Tax Workshop For Farmers Is Scheduled

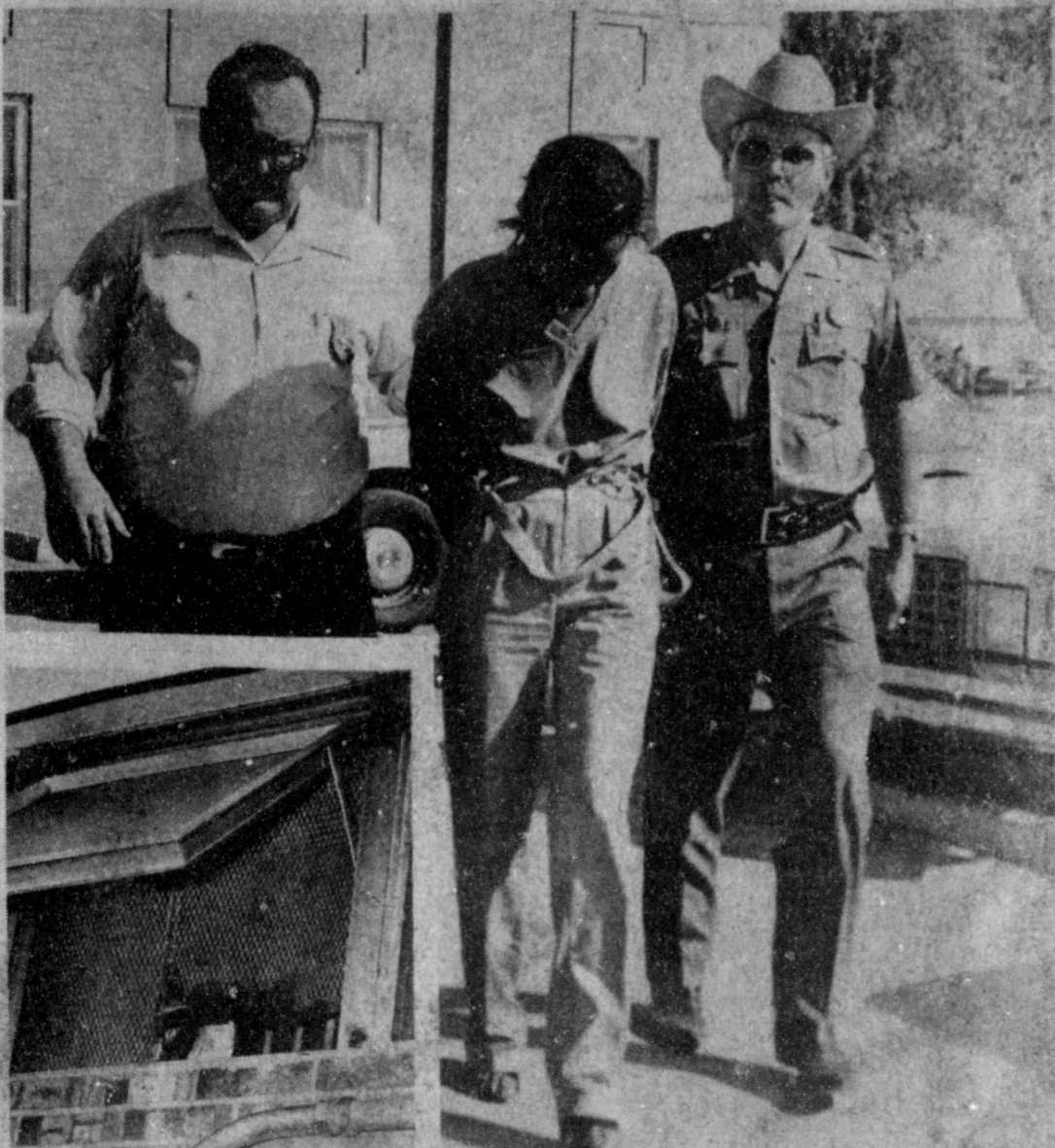
Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the Internal Revenue Service in offering 37 Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state, reports Spencer Tanksley, Bailey County Extension Agent. The nearest workshop to our area will be in Lubbock on December 1-2, according to the county agent.

Also, he said the nearest Advanced Workshop will be in Lubbock on December 3-4. These two day workshops are specifically designed for tax practitioners who work extensively with farmers and ranchers.

Topics to be covered in the general workshops are: What's new--including the windfall profits tax; divorce, separation, child support, alimony and property settlements; capital gains and losses; repossession; oil, gas and coal; filing and processing; corporations and partnerships.

For the first time this year, eight advanced programs will be offered, stressing tax preparation for businesses, added Tanksley. Topics to be discussed in the Advanced Workshops are: What's new--including the windfall profits tax; 351 transfers; dividends, calculating earnings and profits account; the subchapter S election; fringe benefits; pensions and profit sharing; corporate liquidations; liquidations (continued) and questions and answers.

According to Tanksley, these are popular Extension programs. Last year, Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

County And City Will Fund TEC

Several people were in the council chamber at the city hall Tuesday morning to speak in support of the local Texas Employment office. When the City of Muleshoe indicated they would stop financing the operation, as far as rent and utilities are concerned, TEC scheduled September 30 as a closing date for the local office.

Jeff Smith, chairman of the Muleshoe Industrial Foundation, and manager of Valley Grain Products, spoke favorably for the TEC office from the standpoint of both his affiliations.

He spoke of the potential benefits to the community to keep the office open here. Smith said readily available employees are one of the first concerns of any industry tentatively planning to locate in or around Muleshoe.

Smith also said he frequently utilizes the TEC office here, and drew heavily on their services during recent construction and expansion period at his plant.

The local businessman urged strong consideration be given toward making every effort to keep the TEC office in Muleshoe. However, he was equally emphatic that the funding of the operation should not be borne by the city alone, but should be shared by Bailey County.

Local business Owner / operator Harvey Bass

stressed that some \$36,900 in salaries would be lost from Muleshoe if the office closes here. "The loss in income to be spent here should be enough to encourage funding of the office," he stressed.

Retired farmer and school bus driver Arthur Bolton, businessman Ronald Ashford, contractor J. E. McVicker and restaurant owner/president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Hal Anderson, all spoke in favor of keeping the office in Muleshoe.

It was stressed by Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr, "The council feels it is not the sole responsibility of the city to provide funding for state agencies. However, the council has little problem funding any program if the public wants us to."

Meeting in regular session Tuesday, the Bailey County Commissioner's Court also hosted a group asking for funding for the TEC office in Muleshoe.

Following a discussion, commissioners agreed to provide one-half of the funding for rent and utilities for one year, in an amount not to exceed \$1,000.

Japanese Livestock Breeders View Lot

Some thirty visitors from Kagawa, Japan visited last week at Sudan Livestock and Feeding Co. They were all cattle feeders who are touring several cities in the United States, including stops in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Lubbock, Sudan, San Antonio, Iowa, Chicago and Hawaii.

This tour was sponsored by All-In-One Feed Co. and Masanori Kimura of Kagawa, Japan. The group is being accompanied by Dr. J.D. Aughry, nutritionist of Indian Wells, California and Nobuhisa Nasu, who is a livestock importer of Tokyo, Japan.

Sudan Livestock is a 25,000 head capacity custom feedyard, established in 1939 and owned by the Rieder family of California. The group showed special interest in the grain elevator, feedmill, modern processing area and newly constructed feeding pens.

Climate for Kagawa, Japan is said to be similar to Central Missouri and feedlot cattle need year-round shelter from rain and snow.

Received 60 Years For Armed Robbery

A window on the west side of the Bailey County jail which has been utilized as an 'escape hatch' for several prisoners during the past two years, became the means of another escape from the jail Sunday night or early Monday morning.

Twenty-five year old Janice Bates Holmes, who was convicted just over two weeks ago of the armed robbery of Lindsey Jewelry, escaped from the jail sometime during the night. Her escape was discovered around 8 a.m. Monday.

Mrs. Holmes was the third and final person to be tried following the April 28 robbery of Lindsey Jewelry. The robbery occurred shortly before 4:30 p.m. on April 28, and the trio left owner Vi Lindsey and clerks, Ethel Murray and JoAnn Sikes tied up in a back room as they made their escape from the store.

The trio had apparently looted several jewelry trays which were recovered by officers after they were captured following a high speed chase approximately 20 miles south of Muleshoe.

Jewelry, valued at above \$50,000, was recovered from the car of the suspects.

Officers explained that the door to Mrs. Holmes cell was not locked and she apparently picked the lock to the door leading into the 'run-around' section of the jail with a fingernail file. Mrs. Holmes was said to have had outside help in the escape, as the small woman was reportedly too small to have torn out the heavy mesh over the window.

Her two male companions, who were tried together in district court in Muleshoe, were tried earlier in the year. R.C. Willard, who reportedly menaced the jewelry store clerks with a gun, received a sentence of 50 years, and Jimmy Jordan, who had a previous murder conviction was sentenced to 90 years. At the time the two men

were tried, the trial of Mrs. Holmes was postponed. She underwent surgery at West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe at the conclusion of the trial of the two men. Mrs. Holmes was under 24-hour guard while a patient at the hospital in Muleshoe for more than a week.

Willard has been transported to the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville to begin serving his sentence, but Jordan, who filed an appeal, is being held in the Lubbock County Jail for Bailey County.

Mrs. Holmes, who had not been formally sentenced, was being held in the Bailey County jail waiting for an appeal of her 60 year sentence.

Janice Bates Holmes is black, slender build and was last seen wearing red pants and a white shirt.

At the time of the armed robbery, freedom of the trio was short-lived as they were apprehended by DPS Trooper Jim Dalka, who was returning to Muleshoe from investigating an accident. He received the call and intercepted the three alleged robbers nearly 20 miles south of Muleshoe. Following a short chase, the trio was taken into custody just 14 minutes after the robbery was interrupted by a Muleshoe woman, who had started

Proceeds from the fish fry will be used for Lions Club projects.



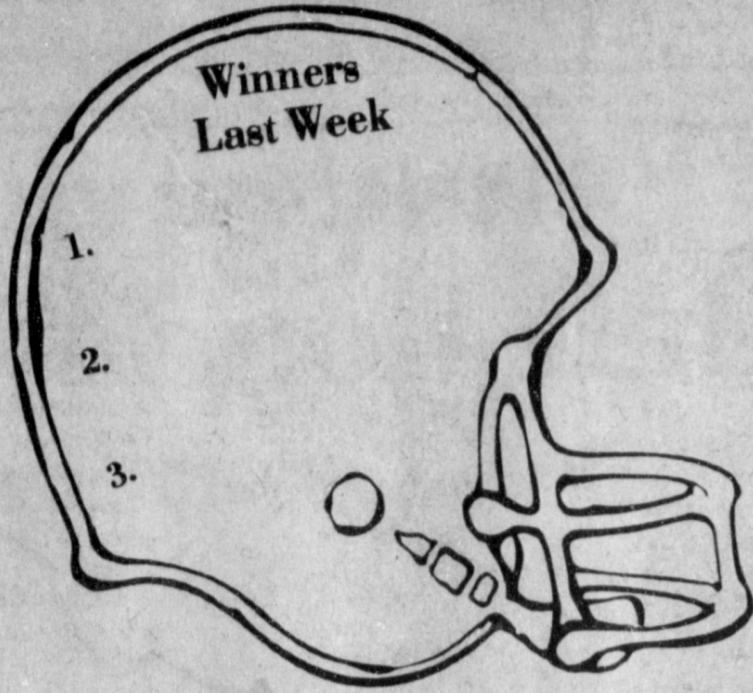
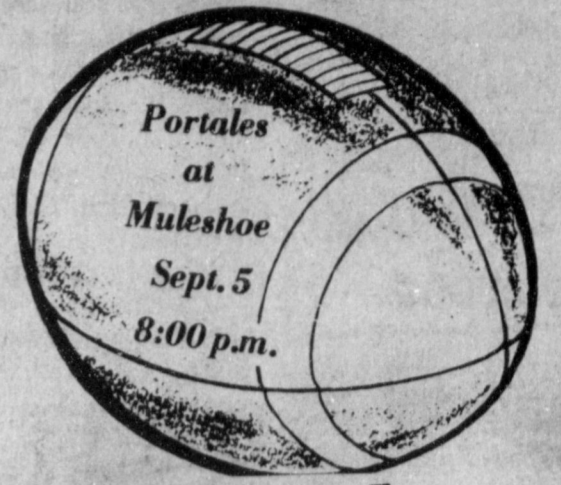

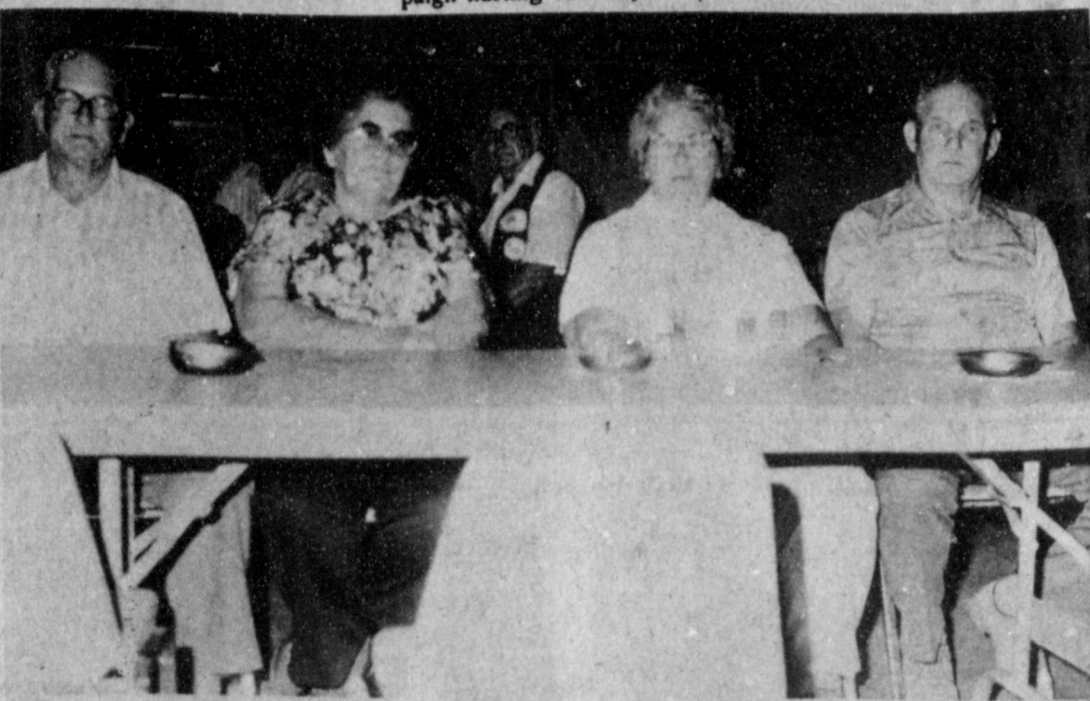

Retired women pay more taxes on more of their income than men in many cases, because of a tax formula based on women's longer life expectancy, but that may change as the Internal Revenue Service studies the issue. Treasury Department Officials have suggested the IRS amend this regulation, so the IRS is holding a hearing on the subject. Currently, IRS regulations use a formula called the "exclusion ratio" to determine what portion of retirement-annuities income is tax exempt. This exclusive ratio is arrived at by dividing the amount of a person's investment in the retirement fund by the total return expected to be received for the rest of the person's life.

Traditional sex-segregated insurance tables provided the average life expectancy figure for the IRS to use in computing the tax exemption-----and these tables show a longer life span for women than for men. Traditionally a women's life expectancy has been longer than a man's, so her exclusion ratio is smaller--and that means more of her income is taxed. Suggested amendments would require tables that do not differentiate by sex. Here's an example of the current system:

A man and a woman each contribute an equal amount to an annuity fund--say \$10,000--with each to receive \$1,000 each year after retirement. The tables say the man is expected to live 12 years and the woman 15. Based on the tables in use, the IRS would compute each person's exclusion ratio this way: **AMOUNT INVESTED** divided by the **ANNUAL ALLOWANCE** times **LIFE EXPECTANCY**. So, for the man, it would be \$10,000 divided by \$1,000 times 12. This equals 5/6. That is his exclusion ratio--5/6 of his annuity would be tax exempt. For the woman, it would be \$10,000 divided by \$1,000 times 15. This equals 2/3.

So only 2/3 of the woman's annuity would be tax exempt. In other words, the man will pay taxes on only one-sixth of his income, while the woman would pay taxes on one-third of hers.

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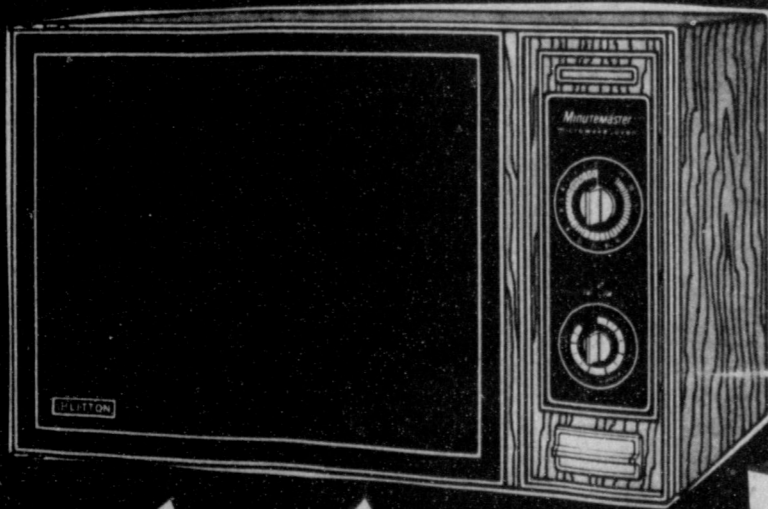
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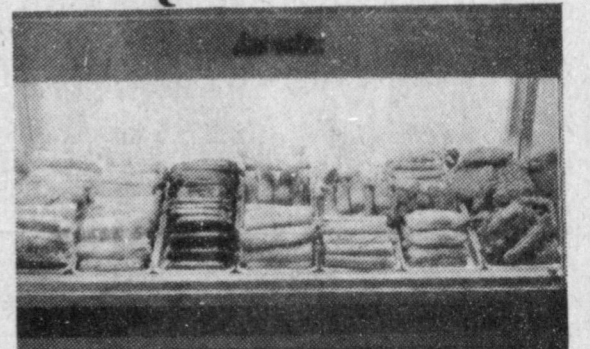

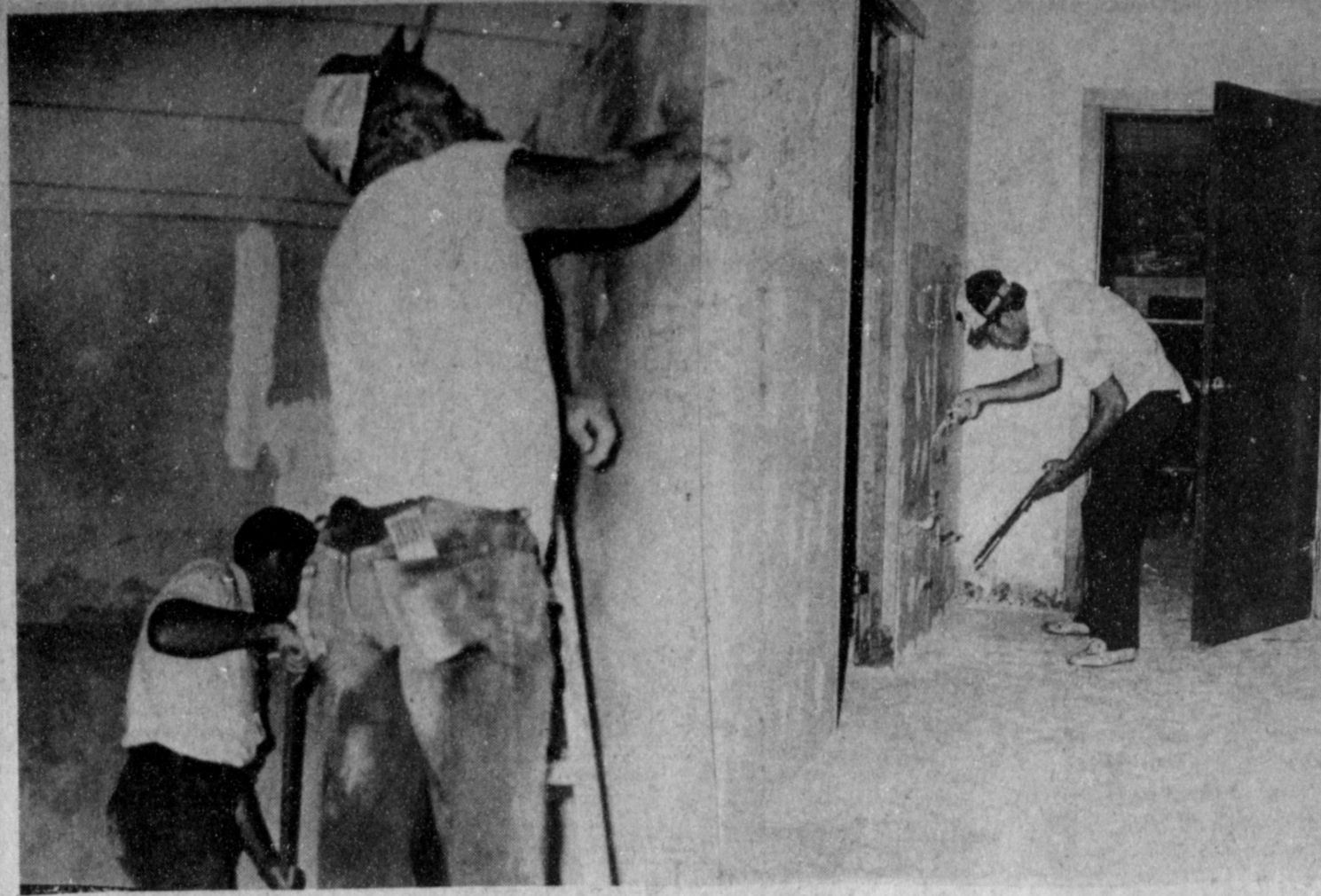
