Club Stock Show Here Monday

The Sterling County Livestock Show will be held Jan. 15, 1962 at the County Show barn in Sterling City.

The show is the annual affair staged for and by the association for the FFA and 4-H Club members who raise livestock for projects. Arthur Barlemann, Jr., county agent, is 4-H Club sponsor and Fred Igo, vocational agriculture teacher at the high school, is the FFA sponsor.

Classifying the fat lambs and acting as showmanship judge, will be Oliver West, county agent of Glasscock County.

Bill Sims, county agent of Irion County, will again judge the sheep. Judging will start at 8:30 a.m., said Fred Igo and he said that the sale would start at 1:30 p.m. if the judging had been completed, and he thought it would be.

Classes this year will include light and heavy weight crossbred lambs, light and heavy weight finewool lambs, pens of three in each division, and classes for registered Rambouillet ewe and in both the fat lamb divisions and the breeding sheep division.

There are over 100 fat lambs entered in the show this year as well as some breeding sheep said Igo.

4-H Club members showing lambs will be Jack and Jay Clark, Barbara, David and Drew Durham. Betty Jo Barrett, Mike and Jerry Payne, Vernon Asbill, Reynolds Lee and David Foster, Rosanne Foster, Cecilia and Jeannie McDonald, Troy Murrell, Larry Stewart, James Morgan and Pam and Mackey McEntire.

FFA boys to show lambs include Tommie Williams, Butch Seago, Billy Bauer, Billy Blair, Billy Joe Tindall, Freddie Fields, Charles Daves, David Sanderson, and Bill Foster is to exhibit some of his registered Suffolks.

Show superintendent this year is I.W. Terry, Billy Ralph Bynum is the assistant superintendent.

Worth Durham is the sales clerk, assisted by Eddy Braswell. Riley King is the Auctioneer for the sale.

The concession stand will be operated by mothers of club members, and proceeds will go to the 4-H Club and FFA Chapter.

The door prize went to Lee Douthitt.

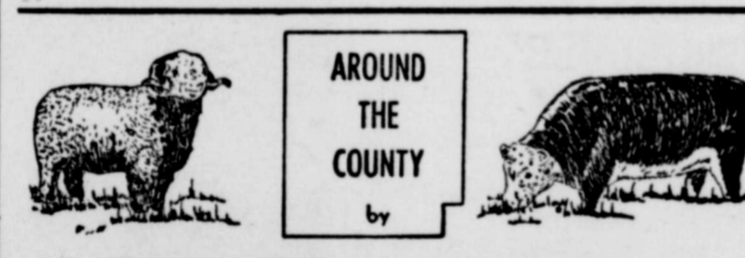
Social Security Changes

Recent social security amendments change both the requirements for payment of benefits and the rate of social security taxes according to Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. The new changes include the following:

1. Men may now get reduced payments as early as age 62.
2. Some workers already drawing the minimum monthly payment of \$33 had their checks increased to \$40.
3. People can now earn more and still draw some social security payments.
4. Workers may now qualify for benefits if they have credit for at least one quarter of work under social security for each year since 1950 up to the year they reach 65 (62 for women).
5. Payments to aged widows and widowers have been raised about ten per cent. When only one parent is receiving payments, that parent also got an increase.

In making these changes, Ellington continued, Congress has shown its usual concern for the financial soundness of the Social Security Trust Fund. To maintain the fund with enough income and reserve to make these increases in payments, Congress has adjusted the tax rates upward.

Bank Stockholders MET TUESDAY; OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS RENAMED

The stockholders of The 1st National Bank here met Tuesday morning. They reelected the directors of the institution, being H. D. Coleman, Flavy E. Davis, Worth B. Durham, Clyde R. Foster, R. T. Foster, H. L. Hildebrand and Roland Lowe. 964 shares out of the 1000 shares were represented by the stockholders or their proxies, said Coleman.

Following the stockholders meeting the directors reelected the officers, being R. T. Foster, president; H. L. Hildebrand, vice-president; H. D. Coleman, executive vice-president and cashier; and Nan E. Davis, assistant cashier.

The bank had a good year last year, said Coleman, and over \$22,000 was added to the capital accounts.

Last month the directors had declared a 20 per cent dividend on the par value of the stock. Par value is \$100 a share for 1,000 shares.

Loans and discounts on the last day of the year amounted to \$1,433,082.96. Deposits on that date were \$2,779,024.28.

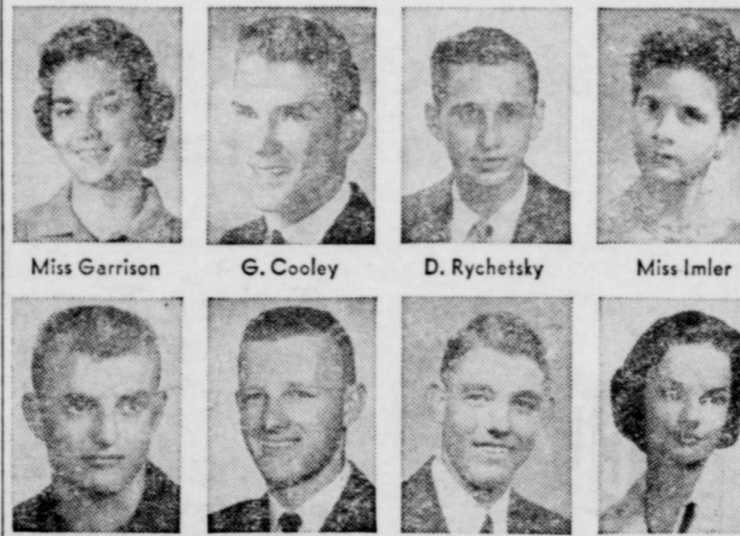

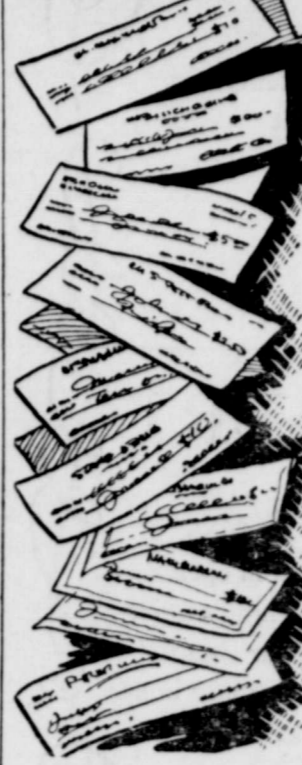
There was also time for window shopping on Chicago's famed State Street and gazing up at the city's skyscrapers. Sightseeing stops included the exciting Museum of Science and

Lehmann received an all-expense paid trip to the 40th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago from the Humble Oil & Refining Co. for being the state's top tractor award winner.

OLD AGE BENEFITS ARE CHANGED

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year."

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

Even when annual earnings are too high to permit any payments, benefits are payable for any month in which a beneficiary does not work in his own business or earn wages of more than \$100.
