

Well, he thought he was making too much money to collect his old-age insurance benefits. He's earning about \$2200.00 a year as a

maintenance man. He is glad he followed the advice in that article because he found that some social security benefits will be payable to him for 1961, even though he continues to work. You see, a worker doesn't have to retire completely in order to get benefits. Under a law passed just last summer, a worker earning over \$1200 a year has only \$1 in benefits between \$1200 and \$1700. Then, for each \$1 he earns over \$1700, an additional \$1 is withheld.





