

## Winter layoffs push jobless rate to 7.5

WASHINGTON (AP) - Job layoffs resulting from the severe winter and a big increase in the number of persons seeking work pushed the unemployment rate up to 7.5 per cent in February, the government reported today.

The jobless rate in January was 7.3 per cent. Nearly all of a 225,000 rise in persons out of work in February 'reflected increased layoffs, probably the result of energy shortages,' the Labor Department said.

The weather also was a factor in an increase of 220,000 in the number of fulltime workers forced into part-time jobs because of production cuts resulting from economic problems. The Labor Department gave this

### Cubans reported to be in Uganda

NAIROBI - For the past month Cuban advisers and technicians have been trickling into Uganda to help train President Idi Amin's undisciplined army and to prop up his shattered economy, diplomatic and refugee sources said Thursday.

The Cubans, who are black and dress in civilian clothes, have tried to remain as inconspicuous as possible and no mention of their presence has been made by Uganda. The sources, whose information is considered extremely reliable, place their number at about 200.

Amin spends 25 per cent of his nation's gross national product on military hardware and long has sought some foreign nation to train his 20,000-man, Soviet-equipped army sion from either Tanzania, Kenya, the United States, Britain, Israel, South Africa or the Sudan.

For example, he has made five official requests to Turkey seeking military advisers and has been turned down each time. He has made similar requests of other non-Western nations. Each has been rejected on the basis that Ugandan weapons are being used exclusively for the purpose of killing other Ugandans.

Amin's breakthrough with the Cubans follows an official visit to Kampala about five weeks ago by Cuba's deputy minister of defense, Gen. Francisco Cabrera. Amin an-

### Nun found innocent in manslaughter case

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) - A Roman Catholic nun who was accused of killing her newborn baby was found innocent today by the judge who presided at her nonjury trial.

Judge Hyman T. Maas of Monroe County Court announced the verdict clearing Sister Maureen Murphy of first-degree manslaughter.

The judge's verdict was announced one day after the 10-day trial had con-

The prosecution charged that Sister Maureen, 37, delivered a full-term boy in a bathroom at Our Lady of Lourdes convent in suburban Brighton last April 27 and asphyxiated the baby by stuffing clothing in

Had she been convicted of firstdegree manslaughter, Sister Maureen would have faced a mandatory prison sentence of up to 25 years.

Before delivering the verdict, Maas had said he could consider two lesser charges: second-degree manslaughter, which is recklessly causing the death of another person, or criminally negligent homicide. Neither carries a mandatory prison

Sister Maureen testified earlier this week that she gave birth, but remembered nothing about it after carrying the baby to her room.

### Saudi warns fellow producers

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) - A Saudi Arabian newspaper mustered Arab and Western experts today to warn that the world could face oil starvation unless Western countries reduce consumption and Arab countries find new reserves.

Mahmoud Amin, assistant secretary-general of the Organization of Arab Petroleum Exporting Countries, told the Arab oil producers they are being imprudent by emphasizing

production without worrying about exploration.

"Although the total number of exploration wells has been decreasing, more production wells have been added. Production has been outpacing exploration, that is," Amin wrote in OAPEC's monthly news bulletin. His warning was reprinted by the Saudi Gazette, which is owned by Saudi businessman Aly Shobokshi.

Between 1960 and 1974, total reserves of OAPEC crude oil increased from 283 billion barrels to 389 billion, or an increase of 106 billion barrels, Amin said. But during that period, 46 billion barrels were pumped, making the net additional reserves only 60 billion barrels.

Meanwhile, the total number of exploration wells in the OAPEC countries steadily declined, according to

official figures, from 134 in 1970 to 101 in 1971, 67 in 1973 and 60 in 1974. But production wells increased from 419 in 1970 to 520 wells by 1974.

"It is the duty of constantly expanding Arab national oil companies to maintain a balanced petroleum industry, upon which the economies of the Arab oil producing countries solely, or at least largely, rest," Amin ad-

### Fire sears Washington Elementary

A fire Thursday afternoon at Booker T. Washington Elementary School, 1800 E. Wall St., is believed to have been started accidentally by plumbers using a torch to work on an air conditioning unit in the school, according to Midland Fire Marshal James L. Roberts.

No students were in the building when the fire started about 4 p.m., said Garland Chapman, assistant superintendent of schools.

He said the damage is estimated at between \$35,000 and \$40,000 in two sixth grade classrooms, a physical education room and a music room.

The fire itself was confined to the ceiling and roof, Chapman said, with only water damage to the rooms

The sixth grade classes will be moved to vacant classrooms at Washington, Chapman said. The music classes will be held in the auditorium and the physical education room is not essential, Chapman said.


### Airplane crashes at Terminal

A plane crash Thursday afternoon 100 feet east of a Midland Air Terminal fence did extensive damage to the plane, but only minor injuries to the pilot

The twin-engine Beechcraft Bonanza plane piloted by Maurice Smith Jr., Tower Road, crashed in pastureland about 4 p.m., some 200 feet north of U.S. 80 West. The owner of the plane, F. T. Levens, 2011 Winfield Road, was the only other passenger, an Air Terminal

spokesman said. Smith reportedly received a minor cut from the crash, but did not require hospital treatment

Except for the plane, no other property damage was reported. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

### Professor new FDA: official

WASHINGTON - Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr. broke a more than 10year-old trend Thursday by appointing a non-physician as commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration.

The new commissioner, who does not require Senate confirmation, is Dr. Donald Kennedy, a professor of human biology at Stanford Universi-

Kennedy, 45, is the first nonphysician since 1965 to hold the top FDA job. The last four occupants of the commissioner's post have all been medical doctors. Kennedy holds a

FDA critics have contended that commissioners who were physicians tended to be biased in favor of drug manufacturers and makers of medical devices, whose industries are regulated by the FDA.

'Doctors generally are taught that drugs are good, and that's the point of view many of them keep," said Dr. Sidney Wolfe, a vocal FDA critic who heads the Ralph Nader Health Research Group.

Kennedy, however, is the fifth nonphysician to serve as FDA commissioner. Four non-physicians served in that post between 1940 and 1965.

A spokesman for Califano said Thursday the HEW secretary "looked at everybody" in his search for an FDA commissioner. "He wasn't looking for a doctor or a non-doctor. He was just looking for the best-qualified person," the spokesman said.

In his formal announcement, Califano praised Kennedy as "one of the nation's most distinguished scien-

He said the formula used in seasonally adjusting jobs figures probably distorted the reported figures on the decline in January and the increase in February in the size of the labor force. After discounting the big January decline and the February increase, he said the actual increase in the labor force since December was about 200,000

Total employment rose more in February than unemployment. The Labor Department said there were 400,000 more jobs during the month for a total of 89 million, a total increase of 2.5 million above a year earlier.

Unemployment increased by 225,000 to a total of 7.2 million following a decrease of more than half a million in January

The Labor Department said there was a decline in the number of longterm unemployed so that the average duration of unemployment fell from 15.5 weeks in January to 14.7 weeks in February, the lowest in 21 months.

The reasoning is that Amin became convinced in mid-January that the Langi and Acholis were trying to overthrow him and that a foreign power was planning to invade. For what he considered international prestige and the need for stability in his army - where thousands of Lango and Acholi soldiers were being systematically massacred - he requested the early arrival of Cubans. from both civilian and military ranks.

### Owning home may become obsolete, study says

NEW YORK — The American dream of home ownership is in danger of becoming obsolete in 1985.

That is the major finding of an authoritative study of the nation's housing plight, conducted jointly by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Harvard University.

Already, according to the Harvard-M.I.T. joint center for Urban Studies, the sale prices of new houses have grown twice as fast as family incomes; barely a quarter of the nation's households can afford a \$44,000 home.

The poorer third of the population has been completely priced out of the house market, and the only families who can find affordable housing are earning \$20,000 or more — the top quarter of the nation in terms of earning power.

The United States will enter the 1980s with modest new homes selling for \$78,000, according to the study.

Later, the price spiral will escalate more, and most of the middle class population will be hard pressed to own their own homes.

"We're not crying out a crisis, but we do have the warning signs of a crisis a few years down the road," said Arthur P. Solomon, director of the joint center and a former White House adviser to President Johnson.

The Harvard-M.I.T. research organization has been pre-eminent in forecasting housing needs since its widely publicized 1973 study disclosed that 13 million American homes were either physically unsound, over-crowded or excessively expensive for the occupants relative to income.

Since 1970, according to the study released here Thursday, the average-income family has lost ground as the cost of home ownership — mortgage and interest payments, taxes, insurance and maintenance — have

outstripped increases in income.

The median sales price for new homes increased nearly 90 per cent

from 1970 to 1976, and the monthly ownership costs of new homes increased during the same period by more than 100 per cent.

The median sales price for existing homes increaed 65 per cent, and the monthly ownership costs for older homes jumped by 73 per cent.

In contrast, the median income, nationally, increased during the same period by only 47 per cent, while the consumer price index rose by 46 per

"The cost squeeze on middle income families is replacing the slum as the major problem in housing in this country," said Bernard Friedman, coauthor of the report, which was funded in part by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The study disclosed that:

—Despite a near-record 1.6 million new housing starts in 1976, the number is 20 per cent below the current need.

—While in 1970 almost half the U.S.

families could afford to buy medianpriced new home (then \$23,400), only 27 per cent of the families could afford a \$48,200 median-priced home last

The number of low-income families living in physically inadequate units has declined since 1960, but the number paying an unreasonably high percentage of their incomes has more than doubled.

While the commonly accepted measure for personal finance used to allow for one-fourth of monthly salary for housing costs, many U.S. families are now paying 35 per cent and more. To compensate for the spiraling house costs, the research team found,

Americans are making concessions that significantly affect their quality of life. Some withdraw from the housing market altogether and become renters, while others resort to pooling husband and wife incomes.

Other families stretch their resources thinly by eliminating many non-essential expenses, while others

have resorted to buying mobile homes.

At the same time, there are sociological factors that are increasing the pressure on the housing market, the study found. These include increasing numbers of young adults and senior citizens who split away from the traditional family to set up their own housekeeping, and a steadily increasing divorce rate.

Also, population shifts toward the sunbelt states and the exurban areas of the northcentral and northeast regions are creating additional bousing pressures in some areas.

The Harvard-M.I.T. unit called for a "strong national housing policy, with a constructive partnership

between the public and private sectors." The policy, the group reported, should focus on better and more affordable housing for the poor, with secondary emphasis on improving the homebuying climate for the young

and for people with average incomes.

When pressed for specific recommendations, Solomon and Frieden suggested reforms in federal monetary policies that would lower the home mortgage interest rate, possible adoption of a variable mortgage interest rate that would fluctuate with rises and drops in inflation, re-examination of environmental restraints on the housing industry that push home development costs upward.

The state governor opposed by the students, Manuel Zarate Aquino, took a leave of absence "in order not to hurt my people," and there were indications that a 13-month dispute which divided the state university into two factions might be settled.

Zarate Aquino was replaced as governor by Gen. Eliseo Jimenez Ruiz, who commanded the military operation two years ago in which the country's most wanted guerrilla, Lucio Cabanas, was killed.

### Cuban policy unclear

Secretary of State Cyrus Vance had barely been sworn in before he hinted at a major change in U.S. policy toward Cuba. Washington, he said, is now ready to talk to Havana about a resumption of normal relations "without preconditions."

This would be an abrupt turnaround from the Cuban policy inherited from the Ford administration. Although former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger had been quietly trying to break the ice in 1975, that effort came to a halt when Cuban troops turned up in Africa helping the Soviet-backed faction in the Angolan civil war.

Mr. Vance's hint seemed to be buttressed by the now-celebrated remark of U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young in Africa - an observation that Cuban forces were bringing "a certain stability and order" to Angola. Mr. Young later managed to soften the implications of what he said, but we were left with an impression that the Carter administration was looking at Cuba and Fidel Castro in a new light.

That was before President Carter was questioned about Cuba during a recent appearance before Agriculture Department employes. Having heard from the President himself on the subject, we're faced with another case of ambiguity in his foreign policy.

Yes, said Mr. Carter, he is ready to move toward normalizing relations if Cuba stops

being an "aggravating influence" in other countries of the Western Hemisphere, stops participating in violence overseas (i.e., Africa), and ends the suppression of

human rights within Cuba. If those aren't preconditions. what are they? In fact, they are virtually the same preconditions that have stood for years during the ebb and flow of interest in changing our Cuban policy.

What may be new is Mr. Carter's reference to human rights in keeping with his new concern with that subject in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. That Mr. Castro might soften his police-state rule in Cuba to court American favor has been the most far-fetched of hopes. Our diplomats in the past would have settled for changes in his foreign

All of this is hard to square with the opinion of Rep. Jonathan Bingham of New York, who just returned from a visit to Cuba, that "the ball is in our court" to make the move that would start a new U.S.-Cuban dialogue.

Mr. Castro told the congressman that the first step he is waiting for is lifting of the U.S. trade embargo. Since that is the "step" from which Cuba has the most to gain, we would place it well down the line.

It is likely that Mr. Carter would, too. If there is a ball in the air, it is heading toward the Cuban court — and it looks very much like the serves Fidel Castro has refused to return in the past.

### Carter's technique comes under strain

WASHINGTON - President Carter's first month in office is history and we now know much more about the man's style, détermination and the challenges his concepts are apt to encounter than we did 30 days

Perhaps the most impressive development during this period has been the new President's extension of his campaign technique of appealing directly to voters to convey the message he is one of them and on their side.

He had resorted to a surprising array of gestures to accomplish this - among others his Inauguration Day walk down Pennsylvania Avenue, his elimination of limousine service for White House staffers, his folksy fireside chat and elimination of some White House ceremonial pomp.

a promise to cut defense spending by \$5 billion to \$7 billion. He was able to trim only \$300 million in defense outlays from the Ford administration's fiscal 1976 budget submitted in January, plus \$2.8 billion from future spending in the form of reduced budget authority.

Then there is also the likelihood he will find it impossible to deliver on the most important pledge of all - to balance the federal budget by 1981, the final year of his term.

It is in just such areas of harsh, economic reality that the Carter techniques, proposed remedies. rhetoric and grasp of the essential knowledge involved, comes under very serious strain and could break down.

He has already had a serious set-

back. The severe winter and natural gas shortage has added \$100 or more to individual fuel bills this year, wiping out the hoped-for stimulative impact on the economy of the \$50 rebates Mr. Carter has proposed for most taxpayers and all Social Security recipients.

Similarly the fuel crisis shut thousands of factories, caused an increase in unemployment benefit payments and even forced some families to seek food stamps or go on welfare rolls.

This in turn has damaged the prospects for a fully reinvigorated economy that Mr. Carter has claimed would be generating \$70 billion or more in increased revenue by 1981 income he will need to balance the budget and pay for promised new

WASHINGTON (AP) - The medicinal value of grapes and wine, long touted in folklore of many countries, is getting a boost from science with the discovery that grapes kill viruses.

For centuries, people world-wide have praised the healing benefits of the grape. Roman soldiers use to pour wine into wounds and ancient Egyptian warriors mixed wine with the unfamiliar waters of countries they invaded.

Although it was known for many years that wine kills bacteria, Canadian scientists only recently discovered the antiviral properties.

In a report to the journal Applied and Environmental Microbiology, researchers for the Canadian Department of Health and Welfare in Ottawa say grapes, grape juice, raisins and wines show antiviral activity in the test tube.

Microbiologists Dr. Jack Konowalchuk and Joan I. Speirs said grapes and grape juice were stronger viral killers than wines. And in every case, red wines were more potent against viruses

The researchers said there was no way of knowing how these test tube results might apply to human health. But all the viruses in the experiments were those that affect humans, such as herpes simplex and polio virus, which cause herpes infections and polio.

"It is not the policy of the government to advocate drinking wine or anything else, Konowalchuk said in an interview Thursday. "But judging from these results, I would say grape juice is a very beneficial drink."

The researchers said the antibacterial properties of wine have been attributed to natural chemicals found in grapes, such as tannic acid and phenols.

Konowalchuk said he suspects the phenols may affect the viruses by binding to them and preventing them from infecting cells and multiplying.

The researchers found that the ability to inactivate viruses comes from grape skins and not

### Folklore about grapes Blumenthal won't coerce labor

NEW YORK - Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal Thursday said the Carter Administration's anti-inflation program will involve "neither direct controls nor indirect coercion" of

business and labor, but will instead try to enlist labor, management, consumers and government in a 'cooperative effort' to hold down inflation. Speaking to a group of business leaders here. Blumenthal indicated that the administration has

backed off from any assertive role in trying to limit wage and price hikes, including proposals for "prenotification" of pending wage and price boosts or application of government "jawboning" pressure on business and labor.

Instead, he outlined a series of eight measures he said will make up the anti-inflation program that will be announced in a few weeks, and these mainly emphasize structural changes in the way government impacts the economy, such as a review of regulations that create bottlenecks.

But Blumenthal still left open the possibility that, short of a pre-notification policy, the Carter Administration will still try to informally consult with the labor and business sectors before a major new contract is negotiated or a significant price hike is

The pre-notification proposal was floated recently by the administration as a form of incomes policy to control wage and prices but met with sharp opposition from AFL-CIO President George Meany.

The Treasury secretary Thursday said he did not "believe that it is useful to waste our energies on fruitless arguments about the pros and cons of imprecise concepts such as pre-notification on wages and prices - voluntary or otherwise.

"What is there to argue about?" he asked. "The expiration date of the major labor contracts is a

matter of public record. Doesn't this give all the prenotification needed?

"On the price front, I am equally confident that major U.S. industrial leaders, who see the importance of containing inflation as clearly as anyone. will, in the kind of cooperative program we plan to develop, weigh carefully and be prepared to discuss with us the implications of various price options," Blumenthal said.

In recent days there has been renewed concern that inflation is re-accelerating, that the Carter Administration's program to stimulate the economy will further aggravate the situation and that no effective plan to moderate inflation has been put forward.

Blumenthal tried to reassure the group that "this is not an administration that talks about inflation but will do nothing about it," and went on to sketch eight proposals that he said will be part of the soon-to-beannounced anti-inflation program. The proposals

-"A prompt review of all government regulations that create bottlenecks, restrict output or are otherwise inflationary," including examination of the need for cost-plus contracts with companies that do business with the government "which tend to reduce normal business cost-minimizing incentives." This would mainly affect defense con-

-A policy on international trade "that provides help and protection to industries and workers hurt by imports, but does so in ways which do not result in inflationary price increases borne by the consumer.' This would emphasize "structural reforms" to lower costs and increase productivity.

-Introduction this year of a major tax reform proposal "designed to promote business investment to achieve increased productivity."

-"A review of unnecessary and costly reporting requirements imposed on business by the govern-

-"An effort to create an effective system to analyze the economic impact of each major new

federal legislative or regulatory effort.' -Improvement of how the government's Council on Wage and Price Stability operates, "not to control or coerce but to provide the data and the research to identify bottlenecks and economic problem areas ahead of time."



LANSING, Mich. (AP) - "You're poisoning people for a dollar bill," farmer Ronald Thomas said, fighting back the tears as his voice broke when he told legislators his son had been poisoned with the chemical PBB.

Thomas then broke down in sobs as he told the state House Public Health Committee Thursday that the PBBcontaminated grain fed to his dairy herd caused his 4-year-old son's enlarged liver and spleen. "I don't know what's going to

happen to him, but if anything does there's going to be all kinds of hell to pay in this state," warned the 43-yearold dairy farmer from Gregory. "My wife is having trouble with her

vision, and I'm so tired it takes me all day and all night to do my chores," he Thomas was among a group of

farmers who told legislators of bizarre illnesses which struck their families after their livestock ate feed contaminated with PBB polybrominated biphenyl, a fire

The accidental contamination occurred in 1973 at the Battle Creek plant of the Michigan Farm Bureau Services when bags were mixed up workers thought they were quarantined farm.

putting a food additive in the feed. The farmers urged passage of a bill sponsored by state Rep. Francis Spaniola to lower the permitted levels in animal products from the current 300 parts per billion to 20 parts per

They detailed symptoms ranging from diarrhea to swollen joints that occurred since the 1973 PBB contamination.

Many said their herds' contamination levels were within socalled "safe" state and federal guideline levels. Medical studies in the past have

registered PBB in milk from new mothers, and a controversial statesponsored study by Dr. Irving Selikoff cited possible links between PBB and human illnesses.

In another part of Lansing, meanwhile, a group called the Young Farmers Committee held a news conference to warn of the economic effects on Michigan farmers if the PBB levels are lowered.

"I'm healthier than I have been in the last three years," said Rerry Heck, 27, a Monroe County farmer who said he has consumed large amounts of PBB from his own once-

### Massage parlor proposal put off

representatives have put off until Monday a proposal that would let counties control massage parlors.

The House tentatively approved Thursday, 115-5, Rep. Gene Green's bill enabling counties pass ordinances to regulate massage parlors, many of which have moved into rural areas to escape ordinances passed by city

A final vote next week could send the bill to the Senate.

The Senate quit until 11 a.m. Monday and the House until 2 p.m.

Senators ended their work week by refusing, 13-17, to take up Sen. Lloyd Doggett's bill that would stop state universities from issuing construction bonds backed by students' tuition payments.

Doggett, D-Austin, said \$23.7 million in such bonds had been issued in the past nine years - not to mention other bonds backed by building use fees, also paid by students.

"It seems to me these bonds have served a very useful purpose in building our schools. It would just compound the revenue problem," protested Sen. Pete Snelson, D-

Green, D-Houston, said Harris and Dallas County already had a problem of massage parlors operating wide open in rural areas after tight city regulations shut them down.

He predicted the same problem soon would arise in other counties. The House passed, 84-56, and sent to the governor a bill allowing the Department of Public Safety to issue

Also sent to the governor was a bill allowing The University of Texas to set up a fund to pay medical malpractice claims against its medical students, residents and faculty. The university's malpractice premium is \$3 million, against claims of about \$100,000 a year.

House members also passed, 113-5, and returned to the Senate an amended bill that would remove from birth certificates any indication whether a baby was legitimate.

The Senate passed 25-5 and sent to the House a bill that would prohibit the netting of fish in passes to the Gulf of Mexico. Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Courpus Christi, protested that commerical fishermen has not had adequate notice of the bill in order to protest it. Sen. Grant Jones, D-Abilene, said the measure merely reinstated what had been stated before a rewrite of state game and fish laws in 1975 inadvertently omit-

### **Energy suit** settled for cash, advice

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Three power com-panies that wanted to force Westinghouse Electric Corp. to honor a contract to supply uranium at one-fourth its current cost have settled instead for cash, equipment and advice.

The difference between the contracted price of \$9 a pound and the present price of about \$40 a pound would have cost Westinghouse an estimated \$2 billion over the next 20 years.

Westinghouse still faces suits from 24 utilities in Virginia and Sweden. Those cases have not yet been heard.

Allegheny County Judge I. Martin Wekselman, who mediated the settlement and announced it Thursday, said the economy of southwestern Pennsylvania had been spared a severe blow. "The people affected by this case were not just

stockholders and chairmen of corporate boards. Thousands of citizens' jobs and the interests of all consumers of energy were at stake," said Wekselman. Duquesne Light, Ohio Edison and Penn-

sylvania Power companies had asked the county court to force Westinghouse to provide uranium for their power plants at the price contracted for Westinghouse had declared it was relieved of

contractual obligations because unforseen market conditions pushed the cost up to about \$40 Under the agreement, the giant electric

equipment maker will give the utilities cash, products and technical advice instead. There is a provision in the agreement to up the settlement if later deals in other courts are more



### Pending bills won't give equal school funding

By JUDY JOHNSTON

Pending school finance bills in the Texas legislature would not provide equal funding, said a representative of a private research firm Thursday in a League of Women Voters

Jackie Cox of the Intercultural Development and Research Association (IDRA) of San Antonio reviewed the pending bills and their potential effect.

Another IDRA employe, Craig Foster, was scheduled to present a review of property tax problems in Texas but became ill and had to

The present rash of school finance bills before the legislature is the result of the 1975 School Finance Reform Act, Miss Cox said.

The 1975 law was an attempt to at least partially equalize education resources by distributing proportionately more state aid to propertypoor districts than to property-rich

As a result, Miss Cox said, districts have tried to look poor, or poorer, than they really are. Richer counties, by virtue of their greater property richness, can have low valuations ratios, low assessment ratios and low tax rates and still have sufficient local tax revenues to pay their local share of the foundation school program.

Poorer districts would have to have greater valuation ratios, assessment ratios and tax rates to have sufficient local tax revenues.

Yet because of the 1975 law, Miss Cox said, the wealthier districts have

cried to state legislators for tax relief.

The bills all would provide an across-the-board tax break, which, Miss Cox said, would be incrementally higher in wealthy

The bill which would most nearly provide equal funding is the Texas State Teachers' Association bill, she and Research Assn.

Although Foster was not present to give his study of property tax problem, Miss Cox reviewed some of the problems and concluded that the so-called Peveto bill would "add reason to a chaotic situation."

The Peveto bill is sponsored by Rep. Wayne Pevets of Orange, who serves as chairman of the Texas Legislative Council's Property Tax Study Committee. The bill has come under some fire throughout the state by local politicians, who believe the bill infringes on local autonomy. The Midland County Commissioners went on record in January as opposing the

The bill originally called for a single office in each county to appraise all local property for tax purposes, theoretically to save money by reducing duplication of work.

However, local assessor-collectors appealed to the legislature, and the

bill was amended to permit keeping the present office of county tax assessor-collector, Miss Cox said.

Other changes the bill proposes are an economical means of appeal and a freeze of property taxes at their present levels unless the public is told that a taxing unit intends to raise more money by raising taxes, according to an article by Peveto Jan. 23 in The Reporter-Telegram.

The bill purports to eliminate property appraisal by various different taxing bodies, such as the city, schools or special districts such as college or water.

Under the bill, Miss Cox said, the various taxing bodies would remain free to set their own tax rate, but certain loopholes which enable favoritism would be "plugged up."







As the first American to reach the summit of Mt. Everest, on May 1, 1963, Whittaker is the country's bestknown mountaineer. He became a friend of the Kennedys and has been a popular figure in the circles of the politically and socially prominent.

### Commercial, sport fishermen bitterly disagree

By GREG THOMPSON

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Texas commercial and sport fishermen bitterly disagree on whether there is a shortage of redfish in bays along the Texas coast.

But the hordes of fishermen that crowded into House and Senate committee rooms this week did agree that the Texas commercial fishing industry will suffer if measures are taken to conserve redfish.

The Senate Natural Resources Committee held lengthy, emotional hearings on a bill that would limit the number of redfish both sport and commercial fishermen can catch

House Environmental Affairs Committee hearings on similar bills stretched late into the night Wednesday. Both committees will consider the measures further raxt week.

"The redfish is being subjected to extremely heavy fishing pressure," said Bob Kemp, director of fisheries for the Parks and Wildlife Dept. "If the pressure is not reduced, I predict the redfish population in Texas bays will most likely crash.

"We're going to run out of redfish." said Rep. Joe Allen, D-Baytown, sponsor of a House redfish bill. "Everybody is going to have to give fishermen, who punctuated the Senate hearings with applause and loud groans, strongly disagreed:

"The redfish stock has increased and has remained strong and stable." said James Pace, a Brownsville commercial fisherman.

James Appel, a commerical fisherman representing the Seafood Producers Association, cited Parks and Wildlife statistics in adding, "We have more redfish now than ever

"We ain't depleting nuthin," said one fisherman, while another, a veteran of more than 55 years of commercial fishing, waved a scarred ever before in my life."

Virtually all the witnesses acknowledged that the industry would be hurt by the conservation measures.

"It will cut our harvest by half." said Pace.

Sen. A.R. "Babe" Schwartz, sponsor of the Senate bill, agreed, "It will adversely affect commercial fishermen who make their living from fishing. The economic hardship will



AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Sen. Oscar Mauzy, D-Dallas, introduced a school financing bill Thursday that he guaranteed "will raise the hair on the back of many a neck across the

Mauzy told a news conference his bill, among other things, would: —Require that all school districts levy an effective property tax rate of at least 50 cents per \$100 of market value. A total of 843 districts have

lower rates now. -Require 172 districts where the 50 cent effective tax rate would raise more than needed for a quality program to return \$70 million to the state

treasury for poorer school disticts. Mauzy estimated his bill, which includes a teachers pay raise, would cost \$850 to \$900 million in new state money for the next two years, com-pared with Gov. Dolph Briscoe's school financing bill that would cost \$820 million, without a teachers raise. - The Dallas senator, who also is chairman of the Senate Education

Committee, said his bill would be

heard by the Education Committee

next Wednesday night, along with four other school financing bills introduced in the Senate.

He said there currently was no House sponsor for the measure.

Other features of the Mauzy bill include a \$9,000 base salary for teachers, compared to the present \$8,000; state funding of full time kindergartens, additional teachers for sparse districts, increased maintenance and operation funds, full funding of driver education, establishment of a School Aid Equalization Commission to assure uniform appraisals and to verify market values

Mauzy said his bill, if passed into law, would result in the state share of school operation the next two years of \$1.8 billion, an increase of 22 per cent over 1975-76 and the total local share rising to \$1.16 billion, an increase of 120 per cent.

Mauzy said he was concerned with the majority of taxpayers and school students, not the number of school

### Judge orders Hayes exam

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — A federal judge Thursday ordered a psychiatric examination for former Castroville marshal Frank Hayes who is accused of violating the civil rights of a Mexican-American prisoner he killed

U.S. District Court Judge Adrian Spears ordered Hayes examined at Wilford-Hall USAF Medical Center in San Antonio and delayed formai arraignment until results of the examination are available.

Hayes was indicted by a federal grand jury last week on the civil rights charges in connection with the Sept. 14 1975 shotgun slaying of Castroville construction worker Richard

Hayes, appearing pale, wore a yellow windbreaker, sport shirt and corduroy pants as he faced the judge in court.

Spears also formally arraigned Hayes', wife Dorothy, and his sister-in-law, Alice Baldwin, on charges they were accessories after the fact of a civil rights violation. They had been released on bonds last week

### Bradley makes, sells records

NEW YORK - People with careers in the record world refer to their industry as the music business for one elementary reason. It is a business. with a sales volume estimated at more than \$2 billion a year.

Like any major business, record companies require bureaucrats as well as creative types, salesmen as well as artists. In the pop music capitals, New York, Los Angeles and London, this division of labor is fairly well defined

But in one increasingly influential quarter of the music world, the definitions are somewhat less distinct. That's in the home of country music, Nashville.

Perhaps the most successful practitioner of this two-headed trade is Jerry Bradley. Bradley's title is Division Vice President, Nashville Operations, for RCA Records. He is the chief administrator for this autonomous segment of the RCA corporation, handling the day-to-day business chores. He is also a record producer and A&R (artists and repertoire) man of some renown, responsible for signing and developing new artists, and keeping the careers of his established artists growing. He makes records, and he sells records.

"Occasionally, the company has expressed a desire for me not to make records," the courtly, 38-year-old, self-described "country boy" said in an interview. "But I guess I ... well, refuse, because an important part of my reputation isn't filling out budgets and signing my name to papers as much as it is making hit records and developing new acts. I spend a limited time in the studio now, but I make sure I do it.

The Bradley balance has paid off smartly for RCA. Bradley joined the company as a producer in 1970, the chosen successor to guitar great Chet Atkins, who was tiring of his bureaucratic chores and wanted to revitalize his own recording and performing career. In 1974, Bradley took full control of RCA's often lethargic Nashville operation. That year, the company had 18 No. 1 singles on the country music charts. The next year, there were 17, but in 1976, RCA had 19

No. 1 records, spanning 23 weeks. "Anybody in the know realizes Jerry has done an excellent job," Jim Fogelsong, vice president of ABC-Dot Records in Nashville, said, "There

was a time when, because he was the son of Owen Bradley (one of Nashville's legendary producers), it was thought he had the red carpet laid out for him. But no one even thinks about that now, since he's done such a good job."

Bradley credits the autonomy of his branch - which he says is unique in Nashviile - for giving RCA the edge in a viciously competitive area.

"What autonomy means is that it has cut 60 days off the time it took (three years ago) to get an album out. We no longer have to get approval from New York on tapes and art work or wait for letters to come back and

Bradley reflected on the time in the early 1960s when Floyd Cramer had a hit single with "Last Date." "It was 13 months before they put the album out. The guy who had the succesful LP on that song was Lawrence Welk! Those things don't happen anymore."

They certainly don't. As country music has grown over the last few years, it has, like rock and soul music, become more album oriented. Bradley credits both the increased sophistication of disc jockeys and radio programmers, the development of intelligent songwriters and the cultivation of young, aware producers and artists as the reasons behind country music's developing maturity.

A rival executive, noting what he called the high turnover of promotion personnel at RCA, said that Bradley is "an A&R man primarily. A&R men think all their records should be hits, even when a good promotion man knows they can't all be. So promotion men get booted

record indicates that his autonomy with RCA has worked particularly well. The company's most substantial success under Bradley was the attainment last year of country music's first certified platinum album, for sales of more than 1 million copies. The name of the album, "Outlaws," by Waylon Jennings, Jessi Colter, Tompall Glaser and Willie Nelson, has come to describe country music's most controversial subgenre.

Jennings, Nelson and Glaser, as well as ground-breaking predecessors like Kris Kristofferson, played music that reflected their life-style, which included long hair, counterculturetype affiliations and an uncompromising, independent attitude that the conservative barons of Nashville music found threatening and offensive. It is perhaps Bradley's greatest triumph that he can reconcile the difference between the two factions and keep everyone satisfied.

"We're sitting on the edge," Bradley said. "Our music — in whatever form - could be the music of tomorrow. I'm not saying that's good — I'd like country to keep its identity. But from a business standpoint, I'd have to follow it wherever it goes-gospel, wherever. That's the





### House cuts carrier funds

WASHINGTON - The House voted Thursday to end the era of the giant nuclear-powered aircraft carrier.

By a vote of 252 to 161, the House decided to go along with President Carter rather than Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, outspoken advocate of a nuclear-powered Navy, and cut money for the nuclear carriers from the fiscal 1977 defense budget.

If Thursday's decision survives what are expected to be less severe challenges in future House and Senate voting, the U.S. Navy will make a highly significant change in course.

Instead of continuing to build Nimitz-class nuclear carriers at \$2 billion or more a copy, the Navy would switch to smaller and cheaper carriers with planes that could take off and land without using today's catapults and arresting gear.

"We are embarking on the V-STOL era," said chairman George H. Mahon (D-Tex.) of the House Appropriations Committee in applauding the switch from giant to medium size aircraft carriers. V-STOL is a designation for vertical and

short takeoff and landing aircraft. Rep. Bill Chappell (D-Ga.), in arguing that it is too early to abandon the Nimitz in favor of a paper concept, urged his colleagues to vote for his amendment requiring the Carter Administration to spend the full \$350 million appropriated last year for a fourth Nimitz carrier.

The \$350 million was contained in the fiscal 1977 Pentagon budget. In reviewing that budget, Carter decided \$268.4 million of the \$350 million should be used to buy spare parts for Nimitz carriers already at sea or under construction rather than start a new ship. The remaining \$81.6 million would be saved.

The vote on the Chappell amendment was this year's first big test of House sentiment toward cutting the Pentagon budget. However, it was not a pure test of Carter's strength in this regard since former President Ford had reversed his earlier position on building another Nimitz carrier and recommended against it in his final budget to Congress in January.

### Soviet bloc debts likely to go unpaid

LONDON - The explosive growth in Soviet bloc debt confronts the West with a "serious", and continuing problem, a pioneering study here has conclud-

An unpublished report by Prof. Richard Portes of London University warns that the expanding mountain of East European I.O.U.s could reach a staggering \$100 billion by 1980. By then, Poland for one will probably need to have its debt "rescheduled," a banking euphemism for making new loans to save old ones from default.

This state of affairs, Portes says, is made even more precarious because the biggest share of the credits is now coming from virtually unregulated private Western banks. Their entry "implies a straight-forward loss of governmental control over Western landing policy.

According to Portes, these bankers are employing foreign deposits in the uncontrolled Euromarket, displaying dubious judgment about credit risks and lending to the bloc on a fraction of the information and none of the collateral required from conventional borrowers. The bankers appear to be counting on Western governments to bail them out, for both political and economic reasons, when their loans go.

Portes concludes that the mounting bloc credit not only endangers Western banks but also tends to drive weaker satellite debtors closer to the Soviet Union. This is the very reverse of a justification often advanced for making loans to Poland, Bulgaria and

Portes is a Yale- and Oxford-trained economist, a former Rhodes scholar who has taught at Princeton and is now a professor at Birback College in London University. His paper, which is circulating among European and U.S. officials concerned with Soviet trade, is believed to be the first serious attempt to assess the implications of the credits.

The Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), spurred by warnings from former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, has compiled the most extensive statistical analysis of East-

West credits. But the still-secret report from the Paris-based OECD scrupulously avoids any conclusions. Some OECD members, notably the French, regard the concern in Washington as an unwarranted trick to deprive Western Europe of markets and influence in the East.

Western credits to the bloc, almost equally divided between government-backed and purely private loans, have mushroomed in the last five years. The Soviet world has turned to the West for the technology it needs and the food it lost in two disastrous harvests. Economic stagnation in the West, in turn, has left Western banks flush with funds they want to lend and Western factories hungry for markets.

By the end of last year, bloc debt to the West was estimated at about \$40 billion, including \$15 billion for the Soviet Union and an outsized \$10 billion in Poland. But big as this is, Portes observes, it understates the volume oif I.O.U.s the bloc has signed. All together, Portes calculates the West has extended credits of nearly \$60 billion. The extra \$20 billion is for loans against which no deliveries of Western goods have yet been made.

If the rate continues through 1980, Portes estimates the debt an will stand at \$100 billion. That would be well above the total extended to other so-called developing countries in the Third World, a credit risk that has just begun to worry Western banking officials.

The credits, Portes observes, would pose no problems if they financed industries that could produce a matching stream of goods sold to the West. But, he says, there is "little evidence" that the capital and technology brought in from the West is being used for this purpose. Instead, the bulk of it produces goods for sale inside the bloc, autos, petrochemicals and

Portes questions the bloc's ability to generate enough imports to pay for the loans in any event. He takes no position on the argument, frequently advanced, that the state-managed economies of the East are too rigid to produce many manufactures the West would buy. But if a freer economy is a prerequisite, he predicts that it will not be achieved. Hungary's moderate relaxation of controls, he says, is further than the Soviet world is likely to go.

The London Economist describes a dilemma that makes debt repayment even more difficult. If the West expands, it widens the gap in technology over the East and makes Eastern goods even less sellable outside the bloc or Third World. If the West slumps, demands for protection against "unfair" bloc competition choke off markets. Finally, the complex Common Market system to protect European farmers cuts off potential agricultural sales from Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania.





After taking an early 8-4 lead, the Chaps trailed most of the way. lagging 32-27 at intermission. Both teams were so bad in the first half, that a rumor started that both would be eliminated.

Midland played like it was Siesta time and, by golly, nothing was going to keep them from getting their nap. There may have been more fact than fancy in the appearance.

"I don't know what was wrong with us," said Alvin Mayes. "We just couldn't seem to get started. Maybe it was the bus ride earlier in the day.' "WE'RE USUALLY just finishing practice at that hour," Jeff Jackson

said of the 4 p.m. start. "We just weren't ready to play. 'We'll be ready tomorrow,'' promised Tommy Parks.

Trailing 38-30 six minutes into the second half and apparently headed for defeat against a team it had beaten twice previously, Midland

Hudgins scored from under the rim, Jackson Pace banked in a turn shot and Jackson tallied from the base

Cooke increased its lead to 42-36 and then Pace scored on a drive, Mayes set up Hudgins and Ron Jones scored twice for a 44-42 Midland lead with

The Chaps never trailed again, but were tied at 44, 50, 52 and finally 54 with 2:57 left. Parks, who wound up with nine assists, fed Jackson underneath for a 56-54 lead with 2:10 to

Jones rebounded a missed shot by Cooke and then converted two more free throws with 33 seconds left to sew

### Finley dares Kuhn to block another deal

Lindblad sale has been settled but the next round in the long-running feud between Oakland A's owner Charles O. Finley and Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn may be just around the

Thursday night, several hours after Kuhn approved Finley's recent \$400,000 sale of relief pitcher Lindblad to the Texas Rangers, the Oakland owner unleashed another namecalling attack on the commissioner and dared him via telegram to veto any of the A's future deals.

"I'm working on deals every day." Finley told The Associated Press from his home in Chicago. "They might include players or they might include cash, it all depends. Nothing is immiment, but you never know with baseball deals. I might have something in the next few days.'

Meanwhile, reliever Jim Todd, one of 13 unsigned A's, failed to reach a salary agreement with Finley and said the owner told him that any players who don't sign will be traded.

In approving the Lindblad sale, Kuhn said he was "seriously concerned that there may be a plan, developing or developed, to substantially liquidate the established talent of the Oakland club.'

He said he would "scrutinize with great care" any deals which involve substantial cash payments to the A's and "will not hesitate to disapprove such assignments if I find that they are not in the best interests of baseball, and to take other action,

There are several factors involved," said Irwin, one of the game's more thoughtful and articulate players, of the 1977 phenomena that has seen the younger, lesser-known competitors dominating the pro golf

(Lee) Trevino is about the same. Arnold (Palmer) is considerably older than that. There just aren't that many of the names still playing. The numbers are heavily weighted toward the younger players.

"And they're athletes, too. I think I'm put together pretty well," said the former Colorado football player, "but I can't hit with some of these guys. Fuzzy Zoeller, Andy North, Bruce Lietzke, Andy Bean, Tom Purtzer, they're all big, strong, powerful, intelligent guys.

We aren't exactly sure what they were playing, but maybe they'll introduce it in Texas some day.

Yet as awesome as the Heels were Sunday, few would bet that they won't become a casualty in the ACC tournament this week, probably by some also-ran like Virginia.

Somehow it's suspected the infatuation with ACC basketball is prompted as much by the charged atmosphere created by vibrant

crowds as the court feats of the players.

An ACC game, more than any other, seems to carry the fanatic flavor of Oklahoma-Texas, UCLA-USC, Michigan-Ohio State or Nebraska-Oklahoma found in football.

EVEN AN allegedly improving Southwest Conference brand of basketball pales in comparison, although it may be in this year's Arkansas team, there is some hint of

The Razorbacks have cracked the top 10, the first time a SWC has done that since the 1950s and gone undefeated through the league schedule for the first time since either the center jump was eliminated or SMU

Still, there are the skeptics who chide that any ACC team could breeze through the SWC without mishap.

Claimed as the Razorbacks' most impressive credential, if 25-1 isn't good enough to lift an eyebrow, to the feat of invading the Big Eight backen December and beating Kansas and Kansas State, which oldtimers claim

### Britain backs Carter

The Washington Post

LONDON - The British government Thursday gave a resoun-ding endorsement to President Carter's campaign for human rights in the Soviet world.

In a major address, David Owen, the youthful new British foreign minister, cited "President Carter, whose obvious concern for the whole area of human rights is crucially impor-

Owen flatly rejected the Soviet contention that highlighting abuses abroad amounts to "interfering in other peo-ple's internal affairs."

"Abuses of human rights, wherever they may occur, are the legitimate subject of international concern," Owen said. "The dignity of man transcends national frontiers."

Britain's government, he said, "shall not hesitate to state our views frankly where we consider the performance of countries to be demonstrably unsatisfac-tory ... The Warsaw Pact countries had and still have much ground to make up."

Owen explicitly aligned London with "the attitude" of the Carter Administration, decrying violations "in every corner of the globe."

"We will apply the same standards and judgments to Communist countries," he said, "as we do to Chile, Uganda and South Africa."

Owen's address to the Diplomatic and Commonwealth Writers' Association is the strongest support the President has received from abroad for his new departure. The French and other Western governments have refrained from publicly criticizing his tactics but made clear their distaste for them.

The 38-year-old foreign secretary spoke out on the eve of a visit he and Prime Minister james Callaghan will make to Washington next week.

The timing was deliberate. It is known that top Foreign Office officials have been laboring for weeks over a coherent statement of the British view toward detente. This was a major and private preoccupation of Foreign Secretary Anthony Crosland's final weeks. His death 11 days ago brought in Owen, who became the vehicle for Thursday night's expression of the British government's views.

In his speech, Owen cautioned that governments "must balance morality with reality,' that their language will frequently be less "exhilarating" than the "highly articulate statements of famous exiles from Eastern Europe."

In raising questions of another government's treatment of its citizens. 'We are beginning to encroach on fundamental attitudes, on human behavior, and the issues go to the heart of each side's perception of itself and its interests."

"It would be folly indeed," Owen said, "for one side to make the process of detente so distasteful to the other that it would prefer to opt out altogether. The golden rule must be that neither side should pursue policies which so raise the level of confrontation that the structure of detente is itself threatened."

This was the closest Owen came to hinting at any reservations, about President Carter's outspokenness. A Foreign Office summary of the speech, probably based on an earlier draft, was blunter. It said, "declaratory statements are not always appropriate; private pressure may sometimes be more effective."

But the government evidently had second thoughts and the final version was softer.

"Your vote is a secret," the sign says, making the point even more emphatic.

A lot of people think the posters speak for the opposition Janata Party, which urges voters to be fearless in ousting Prime Minister Indira Gandhi and her ruling Congress Party.

But the nonpartisan signs were put up by the national government's election commission. That in itself

announcement of an election. In almost no time, four opposition parties - most of their leaders only recently released from jail, their treasuries empty, their longstanding personal and ideological disputes outstanding —got together and, more important, have stayed together.

And the opposition has been on the offensive from the start. The Janata Party picked up momentum when Jagjivan Ram, leader of India's Untouchables, quit the Cabinet and ruling party and formed an alliance with the coalition. Then Mrs. Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, a veteran diplomat and Mrs. Gandhi's aunt, joined the opposition bandwagon.

When the campaign began, Janata defined the issue as demiocracy versus dictatorship. Mrs. Gandhi contends it is stability versus chaos.

The Prime Minister has been on the defensive. She tours this vasa nation. telling crowds she is not a dictator. Her ministers apologize for excesses committed during the emergency.

In the capital, the opposition seems very strong. It gets huge crowds and they are enthusiastic. By contrast, Congress Party rallies draw fewer people who are inattentiste, even jeering speakers, as they did Mrs. Gandhi the other day when she attacked the Janata Party.

There are reports that this mood extends into the countryside, where

elections are decided by the overwhelming majority of the people who live in rural India.

Indian journalists say they cannot remember a campaign so lively and exciting, one in which the ruling party
— the Congress Party has ruled India since independence in 1947 — seemed so vulnerable.

Nobody with any sense would count out the Congress Party with the enormous advantages a ruling party has. But many ruling party members are nervous while their opposition counterparts talk about who will get which portfolio in the Janata Party

That certain reflects the excitement level of this campaign, including some wishful thinking. But the peculiarities of an Indian election considerations of caste, religion, village leadership - almost defy analysis.

And who really knows, two weeks before balloting begins March 16, whether the world's largest electorate

will vote without fear? In the short but very intense campaign of the last six weeks, it is almost as though a vast, diverse nation has come out of hiding!

### Device helps spines

The Washington Post

WASHINGTON - The chief of orthopedic surgery at Children's Hospital here has invented and successfully used a device designed to straighten the severely curved spines of young children suffering from a condition known as kyphosis.

Dr. Douglas McKay said that his procedure does not eliminate the paralysis from which these children suffer, but it does eliminate the hump back with which they have previously had

The operation, which takes eight hours and has been performed 13 times. also extends the life of the children, by straightening them up. McKay said. This relieves pressure on their lungs and intestines caused by their bent-over

"This has been an answer to a prayer," said David Mannes of Norfolk. Va., who attended a press conference on the procedure Wednesday. Mannes and his wife, Irene, have a 10-year-old daughter. Laura, who is one of McKay's patients.

"We've been looking for years for a doctor the skill and knowledge to do this," said Mannes. "We've gone from hospital to

McKay showed slides of Laura before and after the operation. In one photo she was bent over and had a large hump in her back. In the other she sat as straight as any child is willing to sit, hump free and smiling.

McKay's procedure involves using U-shaped stainless steel bolts to pull the spine, which curves outward, in to its natural position where it is held fast to a narrow stainless steel plate. Some of the material

between the vertebrae is removed, and the space thus created is packed with bone chips. The goal, explained McKay, is to fuse the spine in the proper position. The plate and bolts are left in, but only as a precaution.

Kyphosis is caused by a number of conditions. McKay said. Some children are born with it, some develop it as a result of paralysis, some because of a tumor, while in others it develops after a serious accident.

According to McKay one in every 10,000 children is born with the problem. At that rate, about 350 such children would be born in the United States every year. An additional group develops the condition after birth. Thus far McKay has tried his procedure only on those children who developed the condition after birth as a result of paralysis.

He said he has not yet tried it on those born with kyphosis because they are generally not paralyzed. He said he has been wary of attempting to use the device on a child whose spinal cord has been functioning. because of the possibility of damaging the chord.

Describing the effect of the operation on the children, McKay said, The greatest improvement we've seen has been in social problems," he said. He went on to say that one of his young patients - who have ranged in age from 6 to 10 - had dropped out of school because of her deformity, "and now does



"It is a new and different approach," Briscoe told a news conference Thursday afternoon. "I have asked my staff to study the proposal. I would not now be ready to

answer whether it violates the no-new "I understand this is new because it requires a constitutional améndment

The refinery tax has been introduced in both the House and Senate by a group of prominent legislative leaders. The measure would allow the property tax to be replaced by a five per cent levy on crude oil entering refineries as the main support of Texas public schools.

### NEIL SOLOMON, M.D. Too much oxygen

Dear Dr. Solomon: I just found out that the little daughter of a friend of mine, who is blind, lost her eyesight because of too much oxygen at the time she was born (she was a premature baby). As I am almost eight months pregnant with my first baby, I am beginning to worry that something like this could happen if my child were premature. Just how can such a misake be made? Can't these thing be measured accurately?-Patricia F.

Dear Patricia: Oxygen therapy for premature or sick babies presents a serious dilemma for even the best hospitals and the most skillful doctors. Too much oxygen in the baby's blood may indeed cause blindness by damaging the retina. But too little can lad to brain damage or even death. As so often happens in medicine, it is a question of balancing one risk against another. A crucial problem is monitoring the oxygen level in

general use is to place a little tube called a catheter in the baby's navel and draw off blood periodically for testing. But this doesn't tell you what's going on every minute. It may also use too much blood. And there can be other troubles, like infection or clotting. Now, however, a promising new device for monitoring has been developed by Drs. Albert and Renate Huch, a West German husband-and-wife

team. It is a tiny, round sensor about the size of a nickel, made of platinum and silver, which can be taped to the infant's chest or back. The sensor is able to gauge the minute amount of oxygen coming through the skin by measuring its

electrical effects, and the results are continuously recorded on paper graphs. If the baby's oxygen level is too high or too low, the

doctors are alerted immediately. And the sensor can even be attached to a baby's scalp during labor by means of a forceps inserted through the birth canal If the still unborn baby is not getting enough oxygen, this can be immediately corrected by giving oxygen or proper medication to the mother.

The Huch sensor is being tried out in America at the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco and at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New York. Reports from both are very encouraging and there may be a commerical model available in a year or so

The device should be of great value in many situations-from getting information on oxygen levels during exercise to monitoring a heart attack.

### College up for sale: \$100,000

TEHUACANA, Tex. (AP) - When he climbs the stairs of the massive administration building or strolls around the halls of ivy, Joe Eagey is a really big man on campus in this tiny Central Texas town. In fact, he's the only man on campus.

But Eagey doesn't go to college. He owns one And for three years, Eagey has been trying to sell the historic, 108-year-old campus where Trinity University was founded.

Eagey bought the college at an auction three years ago, planning to resell it, but he found out there is not a huge market for used colleges. So far the only taker has been a Hollywood movie

company. But it only rented the school to make a It was a horror movie that didn't do much to en-

courage prospective college buyers. It was titled "Don't Look in the Basement."

Now Eagey, who's in the real estate business in Mexia, may have to look for a buyer with bats in his

'It's probably going to have to be somebody with a tub full of money," he said. "Somebody who wants something nobody else

With a huge, four-story limestone building in the center of it, the historic Westminster College campus takes in 10 acres on a quiet side street in Tehuacana (pronounced Te-wahkana) 80 miles south of Fort

The college, which includes a gymnasium, two dormitories and a 310-seat auditorium, was operated by the Congregational Methodist Church until it was closed about three years ago. That's when Eagey bought it

Now he's trying to sell it for \$100,000. The aged buildings will need extensive renovations, but Eagey said he thinks the college has a lot of potential He said the 32,700-square-foot main building,

called Texas Hall, would make a nice mansion, he The main building has scores of stained glass windows, 12 chimneys, 15-inch-think limestone walls a large auditorium and a bell tower. The tower, Eagey

said, offers a view of 10 towns, including Waco. One idea Eagey has been kicking around is to dismantle the 6,000 limestone blocks in the building and sell them to Trinity alumni as patio stones.

"But I hope that never comes to pass," he said 'I'd hate to tear it down. That's my last plan. But if something is not done in 10 years or so it will probably detoriorate to the point it has to be torn down.' Eagey said there's too much history tied up in the old college to raze it.

"Up on the fourth floor there's a basketball court marked off. The first indoor basketball game in the state of Texas was played in that attic.'

In front of the campus two Texas historical markers also note some of the other roles the college has played in Texas history.

John Boyd outbid Dallas to become the home of Trinity University in 1869 and operated the school here until 1902. Afterward the college was deeded to the Methodist Protestant Church, which relocated Westminster College on the campus and the Congregational Methodist Church took over in 1953. Then Eagey stepped in.

"Actually we were just standing there on the day of the auction," he said. "You should have seen the look on my wife's face when I told her I bought it."


