2. An inspection and appraisal must be made by the range inspector, Julius Bade.





Even though doctors are too busy to be bothered with unnecessary and needless worries of young mothers, they are not too busy to give your baby the regular check-ups he should have. Your doctor's supervision not only keeps you from useless worry but he will be able to detect any irregularities as you cannot do. The formula may need slight adjusting, the daily schedule for feeding or care changes as your below groups older. changes as your baby grows older, certain immunizations are given during the first year. If your doctor is familiar with your baby often a telephone call will suffice and save a long wait in the doctor's office. 1

The majority of young mothers, The majority of young mothers, in these days, are matter-of-fact and use their good common sense. They know that if the baby ceases to be happy, or fails to gain in weight fairly regularly, or if he does not seem to enjoy his food or eat enough, then is the time to call the trouble to the doctor's attention. Of course, loss of appetite or even losing a meal, if temporary, is nothing to worry about. It may is nothing to worry about. It may be the forerunner to a cold. But, a cold is something to have your doctor's advice about.

During wartime many homes have been kept at a lower temperature than formerly. Probably in most cases, this is a good thing, for we know that many homes even now are kept too hot. It may mean some adjustment in your baby's some adjustment in your baby's clothing. He should be kept warm enough so that his skin does not feel chilly to your touch, but babies are much more apt to be kept too warm than not warm enough. Remember babies and children are active and don't need as much clothing as an inactive person.







#### GAS tronomy-BRAISING BEST FOR UTILITY BEEF

You can have your steak and eat too, if you braise the meat. Recent record production of beef has placed large quantities of unra-tioned "utility" or lean beef on the market. When cooked with slow, moist heat, it can be fork-tender and delicious.

To braise means to dredge meat n flour, salt and pepper, brown in fat and then cook at a low heat with moisture, until it is thoroughly browned and tender. With a pro-



s easy because the flame can be set at high to brown the meat quick-ly and then lowered quickly and easily so the meat will cook slowly. These fuels, known as "bottled" or "tank" gas, are used in off-the-gasmains residences.

The best cuts of meat to use for braising include beef round, chuck, ribs or plate. The meat is a deep cherry red in color with no fat mar-bling through it but a thin layer of fat on the outside.

For Swiss steak at its best, dredge one of the above cuts with ¼ cup flour mixed with 2 teaspoons salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. If possible pound in the flour mixture with a mallet. Brown it quickly in 34 table spoons fat, and then add 2 cups of canned or cooked tomatoes. Cover tightly in kettle or skillet and cook with a very low heat 2½ to 3 hours until meat is tender and easily pierced with a fork.





#### Mailing Precautions

Because of the many advantages that will result mailers are urged to send their holiday greetings at the first class rate, for when so sent the greeting may be sealed and contain written messages not otherwise permitted, therefore having a personal appeal which is, of course, more highly appreciated by the recipients; also such greetings are dispatched and delivered first, given directory service, and, if necessary, forwarded without additional charge, If undeliverable, they are returned without charge provided the senders' return card is shown on the envelope.

On the other hand, printed Christmas greetings mailed in unsealed envelopes at the third-class rate which cannot be delivered as addressed, because of the removal of the addressee or for some other reason, must often be destroyed as waste, thereby causing disappointment. Greetings mailed at the third-class rate (11/2c) are not entitled to the forwarding privilege accorded those mailed in sealed envelopes at the first-class rate, and, consequently, the senders in many cases never know that the greetings were not received by the addressees. This would not occur if the greetings were mailed at the first-class rate.
