CURIOUS FRENCH EXPERIMENTS. - A curious as well as interesting series of experiments made in France show approximately that the heaviest load a man of strength can carry for a short distance is 319 pounds; all a man can carry habitually, as, for example, a soldier his knapsack, walking on level ground, is 132 ds-an extreme load, it would seemfor he can carry an aggregate of 1,518 pounds over 3,200 feet as a day's work, under like circumstances. If he ascended ladders or stairs as do hod carriers, then be can carry but 121 pounds continuously, and his day's work can not exceed 1,232 pounds raised 3,200 feet high. With regard to the effort and the velocity with which a man can produce by pulling or pushing with his arms, it has been found by these experiments that, under the mos Tavorable oircumstances, and for continuons work, an effect can not ber gained exceeding from 26.4 to 23 pounds raised from 1.0 to 2.3 feet per second, or 2 bont. one-eighth horse power.

THE POSITION OF THE SOUTH.

The position of Southern leader throughout the trials of the present politi call inbroglic have been so conservative, and the leaders have been so self-poised, as to win praises on all hands. The South occupies a highly important position in this dispute. Oppressed, villified, train-pled upon as she has been, by her proud conquerers, the condition of politics has redounded, at last, to her exaltation. She is virtually to day an arbitor between peace and war. There is no man who understands the situation who does not know that any determined move toward power by the Southern Demecrats would provoke a collision. Instead of acting rashly, the leaders have acted in good grace, but forwardly nor vindictively. They have presented claims, and endeav ored to custain them through legat and peaceable means. The Northern Demo-crats are receiving the entire volume of villification issuing from the Republican press, and the liberal-mindedness of Southern Democrats is being commended There is a point in this. THE SIX GREAT POWERS .- Europe, at

the end of the year 1871, contained altogether 306,811,304 inhabitants, of which number 250,312,807 or nearly five sixth of the whole, belonged to the six Great Powers. The population of these six countries in order, was as follows: The Russian Empire, 78,305,185, the German Empire 41.058,791, the Austro Hungarian Empire, 36 155 370, the French Republic, 55,970,714, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, 32,021,572, and the Kingdom of Italy, 26,801.054. This classification, however, becomes very different when the possessions of the various European States outside of Europe are taken into 'account. In that case the British Empire comes first with 236,000,000 inhabitants, followed by the Rus ian Empire with 86,000,000, by France with 41,800,000, and by the Ottoman Empire with 41 700 000. Germany still preserves her preponderance over Austre Hungary but Holland, with a total of 28 000 000. takes precedence to Italy, and Spain i close upon the latter. The six Great Powers enumerated have, as mentioned above, nearly five-sixths of Europe under their immediate dependence, and their populations may be divided into three groups of almost equal extent, vis: the United Kingdom, France and Italy, 38 per cent; Germany and Austria, 37 per cent, and Russia, 31 per cent. Next after the six Great Powers come Spain with a population of 16,900,000; the Ottoman Empire, 8,500,000; Norway, 5 954,307, and Belgium, 5,113,680; while the three small est States are the Principality of Lichten stein with 8,329, the Republic of San Marino, 7,500, and the Principality of Ecnaco with 5,700 inhabitants.

It is said that with a full knowledge of these facts, the authorities of the United States have furnished Revueltas with a munition and supplies.

Revueltas, having denounced Cortina as a handit, with whom he would not treat, now tarns about and makes propositions to Cortina and recognizes the Diaz government. In fact he has played a treacherous game and is trying to make a safe netwer with the money he has stolen from Americans and others.

Yesterday the letter of Revueltas to Cortina was in the hands of the Consul Wilson. It is reported that a certified

It is stated that Cortina declines the proposition made by Revueltas. Revueltas has issued proclamations recognizing the existing government at the Mexican capital, not mentioning Diaz, and declares his intention to surreinder Matamoros only to such person as may Matamoros only to such person as may

be designated by that government to re-lieve him of the command.

O'Brien, on the Guadalupe, has 35,000 cattle. Mr. Lowe, west of the San Antonio river, has 40,000 acres in pasture and 120,000 head of cattle on the plains and sells annually 15,000 heaves. Mathis, Coleman & Fulton, Rockrott, have 200,000 acres of pasture land aud 130,000 cattle. They ship annual Rockfort, have 200,000 acres of pasture land and 130,000 cattle. They ship annually including purchases 30,635 boeves. Deweese & Ellison, San Antonio, drove last spring 60,000 head of cattle to Kansas and have 120,000 on the plains. Mr. King, west of the Nucces river, drove to a western market 33,000 beeves from his own rocks. ranch and sold them at \$33 per head. He has 200,000 acres of pasture, and 160,000 eattle, 10,000 horses and mules. Mr. M Kennedy, his next neighbor, has 190,000 acres of pasture, 130,000 cattle and 8,000 horses and mules.
