

A Janesville physican gives the follow ing as the history of diphtheria ! "The name dightheria (from a Greek word meaning skin or membrane) was ony given to this disease by B etonneau, of Tours, about forty years ago. It appears to have been described by Arctaeus, of Cappadocus, as a disease of Egypt, and was mentioned by Macrobins and Coelins Anrelianus, among early writers. Hecker gives account of its prevalence in Helland in 1637; Carnevale, at Naples, 1639; Tama-yo, at Madrid, called it garetille, in 1622; Ghisi first clearly described the pseudo membranene formation at Cremona, in 1740. HOW TO REACH THE NORTH POLE,

The following suggestions are made by Capt H. W. Howgate, Acting Signal Om cer of the United States army, as to the nost practical way of finding the North Pole :

The expedition of Capt. Hall in the Polaris in 1871, and of Capt. Nare in the Acert and Discovery, in 187, have shown that by the use of steam it is a comparation say matter to reach the entrance t Rubeson's Channel, in latitude 31° north and that the serious difficulties to be overcome in reaching the Pole lie beyond that point. Parties from the two expeditions have made fair surveys 140 miles north of this, leaving only about 400 miles of usexplored region between that and the goal of medern geographers—the Pole. When Capt. Hall reached utmost extrem-ity of Robeson's Channel, the lookout of ity of Robeson's Channel, the lookout of the Polaris reported open water an aight and just beyond the pack which surround ed the vessel and prevented further pro-gress. This open water was afterward seen from the cape at the nor hern open-ing of Newman's Bay, and it was the opinion of the crew of that ill fated vessel. au hour earlier in reaching the channel, they could have stanned unobstracted over a veritable "open sea" to the Pole itself. hey did not succeed, but were forced to winter almost within sight of this sea and subsequently disheartened this sea, and subsequently, disheartened by the loss of their gallant commander, abandoned the enterprise. The report of Capt. Nares, of the British Arctic Expedition, has just been published in full. Gapt: Nares seems to disprove the existence of Dr. Hayes Open Polar Sea, and of the northerly land reported by the Polaris. On the first point he says:

"In Robeson Channel proper, except where the cliffs rise precipitously from the sea, the shore line is fronted at a few paces distance by a nearly continuous, ragg d-topped ice wall, from fifteen to thirty-five feet high. But on leaving Robeson Channel, the coast-line looses its steep character, and the heavy ice is stranded at a distance of one hundred to two hundred varis from the shore, forming a fringe of detached masses of ice from twenty feet to upward of sixty feet in height above water. The average measurement of the ice in thickness as it floated is eighty feet. The coast line continued to the northwest for about thi ty miles, forming a large bay, bounded by the United States range of mountains. No land was to be seen to the northward, and I was reluctantly forced to admit that none existed within a reasonable distance, and that we had arrived at the shore of the Arctic Ocean, finding it exactly the opposite to an "Open Polar Sea."

Concerning the reported northerly land reported by the Polaris he says:

"After a constant watch and carefully noting the movement of the darkened patches, I was now with much reluctance forced to admit that no land existed to the northward for a very con-

Obviously, the right of choice does not devolve noon the House until it has been officially ascertained, by opening all the cer tificates, that no person was elected can not be forfeited by nonaction And by express provision that House has until the fourth day of March next, following (1878) in which to make its choice, before the Vice President can act under Article XII. My supposition was that pro longed debate upon questions rais ed might prevent the opening of all the certificates until the 4th of March. Until that event no right of choice devolves.
