## High School Wins District Track

### To Regional This Week-End

Sterling City followed the lead of Jerry Payne and Jack Asbill to a run-away of the District 20-B track title in San Angelo Stadium last Saturday romping to 160 points. Forsan was second with 93 and 1-3 points; Garden City came in third with 84 1-3.

Payne was the big point man of the meet with 38 and Asbill was second with 35.

Sterling elementary school placed third in the meet with Sands first and Garden City second. Sands had 133½ points, Garden City 123 and Sterling City 113. Forsan racked up 43½ and Water Valley 1.

Three new records fell in the meet. Walker Fields of Forsan vaulted 10 feet to erase the 9-2 record in the pole vault. In the 880 yard run, Payne made two laps of the track in 2:17.7, erasing the mark of 2:18.9. In the 220 yard dash, Micky Jones of Water Valley set a new mark of 23.7. The old record was 24.8.

## Two 100% Papers in District Literary Meet

J. R. Dillard, principal of the Sterling Elementary or Grade School here, said that there were two one hundred percent perfect papers in the spelling events of the district interscholastic league earlier this month. The two students who had 100% perfect papers were spellers in the fifth and sixth grade spelling contests. They are Danna West of Garden City and Collin Douthit of Sterling City. The papers of the two were graded 100% by the judges here. Then the 100% papers were sent to Austin headquarters (a rule of the league) and graded there once more. Graders of the spelling here were Mrs. John Gibbs and Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Conner, said Dillard.

Last week the students each got letters of commendation and a citation from the state office of the league citing them for having 100% perfect papers.

Dillard said he was proud of the local schools, both the high school and elementary, in winning the district league literary events. He said he thought the individual teachers and the students, as well as the parents, all deserved to be commended for helping or having a part in the local school winning the meets.

## Attend Ceremony MEDAL GIVEN MAN FOR SAVING C.L. KING'S LIFE

Master Sgt. Frank Towles, of Del Rio was awarded a medal last Friday afternoon in a ceremony at Laughlin Air Force Base, Del Rio, for his part in saving C. L. King's life last August 13 near Sonora. The commanding officer of the base pinned the medal on Sgt. Towles, remarking that it was the highest honor or medal that the Army could award during peace time.

Mr. and Mrs. King attended the ceremony at Laughlin.

Sgt. Towles has since retired from the Air Forces and makes his home in Del Rio.

On August 13, 1960, Mr. King, a Sterling man, crashed his truck into the 17-mile bridge between Sonora and Del Rio. His truck caught fire and he was all bunched up in the crash, getting a broken leg among other injuries. He managed to crawl out of the overturned truck, but was still very near to the blazing and dangerous truck. A number of people had stopped or gathered to look at the wreck but no one was getting close enough to pull King out of danger, it seems. This sergeant drove up and ran in and pulled him away from the fast spreading fire and got him into his own car and took him to the hospital in Sonora 17 miles away. He was credited with saving King's life, as a furious explosion wrecked the burning truck quickly after Towle had pulled him to safety.

King was later flown to the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston for treatment of his burns and he still has some more work to be done on his right hand.

In a few days Sterling County will receive the Certificate.

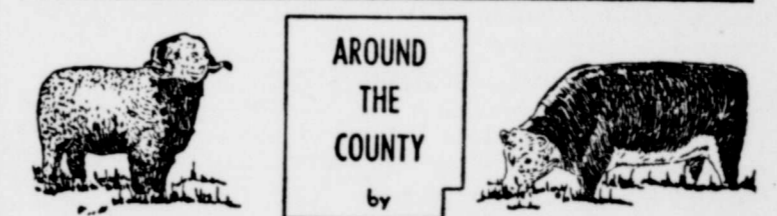

AROUND THE COUNTY by

ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

Two 4-H Club teams from Sterling County will compete in the district 7 elimination contests at San Angelo College Saturday, April 22. The contests will be held on the campus of the college or on the college farm, depending on the type contest. Teams from the 22 counties in Extension District 7 will be competing.

A senior range judging team composed of Reynolds Lee Foster, James Morgan and Tommy Foster will compete for the right to represent the District at the state 4-H contests at College Station in June. The two top teams from each of the 12 Extension Districts will be eligible for the State Contests.

David Foster, Jack Clark, and Larry Stewart will make up the Junior Range judging team. They are not eligible to compete in the state contests but are receiving training that will help them when they do become eligible.

Two field days are scheduled for Experiment Stations in this area in the next couple of weeks. The annual Sonora Station Field Day and Ram Progeny Test is Wednesday, April 26. Results of the ram progeny test which has been under way there for several months will be announced. In addition, there will be results on brush and weed control work in this area, range management practices, and a tour of the station.

On Monday, May 1, a field day will be held at the Barnhart Station. The Barnhart Station is strictly a range station.

Their program on the first includes results of research

work on the chemical control of bitterweed, perennial broom weed, prickly pear, and mesquite. They will also demonstrate spraying equipment and tour the station's pastures.

Everyone in the area is invited and urged to attend either or both of these field days. They have a good program lined up and it should prove interesting to any rancher.

Several entry blanks applications for the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders' Association Wool Show at Brownwood on May 1 have been received. The wool show is held in connection with the association's sale each year. Dates for the sale this year are May 16-19. Entries in the wool show are due on May 1. Wool will be judged on Wednesday, May 17 at 1:00 p.m. Classes in the show include Rambouillet, Delaine, dual purpose, medium wool, and commercial or range wool.

Eddie Braswell, ASC office manager, reports that some people have not turned in their wool and lamb receipts papers to the ASC office. In order to qualify for payment under the 1960 payment program, these papers must be filed in Eddie's office by May 1. This is also the date that all applications must be signed in the office.

If you have not already turned in your papers, or signed your application, go by and do it before May 1.

The County ASC committee has also set May 1 as the sign-up date for application for ACP practices. This includes mesquite control and other work ordinarily done in the next few months.

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**INTRODUCTION OF PLAINS INDIANS**  
 By Members of 7th Grade History Club

No other primitive people have stirred the interest of the civilized people as have the North American Indians of the Great Plains. For thousands of years before the first European explorers appeared on the grasslands between the Mississippi River and the Rocky Mountains, the Indians of this region boldly hunted the buffalo on foot. Acquisition of the European horse transformed these plodding footmen into some of the most daring and skillful horsemen in the world. They became more efficient as big game hunters, more aggressive and fearsome warriors. The Indian Wars of the Plains provide some of the bitterest battles and some of the most dramatic action in the history of warfare.

The members of the Seventh Grade History Club bring you a report of the Plains Indians of Texas. These are: Comanche, Apache, Kiowa, Ute, Basket-Makers. The Comanche, Kiowa and Apache were prominent settlers in Sterling County and the surrounding territory.

**THE KIOWA INDIANS**

On the southern plains no more war-like tribe existed than the Kiowa. Of all the Kiowa chiefs none was more warlike than White Bear, sometimes known as Satanta. Until his death, Satanta never ceased fighting the white invaders of the Kiowa territory.

The Kiowa Indians were a buffalo-hunting tribe of the Southwestern Plains. The Kiowa and their allies, the Comanche, raided the Texas ranches. They have probably killed more whites than any other Indian tribe. For some sixty years (1832-1892) the Kiowa kept a record of their daring deeds on painted buffalo skins. The bright-colored pictures of horses and teepees showed the yearly celebration of the great sun dance; the coming of the deadly small pox, cholera, and measles; and the making of a treaty with the whites.

The Kiowas dressed in buck skin and wore their hair in a knot with several feathers in it, they wore bright colored earrings and necklaces.

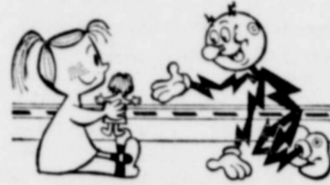

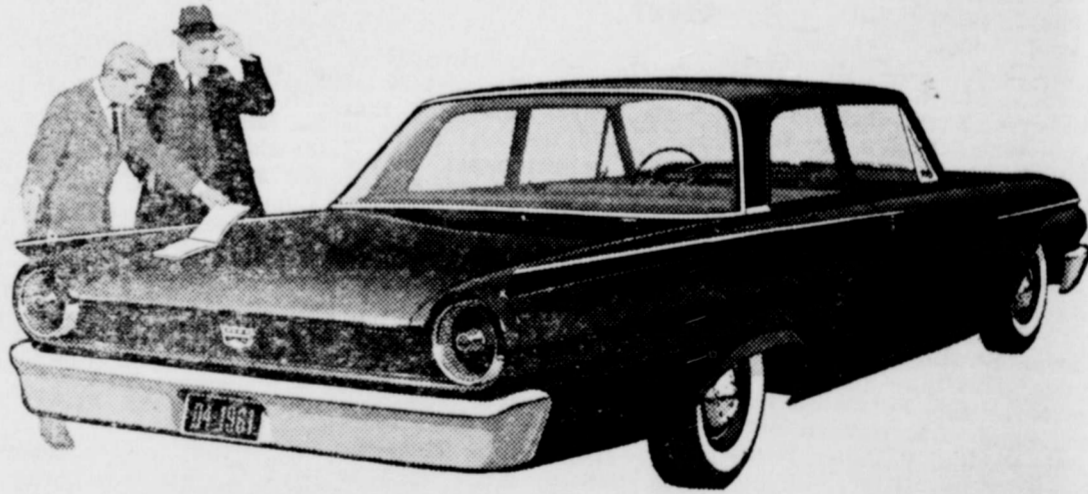

**Coconut Honey Frosting**  
 2 egg whites; 1 1/2 cups sugar;  
 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/4 cup water;  
 2 tablespoons light corn syrup;  
 2 tablespoons honey; 1/2 tea-  
 spoon vanilla; 1/4 cup Angel  
 Flake Coconut.

Combine egg whites, sugar,  
 salt, water, corn syrup, and  
 honey in top of double boiler.  
 Beat 1 minute until thoroughly  
 mixed. Cook over rapidly boiling  
 water, beating constantly with  
 sturdy egg beater (or at high  
 speed of electric beater) 7 min-  
 utes. Remove from boiling  
 water. Add vanilla and beat 1  
 minute or until thick enough to  
 spread. Frost cake and sprinkle

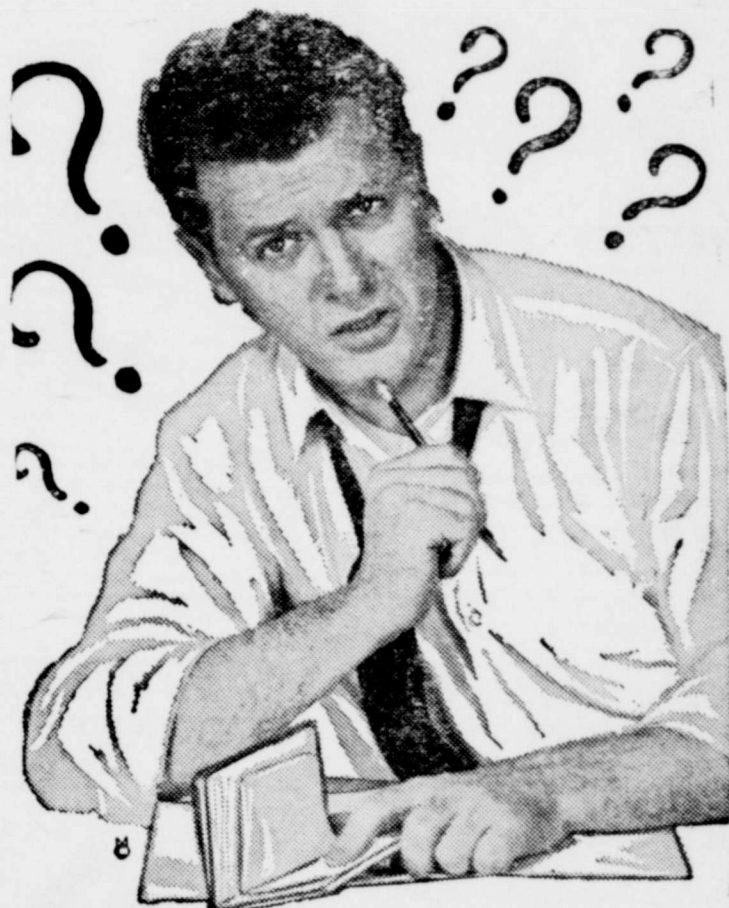

### WASHINGTON LETTER By Congressman Fosher

With both House and Senate inactive the past week, New Frontier legislation is on tap for this week and the tempo is due to be stepped up in the weeks immediately ahead. The Senate has tackled the minimum wage bill, and a conference committee of both House and Senate members will work out a compromise. Then it will be up to each body to accept or disapprove the version reported.

The Russians have made a big to-do about their spaceman who spun around the earth a couple of times at 17,000 miles per hour. It was indeed a great and spectacular achievement, but its significance should be considered in proper perspective. Russia is breaking all travel records. One Communist went into orbit—and 3 million others got

to through West Germany!

The simple fact is that the Soviets started their missile program six or eight years before we did. Practically nothing was done in that field during the Truman administration. The gap is now practically closed, and we are now ahead of them in some areas of missile development.

As Kennedy pointed out, the Commies under dictatorship can concentrate their energies, money and resources behind anything, to the neglect of everything else—if they choose. Thus, they will spend billions to achieve a "first" for propaganda use, while remaining woefully unconcerned about low standards of living, jammed up housing conditions and shortages of every description.

In 1957 the Soviets fired their first sputnik into orbit, a first. They practically broke their necks to be "first." But

today, now that the dust has settled, what do we have? The Commies have one sputnik in orbit today—we have 22. We have scientific purposes to achieve, and we proceed in an orderly pace. But the Soviets, goaded by a basic inferiority complex, feel they have to be "first" at any cost to prove they are not inferior after all.

Anyhow, we have plenty of time to get our astronauts into space, and contribute many times in the future to man's conquest of the unknown. But we must move firmly and speedily, because there can be military as well as scientific meaning to this penetration of space business.

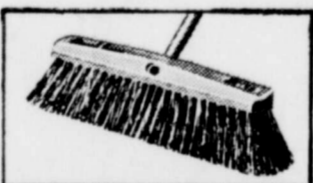
