All male persons who have reached their 20th birthday on or before December 31, 1941, and who have not reached their 45th. birthday on February 16th. 1942, will be required to register. Wilful failure to register subjects the delinquent to a heavy penalty. In the event a registrant is ill and unable to report for registration, a special registrar will be sent to him.

Nearly a thousand West Texas Utilities Company employees in 166 communities are getting organized to help lick the Japs and Germs with dollars - as well as kilowatts. Results of a survey were announced today by District Manager Henry


HENRY BATJER District Manager West Texas Utilities Company Batjer in which it was learned that 79 per cent of all WTUers already were buying defense bonds and stamps.

Mr. Batjer said that participation will be strictly on a voluntary basis and that the program will supplant payroll allotment deduction plan. The company recently announced purchase of $\$ 50,000 \mathrm{in} \mathrm{U}. \mathrm{3}$. bonds subscribed of a pro rata dasis in the various communities it serves.
