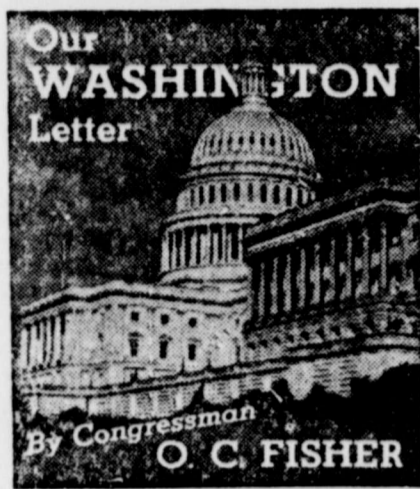

WHEN IS A President not a president? That question is engaging a lot of attention these days and may be resolved soon. At least, the issue has been submitted by Attorney General Brownell to the House Judiciary Committee where all constitutional amendments are considered in the House. President Eisenhower wants something done about it.

The hiatus stems from indefinite language in Art. II, Sec. 1, Clause 6 of the Constitution, which raises, but does not answer precisely, a number of questions about what happens in the "inability" of the President to "discharge the powers and duties" of his office.

The Constitution says the Vice-President takes over when "inability" prevents the President from acting. But what is meant by "inability"? Who decides if and when a President is unable to continue to serve? Does the President decide it? Does the Vice-President decide it? It is to clear up those issues that all this talk is now taking place.

Suppose a President becomes deranged, is stricken with an illness that renders him unconscious, or is captured in time of war? The Constitution simply does not answer the question of who would decide upon the question of the Vice-President taking over.

THE ISSUE POPPED UP when President Eisenhower had his heart attack in September, 1955. But the same concern has been debated scores of times in the past, even during the Constitutional convention.

President Garfield was hopelessly unable to perform an official act for 30 days after he was shot in 1881.

President Woodrow Wilson was partly paralyzed and hardly able to function from September 1919 to March, 1921.

In both of these instances there was much talk about passing on to the Vice-President the duties of the office, rather than allowing the affairs of state to drift while experts debated the ambiguities of the Constitution.

IT IS SELF-EVIDENT, therefore, that this serious flaw in the Constitution should be corrected. Either the Presidents cabinet, or a special commission, should be charged with the responsibility of making the decision, in conjunction with the written views of the President himself concerning his inability. Anyhow, this old unanswered question is being kicked around again.

Yarborough Wins Over The State

Sterling County voters gave Martin Dies the top spot in the special Senate race here Tuesday with 82 votes. Ralph Yarborough, the winner over the state, got 52 votes and the Republican candidate, Thad Hutcherson, received 32 Sterling votes. Only 172 votes were cast—and all voters used the box at the courthouse. In the absentee box, Hutcherson got two votes to 1 for Dies.

The vote cast was light over the whole state. Yarborough will go to Washington to replace Bill Blakely, whom governor Shivers had named to fill the place until a successor for Price Daniel was chosen at the polls. Yarborough had lost in state races for the attorney general and governor the past several years.

But now he's got the top spot of all his races—United State Senate.

Novel Bread Is Trump



Times do change! A few years ago no busy young homemaker would dream of taking time out from a busy morning for a little chat with her neighbor over a cup of coffee. Now, however, a late morning kaffeeklatch with a few hands of bridge thrown in is a growing custom in small towns and cities. "Helps us relax," say these busy young homemakers. "Our husbands have their coffee breaks in the office. We like them too. Bridge? Well, once in a while if we have the time, it's fun and it changes our routine."

These late morning breakfasts feature fruit, a quick hot bread, preferably something novel and home made, and lots of coffee. And taking this cue, Crisco Kitchens developed a new recipe for a quick bread, light in texture because of the vegetable shortening used, and filled with cherries and spice. Try it hot. Try it cold. Try it with tea and with coffee. It's a winner.

Cherry Crumb Cake (Makes one 9" x 5" x 3" loaf)

2 cups sifted enriched flour 1/3 cup Crisco 1 egg
3 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup sugar 2/3 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Blend Crisco, sugar and egg until fluffy. Stir in milk alternately with flour mixture; beat until smooth.

Filling:
1 #2 can pitted red sour cherries, water-packed
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
2 tablespoons melted Crisco

Drain cherries well. Mix brown sugar, cinnamon, flour and melted Crisco until crumbly.

Spread half of batter in greased 1-1/2" deep 9" layer pan. Top with half of cherries, then half of brown sugar mixture. Repeat. Bake in 400° F. oven 30 minutes, or until it tests done.

Car Inspection Coming Along Slowly

Only 51 per cent of the 926 vehicles registered in Sterling County have been inspected so far. This was the information put out by Johnny Marion with the State Department of Public Safety, this week. The 462 person yet to get their cars or trucks inspected, have until April 15 for a deadline, pointed out Marion.

Motorists who fail to have the official sticker on their car windshields after that date are subject to a fine for failure to show the new sticker.

AROUND THE COUNTY

by **ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT**

Farmers and ranchers are reminded that time is getting short for filing their 1956 income tax returns and social security reports. Deadline for filing both returns is April 15 which is just ten days away.

Pecan trees are getting ready to put out pretty soon now. The buds are beginning to swell, an indication that the trees will soon be leafing out. In some areas just a few miles south of here they are already leafing out. Some were far enough along in the freeze of Mar. 25 to get burned or set back.

Now is an excellent time to fertilize your pecan trees also. Recommendations call for the application of 2 pounds of ammonium sulfate per inch diameter of the tree. The fertilizer should be applied in holes punched about a foot deep around the tree. Be careful and not punch the holes too close to the tree and injure the root system. Holes should be punched all around the tree. Be sure to get some of the

fertilizer out at the edge of the drip area of the leaves.

Recommendations of the past have always called for the application of a balanced fertilizer such as 16-20-0 but trials during the last several years have failed to show any results from the phosphorus. In the tests, pecans responded to nitrogen and nitrogen alone. No response was shown from potash, phosphorus, or any other fertilizer. Ammonium sulfate is recommended because there have been indications that sulfur such as is found in ammonium sulfate has been of value. Nitrogen is the element which is responsible for good leaf growth of all plants and good leaf growth is necessary to all plants since the leaves are responsible for feeding the plant to a large extent. The leaves take in food from the air, sunlight, water and other elements to manufacture a large part of their food. Also, the tests showed that nitrogen was necessary to have good, well-filled nuts.

Spring is clean-up time. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council urges everyone to take a look at their own places from the outside as well as from the inside. Make them safer places to live.

Disorder ranks second to poor judgment as a cause of accidents according to Safety Council statistics. One out of every five people contacted in case of accident claimed they were put there by disorder. Cluttered, untidy surroundings are conducive to accidents.

A place for everything, everything in its place is a good motto as well as a good safety practice. Tools, such as garden rakes, hoes, pitchforks, and many others are deadly as a gun. Fall or trip over them and you may be in for a long siege in the hospital or bed.

Fires, too, thrive on paper, rags, and rubbish piled in closets. Fuels, paint cleaners, and insecticides are also fire hazards. Overloaded electrical circuits also contribute much to an increased fire hazard.

An atmosphere of cleanliness will also help to discourage many of the rodents such as rats and mice from moving in. They thrive in dirt and trash and disorder. A clean place seldom has much trouble from rodents thereby removing the disease hazard carried by them.

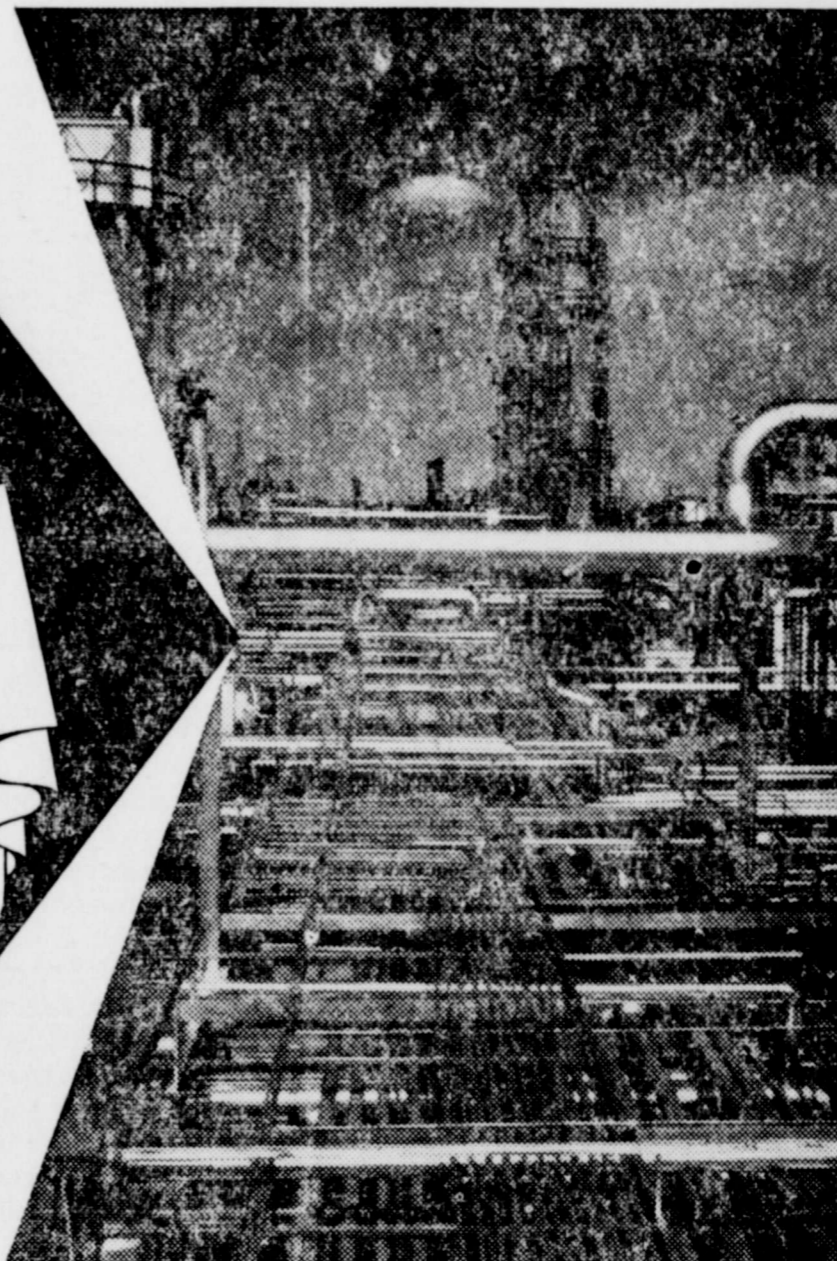
4-H Club members working out for the grass identification and range judging teams have held two

workouts thus far. The wool and mohair judging team has held one workout with another scheduled for this week.

Members who have worked out on the grass identification team and the range judging team will have another workout on Monday, April 8. They are in the process of learning to identify 56 different grasses which are prominent in Texas. The characteristics of these grasses also are included in the contests. These included whether the grass is a cool or warm season plant, an annual or perennial, climax or invader species, and the grazing value of the plants. In addition to the grasses range judging includes identification of some other plants such as poisonous plants, classification of range sites, and the placing of four different plots of ground.

Wool and mohair judging includes the classification of wool into the various classes or grades such as fine, half-blood, 3/4 blood and on down the line. It includes staple length classification and estimating the shrink also. They also place four fleeces and check reasons on them. In mohair judging, the mohair is graded in its various grades, and also four clips placed and seasons checked on them.

There is still time for any member who may wish to start working on any of these activities but they should start immediately because the rest of the boys and girls will be too far along to catch up with.
