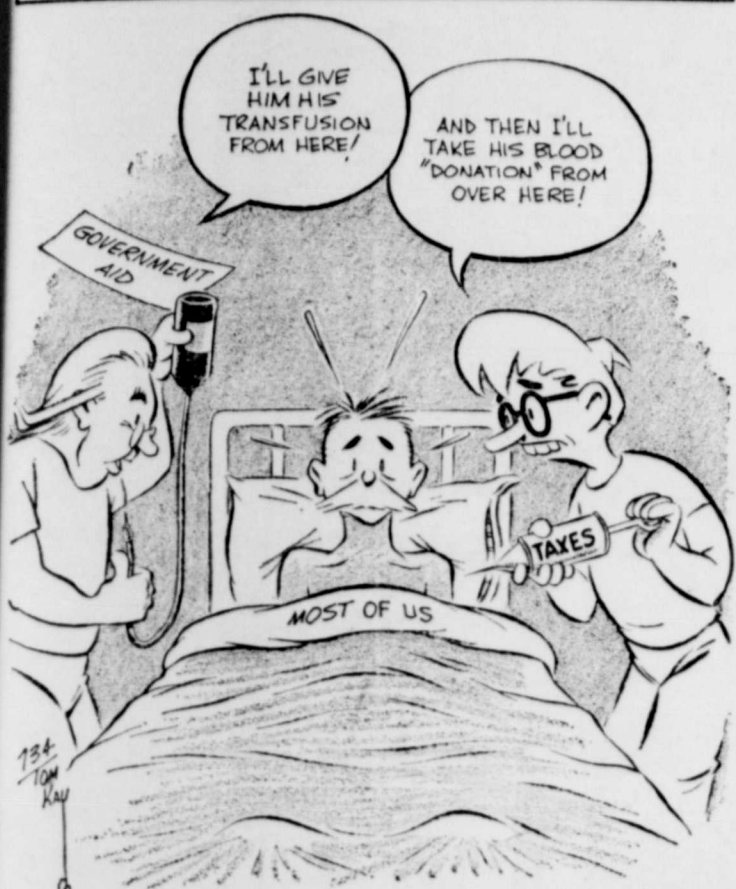

AROUND THE COUNTY

During the last week, several people have picked up forms for filing the claim for the refund of the federal tax on gasoline used on the ranch or farm. There are conflicting dates as to the time of filing these forms on the instructions issued by the Internal Revenue Service.

One set of instructions, a pamphlet number 398, states that the claim must be filed and postmarked not later than midnight September 30. Another form, the copy form which the operator keeps for his records, states that it must be filed prior to October 2. Since September 30, falls on Saturday, it is probably that the Internal Revenue Service is allowing until Monday for filing claims. However, if you can manage to do so, get yours mailed on the 30th in time for postmarking that day.

October 3 is the date of the supervisor's election for Zone 3 of the North Concho River Soil Conservation District. Zone 3 is the Coke County portion of the district. Bob Mims is the present representative of the zone on the board.

The election will be held at 10:00 A. M. Tuesday morning in the park on the river at Water Valley. After the election, the group will tour the area on the Carter Rollins ranch that was aerial sprayed for mesquite control in 1959. A barbecue dinner will be served at noon and after noon, the group will tour the George Skeete ranch to see some results of conservation work on the ranch. Every one is invited to attend the meeting, the barbecue and the tours.

October 1 is the recommended stopping date for the chemical control of prickly pear according to the Extension range specialist. Chemical control consists of the application of a mixture of 2,4,5-T and oil.

Best results for this type of control have been obtained during the period June 1 to September 30. The pear is in good growing condition at that time and the temperature is high enough for a good reaction on the pear. During the cooler seasons of the year, the reaction is slower and on test plots, the results have been erratic.

Deferment of pastures during the next few months is a good practice. The summer

grasses are making their last growth of the season and in those favored with the past weekend's rain, will probably make crop before frost unless it freezes very early. This seed crop is considered to be better than the first seed crop which usually is a low germination one.

Too, deferment now will give the winter weeds and grasses a chance to make a start and be ready to furnish grazing in a few months. During the past summer, some of the filaree and tallow weed remained alive because of the cooler than usual temperatures and moisture. These plants will soon be furnishing grazing although there is not actually enough of them on the ground. Deferment now would permit more of it to make growth and be available in a short time.

Tooth Taboos

In the primitive tribes on the island of Samoa, the loss of a tooth was believed to be a punishment inflicted by a household god because that person had violated a certain taboo. Similarly, in our civilized society the breaking of the taboos or rules of good nutrition can result, conceivably, in the loss of one or more teeth.

Scientists are convinced that a significant amount of dental decay is caused by improper nutrition. Failure to provide proper nutrients in the diet of an infant can seriously impair the development of healthy teeth. These poor nutritional habits, carried through adulthood, can cause permanent damage.

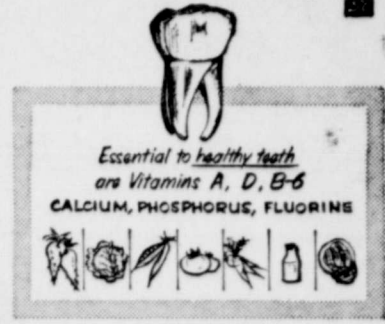
It is believed that a diet balanced in vital nutrients and supplemented by a multiple vitamin preparation such as One-A-Day, can be a major factor in preventing harmful decay—from childhood through adolescence.

Intake of sufficient quantities of certain vitamins and minerals is essential for the proper development of teeth. Most important in the diet are the vitamins A, D, and B-6 (pyridoxine) and the minerals calcium, phosphorus and fluoride.

Vitamin A can profoundly influence the development of teeth, for if a child gets too little vitamin A when his teeth are developing, the enamel-forming cells in the gums become abnormal and cease to function properly. This leads to pitting in the enamel surface of the tooth. These pits later harbor food deposits, which may ferment and form acids that etch the enamel and lead to decay.

Vitamin D not only aids in the development of bones, but also is involved in the body's absorption and utilization of the

minerals calcium and phosphorus—which are found in large amounts in the teeth. In fact, the enamel and dentine are composed almost entirely of these two elements.

Another vitamin which is vital to our teeth is B-6. New experimental studies presented by a scientist at the recent meeting of the American Society for Clinical Nutrition, indicated that vitamin B-6 greatly reduced incidence of new cavities in pregnant women. Vitamin B-6, they found, is very effective in preventing tooth decay.

Research continues on the role of vitamins in fighting tooth decay. Scientists would like to know exactly how these nutrients work to prevent decay. Once they obtain this knowledge, they may be able to make dietary recommendations that will go a long way toward eliminating the problem of tooth decay.

Caperton Chevrolet Having Open House This Week-end in Bronte. '62 Cars on Display

Caperton Chevrolet of Bronte will have a grand opening of their newly enlarged and remodelled building Friday and Saturday. The building was completed a couple of months ago, but the formal opening was postponed to coincide with the showing of the new 1962 model Chevrolets.

A quarter block to the rear of the building has been resurfaced to provide parking area for the firm's stock of new and used cars.
