Know the Danger Signals

My cancer was detected because I had an irritating pain in the chest. I suspected it might be heart trouble. I went to my physician. X-rays were taken. A shadow high in the left chest showed up on the x-ray films. It turned out to be lung cancer.

If I had lived with my pain longer, the cancer would have spread more. So I tell those who ask advice, "Always be alert to Cancer's Seven Danger Signals."

The American Cancer Society has designated seven of these signals for the most common forms of cancer. They are: unusual bleeding or discharge; a lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere; a sore that does not heal; change in bowel or bladder habits; hoarseness or cough; indigestion or difficulty in swallowing; change in a wart or mole.

If you have one of these signals for more than two weeks, go to your doctor at once. I am thankful that I went to my doctor in a hurry.

The certificate designating Sterling County as a Modified-Certified Brucellosis free area has been received. This certificate clears the county with the modified-certified free area designation until March 14, 1964 after which time a spot check will be necessary. In this respect, the program becomes similar to the tuberculosis certification program in that spot checks of a percentage of the herds must be made after three years.

With the granting of this certificate by the State and the United States Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service, stockmen can ship cattle to any state with fewer regulations on the health certificates needed.

The 4-H Club junior range judging team made up of David Foster, Jack Clark, and Larry Stewart placed third in the junior division of the Crockett County Invitational Contest Tuesday at the Barnhart Experiment Station. Each of the boys received third place ribbons and the team received a plaque to display in the county agent's office.

The senior team placed 6th in their division. Team members were Reynolds Lee Foster, David Durham, James Morgan and Tommy Foster. These boys missed ribbons and a plaque by two points since the fifth place team scored just two more points than the sixth place team and the fourth place team scored six more points than the sixth place team in a very close contest.

Reynolds Lee was high point individual of the contest scoring 369 points out of a possible 400. Two boys, one from Sutton County and one from Crockett County tied for second with 366. The high individuals received rosettes for their awards.

Lee missed three plants out of the 40 they were required to identify. One of these was a grass of which we have no mount and which does not grow in this area so he was not familiar with the plant.

All seven of the boys did well in a contest where the competition is always stiff. They have improved in each contest and done just a little better. Saturday, they will enter the San Angelo College Soil Conservation District contest.

Time is fast running out for those ranchers who had planned to spray mesquite this year. The weather has been most uncooperative with both March and April being dry and windy. Then, too, Eddie Braswell, ASC office manager, says that more than enough people signed up on Monday to use all the money available this spring for such practices.

Unless it rains this week, and it must be a good soaking

rain, it is not going to be advisable to spray mesquite this year. There is not enough moisture available in the surface soil to support growth and the subsoil is beginning to dry also. By the time mesquite should be sprayed, the last week of May or early June, chances are that it will be in pretty bad shape for spraying. The trees will be suffering from a shortage of moisture, be tough, and the spraying will be ineffective.

If you have already purchased the 2.4.5-T for spraying, just leave it in the barrel or cans. It will store all right and be good for next year when perhaps the elements will be more cooperative. If you do have a good soaking rain this week, it would be possible to get a fairly good kill thus justifying the spraying.

A. L. Merrell, 80, Buried Here Wednesday

Albert Lee Merrell, 80, a retired Sterling County ranchman, was buried here at the City Cemetery Wednesday afternoon. He had died at his home in Water Valey Monday. He had been in bad health for about two years and had been a patient in the local hospital for about a month before being released last week.

Services were held here at the first Baptist Church and burial followed in the City Cemetery. Lowe Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Mr. Merrell was born Nov. 24, 1880, in Hope, Ark. He married the former Miss Tennie Johnson, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Johnson of Colorado City, March 23, 1910 at Loraine. They made the trip from Colorado City to Loraine by horse and buggy for the wedding.

Mr. Merrell moved to Sterling City in 1911, where he maintained his home until moving to Water Valley in 1937. He was a member of the Baptist Church here while he resided here.

In 1958, Mr. Merrell was presented a 50-year award pin and a lifetime membership in the Sterling City Masonic Lodge, AFAM No. 728. He had been an active Mason more than 60 years. Masonic graveside rites were held at the services.

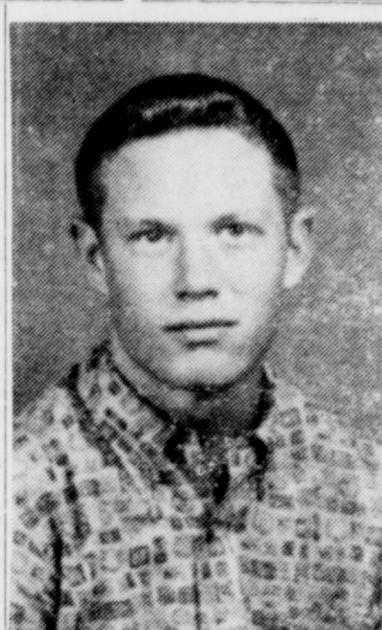
New Phone Number at Sheriff's Office

Unused Bibles Useless

Party Pretty

HERE'S a delicious party pie, made with strawberry chiffon pie filling mix and sliced strawberries. It is so easy to prepare that you will hardly believe it. Why? It's the chiffon mix, of course, which requires no cooking and is made in a matter of minutes.

Strawberry Party Pie
1 package strawberry chiffon pie filling mix; 1/2 cup boiling water; 1/2 cup drained strawberry juice, cold; 2 to 4 tablespoons sugar; 1 package (10 ounces) quick-frozen sliced strawberries, thawed and drained; 1 baked 9-inch pastry shell.

Place contents of package in a large deep mixing bowl. Add boiling water and mix thoroughly. Add drained strawberry juice. Then beat vigorously with a rotary beater, or at highest speed of electric mixer, until mixture is very foamy—(takes about 1 minute). Add sugar and beat until filling stands in peaks—(takes 1 to 3 minutes). Fold in drained strawberries. Pour into cooled baked 9-inch pastry shell. Chill until set about 2 hours.

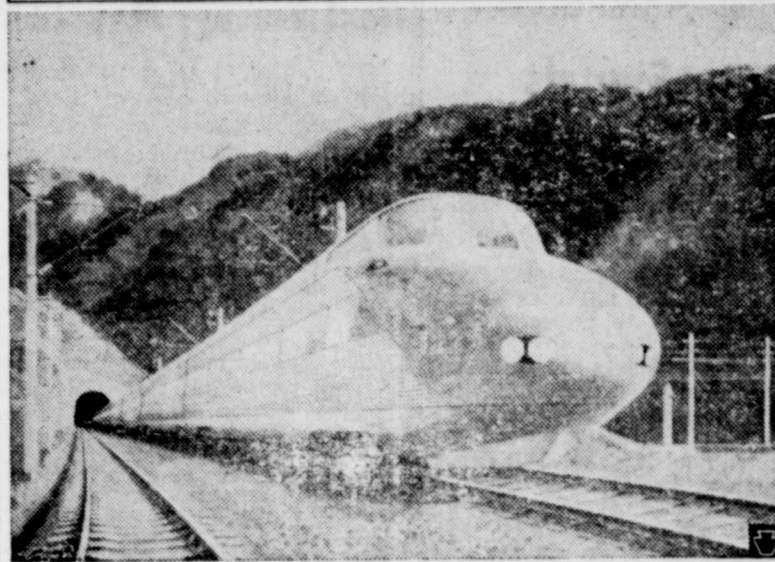

Plan World's Fastest Streamliner



Japan Information

This is an artist's conception of a new electric streamliner of the Japanese National Railways for the Tokyo-Osaka run. Scheduled for completion in 1964, the new streamliner will cut the running time from the present seven hours to three. There will be no grade crossings throughout its 310 miles of tracks.

The streamliner will run on standard gauge tracks at a maximum speed of 155 m.p.h. and at an average speed of 106 m.p.h. It will operate on the Tokaido Line which passes through heavily populated and industrialized cities.

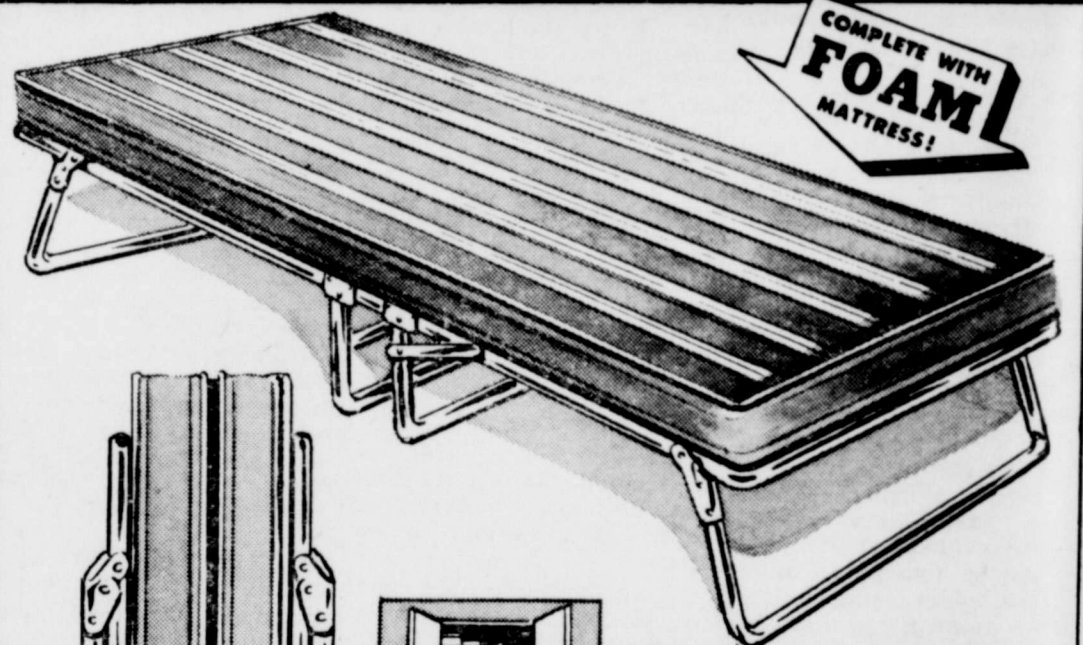

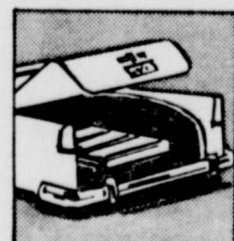
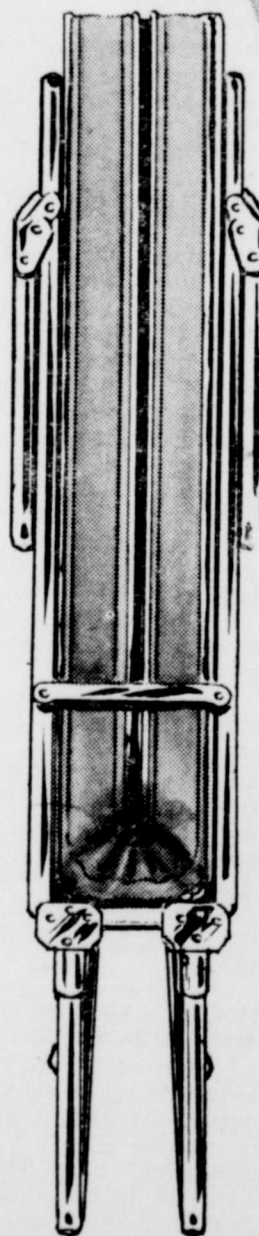

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IT'S A HONEY . . . COCONUT PIE!

Here's a "quickie" that's really delicious! Prepared in two easy steps, this dessert combines the popular flavors of flaked coconut and honey. For interesting variations, and easy preparation, spoon the filling into a graham cracker crust or a vanilla cookie crumb crust. And, for a special holiday or birthday party, tint some of the coconut to match your general color plan for the table and use as a topping.

Honey-Coconut Chiffon Pie
 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 1 cup water
 1/2 cup honey
 1 package (3 ounces) lemon or lime-flavored gelatin
 3 tablespoons lemon juice
 1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
 3 egg whites
 Dash of salt
 1/2 cup Baker's Angel Flake Coconut
Quick Coconut Crust
 Combine egg yolks, water, and 1/4 cup of the honey in top of double boiler; mix well. Cook over boiling water 5 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved.

Add lemon juice and rind. Chill until slightly thickened.
 Combine egg whites, salt, and remaining 1/4 cup honey and beat with egg beater until mixture will stand in stiff peaks. Fold in gelatin mixture. Add 1/2 cup of the coconut. Spoon into cold pie shell. Sprinkle with remaining coconut. Chill until firm.

Quick Coconut Crust
 1/4 cup butter, melted
 2 cups flaked coconut
 Combine butter and coconut. Press evenly into an ungreased 8- or 9-inch pie pan. Bake in slow oven (300° F.) for 30 to 35 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool.

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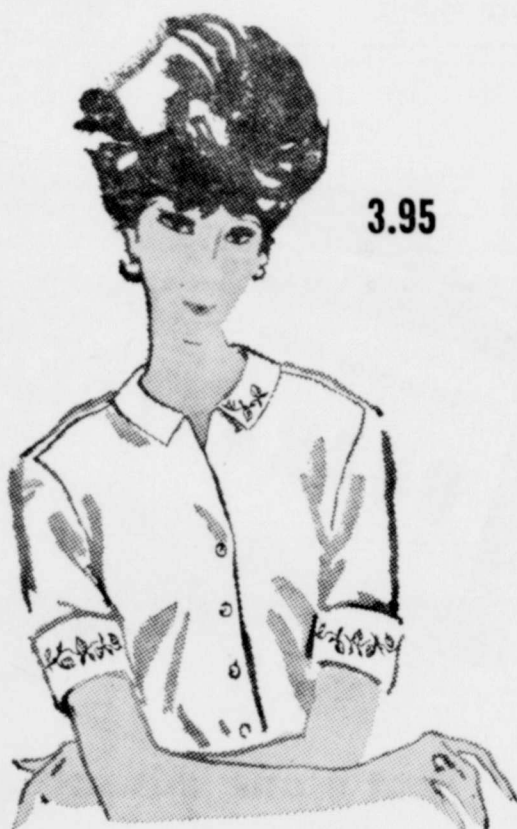

**FFA Team in Judging
Contest at Tech**

The Sterling FFA Livestock Judging team, composed of Don McDonald, Freddie Fields, and Billy Bauer competed in the contests held at Texas Tech, Lubbock, last Saturday, April 29.

There were 124 teams entered in the judging contest; all classes of schools compete, including 4A. Sterling team was third high in judging beef cattle and fifth high in the entire contest.

In judging hogs, Billy scored 131, Don 123 and Freddie 122. In sheep Freddie scored 116, Don 110 and Billy 101. In cattle, Billy scored 133, Freddie 130 and Don 120. In the commercial grading Freddie scored 88, Don 81 and Billy 65. In the overall individual scores, Freddie scored 456, Don 434 and Billy 430.

The team won a fifth place banner in the overall contest, and a third place banner in Area II. Eight teams from each of the ten areas in Texas qualified for the state judging contest, so the Sterling team will judge there on Saturday, May 6 at College Station.

The winner of the state judging contest will represent Texas in the National Livestock Judging Contest, held in conjunction each year with the National FFA Convention at Kansas City, Mo.

Last Friday the local team and sponsor Fred Igo went on the judging trip. The group visited a hog farm and did some workouts on hogs. Then they went to the Lewter Feed Yards near Lubbock. There they have about 18,000 head of cattle on feed and their feeding methods and equipment is surely something to see. While at Lewter's, the team looked at various pens of cattle and had some practice in commercial grading.

The contest at Tech consisted of one class of market barrows, with a set of questions; one class of Duroc gilts, one class of market lambs, with questions, one class of Rambouillet ewes, one class of market steers with questions, one class of Angus cows, one class of five slaughter steers to give the market grades, such as prime, choice, good, etc., and one class of feeder steers to give the market grades such as fancy, choice, good, etc. In the commercial grading, the contestants must give a high and low division for each market grade, low fancy, high choice, etc.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By Congressman O.C. Fisher

A brand new program, calling for an expenditure of \$400 million, has been approved in Congress and is due to be okayed at the White House. It will be spent in "depressed areas" in the form of grants and loans to communities where unemployment persists.

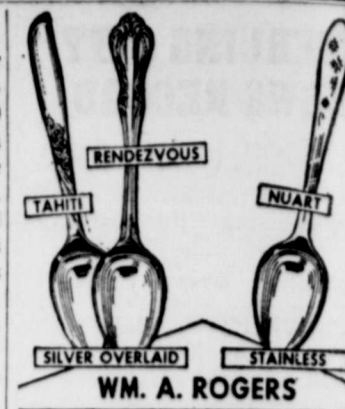
A bad feature of the bill was added in the Senate. Instead of allowing the Congress to examine the program each year and then appropriate any funds that may appear to be justified, the bill as approved permits "back door" spending—that is, by debt management in the Treasury Department. The money each year will be made available without any action of the Congress.

I voted against the bill in its entirety for several reasons. First, because it begins a brand new government hand-out program to communities which a government agency decides should get it, and thus add a brand new type of Federal expenditure for years to come. And the "back door" concept is both unsound and dangerous, as I see it, because it takes away from the Congress the responsibility or doing the appropriating, and it deprives the Congress of a chance to review and appraise the program, from year to year.
