Mr. Ratliff was found dead by sheriff Bill Green Tuesday afternoon in an old building near his home.

Ratliff had been Justice of the Peace here since 1955. He and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last year.

Burial was the Fairmount Cemetery in San Angelo.

Pallbearers were W. O. Green, J. K. Martin, Jeff Davis, L. F. Hodges, all of Sterling City; and C. H. Henson and C. C. Coe, both of San Angelo.

Survivors include the widow; a daughter, Mrs. Wayne Magill of San Angelo; a son, S. B. Ratliff of Ruidoso, N.M.; six grandchildren; 1 sister, Mrs. Norman Howlett of Corpus Christi; and 3 brothers, Oscar Ratliff of Del Rio, Noel Ratliff of Denver, Colorado, and Paul Ratliff of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The board of supervisors of the North Concho River Soil Conservation Service will furnish seed for the demonstration at Humble's.

Native grass seed will be used, said Jim Kelly, with the Conservation Service here.

New School Board Member Sworn In

The Sterling School Board of Trustees met Monday night for a regular meeting following the election of last Saturday. The new board member, John Copeland, Jr. was sworn in and took his place on the body. The board reelected all old officers—Worth Durham was named president, David Glass vice-president and D. L. Haralson, secretary.

All classroom teachers were reelected at the meeting. The school administrators had been reelected at an earlier meeting this year. Copeland replaces Foster S. Price. In the election last Saturday, 186 votes were cast. Reynolds Foster received 165 votes, Copeland 103 and Price 81. R. T. Caperton got one write-in vote. Foster and Copeland were thereby elected.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



The cause of good government got a set-back last week when the Senate declined to submit an amendment to the Constitution which would abolish the antiquated, horse and buggy method of electing the President and Vice-President.

It will be recalled that six years ago the Senate approved a similar proposal but the House fell short of the required two-thirds majority necessary to submit a constitutional amendment.

At present a President is chosen by electoral college votes. Under the law Texas, for example, has 24 such electoral votes. At general elections the people vote for slates of electors—Republican, Democratic, etc. The side that gets the highest number of popular votes, under our system, gets ALL of the electoral votes. In other words, if you don't vote for the party that leads in your state, your vote is counted for that candidate anyhow. Your vote may be counted for a party you actually voted against!

But the proposed amendment would apportion the presidential vote of each State according to the popular vote. The chief effect would be to make every vote cast for President count.

Here is an example of how the proposed vote would work out: A State has, let us say, 12 electoral votes (depends on the number of Senators and Representatives), and has a turnout of 2.4 million voters. The Republican got 1.6 million, the Democrat 600,000 and a third party candidate 200,000.

Under the present system, the Republican would get ALL 12 electoral votes. Under the new system each would get his proportional share—the Republican 8, the Democrat 3 and the third-party candidate 1.

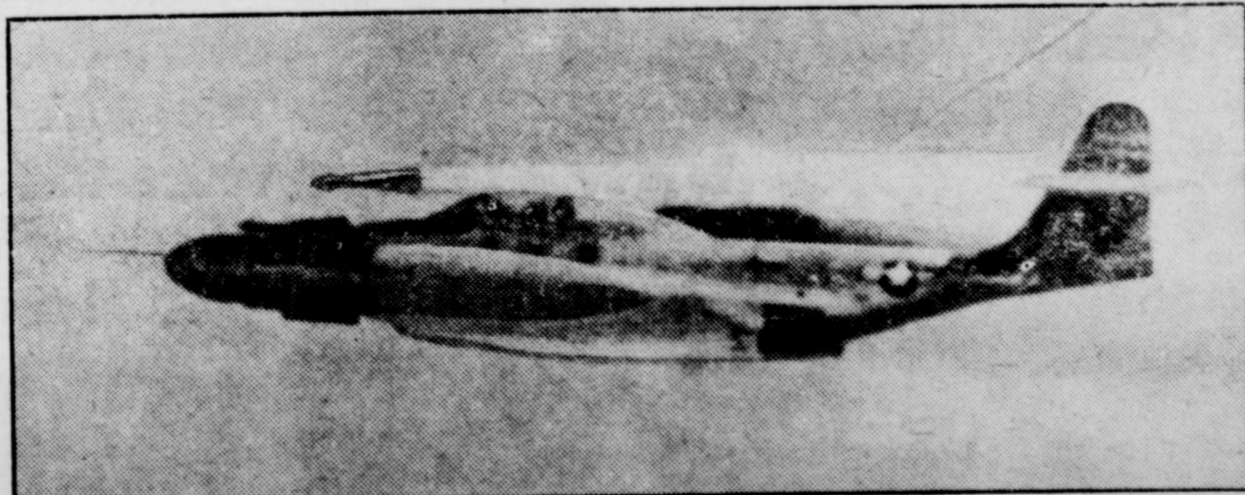
But, as expected, the so-called liberals jumped to their feet in violent opposition. The ADA condemned it. Every other left-wing and radical group denounced the change. Why? Because at present their importance in pivotal states is far out of proportion to their numbers.

Candidates go wild in appeals for the Harlem bloc of votes in New York, for example, because by getting 51% (and all) of the total in that state, or getting perhaps 49% (and none). So they go after those fringe minority blocs. And they write political platforms offering them everything in the book.

That system makes for bad government. It rewards expediency rather than principle. The Gallup poll shows a 2-to-one sentiment for this reform. The struggle for its approval must be continued.

M. D. Rawls, county surveyor, has received his new state license as a surveyor in the new licensing program setup by the state recently. He said only about 800 of the 5,000 surveyors had so far received their new license. His number is 704.

A test had to be passed and a moral code of ethics was part of the licensing.

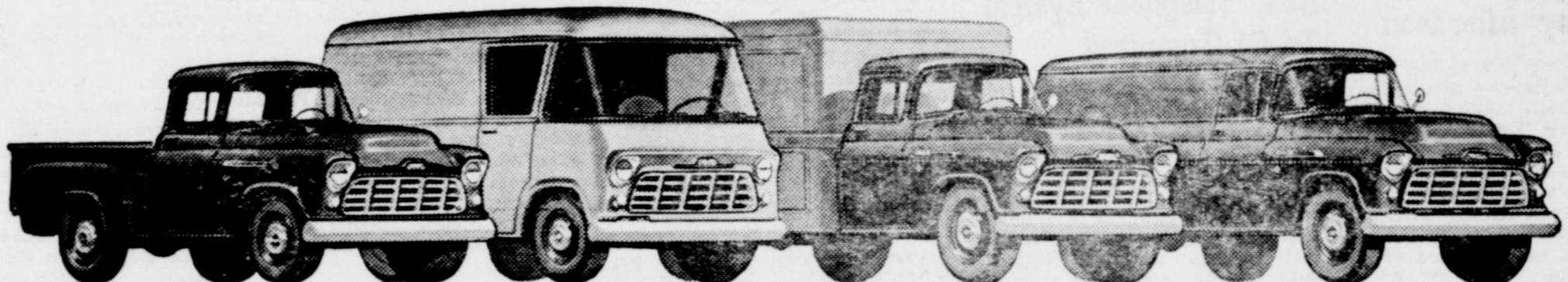

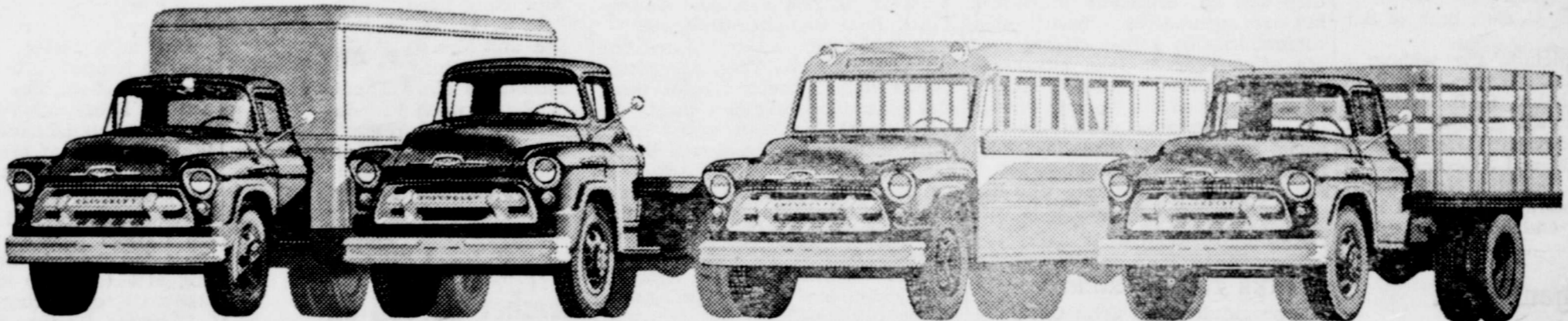

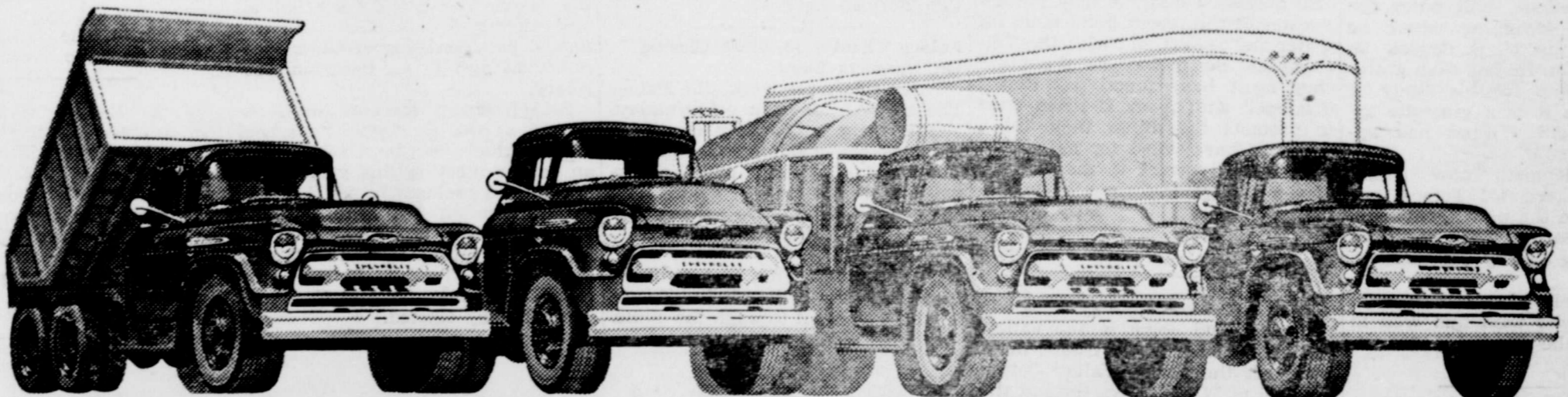

This Tea Ring Is an Easy, Any-Time Delight

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

EVER try a packaged hot roll mix as the easy base for a rich fruit tea ring? Saves time and produces first-class results. This recipe makes two 7-inch rings.

Maraschino Tea Ring

One 14 1/4-ounce package hot roll mix, 1/2 cup mint jelly, 1 cup dried apricots, chopped; 1 cup chopped maraschino cherries, well drained (about 40 cherries); 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine.

Prepare roll mix according to package directions. When dough is ready to shape, divide into 2 equal portions.

Roll out half of the dough on lightly floured surface to a 14x8-inch rectangle, about 1/4-inch thick.

Spread with half of jelly and sprinkle with half of apricots, cherries and walnuts. Dot with 1 tablespoon butter or margarine. Roll up, jelly-roll fashion, and seal.

Shape into a ring on lightly greased baking sheet. Seal ends of ring. With kitchen shears, make cuts two-thirds of the way through ring at 1-inch intervals. Turn each section on its side. Let rise until double in bulk (about 30 minutes).

Meanwhile, prepare another ring with remaining dough and remaining ingredients. Bake rings in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes, or until done.

Frost tea rings with confectioners' sugar glaze and garnish

Alternate Filling

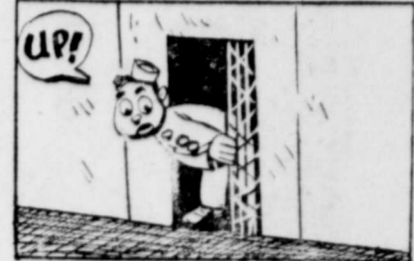
Two tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 cup shredded coconut, 2 4-ounce jars chopped citron, 1 cup chopped maraschino cherries, well drained (about 40 cherries).

Dot half of dough with 1 tablespoon butter or margarine. Sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon and 1 tablespoon sugar. Top with half of coconut, citron and cherries. Roll up, jelly-roll fashion, and seal. Finish according to maraschino tea ring directions.

Prepare another ring with remaining dough and remaining ingredients.
