Charged Bank Robbers To Trial June 4

Probable trial of the three Sterling City bank robber suspects is scheduled for Monday, June 4 when district court reconvenes here. Judge Joe Mays has the docket for the three suspects as well as the trial of Candelario Sanches, 24, of San Angelo for the Dec. 10 burglary of Brock's Grocery.

The three bank robbery suspects Wallace Ray (Pete) Moulton, 34, Charles Peebles, 33, and Percy Allen Warren, 30, are in jail under \$15,000 bonds. The court appointed attorneys to represent the men. Wm. C. McDonald Sr. is to represent Warren, Norman Barr will represent Moulton and William E. Hall will represent Peebles.

He stated "We have those rows wetter now than we did all the time last year." To further improve their watering system and conserve their water, Ross and Reynolds installed an underground concrete pipe system. 2900 feet of 12 inch concrete pipe was installed for their delivery system to the borders .Valves were installed at proper intervals where six tablets can be watered from each outlet .With concrete pipe or concrete-lined ditches, there is very little or no water loss.

Good rains were recorded north, west and south and east of Sterling missioner Precinct No. 3. He paid City Wednesday afternoon and early night. West of here about 18 miles on the Big Spring highway, traffic was stopped for a short time-a regular cloudburst of several inches made the highway impassable for awhile.

Broome to the east got good rains and the North Concho river here got bank full from the rains above here and in Glasscock. The rains below here put the river on another rise, which will all add to water in North Concho Lake above San Angelo.

Here in town about .25 inch fell. but most parts got better rains than did Sterling City itself.

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





ses and prizes in the show sanctioned by the Rodeo Cowboy Association. The show begins at 8 p. m.



Among the sights of the older section are the Biblical Street called Straight, the House of Ananias and St. Paul's Wall. It was on the road to Damascus that Paul saw a blinding light (Acts 9, 3) and was converted to Christianity.

Medina, a resident here for 25 years, had died on May 16. He is survived by the widow, a daughter and four brothers.


