As He Sees It

Pelletized 2, 4-D, a relatively new form of the well known herbicide weed killer, was put out this week on some bitterweed on the Fowler McEntire ranch. This is the first time that this form of the weed killer has been used on bitterweed and the results will be watched both here and by the Experiment Station staff at College Station.

In this form, the 2, 4-D is in small pellets and must be used several weeks before you would use the other forms of it. It is necessary that the pellets dissolve and the hormone reach the root zones of the plants. The pellet form of the weed killer has been used in some areas to control weeds in row crops in the past two years that it has been on the market.

Presently the pellet form of 2, 4-D is prohibitive in cost for such an operation as bitterweed control on the range. The material being used here is furnished by the Experiment Station and the chemical company who manufacture it to see what results can be obtained. In the future the cost will probably drop possibly to a point where it could be used in the same cost range as other forms of 2, 4-D. In specialized crop operations it has worked quite well on weeds, but now it is out of the question for range work except on an experimental basis.

We'll keep you up to date as to the results of the test.

LeRuth Reed has three lambs entered in the El Paso Show.

Judging in the El Paso lamb show will take place Tuesday, February 9. LeRuth is the only Sterling County 4-H club entry in the El Paso show.

How does 1960 stack up when compared to 1959 for the agricultural commodity producer?

John G. McHaney, Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist, says that the rancher and farmer can expect the trend to follow the pattern set in 1958 and 1959. Average prices received will show slight further drops while production costs will show an increase.

As a result of these trends, he realized net farm income will be a little lower than 1959. Supplies of farm products have been so large during the period since World War II that prices have not responded to demand.

Domestic demands for agricultural products are expected to be as strong, or stronger, than 1959. Exports should reach the \$4 billion mark during the 1959-1960 fiscal year. If they reach this mark, it will be the third highest year in history, exceeded only by a mark of \$4.7 billion during 1956-57 and \$4.1 billion in 1951-52. Cotton, grain, and rice are expected to increase; wheat, flour, and dairy products decrease.

## WORK STARTED ON BANK BUILDING

Floyd Ogden of San Angelo was awarded the general contract on remodeling of the First National Bank here last Friday. Work was started on the project the first of this week.

## Our WASHINGTON Letter



AFTER ONE month of the New Year, Congress is grinding along—slowly. As anticipated, Old Man Politics is taking a hand in nearly every bill that is being pushed. It's always been that way. In Presidential election years, it's part of our system.

Every four years—and sometimes in between—so-called civil rights bills are in the forefront. A mild sort of bill was reported by a House committee last year and is before the Rules Committee—the clearing house for bills that reach the floor. But the Rules Committee is not a political committee and is not easily rushed. It is reluctant to advance politically-inspired election-year measures. And so it has taken no action on the bill that is the answer to some of the politicians' dreams.

Over in the Senate, all sorts of concoctions have been offered under the guise of civil rights—vote-getting concoctions. And a bill is expected to pass that body. And the House is expected eventually to approve one. The moderates will attempt to weed out the extreme proposals that would adversely affect freedoms and the rights and responsibilities that were supposed to have been guaranteed to the States in the Constitution.

Among recent guests have been J. Edward Johnson of Dallas, formerly of Brownwood, and W. O. Bankston, also formerly of Brownwood. The latter, a native of Winters, was awarded the Benjamin Franklin Award by the Saturday Evening Post, in connection with the annual convention of the National Automobile Dealers' Association being held in Washington. Bankston, the leading Ford dealer of Dallas, will soon be the subject of a feature life story in the Post.

**For a Beautiful Cake!**

HEAVENLY frosting, delicately honey-flavored, and covered with frosty-white flaked coconut, makes a "beauty" out of the simplest of cakes! You can use bakers' cake layers; or you can make layers or a large loaf from a mix, or from your own favorite recipe.

**Coconut Honey Frosting**  
2 egg whites; 1½ cups sugar; ¼ teaspoon salt; ½ cup water; 2 tablespoons light corn syrup; 2 tablespoons honey; ½ teaspoon vanilla; ¼ cup Angel Flake Coconut.

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, corn syrup, and honey in top of double boiler. Beat 1 minute until thoroughly mixed. Cook over rapidly boiling water, beating constantly with sturdy egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute or until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and sprinkle with flaked coconut. Makes 5½ cups frosting or enough to cover generously tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.

## JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN

The annual convention of the Outdoor Writers' Association, held recently at Hot Springs, Arkansas, was a great success. They seem to have more than their share of black bass down there, but they are bashful bass; the kind you have to go down deep for during warm weather. My boat came in with both first and second prizes — thanks largely to the appeal of the red plastic worm!

Evidently one shouldn't take a dim view of plastic worms, and I don't any more. Local savants, like Ira Robbins and Ed May use them with spinning tackle and impale them by one end only on the hook of a brick-colored 1/4 ounce lead jig. They cast out off points of land and let the lure sink to the bottom; jiggling it in slowly until they get a strike or get hung up. Both happen frequently. We lost several jigs, but we caught our limit of bass.

With about six inches of indigestible worm trailing beyond the hook, it's a wonder these bass don't strike short, but they don't seem to. There are few strikes that don't result in hooked fish.

All this gives me an idea for hot weather, when other fish lie deep. I don't know how this rig works on trout and other species but, when they aren't hitting on top, I intend to find out.

These Arkansas boys are great ones for enjoying life the easy way. While Ira and Ed and I were bothering the bashful bass on Lake Ouachita, Ira said, "Joe, how'd you like a hot drink of something? We have coffee, tea, or cocoa. Take your choice."

I eyed the two "Thermos" vacuum bottles and wondered how he could get three kinds of drinks out of only two bottles. He solved the problem by taking a small jar of "Nescafe" (instant coffee) from his kit; pouring a teaspoonful into a cup, and filling it with piping hot water from the "Thermos". "Nescafe" is wonderful coffee, and it tastes especially good out-of-doors.

Ed went for a hot cup of "Nestea" (instant tea) and Ira settled for "EverReady" cocoa. Three kinds of drinks — all from the same hot water container, with no waste, and no need to wash the container afterwards! These boys keep the ingredients in their "Thermos" kits all the time. Since there's no need to wait for coffee to perk, they get a quarter hour

head start in the morning!

Another angle to this idea is to combine "Nescafe" and "EverReady" cocoa to make a hot drink called "mocha". This is a favorite combination with athletes as well as with sportsmen because it packs the lift and flavor of coffee with the energy and flavor of cocoa. They usually go for the "EverReady" kind because it has sugar and whole milk already in it. There's nothing to add except very hot water.



After our little beverage break, we drifted into a crappie area and found that this lure is sure death to big crappies. This gives me an idea for salt water fishing back in New England. Along our northeastern coast we get runs of bluefish and striped bass. I'm going to try the black version of this worm rig for them. It should be a good substitute for rigged cels, which are one of the popular baits along the coast.

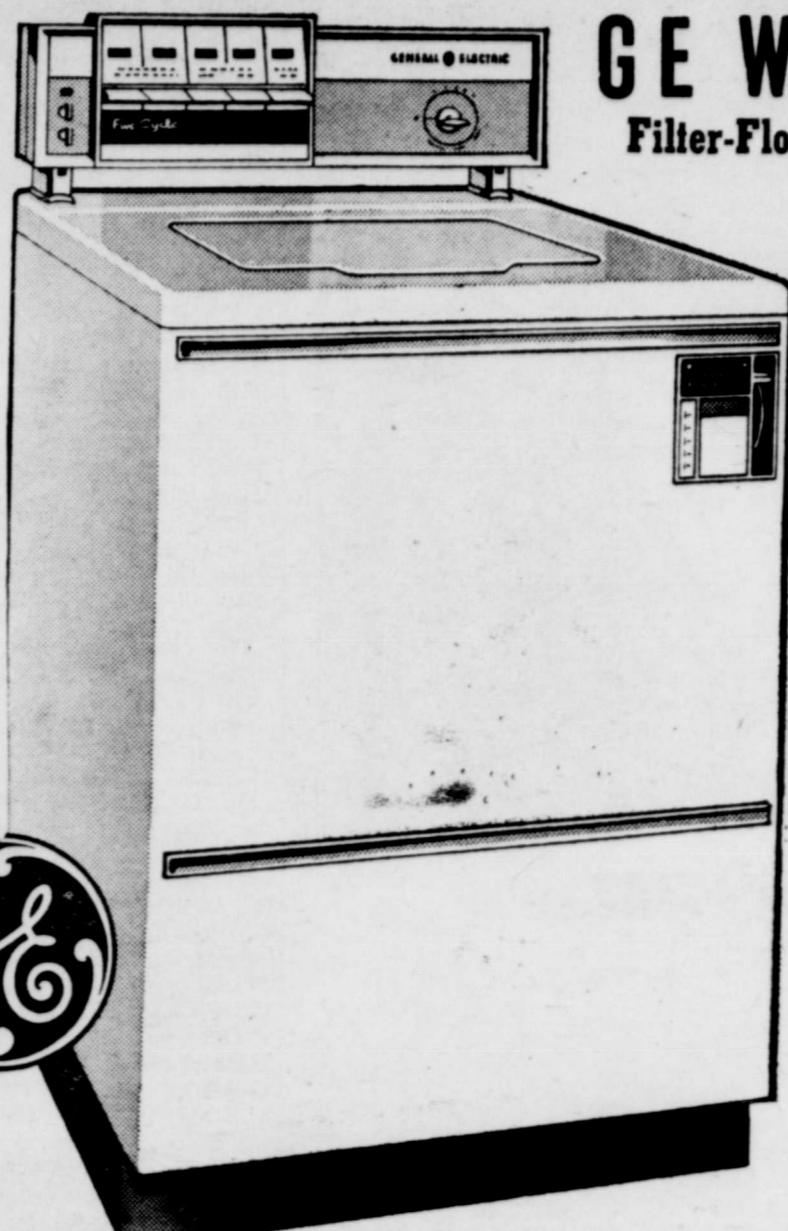

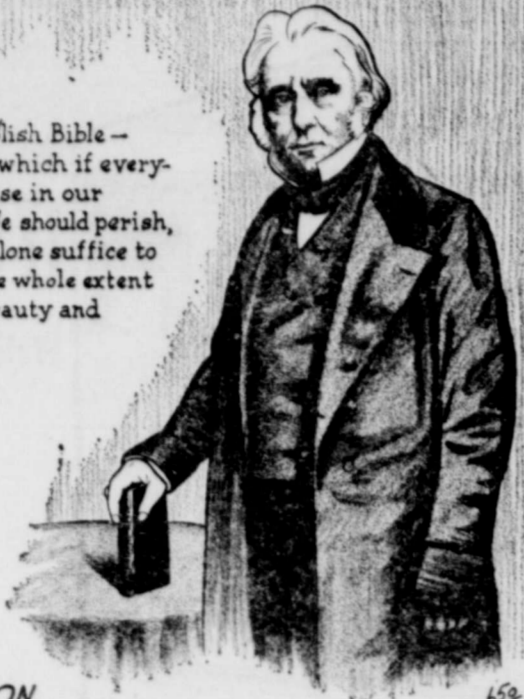

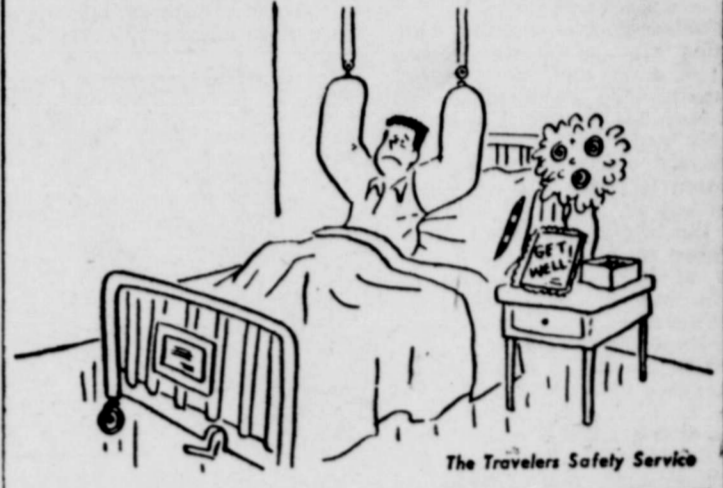
