AROUND THE COUNTY by

According to an April 18 announcement, the screwworm transport control line has been moved farther north. The line now extends from Del Rio to Sonora to Junction to Fredericksburg to Blanco to San Marcos to Luling to Gonzales to Hallettsville. Wharton, and Matagorda. Screwworms have been found as far west as Sander son in Terrell County and as far east as Brazoria. Two hundred cases developed during the week of April 11-18.

Five specimens were sent in from Sterling County in the first three days of the week. One specimen sent in last Friday has been classified as negative or not screwworms. As more ranchers shear, more samples will probably be coming in for mailing.

When you find what you suspect are screwworms, contact the county agent's office for shipping containers. Take about 10 worms from the wound, place them in a small bottle of alcohol or water, and bring them in for shipping.

The Texas screwworm eradication program has been given a big push with the states of Louisiana, Oklahoma, and New Mexico now officially cooperating in the program. They are organizing on the same basis as Texas.

As of April 1, 247 Texas Counties were organized and working on the program. This leaves seven counties as unorganized. The majority of these counties are in the Panhandle area of the state.

Fifteen million flies are being produced weekly but by April 24, production was to reach 20 million. By July 1, when the Mission plant goes into operation, 75 million flies will be produced weekly.

The District 7 4-H Club elimination contests will be held Saturday, April 28 at the San Angelo College. These contests will determine which teams compete in the State 4-H Contests at College Station in June.

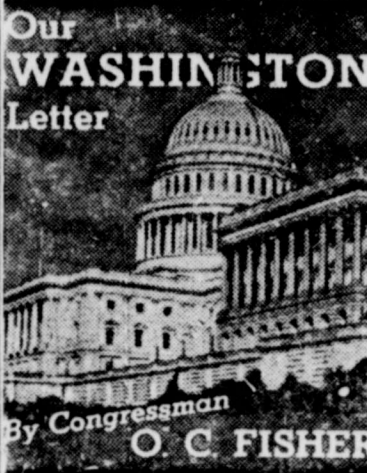

Eddie Braswell, county office manager of the ASCS, advises that all applications for payments on wool and unshorn lambs must be signed on or before April 30. Under the provisions of Wool Incentive program, receipts for wool and lambs sold between April 1, 1962 and Mar. 31, 1962 must be turned in to the local ASCS office and applications signed by April 30, Monday, if you are to receive payment.

Our WASHINGTON Letter

If the people in southwest Texas had their way about it there would be no medical care program under social security; no federal school aid; no UN bond purchase; no expansion of the Peace Corps and the Congress would retain its constitutional responsibilities rather than delegating some of them to the President, on a standby basis.

Results of tabulation of the questionnaires just completed reveal an aroused public interest in governmental affairs in our area. Plugging for lower federal spending, fewer controls, less government in the affairs of the people, Texans spoke out strongly and decisively in answer to the 24 questions submitted.

On the question of expanding the Peace Corps (whose mission is largely a duplication of Point 4) 79 per cent were against and only 9 per cent favored more spending on this project.

The people voted more than 4-to-1 against the medicare proposal, the adoption of which would force an increase in the social security tax.

Federal school aid was defeated more than 3-to-1. In fact, of 382 teachers who answered, 289 were opposed to federal aid for teachers' salaries.

"Right to work" laws were favored by well over 10-to-1. And 81 per cent for and 6 per cent opposed a law requiring labor unions to confirm to antitrust laws on the same basis as private corporations and business enterprises are now required to do.

Nearly 75 per cent oppose any expansion of unemployment compensation. Hundreds of citizens wrote in to cite specific instances of abuses in this program, where unemployed refuse to seek or accept gainful employment so long as they can draw unemployment benefits.

And they take a dim view of the various new welfare programs that they have been submitted to the Congress.

By a margin of nearly 5-to-1 these Texans think we should forego any raises for government employees at this time.

And by a ratio of better than 2 and one-half to 1 the people oppose H.R. 3745, a World War I pension bill.

Foreign aid should be confined to friendly countries, and it should be reduced or eliminated.

This is the voice of the people of the 21st district. Some 15,000 expressed themselves. This represents a fairly accurate cross-section of public opinion.

Little Mark Floyd Fatally Burned Sunday

Funeral services for little Charles Mark Floyd, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Floyd of Midland, were held there Tuesday afternoon at 3 p.m. in the Ellis Funeral Chapel and burial followed in the Resthaven Cemetery.

Little Mark died at 12:04 a. m. Monday in Midland Memorial Hospital from burns suffered while his father was starting a barbecue fire.

The mother of Mark is the former Ginger Lane, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Lane of Sterling.

Investigators said the child was playing nearby as his father, Jimmy Charles Floyd, 29, and his grandfather, L. B. Floyd of Fort Worth, were starting the fire. They ran out of charcoal lighter fluid and were using gasoline from a glass jug. As the child's father sloshed the gasoline on the fire the fire flared up and he dropped the jug on the concrete floor of the garage. It shattered and flaming gasoline covered the child.

The child's father suffered second degree burns on his legs and an arm and is in Midland Memorial Hospital. The senior Floyd, who had second degree burns on his arms and first degree burns on his face, was treated and released from the hospital.

The family had been living in Midland since last October, moving there from Fort Worth. The child's father is a sales engineer for American Manufacturing Co.

Survivors include the parents; a sister, Teresa Renee Floyd; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd and Mrs. and Mrs. Ray Lane—of Sterling City; and a great grandmother, Mrs. Teresa Lane of Brownwood.

Alvie said that 247 Texas counties have been organized and money collected to help in the eradication program in the state. The federal government is paying half the costs and livestock raisers are attempting to raise their half of the six million needed.

A new plant to breed the flies and sterilize them is being built in Mission, Texas. The sterilized flies, both male and female, are released over areas where screwworms are known to be, and the problem works itself out from there.

Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments

The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

APRIL 30 IS DEADLINE FOR FILING 1961 WOOL APPLICATIONS FOR INCENTIVE PAYMENT

Monday, April 30, is the last day for filing applications for payments for the 1961 marketing year under the wool payment program, growers were reminded April 25 by Eddie Braswell, County Office Manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office for Sterling County.

The payments for the 1961 marketing year cover shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31 of this year. Later marketings will be eligible for payments

for the 1962 marketing year. Mr. Braswell stressed the fact that the payments on wool and lambs are not made automatically -- growers must file applications which are supported with all the necessary sales records in order to receive payments under the program.

Since these sales records will be the basis for calculating the national average price received by farmers for wool during the entire marketing year, it is to the grower's advantage to file his application early. When the average price can be determined, the payment rates for shorn wool and unshorn lambs sold during the 1961 marketing

year will be announced. The payments will be made to growers during the summer, the early part of July.

Wool program applicants should be filled at the ASCS County Office and this should be done as soon as possible but no later than April 30, 1961. Eddie R. Braswell, County Office Manager ASCS Sterling County

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Some Benefits for Workers Who Continue to Work After Retirement Age

Just the other day, a local man read an article saying all working people 65 or over who have not applied for their social security benefits should check into it. Well, he thought he was making too much money to collect his old-age insurance benefits. He's earning about \$2200.00 a year as a maintenance man.

He is glad he followed the advice in that article because he found that some social security benefits will be payable to him for 1961, even though he continues to work. You see, a worker doesn't have to retire completely in order to get benefits. Under a law passed just last summer, a worker earning over \$1200 a year has only \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 he earns between \$1200 and \$1700. Then, for each \$1 he earns over \$1700, an additional \$1 is withheld.

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year."

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

HELP ALWAYS GLADLY GIVEN AT SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE

"Although not everyone wants to retire as soon as he reaches retirement age, everyone wants to get his social security checks promptly, when he does," Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office said.

"We at the Social Security Office are glad," he said, "to give specific help and information where it is needed whether in proving age or any other phase of establishing entitlement to benefits. Because we are interested in paying claims promptly, we urge future applicants to give some time and thought to planning ahead for retirement."

By consulting the Social Security Office by phone or mail two to three months before he retires, the prospective claimant can find out what papers he needs and get every thing in order in good time. This way there should be no delay in the mailing of his first check.

Detailed information and free booklets on the social security program can also be obtained by writing the Social Security Office at San Angelo, Texas.

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year.

An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regard-

less of his net profit for the year

Anyone who earns over \$100 in every month, and over \$1200 in the year as well, may still be eligible for some payments. Each two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700 a year, costs only one dollar in social security benefits; over \$1700, each additional dollar reduces benefits one dollar.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

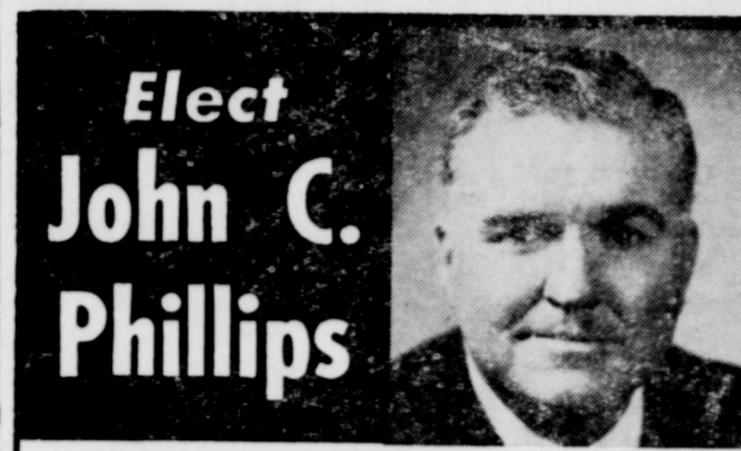

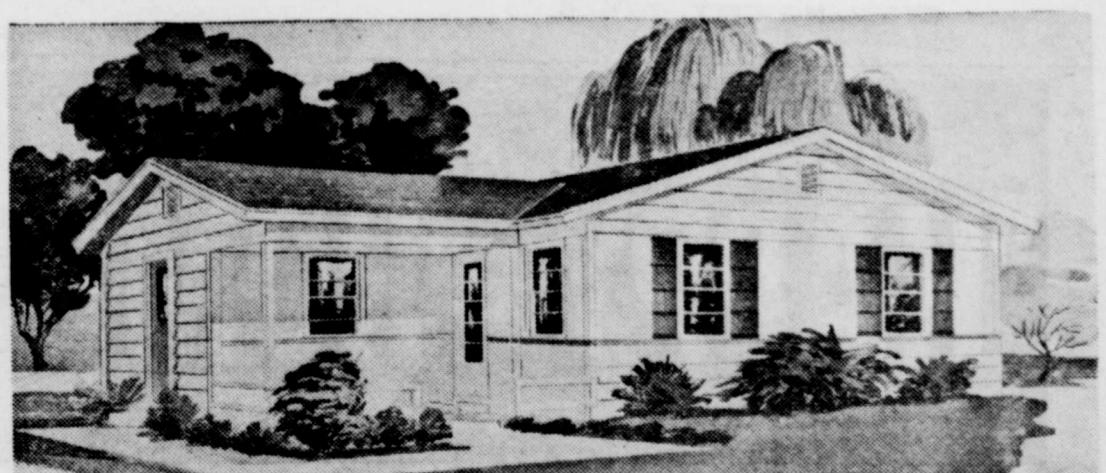
