Sterling County Stock Show Held Here Monday

LeRuth Reed and Don McDonald Vie For Tops

BETTY JO BARRETT AND TROY MURRELL TOPS IN BREEDING CLASSES

Thirty-seven FFA boys and 4-H Club boys and girls exhibited their lambs in the annual stock show here Monday in the Sterling County show barn. Curtis Henderson, county agent of Irion County, was judge of the show. Among supervisors were William Foster and Marvin and Melvin Foster, superintendents, and Fred Igo, vocational instructor at the high school and Arthur Barlemann, county agent.

Both the champion and the reserve champion finewool lambs were shown by LeRuth Reed, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Reed. Don McDonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chesley McDonald, had both the grand champion and reserve champion crossbred lambs in the show. He also received the showmanship award in the breeding sheep division.

In the breeding sheep division, Betty Jo Barrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dayton Barrett, showed the champion registered Rambouillet ewe, while Troy Murrell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Murrell exhibited the champion ram. Betty Jo also showed the 1st place pen of three commercial ewe lambs.

In the pen of three registered Rambouillets, Barbara Durham took first place while her brother, David placed second. Both are children of Mr. and Mrs. Worth Durham.

In the lightweight finewool lamb class, Jeannie McDonald placed first, while Reynolds Lee Foster placed first in the lightweight crossbred lamb class.

Jerry Payne, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Payne, received the showmanship award in the fat lamb division.

Following the judging each exhibitor was allowed to sell one lamb. The thirty-seven lambs sold for a total of \$3,323.60 or an average price of \$89.82. Jack Drake of the Producers Livestock Co. of San Angelo placed a floor of 18c on the lambs and took all sale animals at that price.

COVERING THE COUNTY

The Sterling County Livestock Show enjoyed the best weather it has had in several years. The morning hours were slightly cool but with the sheep in the pens all night Sunday and the fires started shortly after 5:00 a. m., the barn warmed up fast and was comfortable throughout the show and sale.

Exhibitors now can really enjoy their show barn. This year the show association members piped both water and a permanent butane system into the barn. With water available, lambs can be left overnight before loading out for other shows or when returning from other shows.

A total of 42 boys and girls exhibited in the county show this year. There were twenty-seven 4-H Club exhibitors and 15 FFA exhibitors with 38 head of crossbred lambs, 70 head of finewool lambs, 10 registered Rambouillet ewes, 6 registered Rambouillet rams and seven groups of commercial ewe lambs.

Thirty-seven lambs were sold through the auction for \$3323.60. Average sale price was \$89.92 per head or an average of \$86.95 per hundred pounds on 3822 pounds. The lambs were bought by Jack Drake of Producers Auction Company in San Angelo for 18c per pound on resale.

The next show on the schedule is the Abilene Fat Stock Show. Ten 4-H Club members have twenty-one head of lambs entered in this show which starts Sunday. Sifting of lambs begins at 7:30 a.m. Monday, January 25 and judging of lambs is scheduled to start at 9:00 a.m.

Ex-Convict Found 14 Miles West of Here

Cecil Grady, 29-year-old ex-convict, was found bludgeoned to death inside a pasture leading to an oil field up the Garden City road 14 miles last Friday afternoon. His body was found by an oil field hauler who notified authorities here.

Nothing had been turned up at the time this paper went to press. Law enforcement officials were pressing the intensive investigation in all directions.

Grady started Thursday on a happy note. It was his birthday and he gained freedom from the State Penitentiary in Huntsville where he served a term on a forgery conviction from Lamb County.

From Huntsville Thursday, Grady rode with a Coleman deputy sheriff to Coleman, Asst. Dist. Atty. Jack Sessom said in San Angelo. At Coleman, Grady purchased a bus ticket to Midland where he has relatives, but got off the bus at San Angelo around 7:15 p.m. Thursday.

He was traced as being in various taverns in San Angelo until midnight Thursday.

The ex-convict was identified by his brother who lives in Midland. Burial was in Willow, Oklahoma Monday.

Sheriff Bill Green and Texas Ranger John Wood of Midland are in charge of the investigation.

An oilfield worker said he gave a man a push in a stalled 1955 or '56 Oldsmobile near the scene around 8 a.m. Friday. He said he gave the man a push for about 200 feet to get his car started. The worker said the man was heavyset, around 45 or 50 years old, and was sitting in the car wiping blood off his face. The man's sports jacket and slacks were covered with blood, said the worker and he walked with a limp around the car.

The dead man was fatally beaten up over the face and body, as if with a hammer, it was said.

When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. 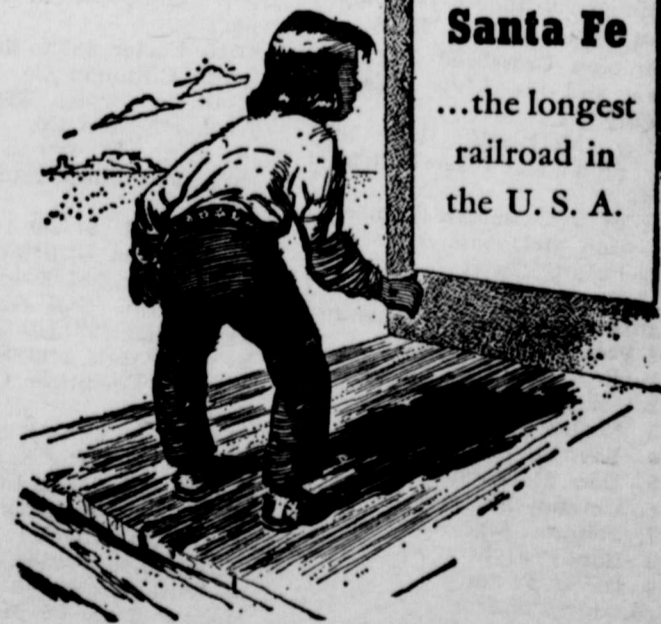

Our WASHINGTON Letter



The fate of Federal lamb grading remains in doubt following four days of public hearings last week before the House Committee on Agriculture. Suspension of the grading program had been ordered by Secretary of Agriculture Benson to be effective on January 4, but at the request of the committee, the action was suspended until a public hearing could be held.

I have joined in urging the suspension of further grading be made effective immediately. At the hearings, all of which I attended, a very strong case was made out against the grading system. Most all the grower organizations over the country and also most of the lamb feeders oppose the grading.

Not to be confused with Federal inspection of meats, which is a good thing and will be continued, this lamb grading is most difficult to administer. It forced feeders to over-fatten lambs in order to meet certain grade standards. And the public does not want to buy overfat lambs.

The result of all of this is that both the grower and consumer is penalized.

Lamb grades and types vary so much in various parts of the country that it is doubtful that even with realistic changes in the present grade standards a workable grading program can be devised.

I have joined the lamb growers in urging that all grading be suspended for a year and see how the marketing functions without the interference of artificial and unrealistic grading.

GUESTS in our office this past week have included Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo, here for the hearings on lamb grading; Arthur Stehling of Fredericksburg and his son, Jack of Austin. The latter is in Washington for a few weeks preparing for an important assignment as Supervising Architect for the construction of the new U.S. Embassy building in Mexico City, due to begin this Spring. A graduate of Texas University, in architecture, Jack has been associated with an architectural firm in Austin during the past two years.

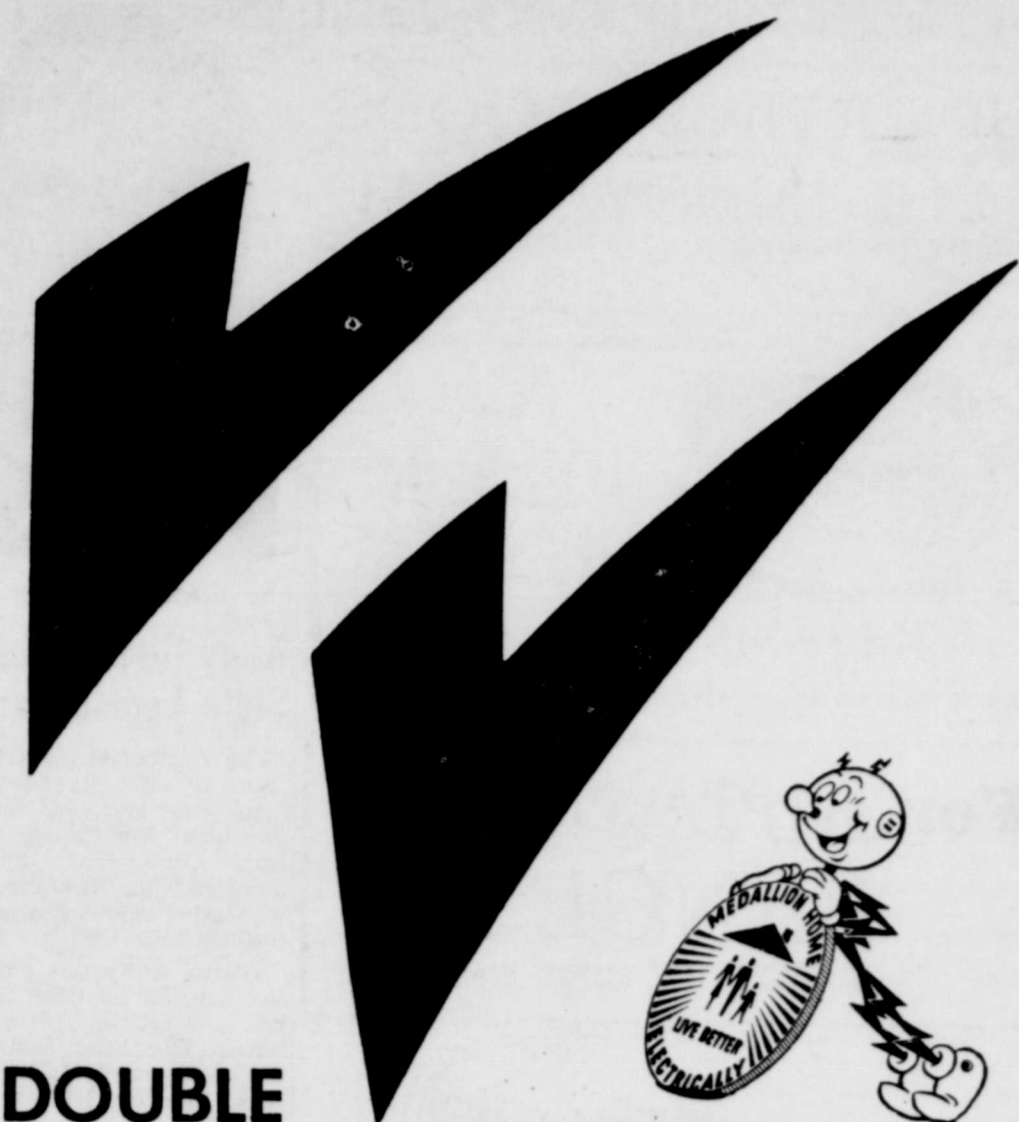

Angy Glenn Files For State Legislature

Big Spring—Angy Glenn, a resident of Big Spring for many year and long-time employee of the Cosden Petroleum Corporation, has announced his candidacy for legislative representative from the 101st District.

Glenn seeks the place being vacated by Obie Bristow, who is retiring after four terms. The 101st District includes Howard, Martin, Glasscock, Sterling, Irion and Reagan Counties.

Glenn pointed to a background of farm-ranch, small business and credit experience as qualifications "which I hope will help me understand the needs and desires of the people of this district and all Texas." This is his first venture into politics.

A native Texan born in Mineral Wells, he moved with his parents to Stephens County when he was a youngster, and had his public schooling in Breckenridge. He represented the Company over West Texas as a number of years in a sales capacity, then was advanced to credit manager in 1952, a position he still holds. Glenn is looking toward retirement from Cosden in 1961, and said he would be able to give the legislative job whatever time it takes.

Platform Given

"I regard the legislative post as a distinct honor, and of the people of this district see fit to bestow this honor upon me, I pledge that they can count on my most conscientious effort. I will be ready and willing to listen to people from whom I can get help, counsel and advice. I would want to make friends with other members of the Legislature and try to work with them.

"It would be presumptions of me to make promises on various specific issues, when I have not given these full study. My platform simply is that I will try to use moderate and sound judgment, to put the welfare of our state first, and to vote for and advocate those things which are helpful to the most people I've got no axe to grind, no special interest to serve. I would just like to make a good, honest, hard-working legislator."

Glenn is the proud grandfather of six. He was married on Easter 1917 to Miss Margaret Elizabeth Cox of Breckenridge and they live at 108 Jefferson. They have two daughters. Mrs. Lawrence Sides of Lubbock and Mrs. Wm. B. Crooker of Big Spring; each of the daughters has 3 children.

The Glenns are members of the First Christian Church. He is a Mason, has long been an active member of the Lions Club. Glenn in 1956 took
