## 6th War Loan Quota \$170,000

Sterling met the October War Bond quota of \$5,900.00 by buying that many bonds in October, said J. S. Cole Wednesday.

The 6th War Loan is now on and the Sterling quota is \$170,000 said Chairman Cole. Although the official dates of the drive are November 20 to December 16, all bonds sold these next two weeks will count on the drive. The 'E' bond part of the quota is \$30,000.

This quota is \$20,000 less than the 5th War Loan Drive quota, and the national quota is down 2 billion dollars from the 5th drive quota.

### "Nothing to It" When He Saves Comrade

Because he braved a storm of enemy fire which had ambushed his patrol to rescue a wounded comrade and succeeded in bringing him to safety, Sgt. Barney L. Echols, son of Mr. and Mrs. B.A. Echols, has been awarded the Silver Star by the commanding general of the First Cavalry Division.

His award was earned during the campaign which gained control of the strategic Admiralty Islands.

Although fatigued mentally and physically from long patrol activity, Sgt. Echols volunteered to accompany a reconnaissance patrol moving against enemy troops superior in number and who were well established for lanes of fire on higher terrain which afforded complete observation. When the patrol had advanced a short distance, the enemy suddenly opened fire from concealed positions.

One of the men fell wounded into the lane of fire. Without a thought for his own safety, Sgt. Echols immediately crawled to his companion and removed him to a concealed spot where his wounds could be treated.

The citation told how Sergeant Echols "thereafter successfully covered the withdrawal of the patrol with the wounded and all equipment, extricating the unit from possible annihilation, and furnishing his commanders with information concerning the enemy dispositions."

When the reporter came to take Barney's picture and question him about the exploit, Barney said, "There wasn't nothing to it."

Rearred in Sterling City, he worked on the McEntire U Ranch until he entered the service July 16, 1940. Training at Ft. Riley, Kansas and Ft. Bliss, he was shipped to Australia early in 1942.

Sgt. Echols was one of the first men ashore in the recent invasion of the Philippines. Carrying the Texas flag, the thousands of Texas boys (Cavalry) were given the honor of opening the Philippine invasion by MacArthur. The war-wise troopers, steeped in the heroic traditions of Sheridan, Custer and Lee, landed on the northernmost part of the 2,500 yard beach, overrunning Jap defenses.

Sgt. Echols has one brother, Pvt. Laverne J. Echols, who had been in the Aleutians for two years on September 20, and another, Loren Echols, stationed at Bakersfield, California after 50 missions.

## North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

Tommy Humble stocked a 736 acre pasture with 25 cows and 75 ewes in January, 1944, and has run the number in this pasture continually since that time. This rate is about 36 animal units per section which is the number for which the range grasses are capable of producing feed. The cows and ewes are in good flesh and there is a good reserve of grass on the ground for winter use.

Foster Conger's steer calves averaged 587 pounds this year. The heifer calves were separated from the steers during the summer and since that time, twenty cows and steer calves have been run per section. Conger has a good grass reserve for winter use.

Robert Foster's steer calves weighed 494 pounds.

Enclosures on Riley King's, W. N. and L. R. Reed's and Foster S. Price's ranches, constructed for the purpose of observing the growth of range grasses with no use, have shown considerable growth and an increase in vigor and density. These inclosures are good measuring sticks to determine what grasses the range is capable of growing and to determine the use make of adjoining range areas during the winter.

W. N. and L. R. Reed delivered their steer calves last week. 154 calves averaged 477 pounds. Only 2% were cut back. The cows are in good condition and there is a good growth of buffalo, side oats grama, hairy grama, black grama, and other desirable grasses on the range for winter use.

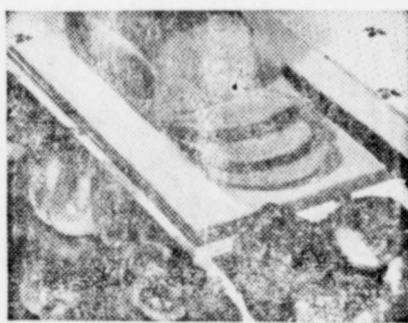

BREAD AND ROLLS**

Crisp, cool weather stimulates the desire for fragrant home-made bread and crusty sweet rolls. Contrary to popular opinion, good bread and rolls are easy to make if these few tips are followed.

Have the oven checked so that it registers the temperatures necessary for bread baking. Those home-makers who live beyond city gas



mains and have gas ranges served with butane or propane, will find that bread bakes more easily in gas ovens.

There is enough moisture to keep the bread from drying out, and still a hot enough heat to brown it evenly on top, bottom and sides.

Use your favorite bread recipe. After the bread has been baked, remove it from tins so that it doesn't become soggy. Sweet rolls should be brushed with lightly beaten egg and water to add a glacé appearance. If you desire soft rolls or bread, brush with melted butter or substitute before and after baking, and then cover with a fresh, clean towel while cooling.

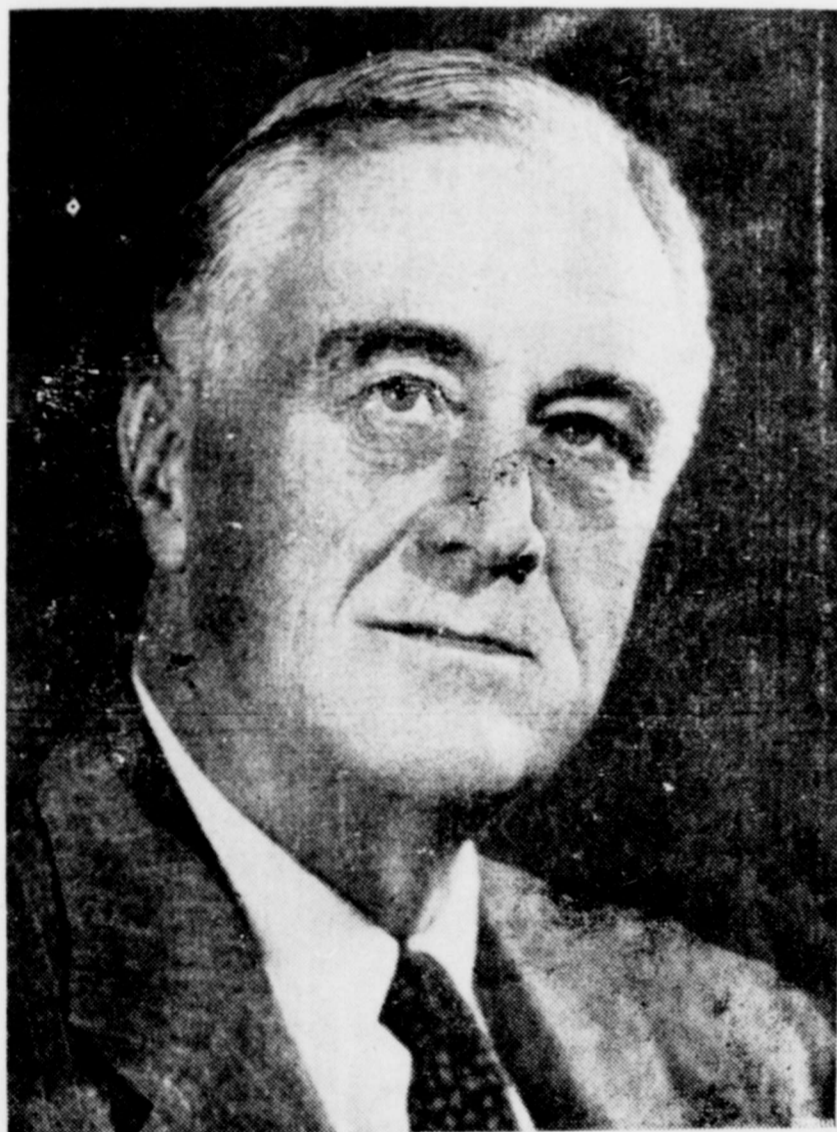

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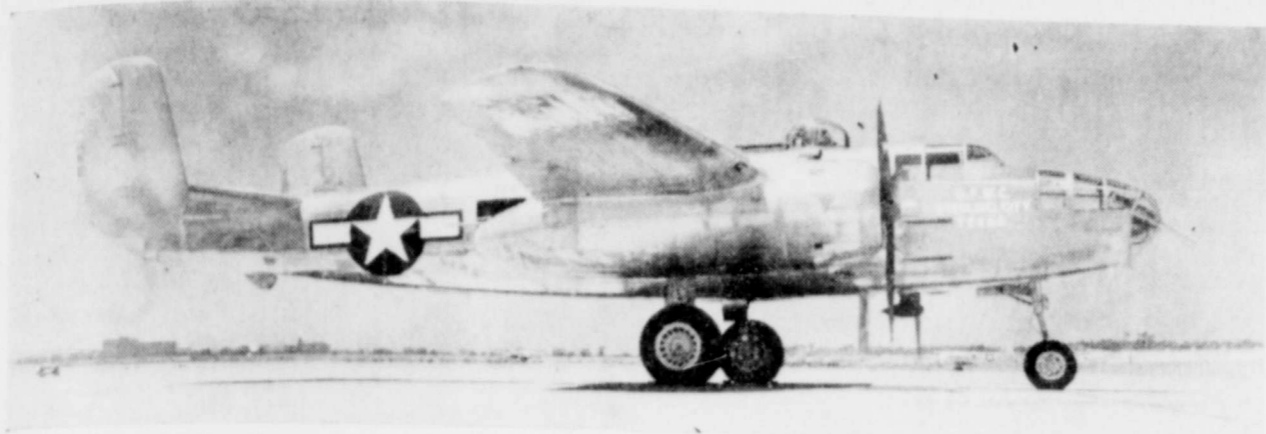

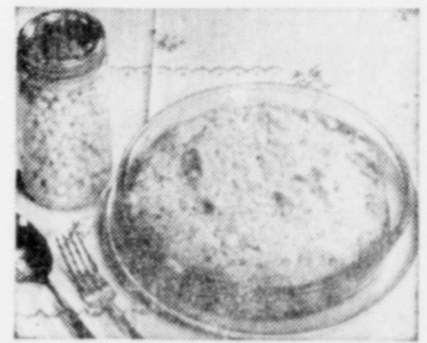

## GAStronomy GLAMORIZE YOUR VEGETABLES

Shelves overloaded with home-canned vegetables offer excellent opportunities for serving many versatile dishes. Try different combinations to make them a real asset to the meal.

The range, whether burners or oven are used, is most important in the preparation of the vegetables. Those who live beyond the city gas



mains and have their range serviced with propane or butane—the "bottled" or "tank" gases—will find the cooking of vegetables simplified. Easily regulated low flames are excellent when you don't want to overcook the vegetables. The moist heat of gas ranges will brown and cook vegetables evenly.

Mix a can of your corn, with eggs and milk, and bake in a buttered casserole, topped with buttered crumbs. Try your peas heated with bits of crumbled bacon or pearl onions. Green beans can be scalloped, that is, layered with white sauce and topped with buttered crumbs or cheese.

Home-canned beets take on glamour when orange juice and rind or orange sauce is added. Carrots are delicious when baked with a tablespoon or two of honey and sprinkled with chopped parsley.
