Sterling Beats Water Valley Easily 60-32

Play Divide Here Tonight at 8 O'Clock

The Sterling football team, well on the way to a district championship, easily won 60-32 over the Water Valley Wildcats here last Friday night. Coach Diddle Young's squad all saw action and the Eagles' mastery overshadowed the stellar playing of the Wildcat's Green, Baker and Bannister.

Sterling elected to receive the kickoff. Water Valley kicked out of bounds. On the first play from scrimmage, Marshall Blair went 55 yards for a touchdown. Water Valley received the ball after TD kickoff and lost a yard on the first play. Baker picked up 9 yards on the second play, then the Wildcats punted. Don Carper made a beautiful return of the punt for about 40 yards—then dropped the ball—losing it to Water Valley. The Wildcats made a ten-yard gain on a pass then punted. Carper made a broken field return of 35 yards. Billy Derrell carried the ball almost to the goal line and then on over. Bobby Lester took the ball over for the extra point, making the score 13-0 in favor of Sterling.

Sterling kicked to Water Valley, who tried 3 line plunges then punted. Don caught the punt and carried it 55 yards for a counter. The kick for extra point was no good. Score 19-0.

Water Valley couldn't seem to gain when resuming play, so they punted. Billy D. returned the punt 56 yards for a tally. Score 25-0.

Young sent in some Eagles and Jim Davis got in some very good tackles. Wilbur Stone recovered a Water Valley fumble. When a double pass play failed to work, the Wildcats took over on the 4 yard line. In 3 plays they went for a counter against the Eagles.

On pass plays—Lynn Glass to Billy D. Blair and next Gaston to Marshall Blair were good for a TD for the Eagles. Sterling kicked for 2 extra points. Score 33-6.

The Water Valley star, Green, passed to J. McCall for a T.D. Score 33-13 at half.

As play resumed after the half, Sterling kicked. The Wildcats made a good return and then a first down, but couldn't keep up the steam.

On the Eagles first play when they took over, Marshall carried the pigskin 55 yards to the goal. A pass for extra point was good and the score was 40-13.

Water Valley's Baker made some nice plays and ran to oval over for a T.D. Score 40-19. As the Sterling boys took over following a nice return of the kick (Carper), three pass plays to Gaston failed

and on the fourth try Marshall couldn't find a receiver, so he ran the ball over for a T.D. Bobby Lester picked up the extra point. Score 47-19.

When Water Valley started, a pass from Green to McCall netted the Wildcats another 6 points. Score 47-25.

As Sterling got possession, Don Carper made a beautiful broken field run, but the play was called back and Sterling was penalized. Marshall ran the ball over for a TD, but the officials called the play back to the 21 yard line, where they said he stepped out. On the next play, a pass from Billy D. to Lester was good for a counter and Gaston ran the ball for the extra point, making the score 54-25.

As play resumed, Water Valley fumbled and Marshall recovered for the Eagles. A double pass play to Glass chalked up a score making the score board show 60-25.

Water Valley in the remaining minutes of play picked up a TD on a pass from Baker to Green, making the final score 60-32.

Little Ronnie Green shone as a punter for the Wildcats and he and Baker and Bannister turned in good performances for the losers.

The association is composed of law enforcement officials from a 14 county area of West Texas.



An All-Family Dessert



By BETTY BARCLAY

Don't by any means think only in terms of children when preparing and serving rennet desserts. Adults, too, delight in devouring this nutritious, milk-filled food that is neither rich nor starchy. From tiny tot to grandparent, all enjoy a delicious, healthful dessert—especially after a heavy meal when something light and easily digested is in order. There are a wonderful variety of flavors available and this delicacy can be served plain for baby or fancy for grown-ups, with the aid of attractive toppings.

Here are a couple of desserts for the whole family, and any guests that might drop in. Try them once and you'll serve them again and again.

Mincemeat Rennet-Custard
 1/2 cup mincemeat
 2 cups milk (not canned)
 1 package maple rennet powder
 Gingersnap crumbs

Divide mincemeat among 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist fre-

quently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package maple rennet powder at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, over mincemeat in dessert glasses. Do not disturb while milk sets—about 10 minutes. Chill. Just before serving chilled rennet-custards top with gingersnap crumbs.

Orange Rennet-Custard

4 or 5 chocolate cookies
 2 cups milk (not canned)
 1 package orange rennet powder

Break up chocolate cookies and divide among 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package orange rennet powder at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, over cookies in dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time. Serve with whipped cream.





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
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FORT WORTH - Salesmen were asking sharply higher prices at Fort Worth Monday in anticipation of a reaction from the sharp breaks of the previous week. However, the buying side took a gloomy view of the huge runs reported around the 12 major markets (over 152,000 cattle and over 39,000 calves) and they also reported wholesale meat trade was very spotty and weak.

Packers reported beef running into increasingly heavy competition from pork and also the low-priced turkey and broiler chicken were making beef sales harder. The hunting season was also putting a crimp in red meat sales as it usually does at the Fall season.

Stocker and feeder buyers reported Cornbelt buyers still inclined to resist current stocker and feeder prices, despite some really great improvement in the subsoil moisture conditions at places that had previously been reported dry.

Cornbelt farmers were still preoccupied with the corn and soybean harvest in many areas, too.

Result of this was that slaughter cattle sold near steady with a few spots 25 to 50 cents higher on cows and bulls. Slaughter calves of choice kinds were fully steady, but the less-than-choice variety sold on a weaker basis, some 25 to 50 cents lower.

Choice stockers were steady, but those of less quality were 50 cents lower.

Some typical cattle sales included the day's top load of stocker calves that averaged 530 pounds

and drew \$20.50 and were consigned by Mrs. Fayette Tankersly of Irion County. Dutton & Co., McCullough County, had a load of steer calves at \$19 and heifers at \$17. Hinson and Sons, Dickens County, had some \$17.50 calves; and Arthur P. Henderson, Concho County, marketed a load of 337 lb. calves at \$19.50.

FAT LAMBS TOP AT \$20
A shipment of 103-lb. lambs topped at \$20 at Fort Worth Monday that came from C. A. Stevenson of Floyd County. Shorn fat lambs topped at \$18. Feeder lambs drew \$12 to \$15.50. All lamb sales were fully steady to strong.

Yearlings and older sheep sold fully steady. Slaughter ewes drew \$4.50 to \$6 and stocker ewes cashed at \$6 to \$12. Old wethers drew \$7 to \$11 and old bucks sold around \$4. Yearling muttons sold from \$8 to \$15.

HOGS STEADY

Hogs topped at \$19.75 to \$20.25 at Fort Worth Monday, this was steady to 25 cents under last week's close.

Texas hogs again enjoyed a strong position as hog runs in the Cornbelt in recent days have been small enough that not many surplus hogs from that area are being offered to Texas packers.

Less attractive butcher hogs sold at \$18 to \$19.50. Sows were steady at \$14 to \$18.50.

- 1 cup pecan meats

Roll pastry 1/8 inch thick. Line a 9-inch pie pan. Mix remaining ingredients together, adding pecans last. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 15 minutes; reduce heat to moderate (350° F.) and bake 30 to 35 minutes longer.
*If salted nuts are used omit salt in recipe.

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
