Federal support for the drive against the screwworm got a boost last week when the House voted \$500 thousand to help finance the program along the Rio Grande. This, added to prior appropriations and the voluntary contributions from Texas ranchmen and farmers, insures a high-gear attack in this relentless war against the deadly blowfly.

Right now, from 50 to 75 million sterile flies are being produced each week, and they are being dropped from airplanes all up and down the Rio Grande where screwworm outbreaks are reported.

Establishment of a barrier along the Mexico-Texas border, to prevent reinfestation of the eradication areas, will require

continued releases of the sterilized flies, control of livestock shipments, and inspection and treatment of animals by livestock owners both within and beyond the barrier zone.

This battle can and will be won. By drawing upon the combined resources of the Federal and State governments, the cooperation of local stockmen, and the reservoir of scientific knowledge—put into active use—victory appears to be in sight. But this is but the beginning of a campaign that must be continued for years.

Indictments of two top communists a few days ago will probably be followed soon by other indictments. They were charged with failing to register with the government as required by the Internal Security Act.

The officials are Gus Hall, general party secretary, and Negro Benjamin J. Davis, national secretary. The U.S. Communist Party itself, also indicted on a charge of failing to register as an agent of the Soviet Union, will be prosecuted first.

Hall was indicted on five counts and Davis on six. Conviction on each count carries a maximum penalty of five years in jail and \$10,000 fine.

These commies claim the registration requirement violates the Fifth Amendment guarantee against self-incrimination. The issue will be finally determined by the Supreme Court, which be a 5-to-4 decision upheld the resignation Act. But since then Justice Whitaker, who favored the law, has retired and has been replaced by Byron White

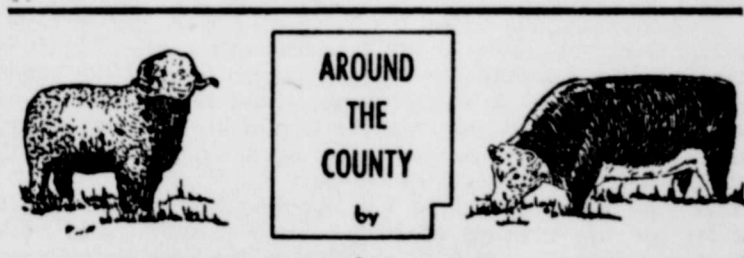

Men, your wives have reason to complain about their feet hurting them at the end of the day. Recent tests in which pedometers were attached to housewives showed that they walk an average of eight and three-quarters miles a day—just about the same distance a cross country runner takes on in his races.

The runner wears especially designed shoes to provide maximum foot efficiency and keep his feet and legs in top condition. What does the housewife wear? Frilly bedroom slippers, spike heels, or goes barefooted according to the surveys. Little wonder she complains about her feet hurting or that women suffer from feet trouble five times as much as men do.

Good buildings must have good foundations. People—men and women—have a foundation too in their feet and shoes. Protect them by wearing properly fitted shoes.

We often hear the old story from some quarters about agricultural being a declining industry. Tom Prater, Extension Farm Management Specialist, disputes this and some facts to prove his contention.

During the 1950's there was a 29 per cent increase in the total output and it is expected to rise even more by 1970. Farm and ranch operations will be larger, many operations will double in the next few years. Capital values will increase, competition will be greater.

In the 1950's one farmer was

feeding 27 persons: By 1970, it is estimated that he will be feeding 50 persons.

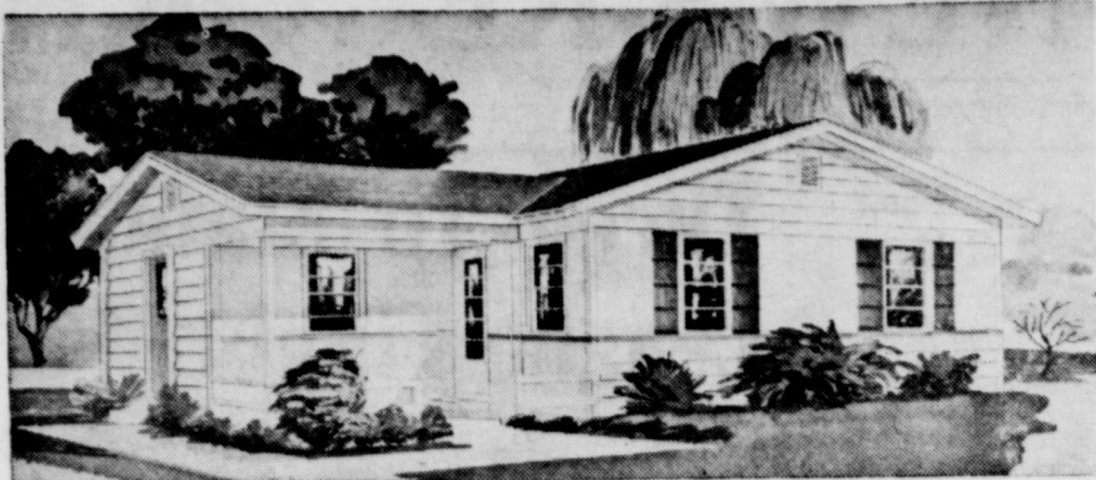
In 1940 the assets used per farm or ranch worker in production were \$3,413—in 1960 \$21,203, and it is predicted to be even higher by 1970. Basing this on constant dollar values for 1947-1949, the above figures would represent \$7,347 in 1940 and 14,703 in 1960.

Agriculture is constantly becoming more competitive. It definitely is not a declining industry regardless of what some think. The necessary food, fiber, and shelter is produced on our nations farms and without this, our civilization would collapse.

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HELP ALWAYS GLADLY GIVEN AT SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE

"Although not everyone wants to retire as soon as he reaches retirement age, everyone wants to get his social security checks promptly, when he does," Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office said.

"We at the Social Security Office are glad" he said, "to give specific help and information where it is needed whether in proving age or any other phase of establishing entitlement to benefits. Because we are interested in paying claims promptly, we urge future applicants to give some time and thought to planning ahead for retirement."

By consulting the Social Security Office by phone or mail two to three months before he retires, the prospective claimant can find out what papers he needs and get every thing in order in good time. This way there should be no delay in the mailing of his first check.

Detailed information and

free booklets on the social security program can also be obtained by writing the Social Security Office at San Angelo, Texas.

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year.

An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regardless of his net profit for the year.

Anyone who earns over \$100 in every month, and over \$1200 in the year as well, may still be eligible for some pay-

ments. Each two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700 a year, costs only one dollar in social security benefits; over \$1700, each additional dollar reduces benefits one dollar.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

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Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments

The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.
