## Top 4-H'ers in Texas

TWO 4-H boys have been selected by the State Club office as Texas' winners in 1944 wartime activities. The two State winners, who each receive an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Dec. 3-6, and brief outlines of their records, are:

Royce Howard (top photo), 16 of Midland, wins the coveted honor for his achievement in the Westinghouse 4-H Rural Electrification Activity. His 3 year record shows that he studied electric installation, helped set poles and wire family residence, barns, henhouse, garage, water pump, cream separator, electric fence, houses for hired hands, and lights for lawn. He also installed plugs and switches for reading lamps and radio in his home.



Laddie Sloan (bottom photo), 16 of Estelline, is the State's highest scoring participant in the International Harvester 4-H Food for Victory Activity. During 4 years in club work he handled 149 beef cattle, 148 dairy cows, 37 hogs and 200 fowls, helped harvest 200 acres of alfalfa, and raised a Victory garden from which a large part of the vegetables was canned for his family's use. Although he attended school, he produced enough food to feed 59 service men. Three participants scoring next highest to Laddie, who each received a \$25 War Bond, are: Alvin G. Davis, of Post; Billy Snodgrass, Tokio, and Clyde Jacobs, of Goliad. Laddie was also a State co-winner in the 4-H Farm Safety Activity, for which he received a \$25 War Bond from William G. Mennen.

Public response to the Post Office Department's "Shop Now! Mail In November" campaign is good but needs to be better, according to Postmaster General Frank C. Walker.

"We urge you to buy now, mail in November and mark gifts 'Do Not Open Until Christmas'."

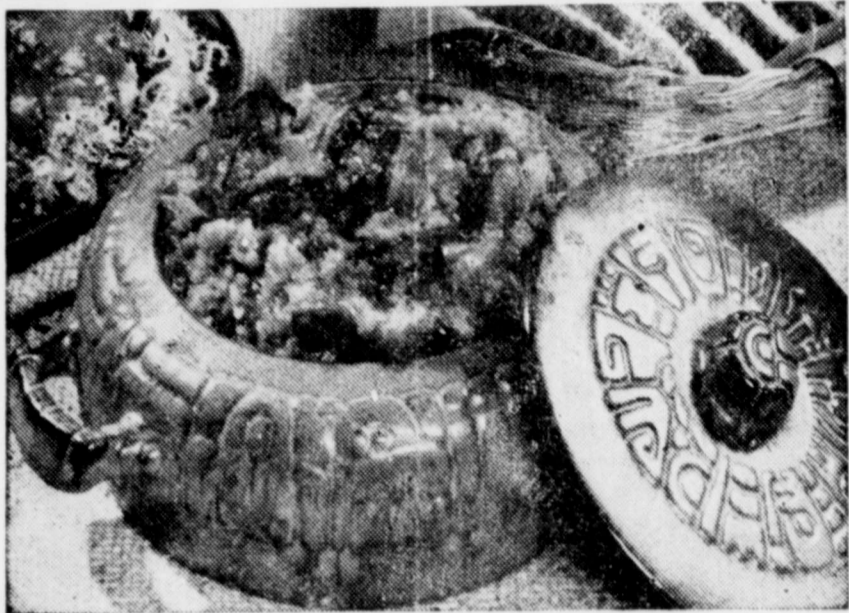

**Spanish Rice Is Point Saver**



Meatless dishes full of rich, meaty flavor are popular these days when we are all short on points. Spanish rice is one of these dishes, hearty enough to satisfy and full of flavor because of its combination of rice, tomatoes and cheese.

Rural and suburban homemakers who use butane or propane ranges will find that Spanish rice bakes evenly so that each grain of rice is fluffy and tender, and the flavor of tomatoes and cheese is thoroughly developed. The heat which they have in a "bottled" or "tank" gas oven will brown this dish quickly and evenly without drying it out.

**Spanish Rice**  
(Serves 4)

- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1/4 cup celery, chopped
- 2 cups fresh cooked tomatoes
- 2 tbsp. fat
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- Dash of paprika
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 1/4 cup buttered crumbs

Cook tomatoes, onion, green pepper, celery and fat for 15 minutes. Add rice and seasonings. Mix well and pour into a greased casserole. Cover with buttered crumbs mixed with cheese and bake in a moderately hot (375° F.) oven 30 minutes or until crumbs are browned.

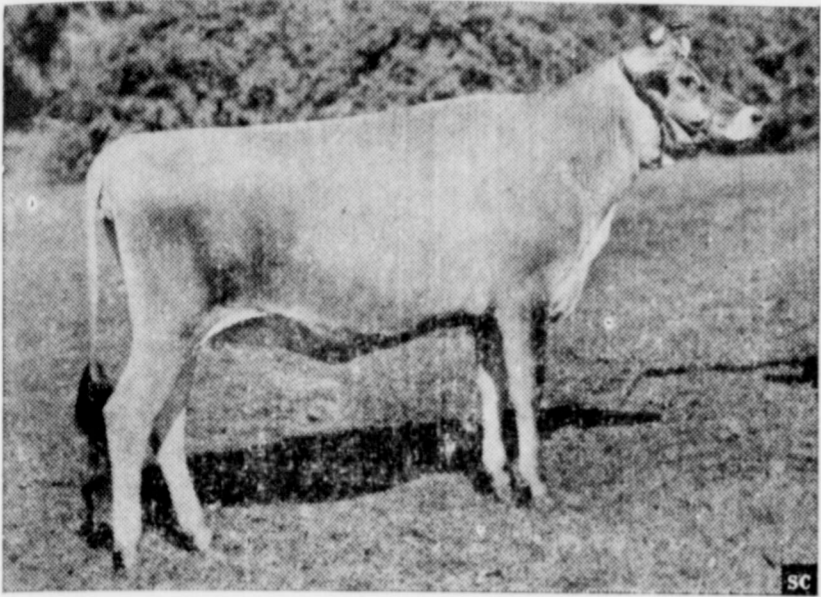

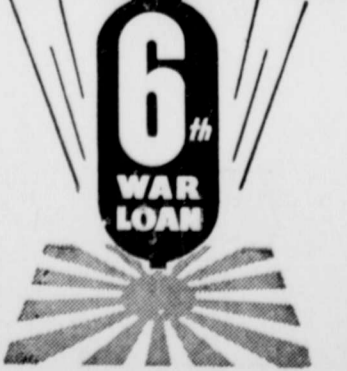

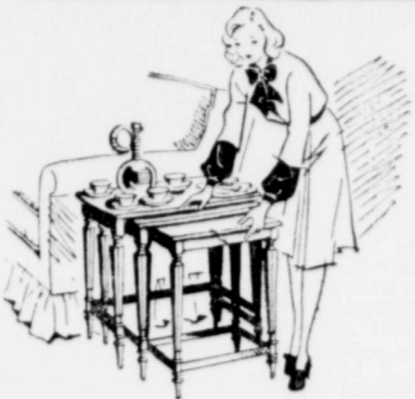

## Your BABY

All babies are not alike; they are individuals. They do not all reach the stage in their development when they want to feed themselves at anywhere near the same age. If your child shows signs of wanting to hold his own cup or spoon, let him think he is holding it himself. As soon as possible, let him do it all without your help.

Even after he starts feeding himself there will be a good many times — perhaps for weeks — when he will need help toward the end of the meal. Or he may get tired of doing it himself or just be bored and want you to feed him for several meals.

It may save your time and avoid a mess to do the feeding yourself. But the mess has to come some time because he has to learn to feed himself. Your child will enjoy learning to eat by his own efforts, if you let him do it when he is interested. Should you let that time pass, then you will find yourself trying to get him to do something in which he is not at that time interested.

As your child grows, you will have the joy of watching the changes which are constantly taking place. It is not necessary to forego discipline but it is much easier to maintain discipline if you use your child's developing personality to guide him and thus keep him interested in doing what you want him to do.

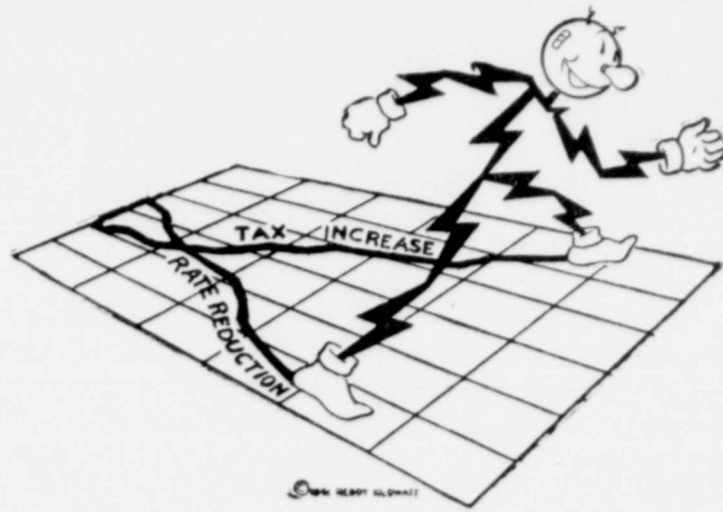
When he starts to feed himself, make things as easy for him as you can. A curved-handled baby spoon may be easier for him to handle than the regulation teaspoon. Usually a small cup and preferably one with a lip will fit baby's mouth better.

The first foods he feeds himself should be the thick ones, not the more liquid. If his strained vegetable will fall off the spoon easily, thicken it with some of his cereal. Strained fruit that is too thin can be thickened with some of his cereal as this will help it hold to the

## Your BABY

By Lillian B. Storms

Parents today are asked to make sacrifices and many are sacrificing time and pleasures and food in order to help the fight to maintain our way of life for our children. But there is one member of the family who must not change his habits of living any more than is absolutely necessary, and this person is the baby.

We are known the world over for our high standards of infant care with a resulting high plane of infant welfare. The infant death rate has been steadily reduced in the last decade. While this is due to a good many improved conditions in the care of our babies, it is due in part to better feeding practices. Within the last dozen years, infants have been receiving a much greater variety of food than did their mothers, and these supplementary foods have been fed at a younger age.

Milk is still the basic food of infancy, in fact, throughout the years of growth. It is the most nearly perfect single food, but even so it isn't quite enough by the time an age of four or five months is reached. Before six months other foods are added, supplying additional vitamins and minerals to those present in milk.

Cereals, which have been fortified with vitamins and minerals and especially prepared for babies, strained vegetables and fruits all have food values which supplement those of milk. These additional foods supply iron, in which milk is particularly low. They materially increase the amounts of vitamins B and C contained in a milk diet. As valuable as their food values are, these supplementary foods — cereals, vegetables, and fruits — have another important function in your baby's menu. They teach the eating of a variety of foods.


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
