sal of standing PCG policy favoring cotton loans based sal of standing PCG policy favoring cotton loans based on an average on U.S. spot market prices. That basic since 1977 .

Hance bill can be brougt to Hance bill can be brought to the House floor. Hance has said he expects both the Budget and Rules Com-
mittees to act on the bill sometime this month, but in mitcees to act on the bill sometime this month, but in percent chance for survival in the House. Immediately after the Thursday meeting, PCG President Joe D. Unfred of New Home sent Con gressman Hance the following telegram.
"PCG Board of Directors Thursday, May 8, voted 28 to 4 to support H.B. 6815 . We stand ready to support your efforts. Please let us know your plans to move the enactment in time to be of assistance to producers in 1980."

Premiums and discounts that determine the loan value of individual qualities change from year to year. They have not been announced for 1980, but the 644 -point 1979 discount applied to the hypothetical 68.9 -cent base lone rate used above would bring the
loan on the average High Plains quality to 62.46 cents Years when the quality of High Plains cotton falls below average, obviously its loan value would be lower. A case in point is 1979 when most High Plains cotton "miked" far below the multi-year 3.4 average, increasing the loan discount by as much as 540 points.
