Most every boy brought up on a Texas farm or ranch, is wise in the ways of the festive bumble bee. He knows a bumble bee is a yellow banded critter about five times larger than a honey bee.

He knows that this big bee carries a hypodermic needle in his tail end, the back of which is supplied with a sac of vemon which the doctors call makesboyhollerum or some long doctor word about that size. When a boy contacts one of these bees, his cries of tribulation can be heard all over the place.

Aside from his cruel sting, the bumble bee makes a delicous honey which he wraps up in a strong paper bag which he makes for that purpose and stores it in a hollow tree or in a hole in the ground. It takes ages to teach a boy that fight ing bumble bees is a precarious

As a small boy cotton picker, they told me that a bumble bee would not "sting this month." So I proceeded to capture one while he was gathering honey in a cotton bloom. With my fingers I closed the petals of the bloom around the bumble bee and captured him. I didn't need any help to turn him loose. Uncle Bill knows life from the seamy side and except for his propensity to skin "jimfergusonites", I like to sit at his knee and learn how to live. But Uncle Bill went haywire on his rattlesnake story ap pearing in last weeks issue of the News-Record. As the story goes a rattlesaske jumped a foot or more off the ground and landed without uncoiling, then ran after Uncle Bill Now, I know that the American way of life has changed. the ministers have quit preaching hell fire and damnation, people have quit eating pokeweed greens and hog jowl, and the roosters have quit crowing at midnight, but I had no idea that the rattlesnakes had changed too.

Now when I lived among the rat tlesnakes they didn't jump off the ground while coiled, nor run after people. ### Infantile Paralysis

Dr. Geo. W. Cov, State Health Officer, states that infantile paralysis is largely a summer disease. Although cases may occur during any time of the year, over half the total number of cases of poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) have been re ported to the State Health Department from city and county health officers over the state.

Direct contact between persons form the chief tactor in the spread of infantile paralysis. Because of the seasonal prevalence of the disease, flies and other insects have been suspected of conveying the virus or germ, Insect transmission has not, however, been scientifical. ly demonstrated. Although animals are subject to paralysis, they are seemingly not susceptible to the human type of this paralytic disease. Carriers are difficult to de termine and this fact makes it ad visable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts during any out break of the disease.

Early symptoms of infantile par alysis are a headache, fever vomit ing, drowsiness and irritability fol lowed by stiffness in the neck and back. Prompt medical care, early recognition of the disease, and re porting of cases to local health au thorities make possible the use of preventive and control measures.

After the acute state of the dis ease has passed and the patient is permitted to walk, it is most im portant that the affected part of the body not be fatigued. The sec ret of rehabilition lies in the conti nuance of professional medical care and large doses of patience.

Children under five years are most susceptible to the disease and all children under twelve should be watched for suspicious symptoms. Your family physician should be called immediately and patients isolated for at least 21 days.

Children should not visit homes where the disease or symptoms of the disease exist. Promptness in diagnosis of poliomyelitis is one of the most important factors in its control measures.

### Bird Kills Snake

Details of the efficient manner in which road runners, or chaparrals go about killing snakes, was contain ed in a report of a game warden to the Game Department recently. The warden got in on the start of the fight and remained until the close, exactly an hour and 21 minutes later

The roadrunner was jogging down a small path through the brush when it stopped suddenly and start ed circling a bunch of cord grass. The warden approached to within twenty yards of the bird and remained there while the chaparral proceeded to trim a 43 inch snake down to its size and then to dispatch it. Darting in and out the road runner dug viciously at the rattler time and again and each time managed to evade the fangs of the six button reptile. After 81 minutes the rattler was lifeless. The chaparral took two more vicious stabs at it, cocked his eye at the warden and nonchalantly strolled off into the brush.

Upon examining the reptile, the warden found a hole completely through the center of its head, three lacerations on its belly and the rat-Chas. Gibbs tler was missing both its eyes.



#### BORROWING MONEY

Lack of understanding on the part of the general public, with regard to public borrowing, is creating a general misconception of economic consequences.

The two factors of primary consideration are the amount of money to be borrowed by the government, and where the money comes from. In normal times the volume of loans is so small that



the savings of people interested in buying bonds are sufficient to cover the requirements. Under such conditions government loans have little effect on our economic life. In an emergency such as the present national defense, where billions of dollars are involved. the government will be forced to buy beyond the savings of the people. This will mean that people will have less money to spend. So long as this drain does not remove more than luxuries from our daily life, and does not impair the capital funds necessary to the economic life of a community, no great damage will

The great danger to the future of the United States, from an economic point of view, is that under the strain of the emergency our government may overlook the long range problem of preserving the economic resources of this country.

It is possible to divert capital replacement funds temporarily but if this continues too long, machinery and equipment will not be kept in repair. As a result, the machinery will lose its ability to produce wealth, thus putting the future income of the country

into jeopardy. Only one sound conclusion can be drawn, considering the vast sum the government must borrow for this emergency and that is, that it become the patriotic duty of every American to loan his government every bit of savings and every bit of additional money he can spare. If any of us hold out and refuse to loan our savings then, by necessity, the government, through taxation, will borrow the capital from American business, whether it be the country store or the giant manufacturing enterprise.

Taxation is advocated by many on the theory that it will check extravagant consumption and avoid the inflation of credit and prices. The arguments are good but, unfortunately, the politicians usually avoid effective taxation. They are willing to tax large incomes but this fails to check inflation. Taxation of the masses is the only way to check rapid rise in prices. This is politically unpopular because most people fail to understand that taxation of rich and poor, as well as the millions in between, is for the protection of everyone. The masses lose more net income as a result of inflation than could possibly be taken away from them by taxation twice as heavy as that now being paid.

Of equal importance to the amount and source of money for government use, is the question of how the money borrowed is to be spent; that is, whether it is put to productive or unproductive use. To be productive it must either increase or protect the capital assets of the country, if considered only from an economic point of view. Certainly the protection of our country means the protection of our assets. Defense for the protection of such capital assets should therefore be considered productive. The building of new plants and the buying of new machinery and equipment all come under the head of productive expenditure. Because such expenses will be so tremendous, it is necessary that non-essential expenditures be reduced to a mini-

The important thing to remember in connection with the present national emergency is that al! of us can do ourselves and our country a great favor economically by turning our savings into defense bonds.
