AROUND THE COUNTY

Sterling County club members are reminded that they have until next Wednesday, June 28, to turn in the completed record books on their 1960-1961 sheep demonstrations. Record books for sheep demonstrations have been mailed to members. Books for all other demonstrations can be had by calling the county agent's office and requesting the books on safety, electric or other demonstrations. These will be due August 1.

Record books for a new demonstration, just accepted this year in Texas, a horse and pony demonstration, have been received. Club members can have as their project fillies, two year old mares, or mares and foals, and in addition learn horsemanship along with their project.

Other new 4-H club projects include an awards program in fire prevention and one in dog care. The record books for these are not available presently but it is hoped they will be available in time for members who wish to complete one this year.

The fire prevention program is one that should find lots of interest. In the program, a club member makes survey of his home and surroundings to locate potential fire hazards and lists the hazards found. A later inspection is made to determine if the hazards have been corrected.

A horse short course will be held at A. & M. College on June 30 and July 1. Sponsored by the Animal Husbandry Department and the School of Veterinary Medicine, the course is open to all interested persons.

Subjects to be covered include reproduction, diseases, parasites, feeding, Quarter horse judging and selection. Persons on the program include Dr. J. K. Northway of the King Ranch; Amye Gambelin, well known trainer; H. Calhoun, American Quarter Horse Association Approved judge, and Garford Wilkinson, of the American Quarter Horse Association. Amaraillo.

Any producer who can pasture his fine-wool lambs through the fall and winter, with little or no feed, should make money by holding them and marketing them early in 1962. Local ranges may respond sufficiently to the recent good rains to allow producers to ser-

iously consider holding their lambs. As it looks now, stocker lamb prices could very well stay in the 10 cents to 12 cents per pound range and holding might well be the answer to the low prices. That is the present outlook from the standpoint of the economists according to Robert Kensing, Extension Area Management Specialist with headquarters in San Angelo.

Forms for the claim of federal gasoline tax used on a farm are now available in county agent's office if you did not receive your copy from the District Director of Internal Revenue.

MINERALS FOR BEEF CATTLE, recently revised, is available in the county agent's office. This bulletin goes into the need for minerals for beef cattle in all areas of the state. Maps in it show the various areas of the state and the availability of calcium and phosphorus, the two major elements in the mineral field.

The maps show that Sterling County rates from high to very high in the amount of calcium in the soil. Since cattle get most of their calcium from the forage they consume, it is not a problem in this area.

Phosphorus is a different situation however. Sterling County, along with the majority of the state, rates low in active phosphorus in the soil. The Big Bend area rates medium and a tiny portion of two counties around Brownsville rates very high while about one-third of the state rates very low.

Trace minerals are also covered in the bulletin. Beef cattle requirements for several of the trace minerals have not been established but generally no trouble has been found to exist in regard to some of the trace elements so it is generally felt that cattle get enough of these from the forage they consume.

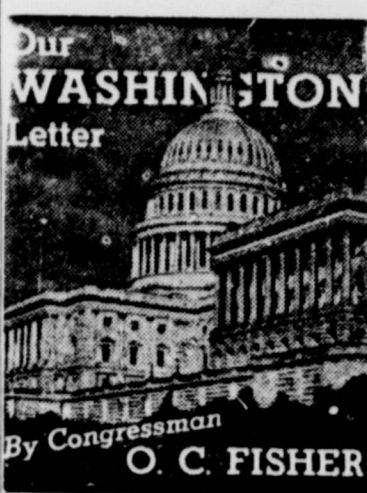
Tuesday of this week, Rev. and Mrs. Gibbs attended funeral services for one of John's cousins in Seguin.

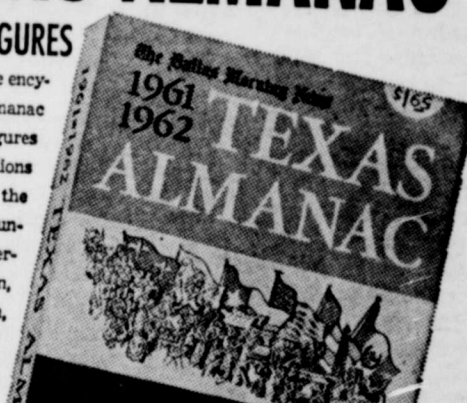

REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. Driver Education

COURSE HERE AT THE SCHOOL FROM JULY 10 TO AUGUST 18

W. M. Romans of the For-san school will teach a driver education course at the Sterling school for six weeks—July 10 through August 18 it has been announced.

For six weeks the classes will be held from 9 till 12 each morning. Class will be limited to about 20 students and tuition will be \$25 for the course, said O.T. Jones, local superintendent.

Jones said that credit for the class would be given if a child would be 14 by the time the course was finished, and of course credit will go to the students 14 or older.

Survivors May Be Eligible For Social Security Payments

Social security benefits may now be paid to survivors of workers who died between March 31, 1958, and January 1, 1940, if the worker had at least a year and a half of social security work before he died, says Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Administration District Office.

Before the Social Security Amendments of 1960, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of a worker who died before 1940.

Under the new law, if such worker had worked under social security for at least a year and a half, benefits are payable to his widow and dependent mother at age 62, to his dependent father at age 65, and to his disabled children who were disabled before they became age 18. This is true even if the family had collected the "lump sum" at the time he died.

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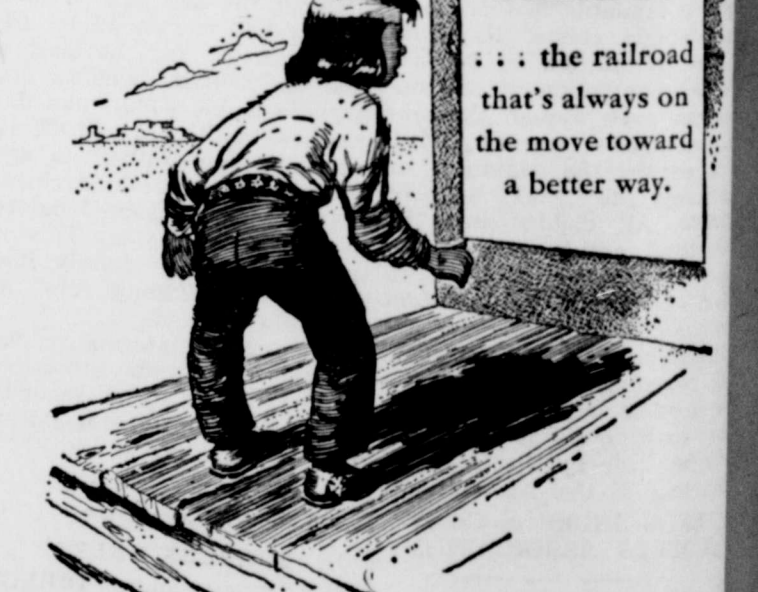
