Wildcat Completed STERLING OIL WELL COMPLETED FOR 243 BARRELS DAILY

Roden Oil Co., of Midland and Cosden Petroleum Corp. of Big Spring have completed a Wolfcamp discovery, No. 1 Reed 14 miles northwest of Sterling City in Sterling County.

It rated a calculated flow of 243 barrels of 40 gravity oil through a 12-64 inch choke and perforations at 7,334-60 feet which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons. A gas flow of 192,000 cubic feet per day accompanied the oil. Gas oil ratio was 790-1.

This potential is based on an actual 16-hour gauge of 162 barrels of oil.

Operators conducted extensive tests of the Fusselman at 9,060-70 feet before plugging back for tests of the Wolfcamp.

The strike is 2,040 feet from north and 650 feet from west lines of section 9, Block 30, W&WN Survey.

FFA NEWS ITEMS

The Sterling City FFA livestock judging team competed in the San Angelo College livestock judging contest at the college farm Saturday, March 17. The Sterling team is composed of Kenneth Fincher, Billy Blair, Billy Bauer and Bill Foster.

Billy Bauer was fifth high individual in judging swine. Kenneth Fincher was high individual in judging sheep.

The Sterling team was the third high team in judging swine and tied for third high team in judging sheep with teams from Winters and from Bronte. Sterling scored 652 points in sheep. The high team in sheep judging, Menard, scored 660 points.

This contest serves as the Concho District FFA livestock judging contest. On the district level, Sterling City was first with a total score of 2,154 points; Ozona second with 2,149; and Bronte third with 2,074 points. Schools in the Concho District include Garden City, Robert Lee, San Angelo, Bronte, Lakeview, Wall, Eldorado, Ozona and Sterling City.

The next judging contest for the Sterling team will be at Sul Ross April 7. Plans are to enter livestock, grass and wool judging at Sul Ross.

Jess Marley, senior student in agriculture at Texas Tech is doing his practice teaching in the local vocational agriculture department.

Mr. Marley, a native of Ozona, will be here until April 27. He will return to Texas Tech after that to complete his requirements for his B.S. degree in agriculture education.

He will do some observing, and then do some actual teaching of some of the vocational agriculture classes. Members of the Agriculture Education staff from Tech make periodic visits to the local schools where the senior students are doing their practice teaching. This, of course, is in keeping with the FFA motto in learning by doing.

The local chapter ordinarily keeps a percentage of the funds raised yearly for use in the home county. Some years an epidemic somewhere in the nation sparks a call from the National office for any idle funds left on hand, and one year some of the money was sent to Tom Green County when they had an outbreak of polio.

In giving the results of the recent San Angelo Stock Show in last week's column, the results of the Calf Scramble were omitted. As you may remember, two Sterling County 4-H Club members took part in the afternoon performance of the rodeo on Friday, Mar. 9.

The participants were Jack Clark and Larry Stewart. Jack finished second and will receive a certificate for \$35 to be used to purchase livestock for his 4-H Club demonstration. This purchase certificate is to be used by the boy to purchase his stock prior to Oct. 1, 1962. It may be used to purchase any type of livestock that the boy and his count agent agree upon.

Larry had the misfortune that many scramblers have: he caught a calf all right, but another boy also got hold of the calf. This resulted in a tie and the judges ordered them to release the calf. After doing so, Larry was not able to get his halter on another calf.

Congratulations to both Jack and Larry on their participation, and on their sportsmanship in the event.

In last week's item about participation in the feed grain program, there was an error in the dates given. Feed grain raisers have until Mar. 30 to sign their intention to participate in the program. In last week's copy in the paper the late was given as Mar. 20 which is in error. Somewhere in setting the type, the 20 slipped in to place. Mar. 30 is the correct date.

Next Tuesday and Wednesday, Mar. 27 and 28, are the dates of the annual District 7 Sheep and Goat school at Junction for producers and county agents.

Extension Sheep specialist Jim Gray has lined up a good program in cooperation with Roy Huchabee, district agent. It includes an analysis of the sheep and goat, wool and mo-

hair situation by John McHoney, Extension economist; range management practices by Garlyn Hoffman, Extension range specialist; wool and mohair grading by Jim Gray; Wool appraisal by Ted Hokekamp of the Junction Wool Warehouse; results of the sheep selection program in Upton County by County Agent Dub Day; a sheep selection demonstration on the Aubrey Kothman ranch and results of 7 years off selection on the Kothman ranch. Aubrey has figures from the beginning of the program up to the present and they show real improvement in wool and mohair production. He also has carried on a range ram production testing program with good results and will cover that also. In addition, Bob Sims, county agent of Real County, and C.A. Stone, county agent of Gillespie County will give some results of brush control practices in their county I will cover the poisonous plant control research done by Dr. O.E. Sperry and Sterling County ranchers.

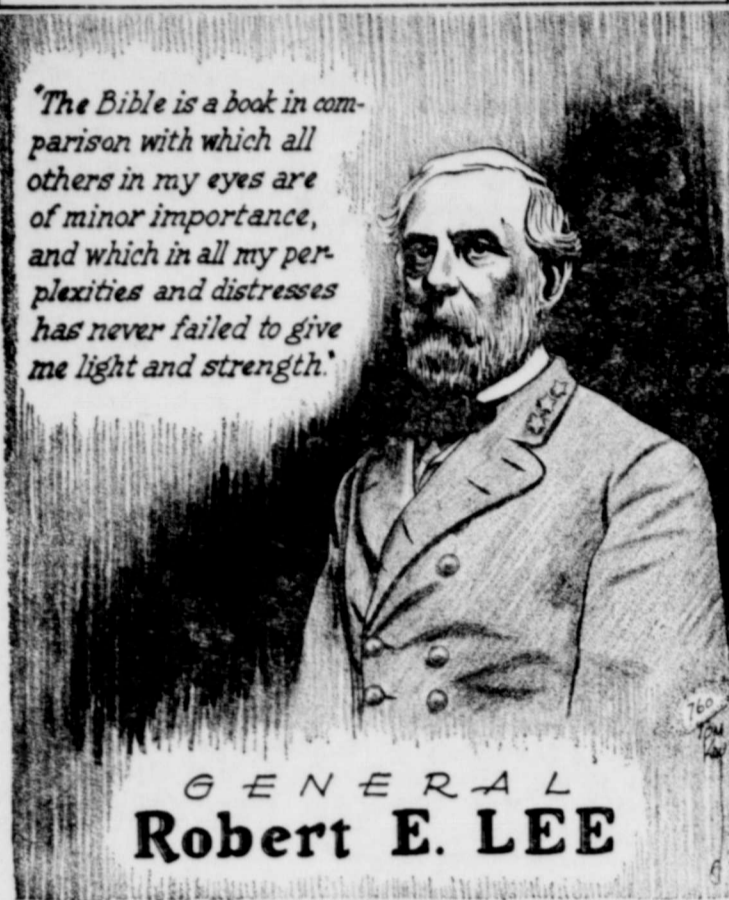

A total of 100 samples of worms were submitted for identification during the month of Feb. according to the Animal Disease Eradication division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. 58 of these cases in 24 counties were confirmed as screwworms and 42 were non-screwworms. Four cases of worms were reported but specimens were not submitted for confirmation.

They also reported that they sprayed 100 white-tailed deer being shipped from Willacy county to Georgia. Georgia is one of the states now screw-worm-free as a result of the Florida eradication program and all livestock entering must be sprayed.

Social Security

Recent social security amendments change both the requirements for payment of benefits and the rate of social security taxes according to Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. The new changes include the following:

1. Men may now get reduced payments as early as age 62.
2. Some workers already drawing the minimum monthly payment of \$33 had their checks increased to \$40.
3. People can now earn more and still draw some social security payments.
4. Workers may now qualify for benefits if they have credit for at least one quarter of work under social security for each year since 1950 up to the year they reach 65 (62 for women).
5. Payments to aged widows and widowers have been raised about ten per cent. When only one parent is receiving payments, that parent also got an increase.

In making these changes, Ellington continued, Congress has shown its usual concern for the financial soundness of the Social Security Trust Fund. To maintain the fund with enough income and reserve to make these increases in payments, Congress has adjusted the tax rates upward.

Some Benefits for Workers Who Continue to Work After Retirement Age

Just the other day, a local man read an article saying all working people 65 or over who have not applied for their social security benefits should check into it. Well, he thought he was making too much money to collect his old-age insurance benefits. He's earning about \$2200.00 a year as a maintenance man.

He is glad he followed the advice in that article because he found that some social security benefits will be payable to him for 1961, even though he continues to work. You see, a worker doesn't have to retire completely in order to get benefits. Under a law passed just last summer, a worker earning over \$1200 a year has only \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 he earns between \$1200 and \$1700. Then, for each \$1 he earns over \$1700, an additional \$1 is withheld.

The Golden Eagle, long a bane to the sheep and goat raiser, particularly in the area of the Mexican border, would be given some protection under the terms of a bill recently approved by the House committee.

An amendment adopted by the committee, however, gives the Interior Department authority to give ranchmen the right to destroy the eagles which are known to be predatory. The amendment gives that right where "it is necessary for the protection of wild-life or of agricultural or other interests in any particular locality".

The golden eagle, described by the Department of Agriculture as a "majestic bird of prey", is one of the largest of the world's eagles and has a wingspread of about seven feet.

It has been difficult to convince sponsors of this protection legislation that the golden eagle is a menace to newborn lambs, kids, and fawns, although this fact is well known in the region of the Rio Grande where these birds are quite prevalent during certain seasons. I have accumulated an abundance of information that confirms this.

Dan Auld of Kerrville is a respected authority on this subject, and he attests to the predatory habits of the eagle, based upon actual observation and experience.

Another authority in our area is W.J. Burns of Del Rio, who for years was a government trapper, writes: "I have seen the eagles fly over the pastures, and dive straight down like a bullet and rise with a lamb in its claws . . ."

Every ranchman knows about this menace. Bounties are often paid for the killing of eagles, and airplanes are sometimes employed to help protect sheep and goat raisers against losses of this kind, by shooting the eagles from the air.

While the amendment giving some protection to the ranchman is helpful, I still consider the legislation unnecessary. There is no present danger of extinction of this bird, as is contended by some. And that is the reason given for the legislation.

Soil Conservation News Column

S. K. Horwood is making plans to enter the Great Plains Conservation Program on a part of the Santa Fe Ranch. His tentatively planned program has been endorsed by the board of supervisors of the North Concho River Soil Conservation District. Brush control by tree-doing and cross fencing in addition to proper range use and deferred grazing are included in the plan.

Ruth Collins Mendenhall has recently made application for participation in the Great Plains program. The Mendenhall ranch is located in Sterling and Coke Counties and is nine and one-half sections in size.

H. E. Tubb, a Midland and Big Spring farmer, is developing a conservation plan in his farm recently purchased in the North Concho River watershed. The land was formerly a part of the Hamlin Elrod Ranch.

Fifty acres of level borders are being engineered on the Charles Phillips farm located in northeastern Glasscock County. The plans are to irrigate alfalfa in the level borders.

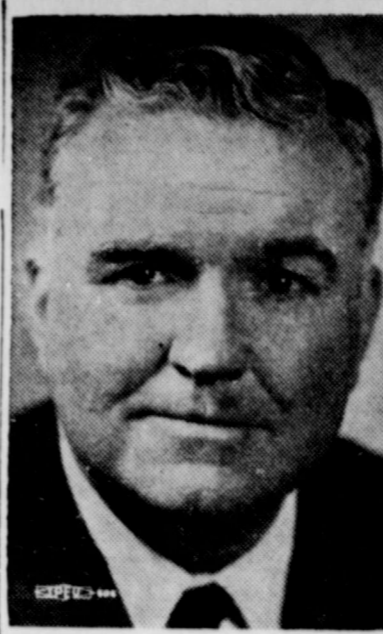
