The finances and other things which are equired by law to be published, are posed to be published in a regular wspaper, and not in a sheet that me times runs and some times does The Advocate does not want the county printing or anyother kind at such figures, and when compelled to lower the standard of the calling to meet such prices it will close up shop anh quit - Amarillo Western Advocate.

Here is truly a plaintive cry-a drowning man grasping at the straws; and a case of desperation unequaled in our community. It is a call on the public, on the county for help, at the exponse of a rival and of the public The Coxey crowd thinks the governmeut ought to support people that are out of work; what less pray, does the editor of the Advocate ask? The Commissioners asked for sealed bids at the lowest price, but Mr Gaut thinks they ought to have awarded it to the highest bidder-in order to subsidize his paper and suppress his competitors, And he "does not know hich is the more to blame the commissoners coart," who saved the tax payers \$42, or the newspaper that earned \$8-the one for subsidizing him, and the other for chance of working for its own living. A delemna, to be sure! to be relieved of which, the News sees but one other recource to save the Advocate—a subscription paper for contribution to keep it on irs feet. Surely no sensible man believes he can dictate to the county judge or any member of the courtmuchless to the Amarillo News-that would drive the former into excesses at the public expense, and the other to an unconditions I surrender to what News considers so impotent a the

Mr ant in his indecision as to which to "blame" ignores the fact that our county court is composed of intelligent, honest and honorable men, elected to conserve the public intrest, and not private intrests—muchless so very private an intrest as that of his own. But all other honest tax pavers will side with the court in accepting the lower bid since they ki ov the \$50 bid was in no wise supperior to the lower bid.
