The Rev. Henry Ward Beecher lectured recently at St. John, N. H., where he says he was welcomed with what he calls "thundering curiosity."

POLITICAL sentiment has its extremes as well as other sentiments. It is in this State, cast over 5000 votes for Tilden, and not one for Hayes. Six towns of Jackson county, Minnesota, cast about 1000 votes for Hayes and none for Tilden, and still, each side was right.

The day for the settlement of the Presidential election is high at hand, that is, if the settlement is to come about outside of Washington. The returns must all be in by the 31st, for on the 7th the electors will meet in their respective State capitals and cast their votes for President and Vice President. Remarks are out of order until after the 7th.

This present crisis is characterized as the American Eagle, in doubt where to lay its egg—N. O. T. H. We don't view it exactly in that light. It seems to us as though, by some means or other, a hard egg has gotten into the proud bird's nest, and that how to remove it is the perplexing question.

Gov. CURTIS, of Pennsylvania, says that the solution of the question as to why the colored men voted the Democratic ticket so largely in Louisiana is a natural one. The colored people of the State are not over 200,000,000 of property, and they manifest great interest in improving their education, in acquiring the vote and protection of business, and in the most intelligent and energetic manner possible.

The supplement of the New York Financial and Commercial Chronicle of November 25, thus states the condition and earnings of some of the Texas railroads:

Houston and Texas Central—Gross earnings in 1876 were \$3,130,000; net earnings, \$1,845,000; interest charge, \$275,000. Capital paid in \$5,000,000.

International and Great Northern (Texas)—This is a consolidation of the International and the Houston Great Northern, situated between and extending from Houston to San Antonio. The company had an income of \$1,000,000 granted in the year, and was reported as having given \$1,000,000.

Galveston, Houston and San Antonio—Net earnings, 1874-5, \$310,374.

Galveston, Houston and Henderson—Net earnings, 1874, \$200,000.

THE MEXICAN REVOLUTION.

Instead of brightening, the prospects of early peace in Mexico are growing more hopeless. The opposition to Tejada, whose term of office derived from his first election expired on the first of November, is constantly growing stronger. It is reasonably alleged that his claims to another term of office are the result of fraud and intimidation enacted at the polls to bring about his election; and that he is not now the legal President.

Many of the most prominent Mexican soldiers and statesmen ceased their loyalty to the Lerdo government with the expiration of his last term of office, and have allied themselves with the revolutionary party to secure his overthrow. This new departure has infused the revolutionists with strong hopes of success, and the reverse of fortune on the part of the Lerdistas is evidence that the revolutionists are not by any means an insignificant faction. A battle was recently fought between Canales and Pedro Martinez in which the army of the Lerdistas was almost annihilated, 3000 federal soldiers being left dead upon the field.

On the 1st of December Gen. Cortina left a communication to Gen. Revueltas, commanding at Matamoros, demanding his surrender within twenty-four hours. It was sent on this day because it is held that Lerdo's government expired with the 30th of November. Iglesias claims to be President, and has made his temporary seat of government in Guajuatim.

On the same day, Cortina also issued two proclamations—one addressed to the defenders of Matamoros, the other to his own command. In the first he says that he has waited patiently for the day to come when there would no longer be any pretext for the followers of Lerdo to sustain him, and that day having arrived, his future operations will be active, serious and decided. Cortina gives adherence to the Iglesias government. He will consider the struggle from now on as one between Iglesias as President ad interim, under the constitution, and Lerdo, claiming to be elected, holding that Lerdo's election was secured by the persuasive influence of the bayonet and all kinds of fraud. If Iglesias wins, he will order a new election to be held in accordance with the Constitution.

The new and increasing support the revolutionary interest has received since the 30th of November, renders Lerdo's cause an extremely doubtful one. He finally seems to be on the weak and unpopular side, and that his government will be overthrown, there is now the strongest probability. The recent news from Mexico indicates that the ablest Mexican generals and a majority of the people are on the revolutionary side, and the fact that the revolutionists grow stronger, instead of weaker, in their opposition, augurs anything but good for the arms of the Lerdistas.

A question here arises as to whether the overthrow of Lerdo will be attended by good results for the Mexican Republic. It will be remembered that the strongest opposition to Lerdo's government was incurred by his severance of church and state, and the insubordination of the church. So long as Mexico recognized an established national religion, there was no hope for her progress or the success of her republican institutions, and upon the governmental decree that men of all nationalities and religious beliefs were equal in their privileges, the civilized world accorded to Lerdo and the Mexican Congress the credit of having removed the strongest barrier to Mexican progress. Lerdo was called a statesman of the highest order, and the achievement, in the face of great danger and a strong opposition, was considered one of the brightest of the age. For the good of the Republic, it is hoped that it will stand for all time.

Lerdo has in different ways shown himself to be a progressive man. He has given impetus to the construction of railroads, and encouraged manufactures. Should he be overthrown, it is doubtful whether the succeeding government would carry out his progressive programme. It is hoped it will, however, and that the Mexican rule of adjusting one wrong by committing another, will not operate in this instance. The overthrow of Lerdo would be an insignificant event compared with the death of the progressive spirit of his government.

THE TEXAS CATTLE DRIVE.

So far as we have been able to inform ourselves, the Texas cattle drive of 1876 was a successful one. The drovers, as a general thing, were large owners of cattle, and had secured markets for their stock before they made preparations for to drive. This was nothing more than a business precaution, but was a lesson taught by the sad experience of many who the previous year flooded the markets with cattle which they could not sell at a paying value, or which lagged upon the market until they had "eaten themselves up."

The drive from Fort-worth to Texas, for 1876 was 717,000. Of this number, 350,000 were driven north to Kansas, and to fill Indian reserves, and quite a number were sold to stock-interests in Colorado. The number to be wintered in Kansas this winter is not so great as last season. It is impossible now to prognosticate as to the number of cattle which will be driven from Western Texas the coming year, but it will undoubtedly be large. The extensive owners are focusing in lands for pasture, and as they select the choicest ranges, taking both grass and water into consideration, they will certainly allow the opportunity of the smaller stock-raiser, who, for self-preservation, will, in many instances, be driven to dispose of
