Several ranchers have had questions regarding the screw-worm control program the past few days. At the present time, full information regarding the program has not been mailed to county agents. We have received information stating that the full instructions and information on the program will be mailed within the next ten days to all county agents and vocational agriculture teachers.

As soon as the full information on the program is received, it will be made available to all ranchers. Presently, the only thing out on it has been published in the newspapers. There was some discussion of it at the quarterly district meeting of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association last Saturday but due to being in Dallas, we could not attend.

Sterling County sheep exhibitors, both in the junior and adult shows, at the Dallas Fair last week did right well. Betty Jo Barrett, who exhibited in the Junior Rambouillet Show, had third and fourth place ram lambs, second place pen of three ram lambs, second and fifth place and reserve champion ewe lambs, first place pen of 3 ewe lambs, and first place lamb flock and was the premier exhibitor.

L.F. and Clinton Hodges in the adult show of the Rambouillet division had both champions as well as many other high placings. William and Bubba Foster had both champions in the Suffolk show and many other placings. They also won second place in the "housekeeping" or herdsman awards division of the sheep and goat show.

The four exhibitors from the county, Betty Jo, L.F. Hodges, Clinton Hodges and William and Bubba Foster, brought home a total of \$502 in prize money plus the \$15 the Fosters won for the herdsman division.

Barn Raising at Stock Show Barns October 21

The Sterling County Livestock Association will have a barn raising, and Bar-B-Que dinner Saturday, October 21, 1961 at the County Show barns, located directly south on block of Butler's Gulf Station.

Plans are to build a new shed on the south side of the barn, the shed is to be 82 feet by 12 feet, built with lumber framing, and sides and top will be covered with sheet iron.

Anyone who wishes to donate labor for the day will be served a free barbecue dinner at the barn. It is hoped that a large group will turn out for the dinner. Fosters Take Top Suffolk Honors at State Fair

Wm. and J.Q. Foster dominated the Suffolk Sheep Show division of the Pan American Livestock Exposition at the Texas State Fair in Dallas last week.

They had the champion ram, the champion ewe, the reserve champion ram and reserve champion ewe. They got 2nd place Herdsman Award ribbon and the Premier Exhibitors trophy in the Suffolk show.

In the ram lamb division they took first and second; in the pen of three ram lambs they were first; in the yearling ram they were first; and had the first and fifth in the ewe lamb class.

William and Bubba had a second place in the pen of 3 ewe lambs; and first and second in the yearling ewe class. They had a second place winner in the pen of 3 yearling ewes and won the first place ribbon in the exhibitor's flock.

You Have to File For Social Security

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year.

An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regardless of his net profit for the year.

Anyone who earns over \$100 in every month, and over \$1200 in the year as well, may still be eligible for some payments. Each two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700 a year, costs only one dollar in social security benefits; over \$1700, each additional dollar reduces benefits one dollar.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

Sprinkle 1 1/2 to 2 teaspoons of the dressing mix over avocado halves. Combine remaining dressing mix with mayonnaise and lemon juice. To half of this mixture add sea food, celery, and pepper. Pile into avocado halves. Place on salad greens. Garnish each salad with 4 asparagus tips, 2 pimiento strips, and several egg slices. Serve with remaining dressing mixture. Makes 4 servings luncheon or entrée salad.

*Or use 2 cups canned shrimp or crayfish, drained and cut in small pieces, or 2 cups canned lobster, drained and flaked.

OLD AGE BENEFITS ARE CHANGED

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year."

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington be-

believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 and 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

Even when annual earnings are too high to permit any payments, benefits are payable for any month in which a beneficiary does not work in his own business or earn wages of more than \$100.

Surprise Cupcakes!

THE easiest and best way we know to dress up plain cupcakes is to (1) sprinkle them with confectioners' powdered sugar and (2) cut a cone-shaped piece from the center of each. Fill the hollow with Chocolate Cream and tuck the cone into this creamy filling.



Chocolate Cream Cakes
1 package chocolate pudding and pie filling; 2 1/2 cups milk; 1 tablespoon sherry (or sherry extract); 8 cupcakes, baked in tart pans, if desired, or store-bought; Confectioners' powdered sugar.

Combine pudding mix and milk in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Pour into bowl. (To avoid surface film, place waxed paper directly on surface of hot pudding.) Chill. Before serving, add sherry. Then beat slowly with rotary egg beater until smooth and creamy.

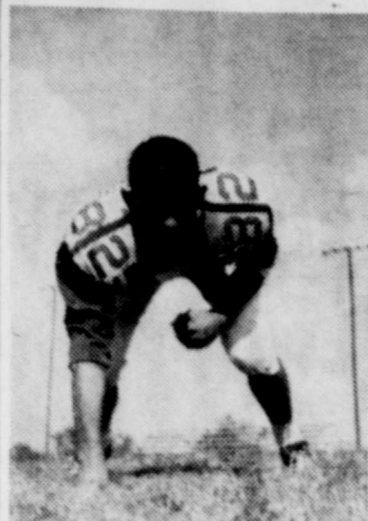
FROZEN vegetables, so fresh of taste, so easy to prepare, achieve distinction when served au gratin.



Mixed Vegetables au Gratin
1 package (10 ounces) quick-frozen mixed garden vegetables; 2 tablespoons butter; 1 tablespoon flour; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 to 1/4 cup grated Cheddar cheese; salt and pepper.

Cook mixed vegetables as directed on the package. Drain. Add butter to vegetables; then add flour and mix well. Gradually stir in milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat. Then cook and stir until thickened. Add cheese. Heat thoroughly, stirring occasionally. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes 3 or 4 servings.

Your will, your executor's name and the banker who knows your business affairs; Your certificate of birth, marriage, veterans' discharge and such papers;

Your deposit and its key; The amount and beneficiary of each of your insurance policies, your insurance agents and their addresses;

Details about your mortgage papers, notes, contracts, financial agreements, plus any stocks, bonds, and the like and your broker's name and address;

Facts on your Social Security—your card number, its location, and your employer's name and address;

Your tax records; Your debtors, creditors, and what is owed;

Your lawyer's name, address, telephone, and papers in his safe-keeping;

The name and address of any one who has your power of attorney;

Your pension arrangements; The names of organizations

to which you belong and any benefits which may be coming to your family from them;

Funeral arrangements you prefer;

Names and addresses of relations or friends you wish notified;

Facts about your children's health record, facts they might find hard to get without your help.

A list of your personal belongings;

Include other facts that seem important.

Then, having completed this

guide for your family, put it in a safe place—but not your safe deposit box. Tell your family or closest friend where to find the list.
