in a worse condition than it is now. To resume first it required legislation. Mr. Lang rose to a question of privilege. He had been reported as having been interested in Ward, Dewy & Co.'s contract. He was, he said, only interested in having some twenty or thirty convicts employ on his place.

Mr. Hayes thought the House ready to grapple with the question. He believed that the contract should not continue, but none of the proposed measures solved the difficulty in the way of legislative action.

Mr. Adams withdrew his motion to refer.

Mr. Allison called on his motion to reconsider the vote defeating the resolution for appointment of a sub-committee to investigate the penitentiary. The vote was reconsidered and adopted. So the matter halts until this committee visits Huntsville and makes report.

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION.

Recent and laudable efforts have been made for several years past by some of our Texas journalists to organize and build up a successful Texas Press Association. We have always favored it, and have done what we could in its behalf, so far as supporting it in our columns is concerned, though we have not had a representative at any of its meetings. We trust, however, to be able to participate hereafter. But while the meetings of the Association are held in the far North-eastern or North-western corner of the State, and until railroad connections are completed connecting San Antonio with the railway system of Texas, we can hardly spare the time or undergo the labor necessary, and then meet only a dozen at the most, adventurous journalists who had the courage to undertake it. The Association ought to meet in some central place, and the best place for it would be at the Capital. The meetings should be held there permanently, just as the Supreme Court should. But as it has just met at Jefferson and is to meet at Fort Worth next September, we suppose it had better continue to "swing round the circle," meeting at San Antonio next Spring.

The recent meeting of the Association was held at Jefferson on the 7th instant, at the Opera House. Present, J. B. Simpson, of Dallas; Geo. A. Culler, of Dallas; B. C. Murray, of Danison; J. W. Barron, of Danison; B. B. Padlock, of Fort Worth; Sam'l. Fargan, of Fort Worth; J. K. Milican, of Fort Worth; F. D. Allen, of Galveston; D. S. Ryan, of Galveston; James Burke, of Galveston; W. Y. Leader, of Jefferson; C. G. Vogel, of Houston; E. P. Reed, of Cincinnati; and Vic Reinhardt, of Terrellville.

The Executive Committee reported no arrangements made for better telegraphic communication, but stated that the Jefferson Leader, Dallas Herald, Dallas Commercial, Danison News, and Danison Democrat had formed themselves into an association to secure facilities therefor, and instructed the secretary to write to other daily Texas papers, asking for cooperation and their company, also to write different associated press companies to know what terms they would arrange.

The following officers were elected: J. B. Simpson, of the Dallas Herald, President; C. G. Vogel, Secretary; and B. C. Murray, Treasurer.

The next meeting takes place at Fort Worth, on the first Tuesday in September. Fort Worth, through Mr. Padlock, proposed a grand ovation with the orchestra.

TOO SADLY TRUE.

A correspondent writes the Statesman, calling attention to the fact, that "fraternal correspondence is at last established between the Southern and Northern Presbyterian churches." It will be recollected that early in 1861 the National Presbyterian meeting in the State of New York closed its doors against the Southern delegates, the Northern delegates (at the time detesting terms to those of the South, which it would have been otherwise than honorable to accept. This caused a split in the Presbyterian church, and from that day to this it has remained apart. The assemblies of both churches lately held their meetings in Savannah, Georgia, and Brooklyn, New York, and the correspondent goes on to say:

One by one the barriers erected by the war are being demolished. It would take too long and would be unprofitable to review the causes which led to the rupture in the great Presbyterian Church, or to relate the hitherto futile attempts to bring about a better state of affairs. The action of the recent assemblies, we are assured, is based upon terms of perfect equality and reciprocity. Each assembly passed exactly the same resolution, asserting that "the condemning certain acts or deliverances of the other, no acts or deliverances of its own are to be constructed or admitted as impugning in any way the Christian character" of the other. This resolution was passed unanimously, and by a voting vote in each assembly.

Thus it is that the only two organized bodies of Christians in the United States, who have until this time held aloof from each other on account of questions growing out of the war, have now been brought into that fraternal fellowship which may, possibly, lead to organic union in the future. Such men as Drs. M. D. Hoge, Stuart Robinson and B. M. Smith, of the Southern Assembly, and Drs. Talmage, Van Dyke and Gauss, of the Northern Assembly, labored earnestly to bring about this result.

The Christian spirit of this writer, says the Statesman, may well be invoked in a prayer that "fraternal fellowship" may spring into an "organic union," but it is a commentary upon humanity that again in matters of Christian faith there must be division. It is the history of all creeds that jealousies grow strong and enmities become bitter within them, and we can hardly conclude, from present appearances, that the millennium is nearly approaching. But when soldiers have long since shaken hands across the bloody chasm, it does seem that Christians should prepare to do likewise.
