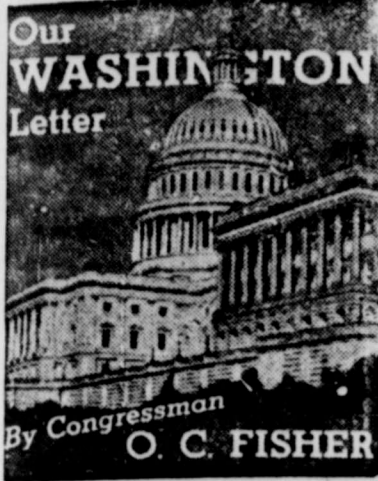

Inflation is being talked about more recently than at any time previously this year. The new threat of more inflation stems from two causes: deficit federal spending and the drive by Big Labor for increased wages.

The recent fiscal year ended on June 31 with a \$3.7 billion deficit, and official estimates are that during the current fiscal year we will take in at least \$5 billion less than the federal government will spend.

It works this way: The more the Government borrows, the more money goes into circulation, and as the amount of money increases it becomes cheaper; that is, it will buy less. So prices and wages go up and up. And the standard of living of those on fixed incomes, those living on savings, etc., goes down and down.

In about 20 years the American dollar has lost more than half of its purchasing power. If its value is taken to be 100 cents in 1939, it now contains the equivalent of 44 cents.

And, on top of the free-spending orgy that has been going on, Walter Reuther has made it plain that he will be shooting for the moon in demands on the automobile manufacturers. The car makers, in an attempt to settle at a moderate raise, offered Reuther a 21-cent hourly increase in wages over the next three years, plus a wide range of improvements in fringe benefits.

"Their offer does not remotely lay the basis for a settlement," Reuther said.

If Reuther succeeds in his goals, as McDonald did in dealing with the steel industry, then the pattern set will be expected to lead to a general wave of wage-price increases. And this, of course, means inflation and more inflation, particularly since it will coincide with the Federal government's deficit spending policies, which, incidentally, are strongly supported by Reuther.

When the town of Newburgh, N.Y., announced that under a new set of rules chiselers and cheaters and deadbeats would be removed from relief roles, the plan gained wide support all over the Nation. In a Gallup poll more than 75 percent of the American people supported Newburgh.

But the courts of New York have decided otherwise. An injunction prohibiting Newburgh, from enforcing its new rules was granted by a New York court. And Federal government spokesmen objected. Since the State and Federal government pay a substantial portion of the relief, the Judge held they can write the rules.

## Department of Health Column

That "Charley horse" you suddenly get from wriggling your toes on a cold night may never cause you a bit of trouble.

On the other hand, permanent disability can follow injuries to the muscles and tendons unless immediate, careful treatment is applied.

Writing in an article in the August issue of the Texas State Journal of Medicine, an Oklahoma City orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Don H. O'Donoghue, cautions physicians to look for possible injuries to both the muscles and tendons when pain persists.

When injury occurs to either, he writes, both are affected, and one cannot be isolated from the other in treatment.

Dr. O'Donoghue defines "strain" as damage to a tendon or muscle occasioned by overuse or overstretch.

"It is important to distinguish between strain and sprain by applying the term 'strain' to muscle and tendon and 'sprain' to ligament," he warns. "Strain of a tendon may consist of anything from a minor irritation of the sheath to nearly complete avulsion 'tearing' of the tendon from its attachment or within its substance. Applied to the muscle, it includes cases of overuse and overstretch short of rupture, either from forcible avulsion or from a direct blow."

Dr. O'Donoghue cautions against resuming physical activity too early since strains tend to recur, but he adds: "Any muscle in the body can be involved in a strain. The amount of protection applied should vary with the degree of damage. In some cases it may only be necessary to limit the patient's activity, whereas in others all stress must be prevented by immobilization, either of the patient or the part."

Exact location and function of the unit involved is important in treatment. "It is much more difficult to prevent strain in a muscle which must be actively overused in some particular sport. For example, in a football player strain of the hamstrings, quadriceps, or calf may be completely disabling. In a baseball player strain of the muscles of the throwing arm may completely prevent participation at his usual position."

Many complications can follow a simple strain. Sometimes muscle spasm or cramping, a frequent complaint of the athlete, is caused from disease. Other times, a blow to the muscle, overstretch of the muscle, reduction of salt by overper-

## Stay-in-School Movement

A "Back-to-Stay-in-School" campaign directed at high school and college students has been initiated by the U.S. Office of Education under the leadership of Dr. Sterling M. McMurrin, Commissioner of Education, it was announced today by J.H. Bond, Regional Director, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Region VII.

The campaign will be a year-round effort, though special emphasis will be directed toward reducing the number of drop-outs before school reopens next month. George D. Hann, recently appointed Office of Education Regional Representative in Dallas, will head the campaign in DHEW, Region VII, Bond stated.

Over 900,000 students dropped out of the nation's schools last year, although 70 percent had the ability to finish high school and probably go on to college. Since the drop-out rate will vary from one community, the student is restricting earning power substantially by dropping out of school. Opportunities for advancement are limited and in many instances available jobs for the untrained person are few or nonexistent. The community suffers when a student drops out of school because this reduces the supply of trained manpower available to expanding business and industry.

Hann suggests that those institutions most vitally concerned with community growth and welfare participate in the campaign by encouraging students to leave their summer jobs and return to school. Officials of schools, local governments, employment agencies, business and industry can help by individually and collectively conducting a "Back-to-School" campaign.

respiration, changes in temperature, sudden chilling or sudden overheating, and dietary factors may cause cramping. Cuffs of pants legs which are too tight around the calf or the calf muscle may prevent proper circulation and cause cramping.

When such causes are excluded, it is necessary to observe the patient for disease such as hematome, myositis ossificans tenosynovitis, and synovial hernia.

Treatment varies for each condition, but a physician should carefully check cases in which difficulty persists.

## School Bus Prices Rigged, Says Wilson

Attorney General Will Wilson says rigged bidding has probably added \$400 to \$600 to the cost of nearly every school bus bought in Texas over the last six years.

Wilson's comment followed his filing in Georgetown of an anti-trust suit against 16 Texas firms and individuals accused of rigging bids in the sale of 5,100 school buses costing \$23 million.

Describing the bid-rigging as a "sneaky conspiracy against our public schools," the attorney general asked 26th District Judge D.B. Wood to enjoin the defendants and assess statutory penalties of up to \$36 million against each of them.

Named as defendants in the price-fixing suit were: Ray Cowan of Austin, president and owner of Austin Motor Co., Inc., and Excel Corp.

Gordon K. Allen Co. and Gordon K. Allen of Dallas. Austin Sales Co., Inc., and Jack G. Fisk of Austin.

Commercial Body Corp., and Harold Grist of San Antonio. Superior Coach Sales of Texas, Inc., and S. Gordon Shreffler of Dallas.

The Texas Coach Co. and Fred Stroud of Austin. Transportation Equipment Sales Co., and R.H. Bentley of Austin.

Hurst Bus Sales Co., and J. K. Hurst of Austin. Hudson Body Co., and Phil Hudson of Dallas.

Wilson's suit was a result of a probe into school bus purchases by the State Board of Control, through which more than 90 per cent of the public school districts in Texas -- or about 1,300 of them -- purchase their school buses.

The anti-trust action, filed August 16th, by Assistant Attorneys General Gordon Cass and Vernon Teofan of Wilson's anti-trust division, covers the period from Jan. 1, 1955 to August 16, 1961.

"The dominant figure and driving force in the conspiracy against the schools and taxpayers is a man in whom Texas had placed its trust -- both as a former state employee and now as a regent of one of our leading state colleges," Wilson declared.

The suit names Cowan as the "dominant figure and driving force" in the price-fixing. Cowan, a regent of North Texas State College in Denton, was employed by the State Board of Control in charge of school bus purchasing before entering the bus business in 1921, the suit alleges.

Wilson accused the defendants of conspiring to restrict the sale and marketing of school buses in Texas, to fix, maintain and increase the prices of school buses and to prevent and lessen competition in school bus sales.

Alleging that the defendants divided the school bus business among themselves by percentages, the suit claims they enforced such allocations by "non-competitive, collusive and rigged bids."

"We want free-enterprise, competitive prices for our tax dollars," said Wilson. "We will not tolerate monopolistic, price-fixing practices. I am determined that this shall not be permitted."

## I Give You Texas

Pat Neff was, perhaps, the last of the Texas orators in the grand tradition.

He was tall and handsome, with features like those of a Roman senator -- a toga would have been perfectly appropriate for him. He had an impressive manner, a deliberate form of utterance, his sentences were long, his diction elevated.

The first time I heard him speak he was governor and the occasion was the laying of the cornerstone of Texas Tech. His rhetoric was worthy of Cicero. The next time, he spoke in the open air at the summer commencement at T.C.U., some time after his second term as governor. Still another speech I recall was at the State Democratic convention in Austin in the 1940's. He was then close to 70. His form was as straight, his voice as clear and his command of language as great as ever. He spoke for half an hour, making what was easily the best address of the convention.

Afterward, reporters asked for a copy of his speech. He replied that there was none and pointed to a small card on which there were a few notes.

Death some time ago claimed a long-time friend of mine-- Clyde Garrett, who served as Eastland city manager, as county judge and as Congressman.

When he was making his first race for Congress, he called at my office in Fort Worth where I was publicity director of the original Casa Manana. Vice President Garner was to attend the show that night and Judge Garrett hoped that I could arrange for him to meet the vice president but Garrett's opponent was then a Congressman and the official in charge of the tour bawled me out for making such a suggestion. (It so happened too that the incumbent had named a relative of his as a postmaster.)

His violent reaction so antagonized me -- plus the desire to try to help my friend -- that I arranged for a photo of Judge Garrett being pushed in one of the picturesque little sight-seeing carts by another county judge, also the suggestion was made that, when the vice president entered the gate, Judge Garrett be in the crowd and join in the applause. Then next day the papers carried the picture and said that Judge Garrett was on hand to "join in welcoming" Garner.

Clyde Garrett was in Eastland County when oil was discovered and he made a fortune which was swept away when the boom collapsed. But he did not let the experience banish his smile or vanquish his spirit but went on to a career of distinguished public service. He was capable and conscientious -- a genial gentleman.

## OUTDOOR COOKING MADE EASY

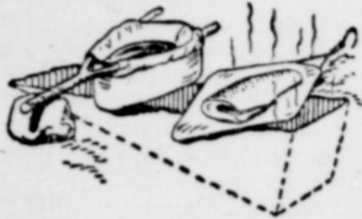

Part of the fun of fishing is to build a small hardwood fire in a safe and sheltered spot near the water to enjoy a hot drink and to cook some of the fish we've caught. Fish always taste better when they are freshest; cooked over an open fire out-of-doors!

Don't bother with pots and pans. Outdoor cooking is much easier than most sportsmen think it is. Just tear a few two foot sections from a roll of heavy duty aluminum foil and fold these all together, doubled over once, the long way. Wrap the folded foil around a small can of "EverReady" Cocoa, and put this in your fishing jacket. Wrap a few strips of bacon in some more foil; take along packets of salt and pepper (and a fork, if you wish) — and your basic lunch is compactly assembled!

A frying pan is unnecessary but, if you'd like one, just bring along an ordinary wire coat-hanger. If you want vegetables with your fish, slice some potatoes, onions and carrots and wrap individual portions in doubled foil, using the "drug-store fold" to keep each package compact. 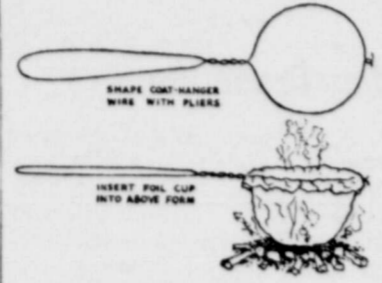
When lunch time comes, scoop out a small trench about six inches wide, a foot and a half long, and about six inches deep at the deeper end — as the sketch shows. Build a small hardwood fire in the deep end of the trench.

A third method is to seal it in a foil package, as was done with the vegetables. When the flesh flakes off the bones, it's done. With or without vegetables, this hot cocoa and fresh fish combination provides a lip-smacking meal. It's easy; there's little to carry, and no pots and pans to bother with. The foil acts as a cooking container and also as a plate to eat from.

Here's another tip, used by explorers and sportsmen all over the world. Always carry an ample supply of chocolate on outdoor trips. Chocolate is the most compact and delicious of foods for a quick snack on the trail. Also, it provides abundant energy. The prime favorites are three kinds. Many sportsmen prefer to carry a package of "Nestle's" Semi-Sweet Chocolate Morsels to munch on during the day. 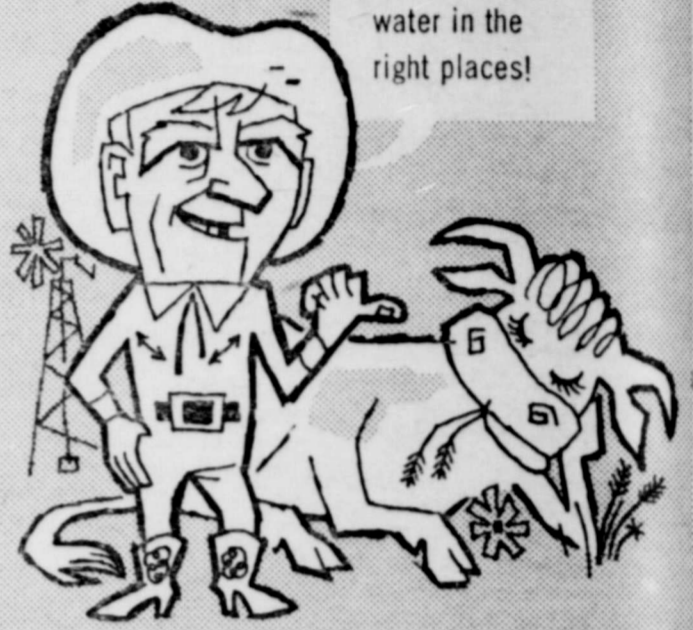

## Deadly Labor Day Week-End Looms

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Monday announced the official prediction that 30 persons in Texas will be killed in traffic accidents during the Labor Day Weekend.

In making the prediction, Garrison warned motorists that records show this three-day period to be one of the most dangerous times of the year on the highways.

The highest Labor Day holiday toll since World War II was in 1951 when 46 persons were killed in 33 accidents. The lowest was in 1949—23 killed in 19 accidents. Figures prove most fatal accidents are caused by traffic law violations.

The DPS, in an effort to focus public attention on the hazards of holiday traffic and to compile data which will be helpful in improving the state's traffic management program, will conduct "Operation Motorcade," from 12:01 A.M. Saturday, September 2 through 11:59 P.M. Monday, September 4.

During the 72-hour period, the safety agency will tabulate all traffic deaths in the state and issue bulletins at 10:00 A.M., 3:00 P.M. and 9:00 P.M. each day.

"Driving is always a full-time job, and driver concentration and alertness are especially essential during holiday periods because crowded highways increase driving hazards," Garrison said.

"An all-out effort will be made by DPS enforcement personnel to remove traffic violators from the highways. The Texas Highway Patrol force will be augmented by some 150 patrolmen from the other uniformed services of the Department of Public Safety. All available radar units will be in operation.

"But law enforcement officers can only do so much. Texas highways will be as safe as Texas drivers want them to be. And what they want will be reflected in the way they drive."

"This Labor Day weekend we are asking each driver to cooperate in making Texas highways safe by obeying the traffic laws and by staying alert while driving."

Garrison suggested several ways drivers can cut down the holiday traffic death toll:

1. Allow sufficient time for travel.
2. Obey the traffic laws; they are designed to facilitate smooth traffic flow and to save lives.
3. Anticipate dangerous situations. Don't depend on another driver to prevent an accident—be prepared to do it your self.
4. Stay alert. Anything that impairs your driving skill or distracts your attention while driving might prove fatal.

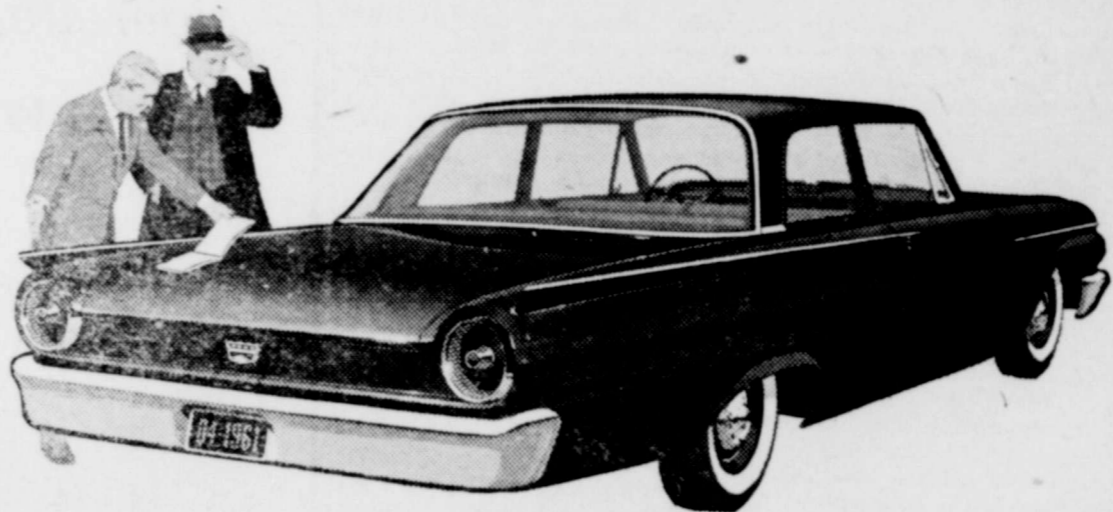

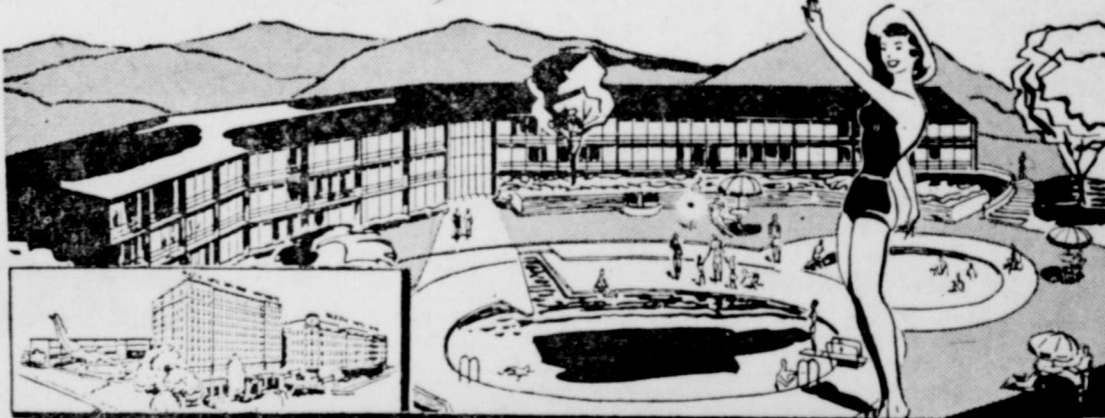
