SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

"How large will my social security benefit be when I retire?" This question is asked frequently, according to Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo Social Security District office.

Workers nearing retirement age are especially interested in the answer to this question, but it is equally important to all workers. Persons making plans for their retirement income need to know how much their social security benefits will be in deciding the amount of supplemental income they will need from other sources. Ellington pointed out that Congress intended for social security benefits to form only the base on which other retirement income could be built.

Listed below are two examples of monthly retirement benefits. A retired worker who has been earning an average of \$150 per month will receive \$73 per month benefit. His wife, at age 65, will receive an additional benefit of \$36.50.

Retired workers who have been earning an average of \$300 per month will receive a \$105 benefit. He, his wife and their minor child will receive \$210.

Outdoorsmen's Quiz-Column

Q. Can you catch more fish by adding scent to plastic worms? If so, how do you do it?

A. Scenting plastic worms isn't necessary, but many fishermen think that it helps. The easiest way I know is to remove the sardines from a sardine can and to soak the plastic worms overnight in the remaining sardine oil. Bait-up with the oiled plastic worms, and judge for yourself how well it works.

Q. Do fishermen have to spend so much money buying so many kinds of plugs? Isn't there one universal plug that will do the work of many — and save us money besides?

A. The nearest thing to a universal plug seems to be one called the "Diamond Jim". This is a jointed, sinking plug shaped like a bait-fish. The secret of it is that it wiggles at both ends, rather than only at the tail. It can be fished near the surface or as deep as desired. Thus, it covers water at almost any depth. If a plug looks and acts like a bait-fish, and can be fished at whatever depth the fish are, it should do the job. This "Diamond Jim" does this, and is effective on nearly all game-fish. Your dealer can show you the one-half and one-quarter ounce sizes, in a choice of nine color combinations.

Q. Where can I get a free booklet that tells how to catch fish when they don't seem to be biting?

A. When fish are not feeding, it's pretty hard to tempt them. However, there are tricks that help. Mail a postcard to me and ask for the free booklet "How To Catch Bigger Fish". This booklet will give many of the answers. Address: Joe Bates, Jr., 195 Algonquin Road, Des Plaines, Illinois.

Q. Is there any kind of a dye which will make live worms a brighter red in color?

A. Easiest way is to hammer a red brick into fine powder. Mix some of this powder into the dirt in which the worms are kept. They should be a bright red in a few days.

Q. I've heard of a plastic body lure that works both as a wobbler and as a jig. Can you tell me what it is?

A. Probably the lure to which you refer is the "Vervette", made by Fastex Division, Des Plaines, Illinois. This has a nickel head and a fish-shaped, translucent plastic body which can be bent or re-bent for any degree of curve. The "Vervette" acts as a wobbler when being retrieved. On a slack line, it will dive head-first, and thus works excellently as a jig.

Additional Work Might Increase Your Social Security

"Social Security benefits can be increased in some cases by additional work after a person first applies for benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo social security office announced today. "But certain requirements must be met before the benefit amount can be refigured."

If a person continues working during the year he first files for social security, he may request that his benefit amount be refigured to include the total earning for that year. There is no definite amount he must earn in the year, but it must increase the average earnings figured at the time of filing.

Another type of recomputation has a definite earnings requirement—earnings must exceed \$1200 in a calendar year after the year the person first filed for benefits. Even though the earnings exceed \$1200, the benefit cannot be increased unless the work since filing would raise his average earnings.

Ellington emphasizes that it is better to check with your social security office and be sure, rather than to guess whether work after retirement will increase your benefit amount. Write your local office and include the amounts of your earnings in each year beginning with the year of filing up to the present, as accurately as possible and the effect on your present check can then be determined.

Mrs. Ruff was driving north in a 1955 Pontiac stationwagon when it collided with a 1957 southbound auto driven by Hayley.

Leslie Ruff, who sustained broken thigh and shock, was taken to Cowper hospital in Big Spring. Mrs. Ruff, who suffered broken ribs, internal injuries and shock, and James Ruff were brought in to the local hospital by passersby.

The Ruffs were enroute to Colorado Springs from San Antonio. From there they were to leave for Germany to join Ruff who is stationed in Germany with the armed services.

Services for Janice are pending at Lowe Funeral Home. Ruff was due in Sterling City Thursday night, having been flown in from Germany to attend to his hurt family.

Sheriff Jim Cantrell and Highway Patrolman Dale Bryce investigated the accident.

David Durham will attend the sixth annual Range Camp sponsored by the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management at the Texas A&M College Adjunct at Junction next week. The camp starts Sunday evening, August 14, and will end Saturday, August 20. David is attending on the scholarship he won as a state winner in the 4-H Club Range management demonstration sponsored by the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Thirty-two farm and ranch boys from all over Texas will spend the week studying and observing good range management practices. They will study not only range management practices but livestock selection, plant identification, and soil and water conservation, as well. The campers will visit several ranches in the Junction area and the Sonora Experiment Station as well.

In addition to the practical aspects of the camp, there will be vesper services each evening under direction of a Junction minister. Organized athletics will also play a part in the camp. Each camper will also prepare a notebook covering the week's activities at camp with the outstanding campers being recognized at the final session on Saturday morning.

On Monday of this week, Fred Campbell of the Sonora Experiment Station staff, set up a flushing demonstration on range ewes on the Alvie Cole ranch. Fred had made arrangements for the demonstration earlier in the year.

The flushing demonstration, which is a cooperative effort of the Sonora branch of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Cotton-oil Mills, is an attempt to find just how much effect flushing does have on the lamb crop. Under the demonstration, similar groups of ewes are run under as near identical conditions on the range as

possible with the exception that one group receives three-quarter pound of cottonseed cake per day for twenty-one days before the rams are turned out and for 14 days after the rams are turned out. Twenty percent of the ewes in each group are weighed given a condition score based on fleshing and staple length of wool taken on the shoulders, this is done at the beginning of the demonstration and again at lamb marking time. At that time it will also be determined if the ewe has raised a lamb to marking time or not in addition to the other factors already mentioned. These factors will be used to determine if it is profitable or not to flush ewes before breeding.

At Alvie's 162 ewes are in the group which will be flushed and 399 in the control, or not flushed, group. This was based on the carrying capacities of the pastures being used. Both groups of ewes are three year old ewes in good condition with a good staple length at this time. If winter conditions make it necessary to feed, both groups will be fed as all conditions must be as near the same as possible with the exception of the thirty-five day feeding period when the fed group will receive a total of twenty-five pounds of cottonseed cake per ewe. The cake is furnished for this operation by the cotton-oil mills of the state. Fourteen of the demonstrations are under study in the sheep raising are of the state at present.

Reynolds Lee Foster returned Sunday from the meeting of the State 4-H Council held at Kilgore Junior College. Lee reports that he enjoyed the trip and the proceedings very much last week. Present for the meeting were 29 boys and girls representing the state's 4-H Clubs. Twelve boys and twelve girls represented the twelve Extension Service districts while five boys and girls were the executive committee of the council.

**OUTDOOR COOKING
MADE EASY**

A metal-bodied wheel-barrow can double as a practical outdoor grille which can be wheeled anywhere. Merely put a few inches of sand or gravel in the body and build the hardwood or charcoal fire on this insulated base. A few bricks form an adjustable support for the cooking grid, which can be a wire tray from a stove or ice-box.

Let's use this wheel-barrow grille to enjoy a pork-chop barbecue — a favorite meal that glorifies pork-chops with an unusually delectable flavor. Canned sweet potatoes are delicious with this tasty meal, and so are caramelized onions. Let's do this the easy way, using paper plates and cups, and having no pots and pans to bother with!



Peel the sweet potatoes and slice them the long way, half an inch thick. Put them back together again and with butter spread between the slices. Place each potato in a square of doubled foil and pour over each a tablespoonful of honey, maple syrup, or a little brown sugar, plus a dash of cinnamon. Roll each in the foil, twisting the ends so they can be used as handles.

Next, peel the onions and cut each in half, crossways. Put each onion back together again with some butter, salt and pepper between the slices. Wrap each securely in foil, twisting the foil at the top, where the sprout of the onion would be.

Garlic bread goes well, too. Mash half a peeled and finely chopped garlic bean into half a stick of salted butter (or use garlic salt and butter). Slice a loaf of French or Italian bread almost to the bottom and spread the garlic butter between the slices. Wrap this securely in foil.

There are many ways of making barbecue sauce. Mine (for pork-chops, hamburgers or chicken) is this: Melt together

a quarter portion each of French dressing (oil, vinegar and condiments), brown sugar, butter or margarine, and catsup mixed with A-1 or Worcestershire Sauce. Let it simmer lightly, and it's ready.

Put the potatoes and onions very near the coals or fire about an hour ahead of meal time. Turn them with tongs once in a while. Keep them very hot, without burning. While the vegetables are cooking, let's have some delicious hot drinks — the easy way. We merely need to boil some water!

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board: providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

Social Security Should Be Paid on Household Workers

Many housewives in this area may be depriving their household workers of social security protection according to a joint statement issued by S. Baker Mallett, Administrative Officer of the San Angelo Internal Revenue office and Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the Social Security district office.

"Workers' earnings are credited to their social security account from reports of their employers," Mr. Mallett said, "faithfully report these earnings year after year." Some household employers who only recently hired household help may not realize their responsibility, and their employees, in particular, should make sure they are protected. The next quarterly report is due by July 31.

"Postcard forms for checking you own account with social security are available at all social security offices and should be used at least every three years by all workers, added Ellington.

If statements returned by social security show that your earnings are not posted to your record, steps will be taken to correct the omission and make sure that your employers report promptly and properly.

"Most people need many years of social security credit to qualify for benefits," Ellington said, adding, "It's your social security; make sure you are protected."

REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All devisions concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.

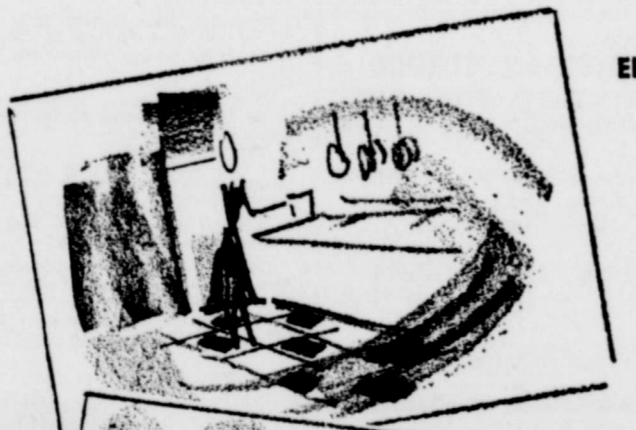

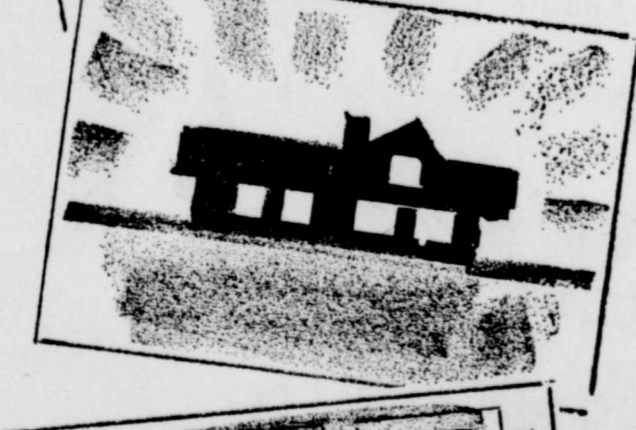

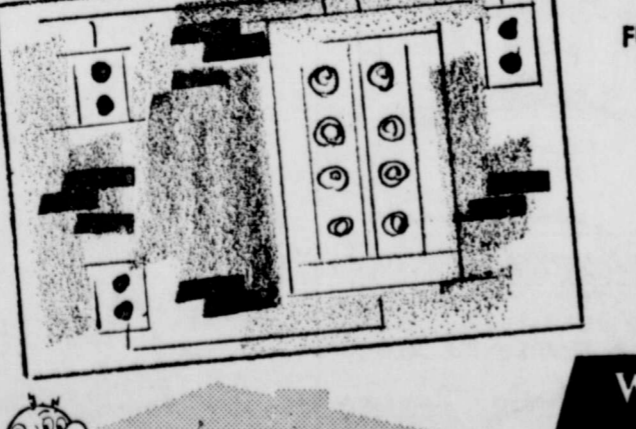

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6, 7, and 8, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows: "Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 5(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Wichita County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 7. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 5(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District subject to district taxation.

"Section 8. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District to be co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas.

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct

No. 4 of Comanche County.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the District may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities; but the District shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the District to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair, renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said seventy-five cent (75c) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Comanche to render financial aid to that District by paying a portion of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the District (whether assumed or created by the District) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the County but without the County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the County in the manner and to the extent heretofore provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County.

"(c) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Section 23 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the shortest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 6th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; providing, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of in-

terest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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WANTED BY THE FBI



JOSEPH CORBETT, JR.

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyl-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a C-shaped scar on his right thumb.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

Convicted of second-degree murder, he is considered armed and dangerous. Anyone having information concerning him should immediately notify the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which can be found on the first page of local telephone directories. **APR 551206-1**

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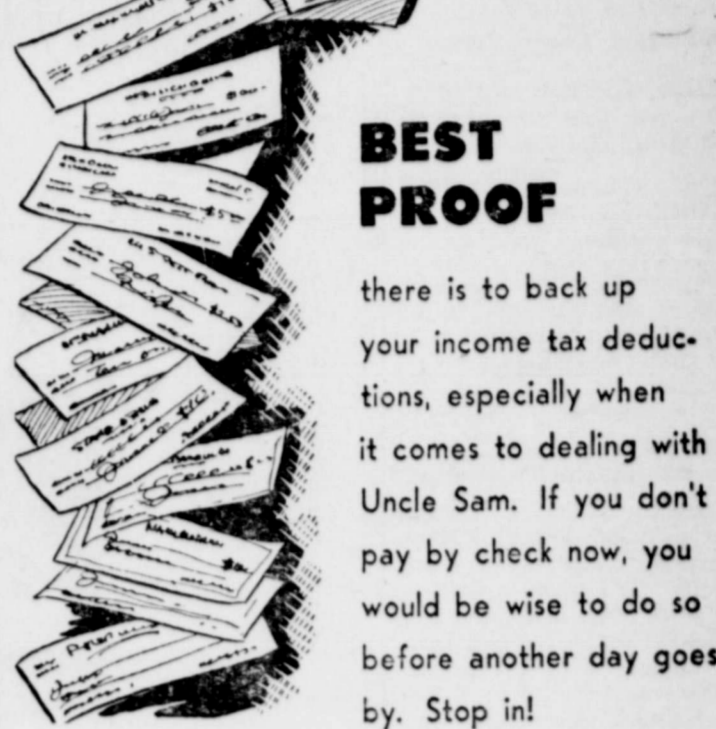

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 49-b proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum. "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of said votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

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Widows Get Full Social Security Benefits at Age 62, Says Ellington

"Widows should apply for social security benefits as soon as they are 62", Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo District Office advises. "It would be even better if they applied a month or two before they are 62. Of course no one should delay, but widows in particular should be careful to apply for benefits promptly."

A woman's benefit based on her own account, or on the account of a living husband is reduced if she applies before age 65, but a widow's benefit is not reduced and the full amount is paid at age 62.

"So, if you are a widow", Ellington explained, "And we once paid you a lump-sum or monthly benefits, you should apply again when you are 62. In fact, you can speed your first check by applying a month or so before."

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
