

Increase Shown In City Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office Thursday issued checks totaling \$37.9 million to Texas cities as their share of the one percent city sales tax

This month's payment is about \$9 million more than the cities received during a comparable period in 1980. The October payments push the 1981 yearly total of city sales tax payments to \$518.3 million, up 16 percent over the same 10

month period in 1980. Muleshoe's check this month will be for \$12,926.32, bringing the city's 1981 payments to date to \$157,491.60. The city's 1981 payments are up about 13.76% from total 1980 payments of \$138,-

The nearby city of Morton shows \$2,802.12 net payment for this period bringing 1981 payments to date to \$37,498.75 which is down by -1.89% over 1980 payments. Last years total was \$38,141.88.

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





Adams also said vehicles which are to be used in the driving test by new driver license applicants must be covered by the minimum liability insurance specified by the law. Applicants will have to certify on the license application that the minimum coverage is in effect for the vehicle before they will be permitted to take the driving test.

The DPS director predicted that more Texans will obtain the required liability coverage when the new law goes into effect.

"Current figures show that approximately 74 percent of the drivers involved in accidents carry liability insurance, Adams said. "This indicates that a substantial number of people must secure the required coverage or face the possiblity of heavy fines and loss of driving privileges."

Out-of-state, government and self-insured vehicles are exempt from the insurance requirements of the new law. However, drivers of self-insured vehicles will be asked by DPS officers to produce evidence of selfinsurance at accident scenes and traffic stops.

Hogs, Pigs At Lowest Level In 16 Years

AUSTIN .- The total number of hogs and pigs in Texas dropped to 700,000 head in September, the lowest level since 1965.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said inflation is one reason for the big drop. "If you are not making any money you cannot keep expanding," he said. "Texas producers have found it

necessary to make deeper cuts than their counterparts in . other states."

Dropping for the fifth straight quarter, the hog and pig inventory is 24 percent lower than it was a year ago and seven percent below last quarter

A decrease in breeding stock will have long term effects on production, Brown

said. Breeding stock dropped 36 percent between June I and Sept. 1, falling from 100,000 to 90,000 head. Brown said the figure is the lowest inventory on record.

More immediate effects will be seen in a 22 percent decrease in the number of marketable hogs. Some 610,000 hogs were classified as marketable in September.

Brown said that farrowing intentions for December, 1981, and February, 1982, are expected to be down 17 percent from a year ago to

33,000 head. Farrowing intentions for the September-November quarter remained unchanged, at 31,000 head.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports that for the 14 states that conduct quarterly hog

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
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
