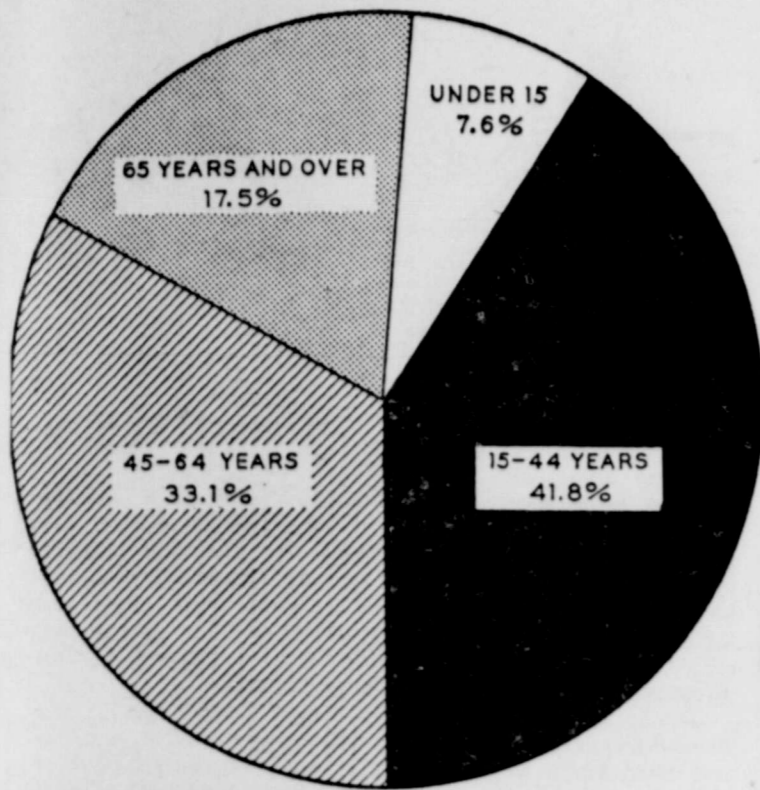

Thankfulness for Improvements in Medicine

Our forefathers proclaimed Thanksgiving Day for the purpose of expressing thanks, not only for the bountiful harvest but for the sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure, that first rigorous year in America.

Texans, this Thanksgiving Day, have much to be thankful for in the way of personal health of our communities. Increased standards of living and improved hospital facilities have given our infants a better chance of survival, our children and adolescents a healthier, happier life and our grownups longer life and usefulness.

Figures revealed by State Health Department show what strides have been made toward keeping our population alive and healthy. A few developments for which we should be particularly thankful are:

Nearly one-half million normal healthy babies were born to Texas parents during the two year period between September 1, 1958 and August 31, 1960. This adds up to an average of 682 babies born each day.

Only 151,000 Texans died the same period: a ratio of more than three births to every death.

The excess of births over deaths during the two year period added some 347,000 to the State's population. That increase combined with newcomers now making their home in Texas swelled the population to 9.5 million.

During the last 25 years, deaths during the first year of life have dropped from 71 per thousand to less than 29 per thousand. And maternal deaths have dropped from 6.9 per thousand to a ratio of 0.3 per thousand.

In addition to pointing out that our infants and their mothers have a better chance of surviving than ever before, these figures bring to light one other important development. Man's longevity has been greatly increased. We now live longer and have the opportunity to see more life giving and life saving developments in the health and medical fields. And for this we should also be thankful.

HISTORY OF TEXAS

From seventh grade Texas History class. By Jimmy Cole.

A news report as it might have appeared in the newspaper, November 26, 1835.

GRASS FIGHT

On November 26, 1835 some Texan scouts reported the approach of a pack train guarded by a small force. It was decided that the animals were loaded with silver to pay the Mexican soldiers. A force was raised, and the Texans rode out to capture the treasure. The fight was short. The Texans captured most of the pack animals and found they were loaded with grass to feed the Mexican horses.

At the time of the fight, the Texan Army was commanded by Edward Burleson.

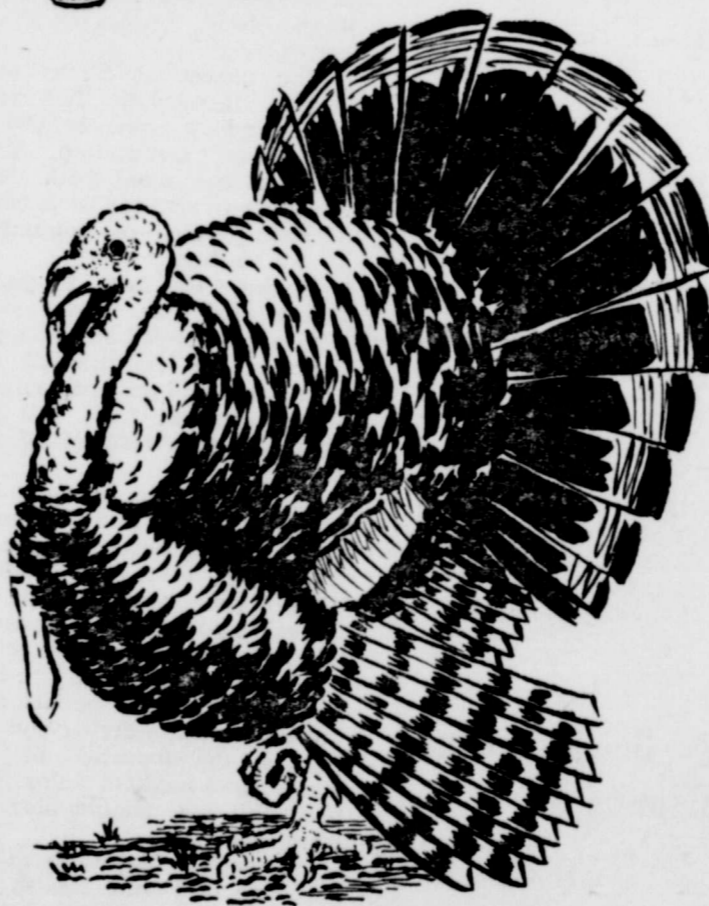

Every outdoor man likes to feel he can handle his bird from the field to the table. So present him with this recipe, and point him in the direction of the barbecue.

Grouse, Quail or Partridge Broiled Over Open Pit: Draw and clean birds; let hang in cool place one or two days. Wash briefly in cold water. Rub insides with salt and pepper. Wrap outsides with ba-

con slices and pin with tooth-picks. Place on skewer just over fire and sear quickly, turning frequently. Move further away from coals and broil slowly for 20 minutes. Serve with lots of easy-to-make tossed salad.

Simple Cake with Penuche Sauce

Whether you bake your own sponge or angel food cake, use a mix, or buy the cake at the corner store, you'll like this Penuche Sauce to make the dessert your own. It's simple enough for the children after school, yet glamorous enough to serve at a card party or other grown-up affair.

This Three-Way Penuche Sauce is versatile, too. Add confectioners' sugar and you'll have a frosting for a butter or chiffon cake, or a full pound of confectioners' sugar for a smooth creamy fudge.

THREE-WAY PENUCHE SAUCE
3 tablespoons margarine
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup dark Karo Syrup
2 tablespoons light cream
1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix margarine, brown sugar, salt and Corn Syrup together in a saucepan. Bring to a boil and boil 3 to 4 minutes over low heat, stirring frequently. Stir in cream and let mixture come to a boil again. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. Serve warm over ice cream or plain cake. Makes 1 cup sauce.

Frosting: Follow recipe for sauce as directed above. Gradually add 3 to 3 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar to the hot sauce, mixing until well blended, smooth and of spreading consistency. Makes sufficient frosting to cover top and sides of 9 x 13-inch cake.

Fudge: Follow recipe for sauce as directed. Gradually add 1 pound sifted confectioners' sugar to the hot sauce and blend until smooth. Turn into greased 8 x 8 x 2-inch pan. Chill until firm. Cut into squares. Makes 1 1/2 pounds fudge.

Screwworm Fund Drive on in Sterling

A concentrated effort will be made to finish the screwworm fund drive in Sterling County by December 1 says Alvie L. Cole, chairman of the drive. Up to noon on Wednesday of this week, sixteen checks totaling \$1670.80 had been deposited with H. L. Hildebrand, secretary-treasurer of the group.

Ranchers will be contacted by representatives of the group who are working roads in the vicinity in which they live. However, if you have not been contacted, you can deposit your check at the bank in Sterling City with Mr. Hildebrand.

The funds are being solicited to initiate the screwworm eradication program in Texas in 1962. The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation is asking help from all livestock owners in Texas in the program. If livestock owners contribute 50c per cow or horse, 10c per head for sheep, goats or hogs, the program will raise the \$3 million necessary to get the program under way.

The checks for the fund can be handled in several ways. If you desire to pay now, you can date the check and have it cashed and it will be deductible as ranch expense for this year. If you desire to withhold payment until the money is called for by the state organization, you can leave the check undated and give Mr. Hildebrand authority to date it at the time of cashing when called for by the state group. This will probably be after the first of the year and it would be deductible for 1962.

All funds contributed to the fund are deductible. The Internal Revenue Service classifies this as necessary ranch expense for all livestock owners. Other individuals not owning livestock can contribute and deduct it as a contribution to a non-profit organization.

CONTRACT LET FOR HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION HERE

A contract for 7.1 miles of construction on U.S. Highway 87 in Sterling County has been awarded to an Austin firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

W. L. Barnes and L. R. Bowden, contractors submitted the low bid of \$328,851 on the project. Grading, structures, flexible base, one and two course surface treatment from the west edge of Sterling City to 7.0 miles northwest is expected to take 200 working days, according to J. A. Snell, District Highway Engineer at San Angelo.

The work is straightening out the highway from the First Baptist Church to the George McEntire ranch line seven miles up the Big Spring highway.

H. L. Bailey, Resident Engineer at Sterling City, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

You Have to File For Social Security

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year.

An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regardless of his net profit for the year.

Anyone who earns over \$100 in every month, and over \$1200 in the year as well, may still be eligible for some payments. Each two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700 a year, costs only one dollar in social security benefits; over \$1700, each additional dollar reduces benefits one dollar.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

OLD AGE BENEFITS ARE CHANGED

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office. "This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old

age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year.

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 and 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

Even when annual earnings are too high to permit any payments, benefits are payable for any month in which a beneficiary does not work in his own business or earn wages of more than \$100.

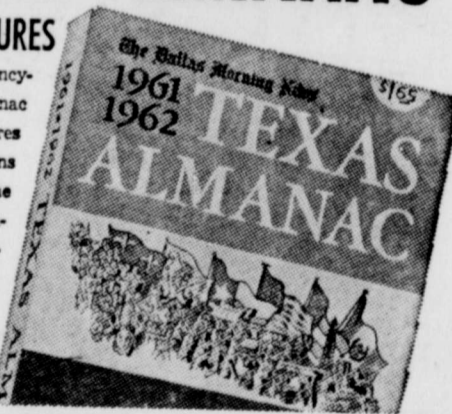
