The 16th Annual Conference Sixteenth District, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers will be held in Sterling City this Friday and Saturday, April 13-14. Theme of the conference this spring is "KEYS to Effective Learning-Open Doors: Home, School, Church."

Another state official, Mrs. James Lewis, Civil Defense Chairman, will speak at 11:15 a.m. The local P-TA is putting on a luncheon at noon Saturday in the school gym. WILDCAT SET ON FOSTER CONGERS

Champlin Oil & Refining Co., Abilene, will drill the No. 2 Foster Conger, a 9,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Sterling County, five miles south east of the Parochial Bade (San Andres and Clearfork) field and 11 miles southwest of Sterling City.

WELL FINALED ON REEDS

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 3-B Reed, extreme north-west Sterling County Montoya-Fusselman discovery, 20 miles northwest of Sterling City, was finaled to pump 10 barrels of 46.9 gravity oil, plus 85 per cent basic sediment and water.

Production was through Fusselman perforations between 9,150-53 feet and Montoya perforations between 9,248-54 feet.

Drilled to 9,248-54 feet, the project was a failure in the Ellenburger.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 151-29-W&NW.

WILDCAT ON TERRYS

Tucker Drilling Co., Inc., San Angelo, will drill the No. 1 C. F. Terry, a 5,500-foot Wichita-Albany wildcat in Sterling County, four miles southwest of Sterling City and two miles south of the west portion of the Durham (San Andres and Yates) field. Location is 1,980 feet from the west line of 14-T-T&P.

FFA NEWS COLUMN

Kenneth Fincher Hi Point Livestock Judge at Sul Ross

Kenneth Fincher, Sterling City FFA member of the livestock judging team, was the high scoring individual at the annual Sul Ross State College judging contest held Saturday, April 7, on the Sul Ross campus at Alpine. Kenneth, a senior in Sterling High school, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Orb Fincher of Water Valley.

Kenneth was the third high individual in judging beef cattle, tied for high individual honors in judging swine, and was the high individual in judging sheep. He scored 232 in sheep, the second high individual had a score of 257.

Kenneth scored 611 points out of a possible 650 in the livestock contest to lead the field of contestants from approximately 60 schools in the livestock judging. The second place overall high individual came in with a score of 570 points.

The Sterling City FFA livestock judging team came in with a 5th place in the overall judging. Other members of the team are Billy Blair and Bill Foster. The Sterling team had a total score of 1559; the winning team, Big Spring, had a total of 1,591 points.

The Sterling City FFA wool judging team, composed of Billy Bauer, Tommy Foster and James Latham, placed fifth in the wool judging contest at Sul Ross last Saturday, April 7. Billy Bauer was the seventh high individual in the contest. Billy was the seventh high individual in the judging portion of the contest. James Latham was the 8th high individual in the grading division of the contest.

The wool judging contest consists of grading 20 wool fleeces according to fineness, length for grade and yield; and then placing two classes of four wool fleeces each and answering 10 questions on each class. Each contestant has a possible score of 400 points.

Members of the wool and mohair judging teams and the range judging team plan to enter the contests at San Angelo Junior College Saturday, April 14. The range judging contest will be held Saturday morning at the college farm, and the wool and mohair contests will be conducted Saturday afternoon at the college.

Trials Set for May 7

Four felony driving while intoxicated indictments were returned Monday by the 51st District Grand jury here and all were set for trial on May 7.

District Attorney Justin A. Kever said two other second offense driving while intoxicated cases have been called to trial the same day.

The indictments were returned against J.W. Brower, 39, of Odessa; Arnold Pavay Grundy, 49, of Llano; Arthur Z. Dean, 50, of Big Spring; and Doris Hayter Moore, 34, of San Angelo.

Brower was arrested Oct. 29, 1961 on U.S. 87 south of Sterling City. A prior conviction allegedly occurred in Moore County in 1951.

Grundy was charged with second offense DWI in November, 1961, after an arrest south of Sterling City on U.S. 87. A prior conviction is alleged in Llano County in 1955.

Dean, arrested Nov. 19, 1961, nine miles north of Sterling City, was allegedly convicted previously on a DWI charge in Howard County in 1951.

Doris Moore, arrested in Sterling City on Nov. 28, 1961 was previously convicted in 1955 in Hutchinson County, the state alleges.

Also to be tried here on felony driving while intoxicated charges are Charles Franklin Carter, arrested June 18, 1961, and Alonzo Horace Lloyd, 53, formerly of San Angelo.



AROUND THE COUNTY by

Friday the thirteenth--a bad day or just another day? Some believe that it is a day in which to be especially careful because it brings all sorts of bad events and mishaps. To others it's just another day of the week. It all depends on your beliefs. The black name was probably hung on Friday the thirteenth because of some disastrous event many, many years ago when people were more fearful of witches and the like, so each to his own beliefs.

The West Texas Wool and Mohair Association at Mertzon was not fearful of the date when they set their annual barbecue on Friday April 13. Bill Sims, county agent of Irion County, advises that the barbecue will be held at the football field in Mertzon with "the eating" at 6:00 P.M.

The program will concern wool from the shearing machine to the scouring plant, and the sheep and goat industry outlook. Jim Gray, Extension sheep specialist, will handle the wool portion of the program while John McHaney, Extension economist, will take care of the outlook portion of the program.

Last year over 200 ranchers and friends attended the program. This year they are again looking for a large crowd. A good many Sterling County ranchers attend the event.

Several persons have asked if there are any control measures they can take to get rid of the large amount of rescuegrass and ryegrass in their lawns now. These two grasses are cool season grasses of course that will coon die out. But, in the meantime they are using moisture that Bermuda grass or other lawn grasses might be using to get started. These two lawn invaders can delay the lawn grasses several weeks.

The recommended control for rescuegrass and ryegrass in lawns is endothal. It is available at a number of garden supplies stores. The recommended dosage for these two grasses is 7 tablespoons of endothal per gallon of water; add one teaspoon of liquid household detergent, or commercial wetting agent, or 3 tablespoons of dry household detergent to the mixture. Apply with a ray moy or broadcast sprayer until the leaves and stems are wet. Apply when grass is small; with the grass as far along as it is now, mow the grass and wait 3 or 4 days and then apply the treatment. The endothal will also kill the goatheads, little barley, clovers, and filaree and might even get the wild onions although it is not recommended specifically for onions.

Endothal is toxic to all warm blooded creatures taken internally. Follow directions closely on the container. It would probably be well to remove your pets for a few days from the sprayed lawn, and keep small children off to keep them from putting some of the sprayed grass in their mouth.



"Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year."

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

Some Benefits for Workers Who Continue to Work After Retirement Age

Just the other day, a local man read an article saying all working people 65 or over who have not applied for their social security benefits should check into it. Well, he thought he was making too much money to collect his old-age insurance benefits. He's earning about \$2200.00 a year as a maintenance man.

He is glad he followed the advice in that article because he found that some social security benefits will be payable to him for 1961, even though he continues to work. You see, a worker doesn't have

to retire completely in order to get benefits. Under a law passed just last summer, a worker earning over \$1200 a year has only \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 he earns between \$1200 and \$1700. Then, for each \$1 he earns over \$1700, an additional \$1 is withheld.

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office.


"This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said.



Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments
 The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program. Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

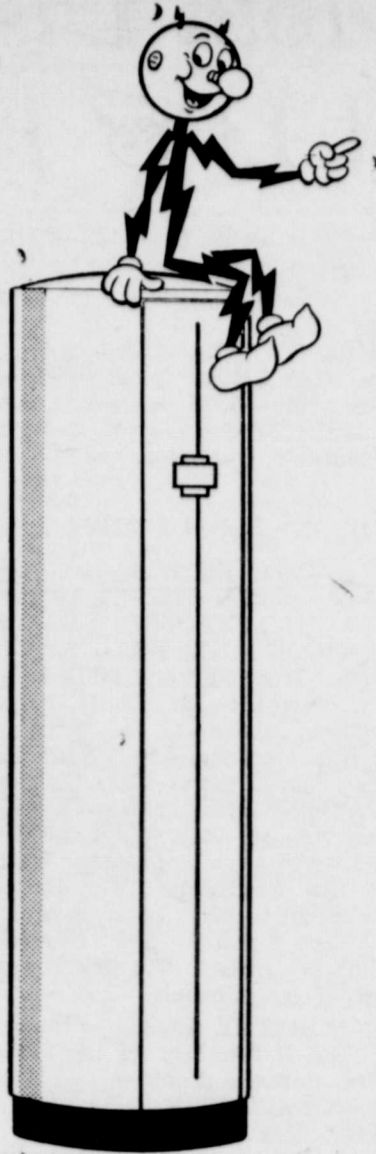
The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

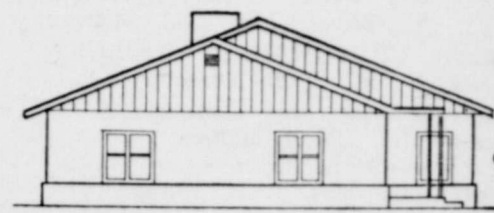

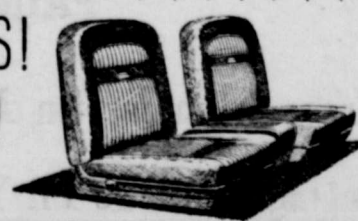
