Last week in reporting the results of the open fat lamb show at San Antonio, Cecilia McDonald was credited with having the seventh place fine-wool lamb. This was an error. Cecilia should have been listed as the exhibitor of the 5th place fine-wool lamb.

The San Antonio Show ended Sunday. The weather throughout the show was the best they have had for their show in several years. It was cold most of the time but not unpleasantly so and it was better on the livestock, sheep in particular, that it be cold. The hot, humid weather which often prevails down there is hard on the sheep, especially the breeding sheep. The wool is wet and very hard to handle during the fitting.

The worst weather of the show was the opening day, Friday, February 12. There was a snowstorm in progress most of the morning which forced cancellation of the opening parade downtown but it did not interfere with other activities of the show.

The auction sale of all fat livestock was held last Friday. Two world records were set in the auction sale.

The champion fine-wool lamb of the show owned and shown by David Fisher, a Crane County 4-H Club member, was sold for \$3600, which is a record. Previous high had been \$1800 two years ago.

The other world record was the \$3500 paid for the champion barrow of the swine show. It was exhibited by Benno Leunsmann in the open show. Leunsmann is a former Bexar County 4-H Club member.

The champion steer of the show, exhibited by Lile Lexter of Lubbock County 4-H Club, sold for \$8100. A chain store, Piggly Wiggly, was the purchaser of the steer.

The Pearl Brewing Company bought the champion lamb; the Lone Star Brewing Company the champion barrow.

Lamb prices in the auction held at 36c per pound or above. Cecilia McDonald's 5th place fine-wool lamb sold for 40c per pound. David Foster's 30th and 39th place fine-wool lambs brought 36c per pound.

The Sterling County 4-H Club won two second places

in the "housekeeping" division of the San Antonio show. The lamb exhibitors won second place in their division and the registered junior breeders repeated in the Junior Sheep Show. Each place brought the club a prize of \$7.50 and a nice banner which is on display in the county agent's office.

The neatness awards are based on the orderliness and cleanliness of pens, animals, and feed equipment, promptness in having these cleaned up by 8:00 a.m. each day, arrangement of equipment and signs, the personal appearance of the exhibitors, observance of rules and regulations of the show, and cooperation with show officials and judges and the general attitude of exhibitors.

David Durham was one of the ten Texas 4-H Club boys honored by the show and the Sears, Roebuck Foundation at a banquet on February 12 in the Gunter Hotel. In addition, ten girls representing the 4-H Clubs, and boys representing the FFA and FHA were also honored.

Each honoree received an official gold badge from the show, a rodeo ticket for Rural Youth Day on Saturday, and recognition for their work in Rural Youth Day. One of San Antonio's papers published all the honoree's pictures and articles on their club work.

Clinton Hodges and W. R. Brooks left Wednesday afternoon for Houston where they will show the Hodges registered Rambouillets at the Houston Fat Stock Show.

## Our WASHINGTON Letter

WHILE the Senate argued over the issue of Civil Rights or Civil Wrongs, the House coasted along with annual appropriation bill last week, and maneuvered for a test on the civil rights issue in early March.

The House debate will begin on March 10, and a bill is certain of passage, though probably milder than the Senate version. It all boils down to the big battle for the Negro vote in 1960. While all sorts of pretensions are advanced, every one knows what the real objective is. In calmer, more objective moments most politicians will admit that special laws are not needed for any minority group, racial, religious or otherwise. But not so on election years.

IN Washington last week as one of four delegates to a national Citizenship Seminar sponsored by the Methodist Church, was Miss Sue Mims, daughter of the Elton Mims of Water Valley. Miss Mims, a student at Texas Tech, also visited the United Nations in New York, spent several days in Washington where briefings by State and Defense Department experts were given.

OTHER Visitors included Joe R. Andrews of Merton and Rex Lowe of Sonora, both en route from the Atlantic City annual convention of School Administrators back to their respective high schools.

CHAS. Schreiner III, Vice-President of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers, was allowed only a half-hour between trains in Washington as he passed through on the annual "Swift Tour", a trip sponsored each year by Swift & Co. to eastern markets, stockyards, packing plants and the like. The group is by invitation, made up of leaders in livestock circles from all over the nation.

ANOTHER Visitor was Roscoe K. Carter of San Saba, who reported on the good rains and prospects in San Saba County. Describing it as being "deep in the very heart of Texas," the San Saba Chamber of Commerce recently sent me an attractive brochure from "the Pecan Capitol of the World."

## Hodges' Rambouillets Do Well at San Antonio Show

Fred and Clinton Hodges' registered Rambouillet sheep dominated the open Rambouillet breeders show at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition this year. Their sheep took seven out of nine first places; they got two grand champion awards and one reserve champion award.

The seven first place ribbons they took included the Ram Lamb, the Yearling Ram, the Aged Ram, the Yearling Ewe, the Aged Ewe, Get of Sire and first in Lamb Flock (of four).

They had the champion ram and reserve champion ram, as well as the champion ewe; it was the same ewe that was champion of the Fort Worth Show.

The well-known Rambouillet breeders had seven first at the San Antonio show, two seconds, three thirds, two fourths, three fifths, three sixths, one eighth, and one ninth place.

The door prize went to Jake Martin.

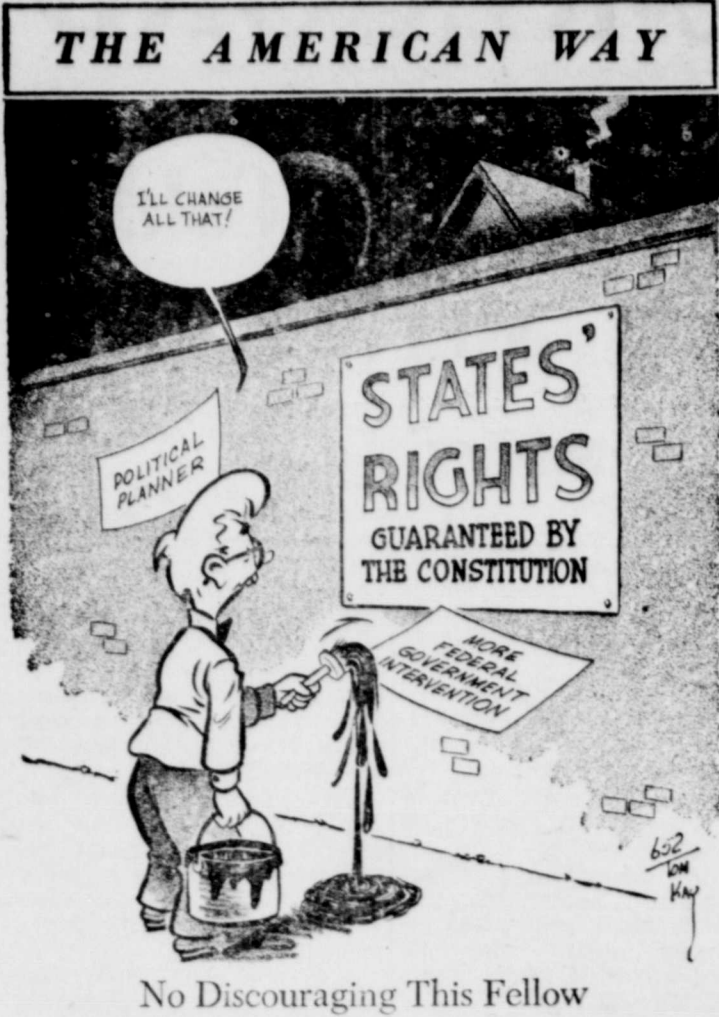

**TAX FACTS FOR THE HOMEOWNER NO. 4**  
**Deductions For Car And Home**

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

**YOUR** home and car may be the source of deductions that will lower your federal income tax. It is important to check all possible deductions because of the savings involved. If you are in the lowest tax bracket — 20 per cent — each \$5 you can find in deductions will mean a dollar in your pocket. For persons of higher income the possible savings are even greater.

The interest on a mortgage is deductible on your federal tax return. In most cases, payments to a bank include both interest and principal; as the mortgage is reduced the interest is less, and a larger portion is applied to the principal. Only the amount you pay as interest is deductible in the case of your residence.

**Real Estate Taxes**

Sometimes the monthly payment also includes an additional amount which the bank holds for the payment of taxes, insurance, and so on. In this case the bank is acting as your agent in paying tax on your property. Real estate taxes paid for you by the bank are deductible as if you had paid them directly. The important point here is that you can only deduct the amount paid by the bank. For example, you may give the bank \$360 over the year toward the payment of taxes, but the tax bill may only come to \$341. In this situation you can only deduct \$341.

**Deductible Auto Expenses**

From the time you buy an automobile, you begin to have other expenses which are deductible on your federal income tax return. Any state or local sales tax you paid on the car purchase is deductible. So are the cost of your license plates and interest on an auto loan.

A common deduction in many taxpayers' returns is for state gasoline tax. It is best to keep a record of your gasoline purchases during the year, but if you don't have such a record you can still make a reasonable estimate. For example, you may divide the average number of miles your car runs on a gallon of gasoline into the total miles you have put on the car over the year. This will give you an estimate of the number of gallons consumed. Multiply this by the tax per gallon, and you have a reasonable estimate of the amount you can deduct.

If you had a collision, you may be able to deduct the damage to your own car not covered

by insurance. Although your driving may have been faulty, you are entitled to the deduction if the accident was not due to your willful negligence.

Such a loss is determined by subtracting the value of the car after the accident from the value before the accident.

**A Roof Over Dependents**

To determine whether or not you contribute more than half of the support for a dependent (one of the tests for claiming an exemption for a dependent), you must consider the value of the roof over the dependent's head. For example, if you provide a room in your house for your mother-in-law, you can consider the rental value of the room as part of your support contribution. This is the amount you could get for the room if you were renting it rather than allowing your mother-in-law to use it free.

If your mother-in-law lives in her own home, the situation may be quite the reverse. To determine the percentage of her support provided by you, you must consider the rental value of the one in which she lives. The amount she could have rented the home for is considered a contribution toward her own support. For example, suppose your mother-in-law has an income of \$500 a year. The rental value of her home, even though she has no intention of renting it, is estimated at \$1,500 per year. For tax purposes then, your mother-in-law is said to be contributing \$2,000 to her own support for the year. To list your mother-in-law as a dependent, you must have contributed more than \$2,000 to her support.

**Additional Information**

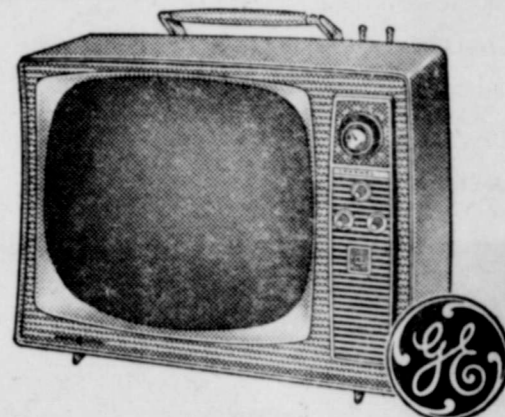

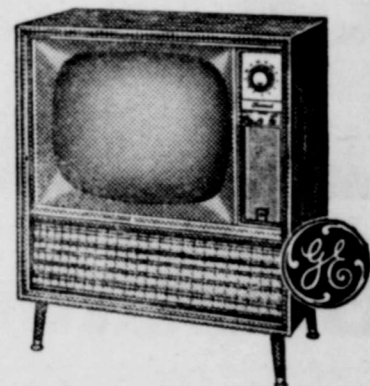

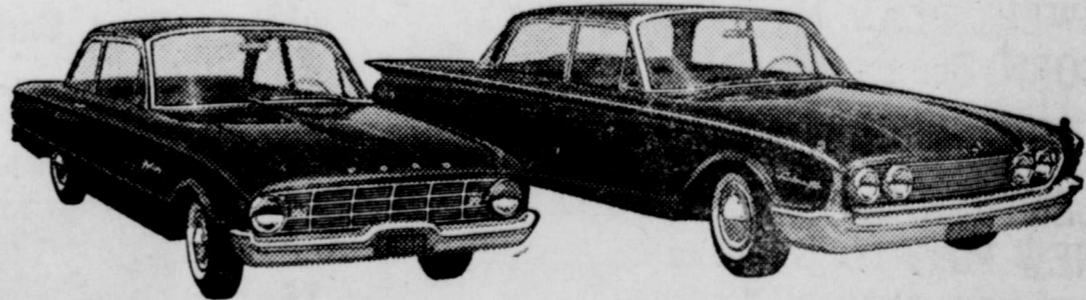
