AROUND THE COUNTY

The 4-H Club range judging teams took part in the San Angelo College—Soil Conservation Districts range judging contest and wool and mohair contest at San Angelo College Saturday. This has become an annual contest sponsored by the three soil conservation districts around San Angelo, the North Concho district which is Sterling County, the Concho district, and the Eldorado-Divide district.

The senior team placed first in the contest and the junior team placed fourth in the same group since there were no senior and junior divisions in this contest. Senior team members were Reynolds Lee Foster, David Durham, James Morgan and Tommy Foster. Larry Stewart, David Foster and Jack Clark made up the junior team.

The boys brought home a number of individual ribbons as well as a plaque for the 1st place team. Reynolds Lee was high individual of the contest followed by David Durham in fourth, James Morgan fifth, Larry Stewart sixth, David Foster ninth and Jack Clark tenth. In plant identification, Lee was second and David Durham tied Keith Mitchell of Ozona FFA for third Lee was first in range classification and James was third. On the for plot placings Lee was first, David Durham second and David Foster third.

In the wool and mohair judging, the teams placed fifth and sixth even though they had no previous training in this field. Lee was tenth high individual in this contest.

The time for spraying pecans for the pecan nut casebearer is getting close. Ordinarily, the pest is found in this county around the 20th of May. The time usually depends on the weather and the hot days and cool nights now may have a lot to do with the time the pest emerges and begins work on the tiny nuts.

We will watch trees in town and around the county and try to keep everyone posted as to the proper time to spray. Results in the past at experimental set-ups have shown that it is possible by spraying at the proper time to save as much as 75% of the nuts that might have been lost.

The casebearer makes its appearance as a tiny greenish-white egg on the blossom end of the tiny nuts. The time to spray is when the eggs are found as they hatch in three to five days. Once the worm has entered the nut, it is impossible to control them.

Recommendations call for the use of three pounds of 25% wettable Malathion per 100 gallons of water, or three pounds of 50% wettable DDT or 5 pounds of 40% wettable toxaphene to 100 gallons of water. If DDT is used, 6 lbs. of wettable sulfur should be added to control honeydew or mites. It is also a good idea in this area to add 2 pounds of 36% zinc sulfate to the spray for control of rosette.

May 16th through 19th are the dates for the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association sale and wool show at Brownwood. The sale and show will be held in the Brown County Livestock Barns at Brownwood. Breeders from Sterling County who will sell in the sale are William and Bubba Foster, Suffolks, and L. F. and Clinton Hodges, Rambouillet.

Events are scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. All mutton breeds, Suffolk, Hampshire, Southdown, and Shropshire sheep—must be in the barn

Breeds which will be sold in the sale are Suffolk, Hampshire, Southdown, Shropshire and Cheviot sheep. These breeds of sheep will enter the ring on Thursday, May 18. Buyers will have a group of better than six hundred registered sheep from which to make their choice.

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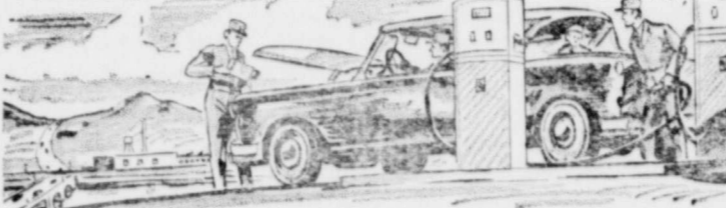

Avocado Sea Food Salad

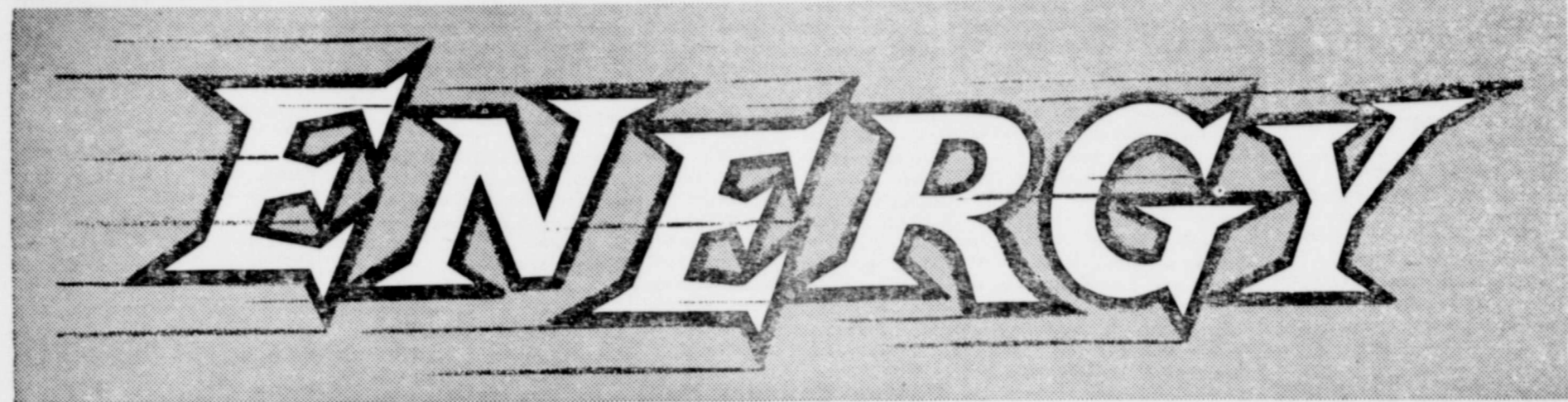

*Or use 2 cups canned shrimp or crayfish, drained and cut in small pieces, or 2 cups canned lobster, drained and flaked.

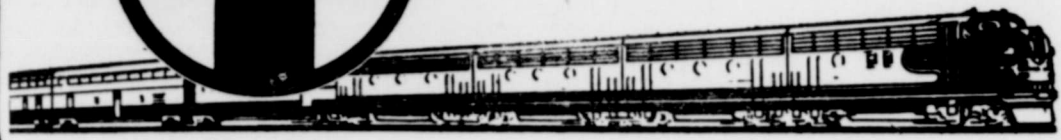

If I had lived with my pain longer, the cancer would have spread more. So I tell those who ask advice, "Always be alert to Cancer's Seven Danger Signals."

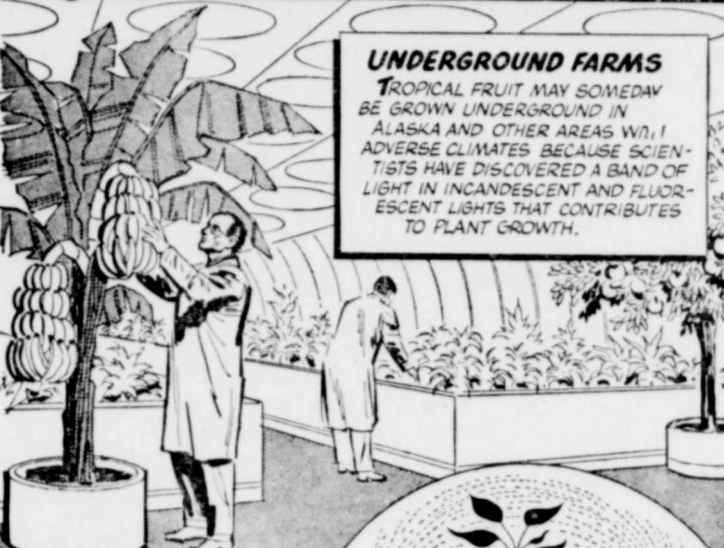
The American Cancer Society has designated seven of these signals for the most common forms of cancer. They are: unusual bleeding or discharge; a lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere; a sore that does not heal; change in bowel or bladder habits; hoarseness or cough; indigestion or difficulty in swallowing; change in a wart or mole.

If you have one of these signals for more than two weeks, go to your doctor at once. I am thankful that I went to my doctor in a hurry.

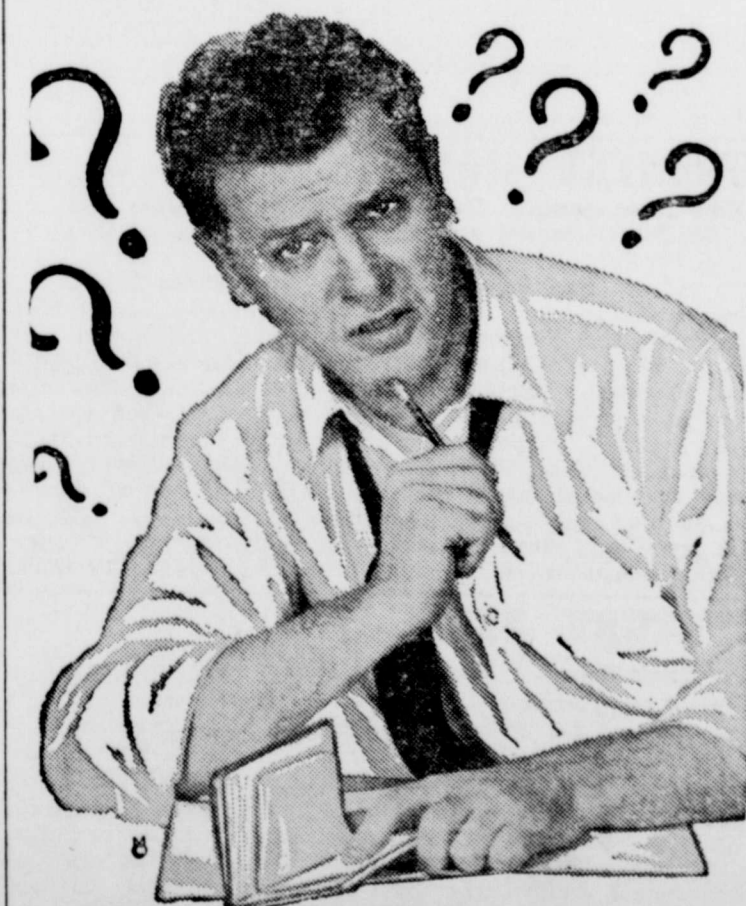

Rabies Shots for Pets Here Wednesday

Wednesday, May 17 between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 5:30 p.m., has been set as the date and time for the spring rabies shot clinic, according to Arthur Barlemann, county agent. Dr. Percy R. Turner of Water Valley, veterinarian, will be at the usual place, west of the courthouse, at that time to give pets their shots for prevention of rabies.

All pets that had shots last May, those pets which are more than six months old now, and those pets that had shots in the early winter of 1959 when the cow testing—rabies shots tour was carried on, should have their shots renewed at this time. The dogs and cats that were given the shots on the tour in the winter of 1959 have been pretty well protected since the shots will usually hold good a little over a year. But they should be renewed now by bringing the animals in next Wednesday. The hot summer could bring on more varmints especially since the dry weather may cut down on their food supply forcing them to go to centers of population for food.

Dr. Turner will make the usual charge for the shots—\$2.50. You will receive a tag and receipt as proof of vaccination for the animal should it ever be necessary.

You are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to protect your pets and your family from rabies. Since Sterling County has been certified as a brucellosis-free area, the cow-testing rabies shot tour will not be held in the fall and those animals should be brought to town if at all possible for the shots. 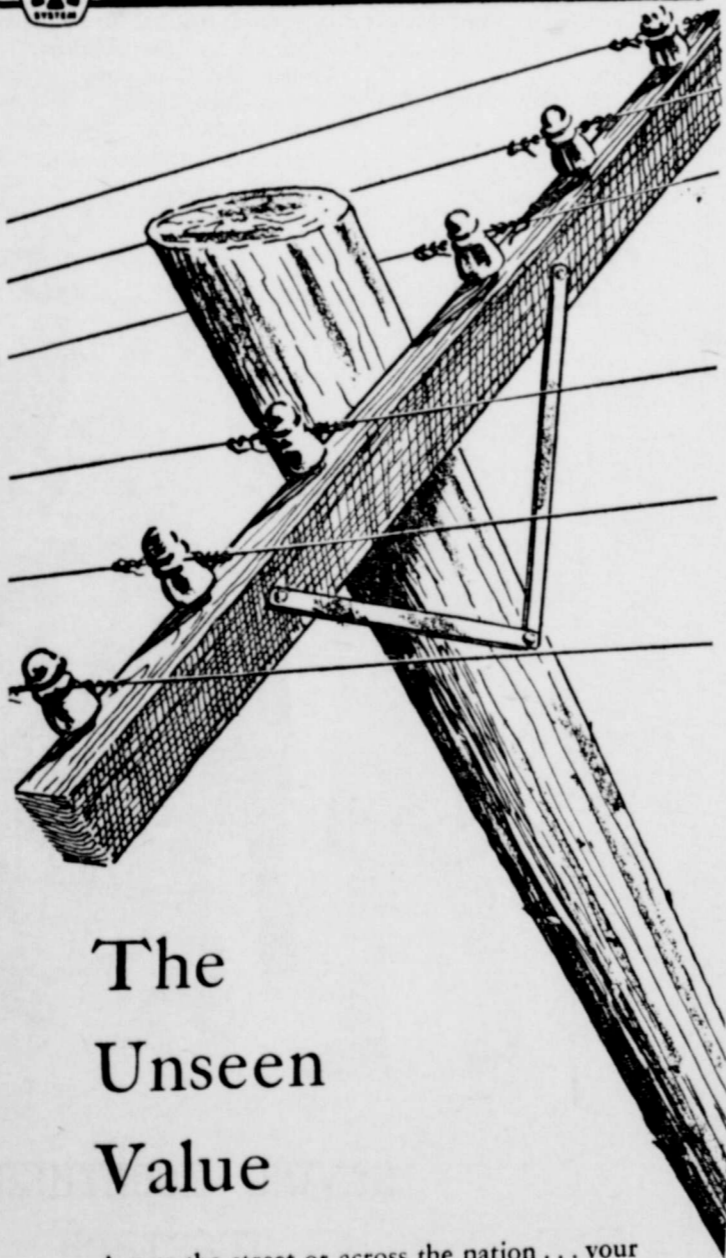

GOOD NEWS FOR POTATO LOVERS!



By SUE TAYLOR

Potato lovers rejoice! The winter potato crop is abundant and abundance means good buys.

Ironically, this popular vegetable was discovered by happenstance. The potato is a native of the Americas and kissin' cousin to such other vegetables as tomatoes, sweet peppers, and eggplant. During a Spanish expedition to discover the mythical and gold-laden land of El Dorado, a conquistador found natives of Colombia cultivating and eating potatoes. Even if the conquistador's search for treasures had been successful, the value of his gems and gold would be inconsequential compared with the value of the potato to the peoples of the world down through the centuries.

Americans eat almost 100 pounds of potatoes each year. Many households have potatoes at least once a day, some at every meal. Such extensive use soon runs the gamut of recipes even for the versatile potato. Combined with one of its kissin' cousins, the tomato, Florida's new potatoes take on a different twist.

New Potato and Tomato Pan Fry

- 2 pounds new potatoes, peeled and sliced
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped finely
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 6 slices bacon, diced
- 3 tomatoes, cubed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

- 1 teaspoon chopped fresh basil or 1/4 teaspoon dried
- 1 teaspoon parsley flakes

Brown onion and garlic in oil in a large, heavy frying pan. Add bacon and sliced potatoes. Continue cooking until potatoes are golden brown. Add chopped tomatoes and seasonings. Cover pan tightly and cook 20 minutes over low heat or until potatoes are tender. Serves 6.

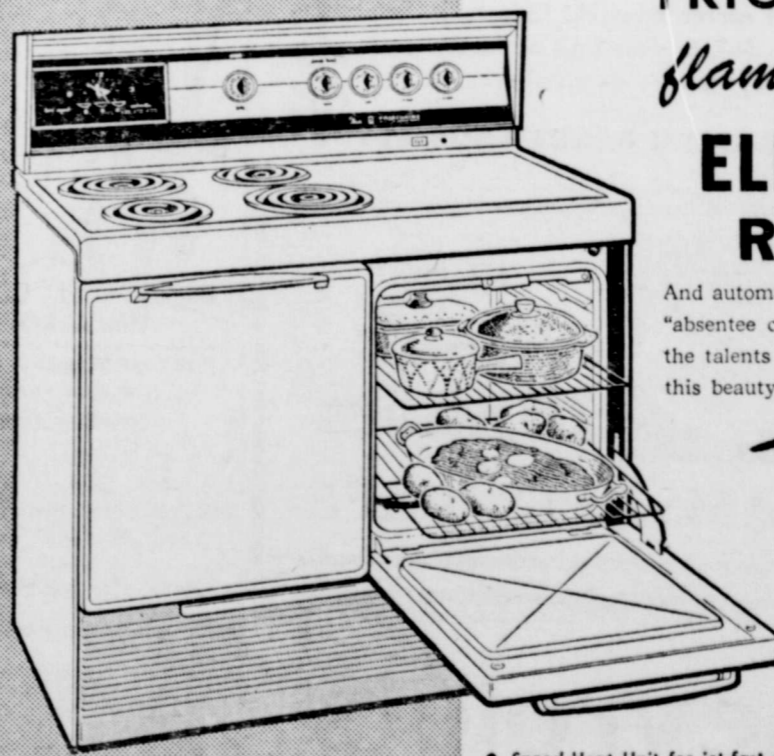

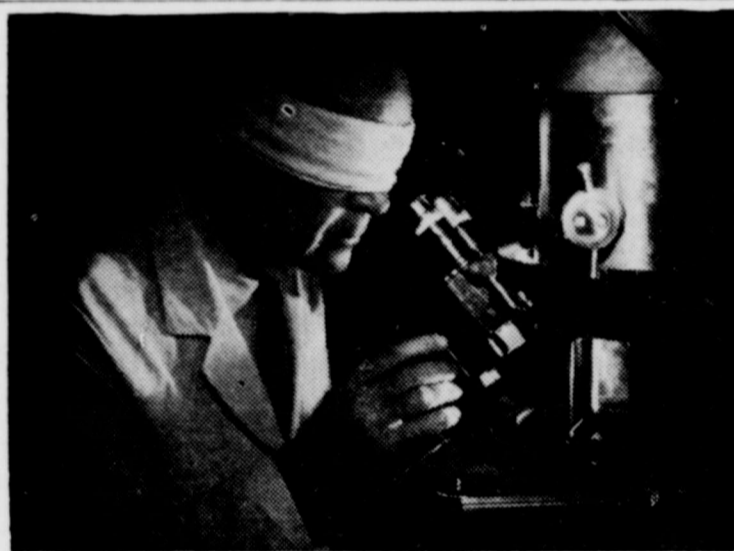

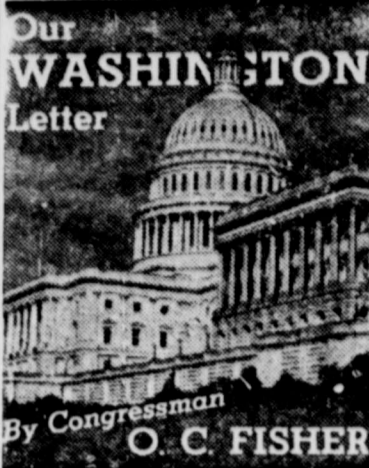

Our WASHINGTON Letter

By a margin of 26 votes a liberal Democrat-Republican coalition last week pushed through the House a new minimum wage bill, boosting the minimum to \$1.25 an hour and extending coverage to nearly 4 million.

A pressure drive by the leadership saw some 15 Southern Democrats switch over and support the bill after having previously voted against it.

The 15 Texans voting against were: Fisher, Alger, Burleson, Casey, Dowdy, Ikard, Kilday, Mahon, Poage, Rogers, Ruth, and Young. Supporting the bill were Wright, Beckworth, Patman, Thomas, Brooks and Thornberry.

From the start to finish it was essentially a conservative-liberal battle, with the chief pressures coming from politicians and labor union leaders. Thirty-three House GOP members switched over to join in a coalition with the Democratic liberals to cinch the victory.

Union leaders have insisted that to increase the wage levels by Federal law would tend to retard the exodus of so much industry from the high-wage north and east to the lower-rate south, where the cost of living is lower than in the metropolitan areas.

The increase in unemployment expected from the legislation will not be felt much for a year or so, since the law will not be fully effective for two years. Small businesses will suffer most, and older, handicapped and other less productive workers will be the first to lose jobs. But a special government relief program is prepared to take care of such cases.

Over-all, the chief adverse

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effect will probably result from the inflation caused by the expected drive for wage increases across the board, once the lower bracket is lifted upward. The tight competitive squeeze with products imported from countries that have no such high minimums, is sure to be felt. Labor unions are known to regard this legislation as a major break from them in their drive for ever higher wages across the board.

The demarcation that separates the Federal from the State governments would be drastically narrowed if an action begun by Attorney General Bobby Kennedy in Federal Court is successful. In a history-making step last week the Attorney General asked a Federal Judge in Richmond, Va. to prohibit that State from granting any state support to any public schools in Virginia until Prince Edward County public schools, shut down the last two years to avoid desegregation, are reop-

ened. The Attorney General's petition also asked the court to require the County and State to reopen and maintain a "system of free public schools" and to forbid County and State officials to use tax money to support segregated private schools by tuition grants as long as the public schools are closed.

If the Federal government has this kind of authority in the operation of schools owned and supported by local taxpayers, just where is the line to be drawn in the separation of the State and Federal government in the area of other local activities?

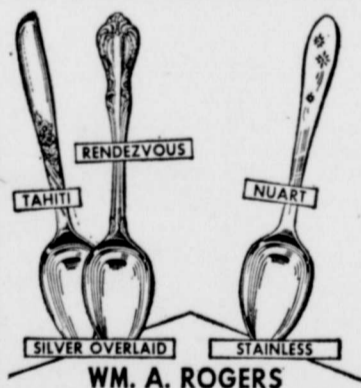
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
