AROUND THE COUNTY

The thirteenth San Antonio Livestock Exposition and Rodeo opens next Friday, February 9, in San Antonio. Closing date for the show is February 18.

Sterling County 4-H Club members who will exhibit in the show are Diana Lou Cole, Vernon Asbill, David Durham, and Betty Jo Barrett. Diana will show in the Junior Angora Goat Show. Judging in this class will take place on Monday afternoon, Feb. 12. Vernon Asbill will show in the boys lamb show on Sat. Feb. 10.

David Durham and Betty Jo Barrett have fleeces entered in the Junior Wool show. Each will show three fleeces from their registered Rambouillets. The wool show will be quartered in a new building constructed at the north end of the coliseum. It is air-conditioned, especially lighted, and dust proof. This wool show has grown tremendously past few years. In addition to the fleeces of wool and mohair shown, various companies have always sponsored educational exhibits in the building advertising wool and wool products, mohair and its products. The various breed associations have also made some very fine exhibits in the show along the promotional line for wool and mohair.

At the time entries closed, over 5,000 head of livestock had been entered in the show's various departments. This includes all types of livestock, poultry, rabbits, dressed poultry, and carcass classes in the lamb and steer departments.

There is still time to spray your nut and fruit trees with a dormant oil spray for the control of scale. Scale is a small insect which gathers on the limbs of the trees. It builds up until finally it may result in the death of the trees. The best control is a dormant oil spray which must be applied while the trees are in the dormant stage without leaves or buds. An oil emulsion spray is available at most feed and seed stores handling such products. It should be used according to directions of the manufacturers.

The need for keeping good records on the ranch and farm was again emphasized a few weeks ago by a suit in a federal tax case. The decision held that an attorney who also owned a farm was not entitled to a loss on his farming operation chiefly because his only evidence of loss, according to the court, was "a mass of unsorted cancelled bills. The court further held that no attempt had been made to put the operation on a paying basis and that little time was devoted to the operation and management of the place."

Proper business records are essential if your return is questioned. Are your records in proper form? Could you prove that you are entitled to the deductions made in your operations?

More information on allowable expenses can be found in the Internal Revenue Service Publication, **Farmers' Tax Guide for 1962**. A copy is available in the county agent's office if you would like one. It could help you in making decisions on whether an item is deductible or not.

Screwworm Funds Almost Complete Here

The drive for funds to be turned over to the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation for use in initiating the screwworm control program in Texas is nearing completion. Two-hundred-twelve counties in the state are currently organized and actively working on the project. Reports from 120 of these counties show that more than half a million dollars has been deposited in area banks to be used in the program.

Alvie Cole, Sterling County chairman and a member of the Board of Trustees of the state organization, says that the Board feels the long-sought goal of a screwworm-free Southwest is a possibility for 1962 if full advantage is taken of the hard freeze of two weeks ago which dealt the flies a severe blow. The \$3 million voluntary contribution goal is to be reached in the next two weeks and could save an estimated \$200 million from screwworm damage in the next two years.

The Foundation Trustees are moving forward with their plans to get the male sterile fly release program underway within the next few days. A state-wide meeting kicking off the program will be held in Austin on February 14. Representatives from every county are being urged to attend the meeting.

On January 31, a total of \$9,821.06 had been pledged in Sterling County, according to H. L. Hildebrand's records. He is secretary-treasurer of the committee in the county. If you have not made your contribution to the drive, there's still time to do so. Any of the roadmen in your area will take your check, or you can leave it at the bank with Mr. Hildebrand or Jim Coleman. The county is nearing the 100% mark now and it is hoped that it will attain that figure. No quota in dollars was set for the counties but a high percentage of participation is hoped for—100% in every county would show that Texas is definitely trying to stamp out the expensive screwworm.

George H. McEntire, who would have been 80 years old on February 5, died last Saturday afternoon in the Sterling County Hospital about 5:30 o'clock. He had been seriously ill for over a week.

Funeral services were conducted here at the First Presbyterian Church Monday at 10 a.m. with the Rev. Hubert Travis, pastor, and the Rev. Baxter Greer, former pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Oakland Cemetery in Dallas Tuesday morning with Dr. Greer officiating. Lowe Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements here and the Sparkman Funeral Home was in charge of the Dallas arrangements.

McEntire was one of the early cattlemen of Sterling, having bought the U Ranch west of town in the 1870's.

George was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Knights Templar, Sons of the American Revolution; and he was a Shriner and a member of the First Presbyterian Church here.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Jack B. Wilkinson, and a son George McEntire, Jr., both of Midland; four grandchildren, Jack B. Wilkinson, Jr., Mrs. William Erskine, Mrs. Cowden Henry, and Mrs. Frances Dunn; and eight great grandchildren.

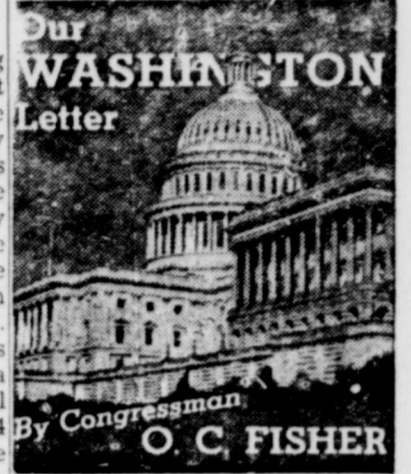

Our WASHINGTON Letter

The shifting sands of politics stirred up a bit of maneuvering last week when the House Rules Committee unexpectedly reneged on President Kennedy's top priority request for legislation to create the controversial Department of Urban Affairs. Two Democrats on that committee who always did the bidding of the late Speaker Sam Rayburn scanned the political skies on the election year and proceeded to vote against clearing the new agency legislation for House action. Those two votes, added to others, blocked the bill. But President Kennedy promptly announced he would create the new agency by Executive action, despite the Rules Committee action. And he announced further that if Congress does not override his action creating the new department he will appoint Robert C. Weaver, a Negro, to the new cabinet post.

Observers saw in the maneuver a strategic move to put opponents on the spot because now, in view of that announcement, it is reasoned that political strategists can say to those who vote to override the Kennedy action: "By voting against the creation of this new agency you will be voting against allowing the first Negro to be given a cabinet post". And supposedly thereby incur the wrath of Negro voters.

Standing by principles: Here's a classic statement written by the late Harry Hornby, Sr., in the first issue of "The Uvalde Leader" published January 22, 1898: "Our politics will be Democratic, and while we do not believe in harshness, in support of our party's platform we believe in holding our own and advocating the principles of true Democracy."

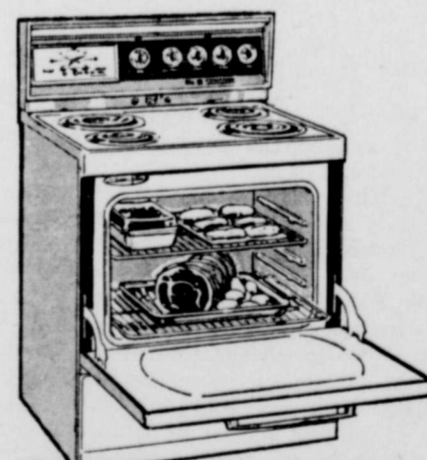

OLD AGE BENEFITS ARE CHANGED
 One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office. "This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued. "This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year." After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.
