Sterling Farm Census

The number of farms in Sterling County as shown by the preliminary count of returns of the 1945 Census of Agriculture was 102, as compared with 117 in 1940 and 121 in 1935. This was announced recently by Charles O. Reed, supervisor for the 1945 farm census in the Seventh Texas Census District with headquarters at San Angelo.

The total land in farms in Sterling County in the 1945 census count was 614,983 acres, as compared with 551,775 acres in 1940, and 508,000 acres in 1935.

The 1945 figure on land in farms exceeds the land area of the county. This is due to the fact that the entire acreage of a farm is credited to the county in which the farm headquarters is located, even though part of the farm may be located in another county.

BIG SPRING RODEO AUGUST 2, 3, AND 4

Big Spring's 12th annual Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo is scheduled for the nights of August 2, 3, 4 and the afternoon of August 5, Ira J. Driver, secretary announced. The program is to be operated under RCA and RAA rules, with Earl and Jack Sellers, Del Rio, being the producers. Cash prizes of \$2,200 are being offered together with the entry fees. Purses of \$400 each are offered in the bare back, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, bull riding and steer wrestling while in the girls' contest the purse will be \$200. Deadline for entries is August 1 at 10 o'clock.

Your BABY

In these days of shortages of help, the baby's clothing is getting more and more plain and easier to wash and iron (if it needs ironing). Furthermore, the plainer clothes are more comfortable for baby. Plain nighties and the shirts which tie instead of going on over the head are easier to put on a squirming little body, besides taking much less time to wash and iron.

Have everything large enough, too large at first because babies grow at an astonishing rate, and large clothes and large blankets are so much easier on both you and baby than are those which are a bit too small.

You can be thankful for the change in fashions from the much beruffled dresses babies used to wear. Ruffles take time to iron, get into baby's mouth, lace tears or catches in the iron or in baby's fingers and fringe or tassels are not worth their bother.

Right along with the change toward plainer clothing there has been a decided trend toward putting less clothing on babies, especially in hot weather. On really hot days a diaper is all that is really necessary. You can tell by feeling of his hands and feet if he is warm enough.

In hot weather at least some of his food doesn't need to be warmed for feeding. The pre-cooked baby cereals may have milk added, which is at room temperature, but not cold. His strained vegetables and fruits do not need to be heated. This is a great convenience when traveling or visiting.

However, we all like to have foods which vary in temperature, so the cereal can be at room temperature, the strained vegetable warmed and the strained fruit or custard pudding at room temperature.

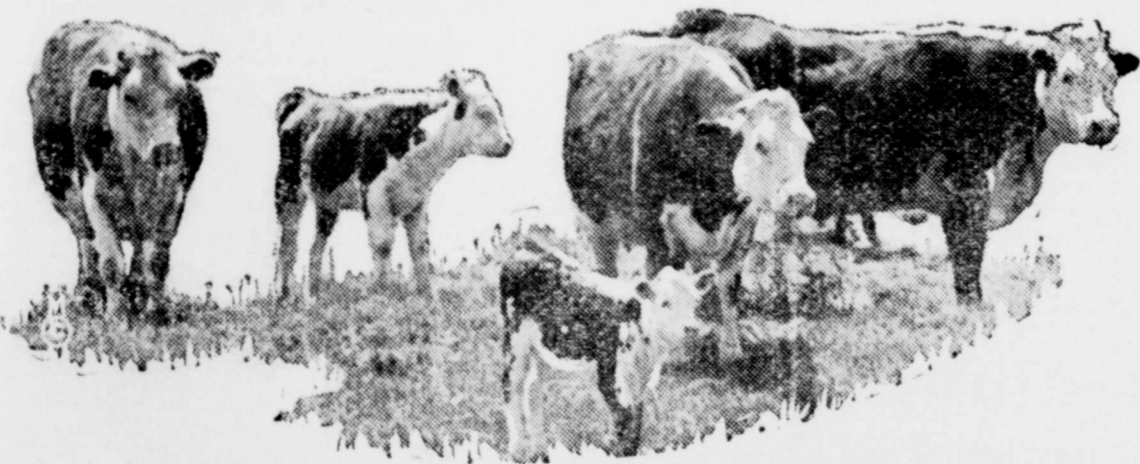

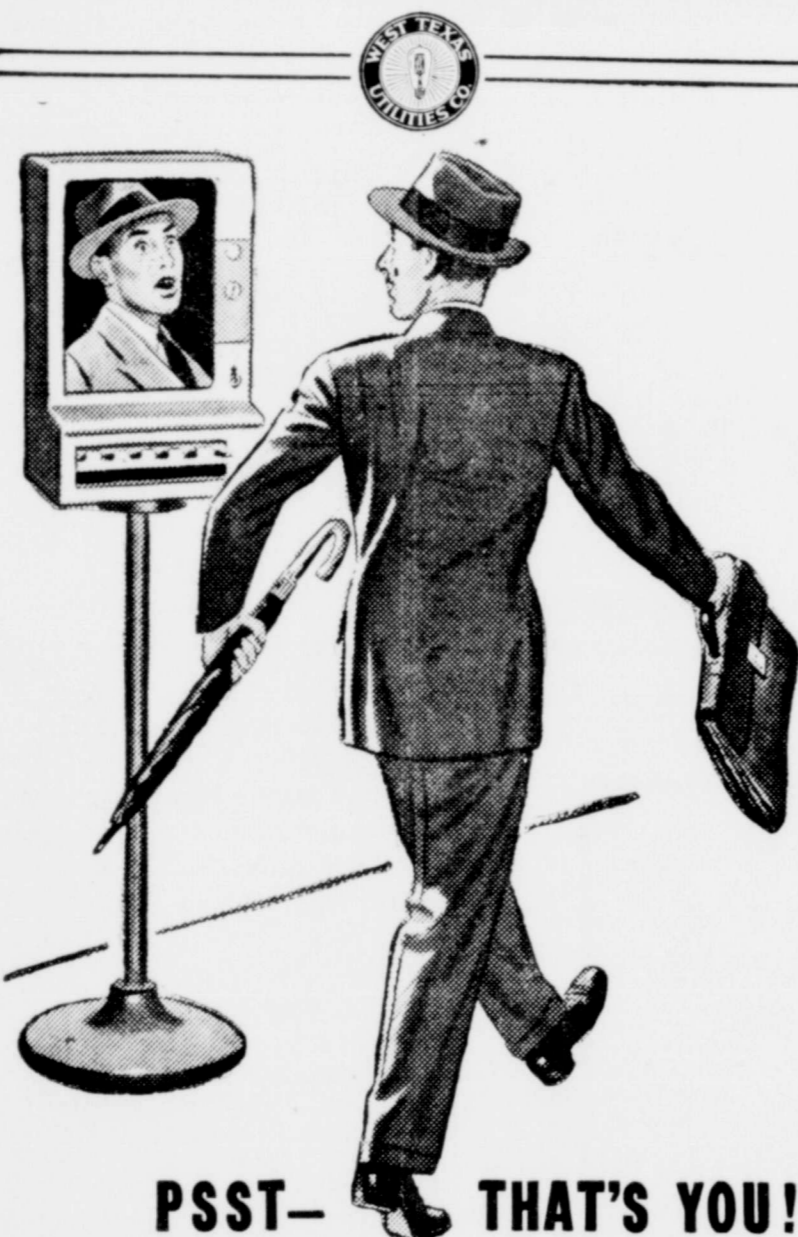

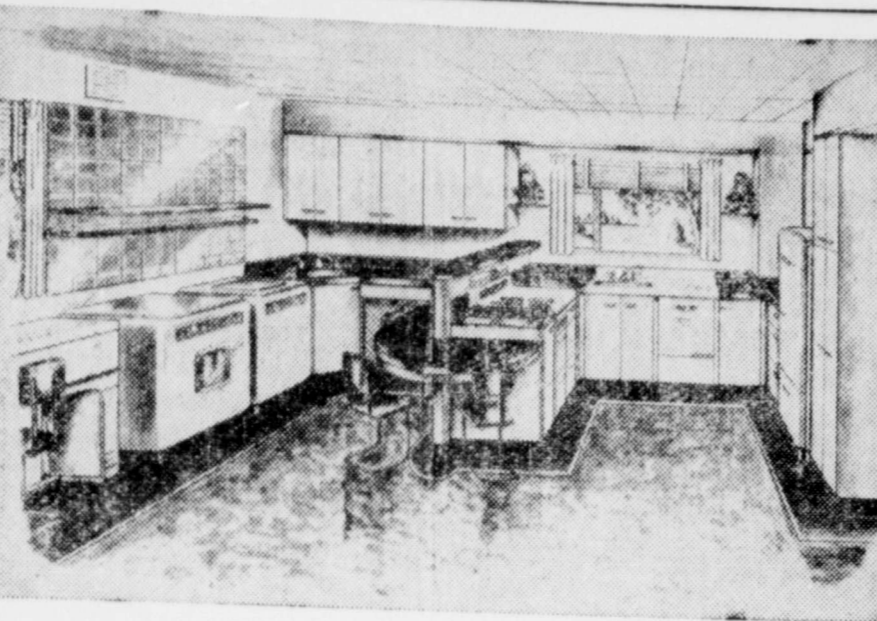

Postwar Kitchen-Laundry to Banish Drudgery



Combination kitchen-laundry will save homemaker steps.

AS WAR BONDS accumulate, many farm homemakers are dreaming of beautiful, work-easy kitchens and light airy laundries on the first floor that will cut household drudgery, according to an article in nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer.

The combination kitchen-laundry pictured above was planned by a well-known electric equipment manufacturer to make those dreams come true. It is a sample of the improved appliances which will be available after the war, says the article in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families. The new laundry equipment will be attractive and the elimination of climbing basement stairs with baskets of clothes will justify the combination. Starting at the left side of the

sketch is a power ironer, that will enable the homemaker to whiz through ironing in seemingly no time. Next is an automatic washer that does the clothes while she prepares dinner. An automatic drier is handy to receive damp clothes, then to tumble them dry in warm air. Beyond the sink a counter and 2 pull-out ventilated metal hampers make sorting clothes easy.

In the kitchen an electric range is conveniently near the dining-room door. The sink directly under the window is equipped with an automatic garbage disposal unit. Next to it is the electric dishwasher that takes care of a whole day's dishes at once. On both sides are cupboards. Base cabinets separate the dishwasher and electric refrigerator. In the center is a snack bar.

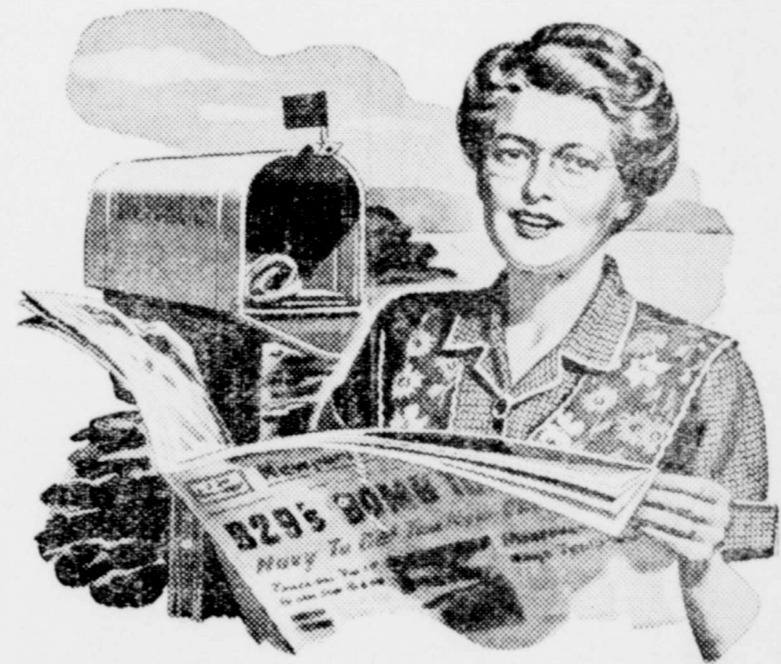

Our Country Needs Still More Used Fats...And We're the Folks to Save them!



IN between the good news about the war these days, careful readers of the paper will see grave words about a serious national shortage that has a direct bearing on military and civilian production schedules.

Our domestic supplies of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Yet thousands of tons of fats are still needed to help make countless essentials for the battle- and home-fronts.

While country people have been doing an even better job of saving fats than the city folks, we must remember that, because of the meat situation, we are in a better position to save. That's why we can't afford to miss a trick.

So, let's save not only the big amounts from frying and roasting, but also meat trimmings, plate scraps, and scrapings. Melt them down once a week and add the liquid fat to the salvage can. Skim soups and gravies. Scrape every pan. Every drop is important.

When your salvage can is full, take it to your butcher, and get 2 red points and up to 4¢ for each pound. If you have any difficulty, call your County Agent or Home Demonstration Agent.

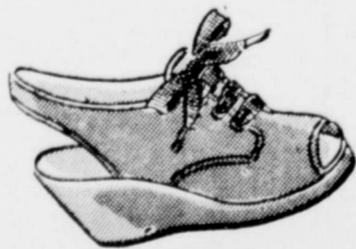
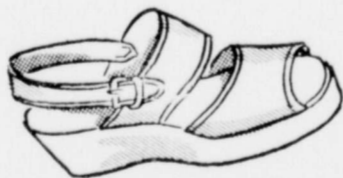
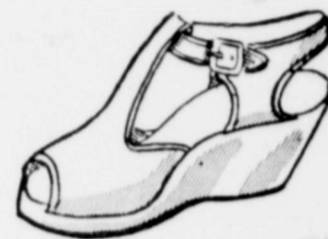
