lief measures are available
to Texas taxpayers:
School districts offer
homestead exemptions to
all homeowners and addi-
tional exemptions to per-
sons who are disabled or
65 or over.
Counties offer home--
stead exemptions on their
farm-to-market road or
flood control tax rate and
cities may offer optional
exemptions for the dis-
abled or elderly.
Exemptions are not ef-
fective automatically and
applications must be filed
each year. Contact the ap-
