Every citizen in the county that has a poll tax or is otherwise qualified to vote (with an exemption or is over the age) is qualified to vote. TO NEW YORK CITY

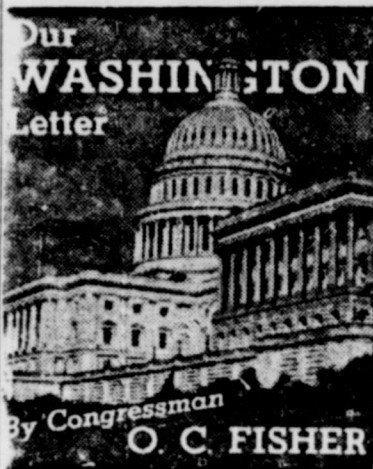

BY A MARGIN of 311 to 109 the House last week approved the election year civil rights bill. I joined with 16 other Texas members in voting against the measure, while 5 Texans voted with the Northerners.

The bill is now in the Senate committee where it will remain until March 29. Then the Senators will renew their month-long debate. And there is no telling what will happen after that.

One thing you can be sure of: Four years from now—on the next Presidential election year—the Congress will spend a few weeks on a Civil Rights bill. There seems to be no end to it. This wild scramble for the Negro vote. Maybe some day the people will rise up and demand that the Congress treat all Americans alike, without special laws to benefit any one group—racial, religious, or otherwise.

BOTH GUAM and the Virgin Islands are now asking for representation in the U. S. Congress. Puerto Rico has for years had a Delegate to the Congress, with all rights and powers except the right to vote on bills. The other two want the same, and may get it. It is looked upon as one of those initial steps toward eventual statehood.

A bill by the same Member who sponsored statehood for Alaska and Hawaii (Mr. O'Brien of N. Y.) is pushing for Guam and the Virgin Islands with a bill to give them representation in Congress.

In the meantime, Statehood talk in Puerto Rico is boiling. Statehood is the Number One issue in the current election campaign going on down there.

IT WILL BE RECALLED that when the Congress broke precedent to go 2,000 miles into the Pacific to admit Hawaii, not contiguous to the continent, to statehood (rather than to give it self-government under a commonwealth status) warning was given that such would eventually lead to the admission of Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands. Such admissions would have a weakening effect upon the superstructure of our Republic.

You'll Get Counted CENSUS TAKERS EASY TO IDENTIFY

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying the takers of the 1960 Census of Population and housing when they start their rounds on April 1, District Supervisor Wm. G. Stacy pointed out today.

Each census taker will be provided with a red, white and blue identification card to be worn on the lapel. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. Persons purporting to be Census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local authorities.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is brown and bears the legend, "1960 Census of the United States" printed in green ink. In the portfolio, the census taker carries his supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools of his trade.

A. T. Bratton Gets Study Fellowship

Brownwood, Texas—A. T. Bratton, head of the Agriculture Department of Howard Payne College, has been awarded a National Defense Graduate Fellowship of approximately \$15,000 for three years of study in the field of plant science.

He will use the grant to earn the doctor of philosophy in plant science at the North Dakota Agricultural College, Fargo, N. D. His major work will be in range management with minor in soils.

"All of us at Howard Payne congratulate Mr. Bratton on this honor," said Dr. Guy D. Newman, HPC president. "It indicates his genuine desire to better prepare himself in the highly important field in which he teaches."

Help Build Department

"It is my fond hope and expectation that he will return to Howard Payne at the end of this period of training and help us to build one of the finest agricultural departments in Texas."

Bratton's grant, which comes through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is one of approximately 1,500 National Defense fellowships to be awarded in a variety of fields. A school is chosen to train one of the award winners on the basis of the work it does and offers in the specific field of study of the grant.

Most of Bratton's work at the North Dakota Agricultural College will be under Dr. Warren Whitman, professor and recognized authority in

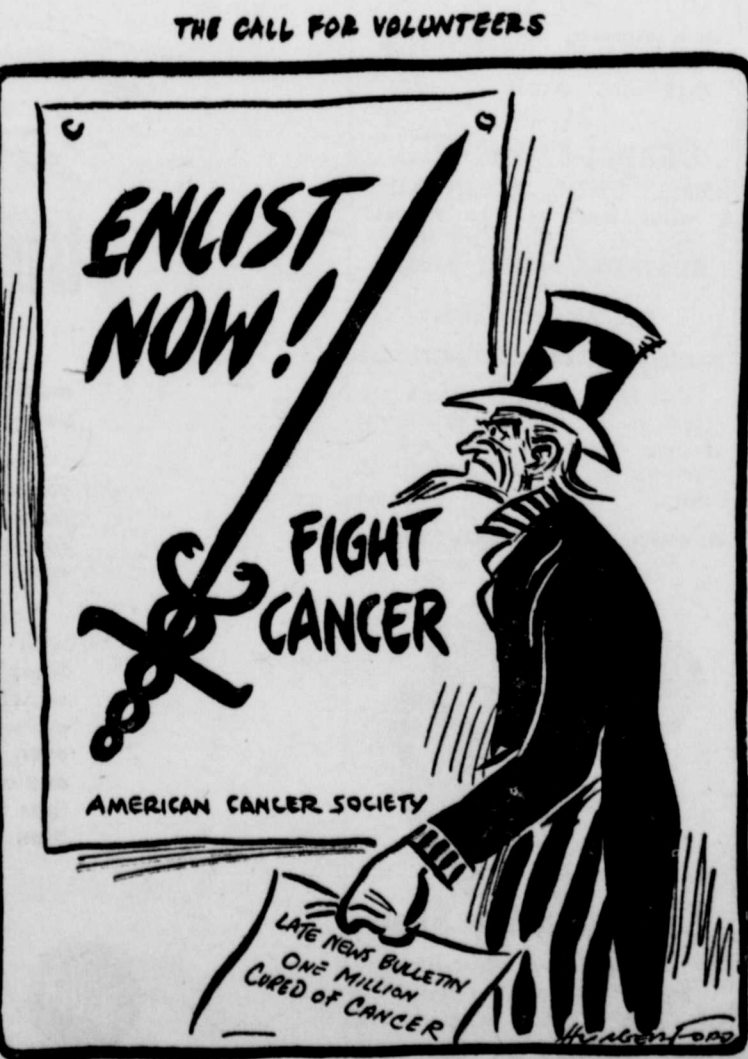

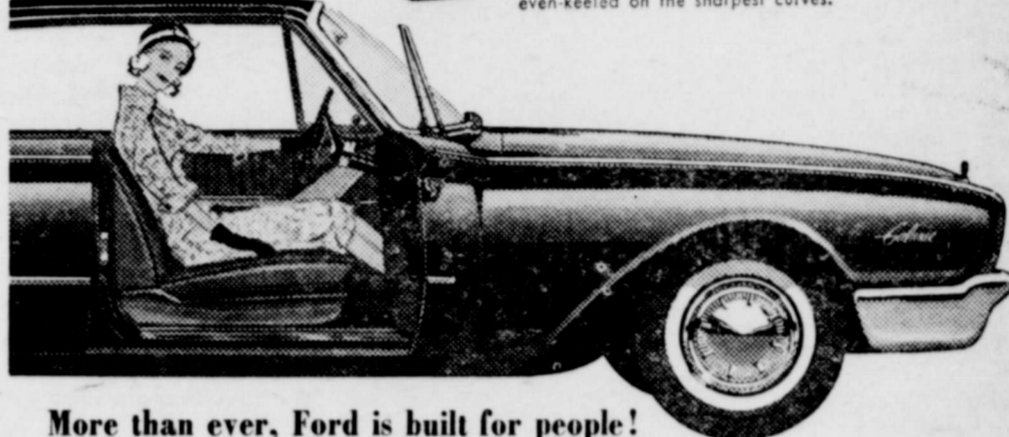

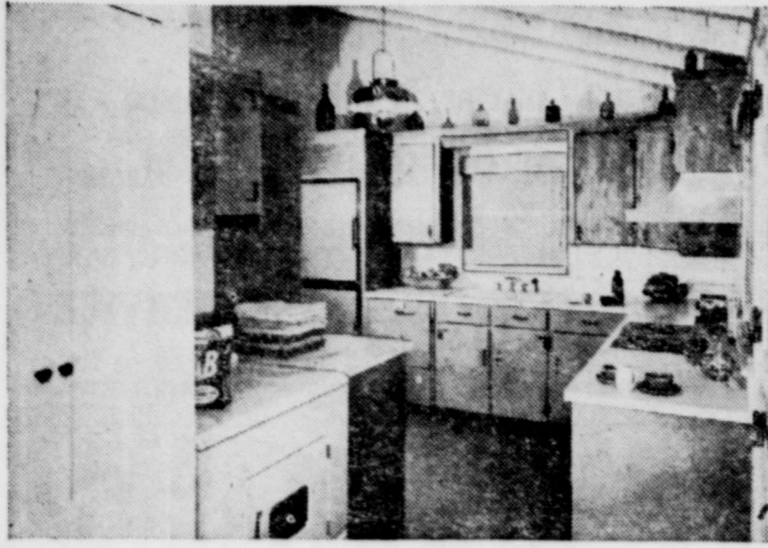

Kitchen Best Starting Place When Remodeling Home

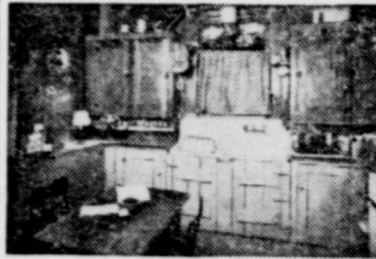

Three Sterling County ranchers attended the two day sheep and goat school at Kerrville Tuesday and Wednesday of this week; the county agent also attended. Ranchers who attended were Gene Alley, Dayton Barrett, and Charles Probandt. Barrett and Probandt returned home Tuesday night after one day of the school due to the death of Probandt's grandmother.

The school was sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service for ranchers and county agents. It has been held for two years now and plans are for it to be an annual affair.

Subjects covered included sheep and goat management, sheep selection for improved production, range management and internal and external parasites. These topics were covered by J. A. Gray, Extension sheep specialist; Garlyn Hoffman, range specialist; Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension veterinarian; Dr. R. D. Radeleff, of the Kerrville Entomology Experiment Station, and Sam Murray, SCS technician in Kerrville.

One of the more impressive topics covered at the session was one that Dr. Radeleff covered Tuesday night. Dr. Radeleff and his group at the Kerrville experiment station are concerned with the many insecticides that are now used by ranchers. He stated that they have tested 17,000 compounds in the last ten years. Of these, only 10 are approved for use on livestock.

By movies, Dr. Radeleff showed some of the consequences of the misuse of some of the insecticides that ranchers now use. He showed that the old theory of "if a little is good, a lot ought to really do the job" can be fatal. By increasing some of the recommended dosages very slightly they caused poisoning in sheep and goats which resulted in death. He stated that the consequences to persons who mishandle these insecticides can be just as fatal to them and cited a number of examples to back it.

Another common practice that can be disastrous is the use of insecticides on livestock that is recommended for plant use only. This can also be deadly to the animal and the persons involved.

In the last few years, a number of ranchers in the state have suffered losses because they used certain insecticides in dipping vats that were not recommended for such use. If a chemical is not specifically recommended for dipping vat usage, it should not be used for that purpose.

Dr. Radeleff cited these safety precautions: (1) Use only in the recommended strengths; don't use 1 1/2 or twice as much. (2) Don't mix chem-

icals or insecticides unless it is recommended by the manufacturer or other authorities. (3) Use only recommended preparations on livestock, not those recommended for plants. (4) If you get the insecticides on you, discard the clothing and wash or bathe immediately.

the field of botany. **Range Research** His study will be conducted for the regular nine-month school terms. He will be employed during the summers by the Fargo college to do range research.
