

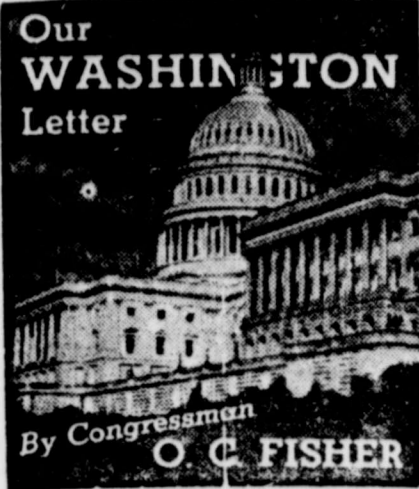

THE TIDELANDS ISSUE was advanced one step further toward a showdown last week when the House and Senate conferees agreed upon a bill which compromised the differences between the House and Senate versions of the legislation. The House passed its bill a year ago by a vote of 265 to 109, and the Senate acted upon a somewhat similar measure a month ago, by a closer vote of 50 to 35.

Under terms of the conference agreement, Texas is given full title to its offshore lands for a distance of 10 1/2 miles along our entire seacoast. Other States which border the sea are given a quitclaim to the lands that extend 3 miles seaward. The Texas case is different because of our boundary agreement when we entered the union.

This agreement is a major victory for Texas, although we are faced with a possible Presidential veto. If that occurs, the House will, it is generally agreed, be able to override with the necessary two-thirds. In the Senate, however, the vote will be closer and the chances of getting the two-thirds is in doubt but not necessarily hopeless.

There is some talk going the rounds up here, wholly unconfirmed, that President Truman may not veto this bill, despite the fact that he vetoed one we passed three years ago. The gossip is that he may allow this one to become law and thereby avoid having Tidelands an issue in the Presidential election this fall. It will be recalled that General Eisenhower has already come out in favor of confirming title in tidelands in the States, and it may be that the political leaders would like to avoid having this featured as a major issue in Texas, as well as in most States of the union.

This is just talk, but it is rather persistent around Washington recently. The House and Senate will act on the Conference reports this week, and the measure will then go to Mr. Truman's desk. In any event, we will know where we stand on the Tidelands subject within another month.

H. H. Carnes has reported for work here with the West Texas Utilities Co. He was formerly stationed with the company in McCamey.

Man Escapes Car Crash Only To Be Killed By Passing Car

A Laredo man escaped uninjured from one accident only to be killed a few minutes later when struck by a car at the scene of the crash.

Precillino Bryand, 43, died instantly when struck or hit by a car driven by Cpl. Charles Lee Roberts of San Angelo.

The car driven by Bryand and a car driven by Robbin R. Barr of California, had sideswiped on and one-half miles south of Sterling City about 2:30 Sunday. According to Highway Patrolman John H. Phillipus, investigator, both cars stopped on the highway about 75 yards apart.

Bryand had walked to the Barr car and was just returning to his own car when he was killed.

Cpl. Roberts, driving toward San Angelo, sideswiped the parked Bryand car, lost control of his vehicle and slid sideways, hitting Bryand and going into the ditch.

Bryand's wife and eight children were in the parked car when it was sideswiped the second time but none were injured.

Glen F. Robertson, 109 E. 19th St., San Angelo, riding with Roberts, was thrown from the car and received multiple cuts and bruises but was not seriously injured.

Cpl. Roberts, on leave visiting at the home of his parents in San Angelo, was uninjured.

Barr and his wife were moving from California to Falcon Heights, Texas, when the first accident occurred.

Bryand's body was taken to the Nalley Funeral Home in Big Spring by Lowe's ambulance from Sterling City. The body was then taken to Laredo by Lowe for burial.

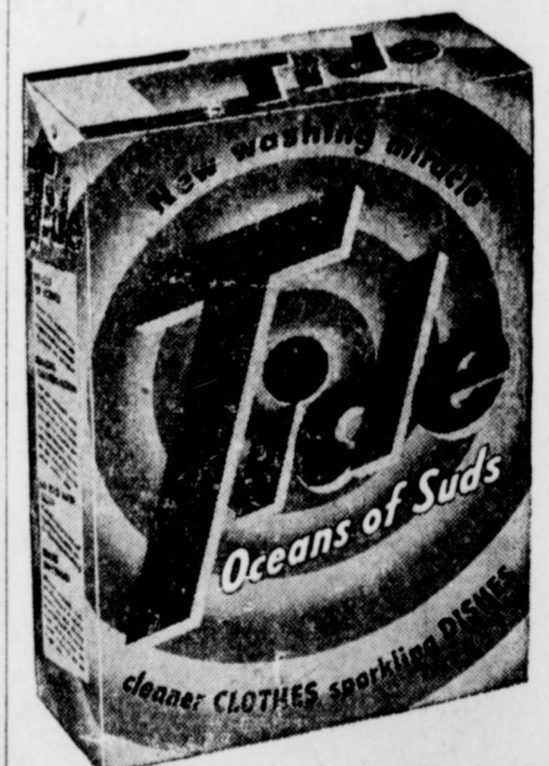

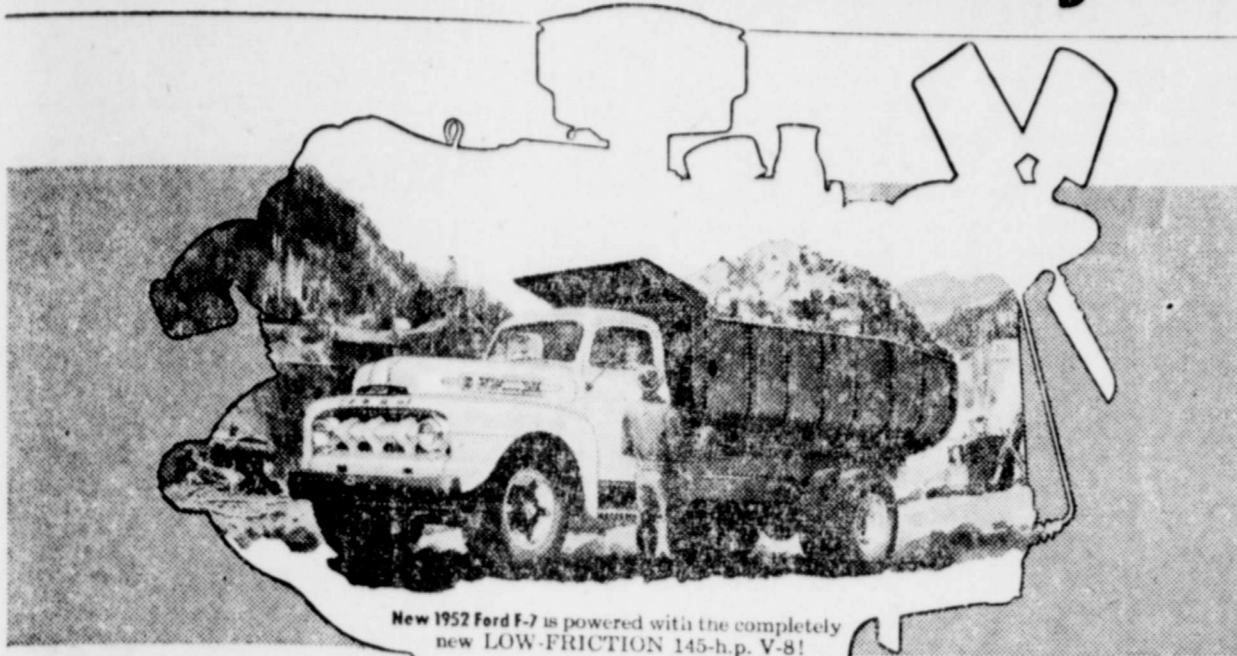

This is perhaps one of the best opportunities for local ranchmen to observe research which applies to our local type of ranching. Time well spent would be a trip down there this coming Saturday.

Now is the time to spray for Pecan Nut Casebearer. You should look for small greenish-white eggs laid single on the end of the little nutlets. If you find these eggs you should spray.

For control, use 3 pounds of 50% wettable DDT powder and 6 pounds of wettable sulphur per 100 gallons of water.

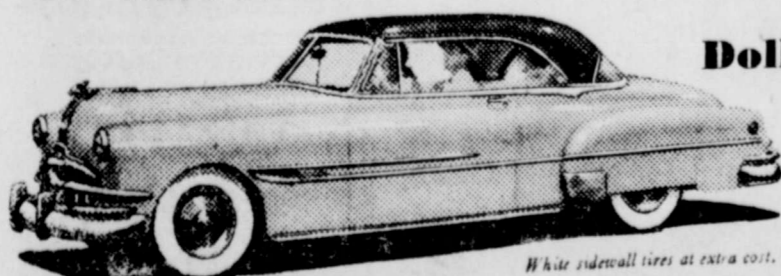

Sorrento Tomato Sauce is not only delicious and zesty but versatile as well. Serve it with broiled or pan-fried fish, with green salads or as a sauce for a seafood cocktail.

Sorrento Tomato Sauce

- 2 1/2-inch slices fresh white bread
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup Mazola Salad Oil
- 1/4 cup cider vinegar

Remove bread crusts. Cut garlic in thin slices and insert in bread. Let stand one hour; remove garlic. Crumble bread into small bowl and add tomato sauce, salt, sugar, paprika and pepper. Beat in salad oil and vinegar. Cover. Chill well. Stir before serving. Serve on simple green salads or as a sauce for seafood. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.
