

Hirohito has become the fair-haired rat; Jap propagandists drool he is solely responsible for making peace, while the American conquerors sit around twiddling their bayonets. That is his new place of business ready just another form of discredited appeasement which incited the war!

. . The impression is being created cent bystander. Hell, you would think Killer Hirohito was Lord of Pearl Harbor), the Jap Emperor sent this cable to Hitler: "I express joy to see our goal realized step by step.'
