Democrat Primary Last Saturday

JIM CANTRELL AND H. F. DONALSON WIN RACES

Jim Cantrell received 322 votes for sheriff, tax assessor-collector in last Saturday's Democratic primary to 123 for his opponent Jake Martin. Cantrell resigned as State Highway Patrolman to make the race against Jake Martin, present deputy sheriff. W.O. Green, sheriff, did not run for reelection.

In the race for County Commissioner, Prec. No. 1 H. F. Donalson got 180 votes and incumbent R. T. Foster 164.

Cantrell and Donalson will not take office until January 1, 1961.

In the district judge's race (51st district) incumbent Joe Mays beat out his two opponents, Bill McDonald and Wm. Davenport. In Sterling County Mays got 276, McDonald 77 and Davenport 50.

In the race for State Representative, 101st District, a run-off race between Angy Glenn and David Read will be held June 4. Here in Sterling County Glenn got 166, Read 122, Frank S. Goodman 30, Al Milch 50 and A. M. Ripps 7. All five men were from Howard County.

In the Prec. No. 3 Commissioner spot, C. J. Copeland was unopposed and got 38 votes.

Worth Durham was renamined County Attorney with 411 votes.

Jack Douthit was reelected Democratic County chairman and the following precinct chairmen for the executive committee were named—O. T. Jones, Reynolds Foster, Riley King and Ross Foster.

Justin A. Kever, present 51st district attorney, had no opposition and got 440 votes, the top number accorded any one on the ballot.

Congressman O. C. Fisher received 438 and Senator Lyndon B. Johnson got 427.

Sterling somehow went contrary to the state as a whole and gave Jack Cox 232 votes to 192 for Governor Price Daniel. Don Yarborough got 180 votes for Lieutenant Governor to Ben Ramsey's 226.

Sterling voters favored Will Wilson to return to the Attorney General's spot over Waggoner Carr. Wilson got 194, Carr 164 and the third man, Bob Looney got 9.

Local voters favored Robert G. Hughes 280 over Robert W. Calvert 108 for the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The state-wide voters gave the job to Calvert, however.

Contrary to state action, the incumbent Bill Allcorn got 259 Sterling votes to 127 for Jerry Saddler for Land Commissioner.

Run-off Primary June 4

Angy Glenn will face David Read in the run-off for the 101st legislative post.

Also, W. T. McDonald of

Brazos County will face the incumbent Lloyd W. Davidson for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals. Sterling voters favored Davidson with 139 votes to 123 for McDonald last Saturday. The third man in the race, Jim D. Bowmer of Bell County, got 89 votes here.

R. B. House Buried Here Last Sunday Afternoon

Services for R. B. (Ransom) House, Jr., 43, of Greenville, were held at 3 p.m. last Sunday afternoon in the Church of Christ. Burial was in the Foster Cemetery under the direction of Lowe Funeral Home.

Audie Moore, Goldsmith, Church of Christ minister, officiated. He was assisted by Marion Hays, local minister. R. B. died Thursday in the Dallas Veterans Administration Hospital.

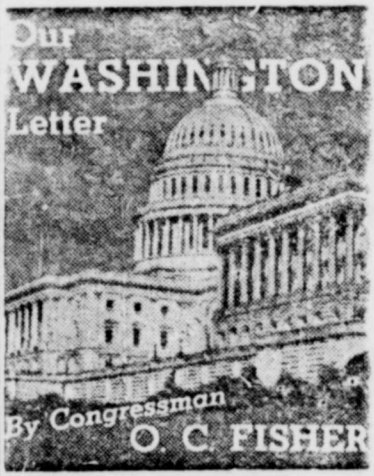
He was raised in Sterling City by his grandmother, Mrs. W. T. Latham, who now lives in San Angelo. He was a 1933 graduate of Sterling City High School and served with the Army in World War II.

He formerly owned a tailor shop in Goldsmith. He had been employed by Temco Aircraft Co. near Greenville for four years.

Mr. House was married to Miss Lottie Murrell on December 25, 1937.

Survivors include the wife; grandmother; one daughter, Vicki House of Greenville and father, R.B. House of Breckenridge.

R. B. suffered a brain hemorrhage, which caused his death.



Compulsory health insurance to be financed by an increase in social security taxes, is unpopular in the 21st district, according to tabulations of returned questionnaires. By a nearly 3-to-1 margin—69%—the answers said "no."

Another issue decisively decided is on the subject of Federal Aid to Education. Sixty-four percent are against construction aid and 69 percent want no part of aid for teacher pay.

By a ratio of 9-to-1 the people think organized labor is becoming too powerful, and 85% want legislation to put unions under anti-trust laws and make both the unions and industry bargain on a company-by-company basis.

Foreign economic aid should be continued but reduced, according to the tabulated views, and they think there should be restrictions on imports of products that adversely affect the well-being of local competitive enterprises.

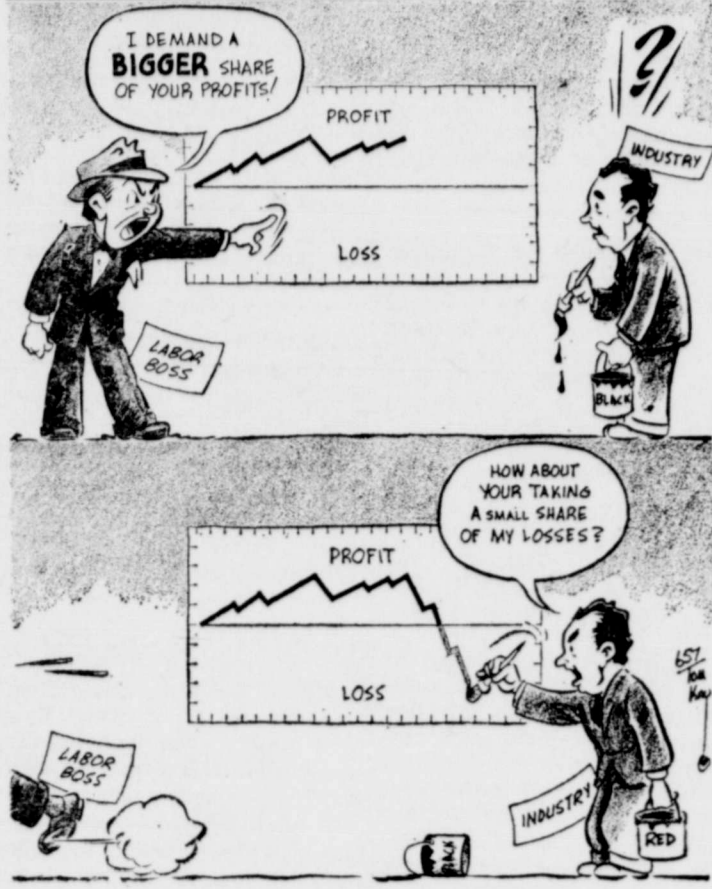
A substantial majority doubt the wisdom of increasing the minimum wage and expanding coverage. And nearly 3-4 want the soil bank discontinued.

Two thirds think agriculture price supports should be reduced.

Fallout Shelters Can Save Millions of Americans

Many Americans near the points of bomb impact could be killed in a nuclear attack by blast, heat and initial radiation. But millions could survive by the simple expedient of protecting themselves against radioactive fallout.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER has called fallout shelters "the best single defense measure for the protection of the greatest number of our people."

For about \$25 to \$150 per person, families can construct shelters, on a do-it-yourself basis, into which they can go after any nuclear attack to stay alive until radiation intensity outside lessens to safe levels, civil defense authorities point out.

Any shelter must be equipped with the necessities of life, including food, water, first aid and sanitary supplies and lights. There must be enough for all shelter occupants for at least 14 days.

Two pamphlets are available to help you construct a suitable

basement or underground shelter. One is MP-15, "The Family Fallout Shelter," which details five basic designs of concrete block, reinforced concrete and preshaped metal. The other, MP-18, "Clay Masonry Fallout Shelters," shows five other plans for basic shelters, calling for use of clay products (brick or tile).

THESE PAMPHLETS can be obtained from your local or State civil defense offices, or by writing to Box Home Shelter, Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, Battle Creek, Mich.

Many persons building shelters are setting them up as recreation rooms, dens, or extra bedroom space, thus gaining multiple use of the facilities, civil defense officials report.

OCDM encourages multi-purpose use of shelter space. Its prime concern is that such radiation-proof shelter be provided now, officials say. On the day of any attack, such efforts would be too little and too late.

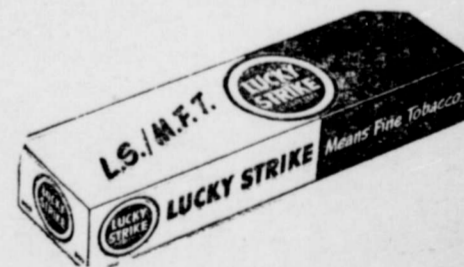

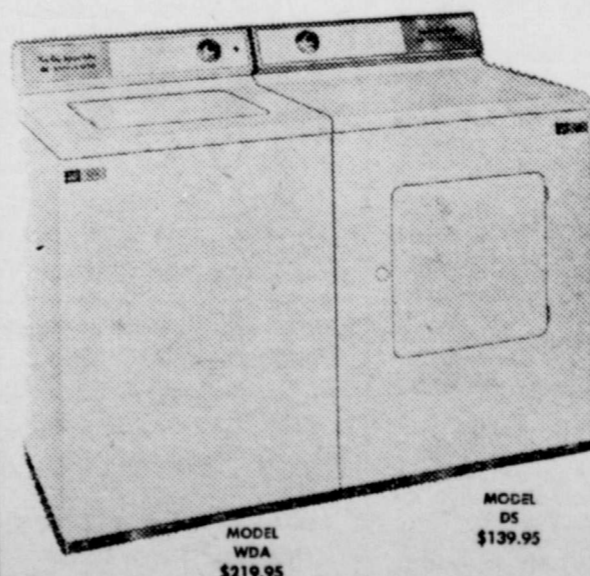

AROUND THE COUNTY by

Now is a good time to fertilize your fish pond if you want to get the maximum yield of fish from it. Fish need a boost in their food supply in the early spring if they are to make the best growth.

Several fertilizers or combinations of fertilizers can be used. A mix of 400 pounds of cottonseed meal plus 200 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate is one that can be used. This 600 pounds of mixture should be applied at the rate of 300 pounds per surface acre in the first application and then three applications of 100 pounds per surface acre at four to six week intervals with no fertilizer being applied during July and August.

One of the simpler fertilizers to use is commercial fertilizer. An application of 300 pounds of 16-20-0 followed by two or three more applications of 100 pounds at four week intervals will do a good job.

Troy Murrell, 4-H Club member, sold his two Rambouillet rams at the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders' Sale in Brownwood last Saturday. One of the rams had been selected as a stud ram by the committee on Thursday. The stud ram sold for \$110, the other ram for \$60.

Clinton and L. F. Hodges also had three stud rams in the Rambouillet division. One of them was the high selling ram at \$310.

Bubba and William Foster sold one Suffolk ram, two Suffolk ewes in the Suffolk sale on Friday. Bill Davis, a FFA member, also sold a Suffolk buck. All the Foster Suffolk and the Davis Suffolk were selected as studs by the committee.

In the wool show held in conjunction with the Brownwood sale, Clinton Hodges did very well. Five fleeces were entered in the show and all five placed; placings were one

first, one third, two fourths, and one eighth.

The first place aged ram fleece was also reserve champion fleece of the Rambouillet division. It weighed 11½ pounds and was a very nice fleece, high yielding and high quality.

In the aged ewe class, Clinton had third and fourth place fleeces. The third place fleece weighed 18 pounds, the fourth place fleece weighed 14. Both these fleeces were off ewes that Clinton purchased in Colorado last fall and had been dipped but in spite of the dipping were still good fleeces with lots of color and a good yield.

In the yearling ewe class, Clinton's entries were fourth and eighth. Both these fleeces weighed 17 pounds.

We have had a couple of calls lately on fleas around the house. If you are experiencing trouble with them, here is what you can do to control them. A dust or spray using either chlordane, DDT, or malathion on the grounds where the fleas seem to be coming from will control them. If you have cats, the best one to use would be malathion.

As of Wednesday of this week there have been no indications of pecan nut casebearer infestations. Ed Hyman, county agent in San Angelo, reports he found the casebearer in the pupa stage there last week. This pupa would have to develop into the adult moth and lay eggs before it would be necessary to spray. He figures that this will occur around May 20 in San Angelo.

This area usually runs a few days behind San Angelo so it would be a little later, probably around the 23rd or 24th before we would have trouble. However, as mentioned before, I have not found

any of the pupa stage here in the ends of last year's growth. It is possible that cold weather killed off the crop and we would not have an infestation. At any rate, we will continue to watch for them.

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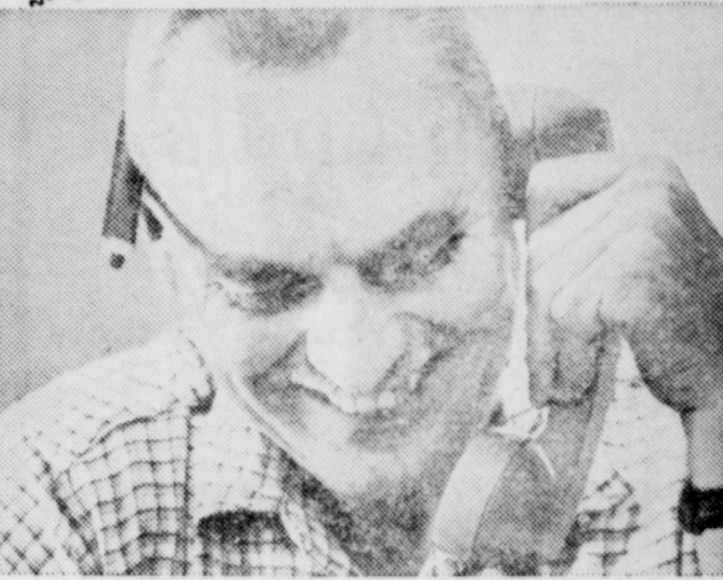
Summer Fellowships To High School Teachers

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Sauce is Important to Skewered Foods



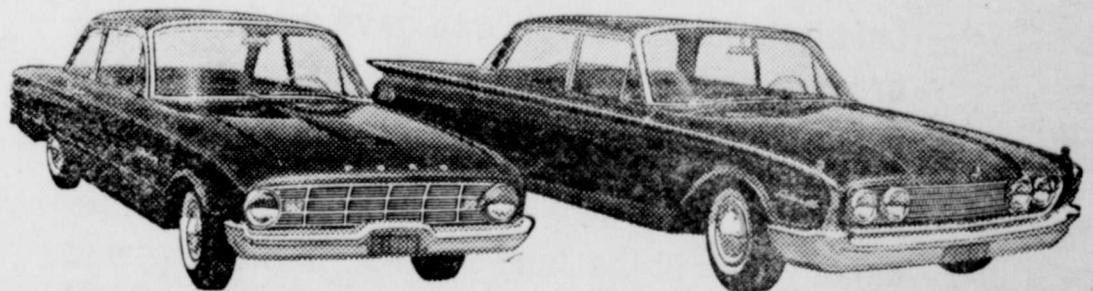

Shrimp a la Broche is a fine choice for any informal get together. The shrimp and vegetables are marinated in a flavorful sauce, so important to all skewered foods, then cooked over coals or in a preheated broiler. Served with a tossed salad, crusty bread, and iced drink your meal is complete. The sauce is made with a piquant blending of corn oil, vinegar, garlic and hot seasonings in mild proportions. Use the same sauce, by the way, for other foods.

Shrimp A La Broche
1 pound small mild onions
2 green peppers
2 pounds tomatoes
1 pound shrimp, fresh or frozen
½ to 1 pound mushrooms
1 recipe Marinating Sauce
Peel and cook onions in salted boiling water about 10 minutes or until almost tender; drain. Remove seeds and stems from green peppers and cut into quarters or 2-inch squares. Cook in boiling water about 5 minutes or until almost tender; drain. Cut tomatoes in large wedges, halves or quarters. Clean and devein the shrimp. If frozen, defrost. If using fresh mushrooms, wash and remove stems, or cut into suitable pieces.
Place onions, peppers, tomatoes, shrimp and mushrooms in a large flat dish. Pour marinating sauce over the food and let refrigerate three to four hours. Turn occasionally. When ready to cook, remove shrimp and vegetables; drain and reserve marinade for later use.

Arrange shrimp and mushrooms on skewers alternating with tomatoes, onions and peppers. Leave about ¼-inch between each piece. Repeat to fill skewer.
Grill over hot coals, or cook in broiler. Adjust distance at top of food to heat source to 3 inches. Turn occasionally and brush the food with the marinade to give a high glaze. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
Marinating Sauce
1 clove garlic
½ cup MAZOLA Corn Oil
¼ cup vinegar or lemon juice
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Dash cayenne pepper
¼ teaspoon Tabasco sauce
Slice clove of garlic into bowl. Add corn oil and remaining ingredients. Stir. Pour over shellfish, fish, cubed meat or vegetables to be grilled or broiled. Marinate food for 3 to 4 hours. Makes about ¾ cup sauce.

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
